The morning of June 17 saw modern-day patriots gathering at the top of Bunker Hill to remember those patriots who fought and died in this town on June 17, 1775. This day marked the 222nd anniversary of the first pitched battle of the Revolutionary War as the colonists took on the elite British forces in their quest for freedom. This year's celebration also marked the 200th anniversary of the USS Constitution and the 100th birthday of Charlestown being her home port. As has become tradition, the day began with a service of music, prayer and readings at St. Francis de Sales Church - on top of Bunker Hill. Guests were led into the church by the color guards of the USS Constitution and the Charlestown High School MA 761st Air Force JROTC, accompanied by the Colonial Band of Lawrence, the Spirit of America Fife and Drum Corps and the Pipes





Courageous Center Sailing Youth Program Enrollment Opens

School's out, but children can continue the enjoyment of learning this summer by enrolling in the Courageous Sailing Center's Youth Program. The Courageous Sailing Center is staffed with accomplished youth sailors from local high schools and colleges who are prepared to teach the finer points of sailing to urban children ranging in age from 8 to 20.

Through a "Five-Step" Program, students can choose from a variety of lessons - from a half-day beginner class to a competitive racing class. But, Courageous provides more than just sailing lessons. The program prides itself on creating recreational opportunities, building leadership, and offering jobs to a multi-cultural set of young people in Boston. The Center aims to impact lives by giving Boston's youth an opportunity to learn about teamwork, decision making and leadership through the sport of sailing during its progressive educational program.

Here's how it works: The Five Step Program

Step One is a taste of sailing. This half-day program allows children to experience their first time on the water, without the intensity of a weeklong course. Children who show interest in learning more about sailing may advance to Step Two.

Step Two is a learn-to-sail program for beginners. The course lasts one week, and includes instruction on the water and in the classroom. Children who complete this course can advance to the intermediate program.

Step Three is an intermediate program for more advanced sailors. The course spans the entire summer, and is intended to prepare students to compete in the R19 Junior Nationals, and for entrance into the junior instructor program if desired.

Step Four is the junior instructor training program. This program is designed for children who have established a long-term relationship with Courageous and have become accomplished sailors through training provided earlier in the program. During this phase of training, students are required to learn presentation, communications and leadership skills. Aspiring junior instructors shadow senior instructors as a means to learn various teaching techniques for on and off the water lessons.

Step Five establishes the student as a senior instructor. The student who achieves this level carries the responsibility of a role model and mentor for children coming up through the program. Senior instructors teach junior instructors how to improve their onthe-water and classroom skills and how to communicate effectively with the students they will eventually teach.



THE LENDER'S APPRAISAL PROCESS

He'll take each one, starting with the selling price, then he'll add the value of each feature your home has that the comparable home lacks and subtract the value for your features that are not found in the comparable. If your sales price is in line with the adjusted sales prices of the comparables, you're in good shape. If the appraisal indicates the price is too high, the Realtors have their work cut out. Catholic Elementary School. St. Catherine's School was his alma mater.



★ Keep Pets Cool In The Summer Months . . . Summer has arrived and already the heat is getting to us - and our pets. The Animal Rescue League of Boston is receiving numerous calls concerning animals in distress due to the heat. The league warns pet owners that the heat of the summer can be detrimental, and some cases, fatal to pets. Leaving pets at home with plenty of fresh, cool water and shade is recommended over car trips.

Animals can easily become a victim of heat stroke if left unattended in cars, vans and trucks, since these metal vehicles act like ovens, quickly raising temperatures inside to fatal levels.

Never leave pets in a parked car, even if the windows are open. Ten minutes is too long on a hot day.

If your pet is suffering from heat discomfort such as excessive panting, glassy staring, hot skin, vomiting, collapsed physical condition or an inability to respond to commands, prompt action must be taken to prevent brain damage and death. Immerse the animal in cold water and apply ice packs to the head and neck areas. Seek medical attention at once. For further information, contact the Animal Rescue League of Boston at 426-9170.





Fleet's In - At The USS Constitution **Bicentennial Model Show**

This year on the Fourth of July an extraordinary fleet of ship models - representing 200 years of USS Constitution and US Navy history - will tie up at the USS Constitution Museum in the Charlestown Navy Yard. 

Gallagher Participates In Evacuation Operations In Sierra Leone

Marine PFC Edward H. Gallagher, son of Edward H. and Ellen M. Gallagher of Elm Street, Charlestown, who recently departed on a six-month deployment, is a member of the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) which recently conducted noncombatant evacuation operations in Sierra Leone.

The U.S. European Command ordered the evacuation of American citizens from Sierra Leone at the request of the State Department. Since May 30, more than 2,500 people have been evacuated. Citizens from the U.S. and several foreign countries were transported to USS Kearsarge for further transfer to a follow-on location.

The evacuation was conducted with French, Nigerian and Sierra Leonean surface ships on station, and Marine and Navy helicopters. Conducting air and well deck operations simultaneously, USS Kearsarge also launched one Landing Craft Air Cushion with supporting security forces from the 22nd MEU aboard to be utilized as necessary.

The 22nd MEU remains available in the area to conduct additional evacuations as necessary.







tion began in 1794, the same year the first monument to the Battle of Bunker Hill was dedicated right here.

USS Constitution was launched in Boston on October 21, 1797. Constitution's warm-ups to her main event were in the "Quasi-War" with France, and fighting the Corsairs on the Barbary Coast of the Mediterranean. But 29 years after the upstart colonies had won the War of Independence, our fledgling nation found itself fighting a sequel to the Revolution.

A single event that parallels the importance of the Battle of Bunker Hill occurred in the summer of 1812. This was a time when President Madison refused to put up any longer with the indignities of servitude and oppression by Great Britain.

This was also a time when not all Americans were in favor of a war against Britain. As in the early Revolutionary period, there were many who feared dire consequences for our new nation when we declared war on Great Britain in the Spring of 1812. That's when USS Constitution sailed from Boston, and on 19 August, 1812, intercepted H.M.S. Guerriere. After twenty minutes of pounding broadsides, the ships collided, presenting the opportunity to board. Capt. Isaac Hull gave the command, and with sword in hand and displaying the same gallantry so evident in the colonists at the Battle of Bunker Hill, charged across the bowsprit immediately losing his life to a musket ball at point blank range.

The fighting continued until 10 minutes later, *Guerriere* was ours. Once again, just 37 years after Bunker Hill, another generation of patriots and a single event fired up our nation with the confidence and courage that we could fight and win against the British. *Constitution* went on to a grand succession of victories, never losing an engagement. But none of her victories ever matched the dramatic impact on our nation as the battle with *Guerriere*... like the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The Battle of Bunker Hill and the USS Constitution have much in common. Both were main events in the extended struggle that eventually won us true independence from Great Britain. But they're even more than that; they are icons in our wonderful history of American tenacity, courage, and pride - prerequisites of a great nation.

The USS Constitution was integral to America's assertion of our rights as a sovereign nation. The War of 1812 has often been referred to as the "Second War of American Independence," for with the end of this war, we had finally broken free from British harassment, secured our borders, and earned the international regard due our nation.

So this is a terrific anniversary year for both The Battle of Bunker Hill, symbolizing the beginning of our first war for independence, and the USS Constitution, symbolizing the successful completion of our second war for independence. These two events, the 222nd anniversary of Bunker Hill and the bicentennial of USS Constitution, are clear testimony to a common struggle that achieved our nationhood.

Think for a moment about the differences in the makeup of these men, those colonists at Breed's and Bunker Hill, and the heroic Americans on the decks of USS Constitution compared to the British whose colony they were? I believe it had to do with COMMITMENT.

The British were committed just to a person. They were members of the Royal British Army ... the Royal British Navy. His Majesty, King George III, was the person to whom each member of the Royal Army and Royal Navy was committed. For much of British history, that commitment to the crown - His or Her Majesty - had been enough to make England great. But it was not enough to carry the weight of the American Revolution, and that is why we are gathered here on this hallowed ground today.

Likewise, the American Sailors and Marines aboard Constitution unlike the British, were not committed to a person. They were committed to high principles and lofty ideals. They were committed to the indefatigable principles of no taxation without representation, free trade, sailors' rights, and to the noble ideals of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

These American patriots whom we honor here today were individuals who had sworn no oath to another person, regardless of their status of birth, but had instead pledged themselves and their sacred honor to the cause, principle and ideal of freedom for all people. It was their commitment to these high ideals and principles that differentiated them from their British opponents.

It is to this, their legacy of commitment to the Constitution of the United States, that we honor, memorialize and re-dedicate ourselves today. That's the linkage between these two wonderful legacies of our past, and it is incredible that they lie virtually side by side here in Charlestown.

This is a fitting tribute to so many American patriots who put their country and noble ideals ahead of their personal safety and well being, so that we could enjoy the fruits of their sacrifice. May the spirit of their selfless commitment to high and righteous ideals be with us forever. Thank you for this wonderful opportunity to come here and celebrate with you,



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

KEEP YOUR WILL CURRENT

Do you think that you don't really need a will? Without one, your assets may go to someone other than you intend, and your child's guardian may turn out to be someone other than your first choice.

State law takes over when someone dies intestate, that is, without a will. If you are childless, all of your assets may go to your spouse, or they may be split between your spouse and your parents. If you have children, a portion typically will go to them, and a portion will go to your spouse, but your parents may end up with part of your estate. If you die without a will, your children will typically receive their share in full upon attaining majority, but you may prefer that their share be placed in trust for a longer period. You should determine where your assets will go, and when.

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minor children. If you die intestate, a judge may be required under the law to appoint a grandparent as guardian of your children, even though you might wish to name someone younger.

Even if you have a will, it's important to keep it up to date. For example, you may need to amend or rewrite your will if you marry, have children, get divorced, if a beneficiary dies, or if your wealth increases substantially. You may also need a new will if you move to another state, since the requirements for a valid will vary from state to state.

Keep in mind that a will controls only the distribution of your probate estate - it doesn't control assets held in trust, joint assets, retirement accounts, or life insurance policies on which you name an individual, trust, or corporation as beneficiary. Thus, the execution of a will must be only part of your total estate plan.






academic subjects; career exploration and other job readiness skills, followed by a referral to skills train-

STRATEGIC PLANNING



Radell Scholarship Established At Bunker Hill Community College


