Voter Registration In Charlestown



History Comes Alive On The 'USS Cassin Young'

Boston National Historical Park will debut a new program, "Tin Can Blue Jacket," a free living history tour of the World War II Destroyer USS Cassin Young on Wednesday, Aug. 24 at 2 p.m., at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The hour-long program will transport visitors in time and place to San Pedro, California in May of 1946 where USS Cassin Young was being refitted.

Their guide during the tour of Cassin Young will be Boatswain's Mate Second Class Christopher Heywood, portrayed in character by National Park Service Ranger Chris Edwards.

Many units of the National Park System offer "first person" living history programs. This is the first time such a program has been presented aboard USS Cassin Young.


Edwards used a variety of archival sources as well as former ship's crew to research his program.

"Tin Can Blue Jacket" will be presented every Sunday, Wednesday and Thursday at 2 p.m. through Oct. 13. Tours are limited to 12 visitors on a first-come, first-served basis.

Visitors should plan on arriving aboard ship by 1:30 p.m. Small children under four feet in height cannot be accommodated. Visitors should also be aware of steep ladders above and below decks during the tour.

All National Park Service interpretive programs are free of charge.







Included is the installation of new street name signs and miscellaneous traffic control signs. Crosswalks will be placed at street comers to connect the newly constructed sidewalk wheelchair ramps. In September, tree plantings are scheduled on Union and Tremont streets.

Pavement rehabilitation work is scheduled to begin next week on Soley and Cordis streets. This work includes grinding and milling the surface of the existing pavement, miscellaneous patching, sweeping and clean up of road debris and adjusting manhole covers and catch basins to meet the grade of the new road surface. This will be followed by placement of a new layer of pavement.

Additional gas lamp post base sections were recently installed on Union and Tremont streets. The top portions of the posts and the gas lamps are scheduled for delivery and installation within the next two weeks on these streets as well as on Winthrop Street.

In recent weeks, precast concrete bases for new gas street lights have been installed on Cordis, Soley and Boyle streets, and Cordis Street Avenue. Service piping to connect the future lights to the gas main in the street has been installed by crews from the Boston Gas Company. Work crews are currently performing repair work for permanent sidewalk and roadway patching in the areas that have been disturbed by this work.

Residents are reminded that weekday parking restrictions remain in effect as posted on those streets where construction work is taking place. Continued cooperation in complying with these restrictions is appreciated.

Paper Company contacted Lescault, he, in turn, contacted the USS Constitution Maintenance and Repair Facility in the Charlestown Navy Yard. After members of the Naval Historical Center Detachment, Boston, traveled to Bainbridge to inspect the trees, they worked out a donation agreement with the paper company.

Once the logs were approved for use on the historexposure to the elements until the Navy could finalize shipping arrangements.

The timber remained in Georgia for approximately three months and with the completion of shipping arrangements, the logs arrived in Charlestown by two truckloads, one on June 9 and the other on June 15. They are currently being stored in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The timber for the origi-

nal structure came from Georgia's barrier islands, according to records at the Naval Historical Center. The ship's nickname, "Old Ironsides" is attributed to the strength and density of the live oak planks that formed the ship's outer hull, Lescault said. A British seaman allegedly shouted, "Huzzah! Her sides are made of iron!," when he saw how British shot rebounded off Constitution's sides. Georgia's white oak is used for other portions of the ship's construction.





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A LEASE OPTION LETS YOU TRY OUT A HOME BEFORE BUYING

Leasing a home with the option to buy can make sense – for both the seller and the buyer. It gives the home buyer time to try out the home while getting his credit in order. And owners find that lease option tenants usually take better care of their property, often making substantial improvements at their own expense.

It is frequently difficult for first-time buyers to purchase a home due to the large down payments often required. That's why renting with an option to buy is perfect for buyers who have good income but are short on cash. And for those with some apprehension over such a major purchase, the option period will give ample time to thoroughly check out the house and neighborhood. At the same time, the home owner will continue to nail down the tax deductions.

A lease option agreement can take many forms. A typical purchase option usually provides for an upfront "non-refundable" payment for the consideration to purchase the home anytime within the rental period. It's not unheard of for a buyer to negotiate as much as a 50% rent credit toward the purchase price. Buyers would also be well advised to lock in the purchase price at today's market value.

The seller need not pay federal tax on any option money received until either the option is executed or it expires unexercised. If the tenant exercises his option and buys the house, the option money becomes part of the purchase price. If the tenant decides not to buy the house, then the option money is treated as income and must be reported on the seller's income tax returns. But in the meantime, the seller can continue to depreciate the house while it is being rented.

As with all contractual agreements, it is always advisable to consult an attorney before signing any documents. And buyers should be sure a memorandum of the lease option has been properly recorded.

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'S.S. John W. Brown' Steams Into Boston Harbor Aug. 23 – Charlestown W.W. II Merchant Marine Veterans To Be Honored

The S.S. John W. Brown, one of only two remaining World War II Liberty Ships, steams into the port of Boston for the first time next Tuesday, Aug 23. This fully-restored floating memorial, dedicated to the men and women who built, sailed and defended the World War II Liberty fleet, will dock at the Charlestown Navy Yard at approximately 8:30 a.m.

The ship will then be open to the public from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. through Friday, Aug. 26 and again on Sunday, Aug. 28 from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Admission to the ship is free, with voluntary contributions strongly encouraged.

During the early years of World War II, President Franklin D. Roosevelt organized an unprecedented emergency shipbuilding program. In order to build ships faster than the enemy could sink them, more than 2,700 Liberty ships were produced between 1941 and 1945. These were not warships, but merchant vessels that carried two-thirds of all the heavy equipment, weapons and supplies needed to launch the Allied offensive.

About 2,500 Liberty ships survived the war. Now, only the John W. Brown and the Jeremiah O'Brien, berthed in San



Francisco, remain intact and are fully-restored.

The remarkable restoration of the John W. Brown was undertaken by Project Liberty Ship Inc., a nonprofit, all-volunteer organization. In the past six years since Project Liberty Ship retrieved the Brown from the reserve fleet in Virginia, more than 250,000 man hours and \$2.8 million have been spent to restore the ship to steaming condition, reactivating her as a maritime museum and memorial. In 1991, the John W. Brown sailed under her own power for the first time since her seagoing career ended in 1946.

The crew serving aboard the John W. Brown is unique. Now in their 60s and 70s, many of the volunteers were officers and crewmen on the Brown, or on other Liberty ships during the war. These veteran merchant mariners, shipyard workers and Naval Armed Guardsmen remain dedicated to keeping the history of the Liberty fleet alive. Visitors to the John W. Brown will survey a vessel restored to look as it did at the end of World War II and meet original Liberty ship crewmen at work.

A rare opportunity to sail aboard the **John W**. **Brown** is offered on Satur-

day, Aug. 27 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. A six-hour "Cruise Into History" will feature tours of the ship, displays of authentic period military gear, World War II aircraft fly-bys, dancing to 1940s music of a live Big Band, a continental breakfast and a buffet luncheon. Tickets for the cruise are \$100 per guest (tax deductible) and can be obtained by calling Frank J. Valenti. Project Liberty Ship, at (215) 836-5730.

On Sunday, Aug. 28, Charlestown residents who served in the Merchant Marines during World War II and made the supreme sacrifice will be honored. The men and women who served as Merchant Marines during that war have recently been designated as veterans. Plans for the cer-

emony are being coordinated by the Charlestown Veterans Committee, Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion and the administrators of the John W. Brown.

A service will be held on board the Brown at 10 a.m. followed by a procession to the newly refurbished buffer zone along Medford Street at the entrance to the former Revere Sugar facility, for the unveiling of a plaque, sponsored by Massport, in honor of the local Merchant Marine veterans of World War II and the following who died in the service of their country: Frederick W. Cahill, Paul E. Carroll, Alan I. Doherty, Robert D. Eatherton, Jeremiah J. Harrington, Edward F. Kelly and Charles H. Stevens.


