

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

Getting here by Public Transport

Guildhall Square is located in Southampton City Centre, close to West Quay Shopping Centre and on the site of Southampton City Council. Guildhall Square is a short 5-10 minute walk from Southampton Central Station, please be advised that the direct walking route from Central is up a steep hill. Should this be a hindrance to your travel, please speak to the station staff who can advise of a secondary and more accessible route.

If travelling by bus, all major bus routes which enter the city centre will be able to provide easy access to our event. However please be aware that Above Bar Street will be closed to vehicular access all day on the Saturday 26th August 2023 from very early. This will involve some diversions and time changes to the bus services which would normally service this route. Contact your bus service provider for more information near to the event date.

Please also be aware that various other roads will have short term rolling closures in the City Centre between 11pm and 1pm due to the pride march which may delay some bus services.

Getting here by car


We do not have any car parks on the site due to the city location, and the Civic Centre car park will be closed. We would advise all visitors to travel by other means where possible, but if you do need to travel by car then pay and display car parks are located at:

NCP Southampton Portland Terrace (<1 mile away)
West Quay Shopping Centre (<1 mile away)
Grosvenor Square (<1 mile away)
Eastgate Multistorey Car Park (1 mile away)



All of these locations are pay and display but offer long stay parking solutions.

Please be aware that Above Bar Street will be closed to vehicular access all day on the Saturday 26th August 2023 from early. Please also be aware that various other roads will have short term closures in the City Centre between 11am and 1pm due to our march.

March Information

The March gathers in Queen's Park, Orchard Place S014 3BR. This is a small park with paved walkways. Our March volunteers will be wearing Pink Hi Vis.

In the park, we assemble the March into sections – which include a quiet area at the end of the public section.

There are also lots of opportunities for everyone to help carry our large flags, and protest and information banners. Our volunteers will be able to direct you to the different areas – and welcome you letting them know if you would like to be involved.

There will be instructions and guidance issued by our volunteers (wearing Pink Hi Vis) and sometimes via megaphones. There may also be extra noise from music speakers and bands spread thoughout the march.

The March route moves along the High Street, through the Bargate, and onto Above Bar Street, finishing at the Pride Village at Guildhall Square. The route is relatively flat, and on the road or paved areas, with dropped kerbs where crossing roads. The March route is approx.. 1 mile and takes around 45 minutes to an hour to complete. There is usually a pause at the Bargate for photos and to allow people to join the public section of the March from here if they prefer.

Water is not provided on the route so please make sure you bring anything you might need with you but please remember, open bottles will need to be emptied before entry into the main Pride event.

We will have volunteers marshalling along the entire March so please speak to them if you need any assistance.

Site Description:

Our Accessibility Stand is located immediately inside the Accessible Entrance. Our volunteer team (wearing Pink Hi Vis) will be able to provide you with Pride Guides, Sunflower Wristbands, Site Information, Loans of Sensory Equipment and offer assistance or guide you through our site if needed.

Southampton Pride Village is sited on paved areas throughout, with some small areas of grass near to our second stage.

Guildhall Square and West Marlands Road has level, paved access with a slope and ramped areas leading down into the Market Village in front of the Civic Centre which is also paved. Some of the paved areas may have slightly uneven slabs or small bumps.

There are no doors or gates to open to enter the site or around the Pride Village apart from the portaloos.

There is very limited seating around the Pride Village. There is a small amount of seating outside The Painted Wagon bar, and on some low level walls and concrete seats across the site.

Viewing Platform

We have a viewing platform for wheelchair users and one companion – for whom chairs will be available. Please speak to the Volunteers wearing Pink Hi Vis who will be present at the viewing platform throughout the day.

Accessible Performances

We have a BSL interpreter on the main stage throughout the performances and speeches. There will be a large screen with live feeds from the main stage for increased visibility of the performances and BSL interpreters - these will be visible from the viewing platforms. For the first time, we will also have BSL interpretation on our SO Stage sponsored by Redrow!

Accessible Toilets

There are portaloos which include accessible toilets at each toilet block and a Mobiloo located in the Market Village area in front of the Civic Centre. A Mobiloo is a mobile accessible toilet with an adult-sized changing bench, a hoist and a friendly attendant will be there throughout the day.

Sensory / Calm / Low Noise Spaces:

Our friends at MAST – directly opposite our main gate on Above Bar Street – are providing a quiet indoor area.

We also have a sensory / chill out area for young people, and the loan of ear defenders for children and young people, located at our Youth Outreach stall in the market village.













We will also have a small supply of ear defenders for loan and other sensory items at our Accessibility Stall which is still inside the site but away from the main stage and crowd areas. It is at the end of one the main traders' areas, and next to the emergency vehicle entrance.

Directly opposite the Accessible Entrance is Watts Park. There are areas to sit and shade provided by trees. You can leave and return to the Pride Village as often as you wish throughout the day.

Medical / Welfare Needs:

St. John Ambulance have a medical / welfare tent on site – directly opposite the Accessibility Stall next to the accessible entrance.



Assistance Dogs

Assistance dogs and pets are welcome at Southampton Pride. They must be kept on a lead at all times and please pick up after them and bring along any food they need and water bowl for them too.

Please note that shade is limited on the site and it can get very hot and crowded – so please make sure any animals you bring with you are kept safe and comfortable.





Southampton Pride's Youth Outreach Team bring you an area of pride dedicated to LGBTQIA+ youth and their families.

A safe space with LGBTQIA+ books available to read, comfortable bean bags to relax, fidget toys and sensory tools to use as needed (including some ear defenders) a chill-out area for games, and a space with arts and crafts suitable for toddlers right up to young adults, including making your own pronoun badges. The space has been built to be a quieter, calmer but fun interactive area available for families and young people benefiting from a break from the crowds. Volunteers from The Southampton Pride Youth Outreach Team will be there to answer any questions about the services they provide.

PLEASE NOTE: This is an unsupervised area and all children must have parents/carers with them. As it is a safe space, It is also requested that no alcohol be brought into this area, however all are welcome.

PRIDE IS, AND ALWAYS BE, A PROTEST

Pride events have become synonymous with the celebration and visibility of the LGBTQ+ community. Yet, behind the vibrant parades, colourful flags, and festive atmosphere lies a rich history of protest and struggle. From the Stonewall Riots to modern-day Pride parades, Pride is a protest and the historical journey of the LGBTQ+ community in its fight for equality and recognition.

Even before the Stonewall Riots in 1969, LGBTQ+ individuals faced widespread discrimination, prejudice, and persecution. Homosexuality was largely stigmatised and because of this, many LGBTQ+ people to live in silence, fear, and shame. Police raids on gay bars were common, and being openly queer was met with severe legal consequences.

The Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York City's Greenwich Village, became a flashpoint for change. In June 1969, a series of spontaneous demonstrations erupted in response to yet another police raid. However, this time, the patrons fought back, igniting six days of protest, known as the Stonewall Riots. This pivotal moment galvanised the LGBTQ+ community, leading to the establishment of the Gay Liberation Front and fuelling the momentum for Pride as a form of protest.

The 1970s witnessed the birth of the Gay Liberation Movement, a collective effort to demand civil rights, acceptance, and social recognition. The first anniversary of the Stonewall Riots was commemorated with marches in several cities, marking the origins of the modern-day Pride parade. These early parades sought to break societal norms, raise awareness about LGBTQ+ issues, and provide a platform for individuals to express their true selves proudly.

As the LGBTQ+ rights movement gained traction, Pride events evolved into a blend of celebration, remembrance, and protest. In the face of adversity, the LGBTQ+ community found strength in unity, transforming their struggles into moments of empowerment and joy. Pride marches became an opportunity to celebrate progress made, remember those who fought for equality, and demand further change where needed.

In recent years, Pride has embraced a more intersectional approach, acknowledging that LGBTQ+ individuals face unique challenges based on their intersecting identities, such as race, ethnicity and gender identity. This shift reflects a broader understanding that true equality requires addressing the systemic discrimination faced by all marginalised communities.

Pride as protest is an enduring testament to the resilience and determination of the LGBTQ+community in the fight for equal rights, acceptance, and visibility. From the Stonewall Riots to the modern-day Pride marches, this celebration has evolved into a multifaceted event that embraces both joy and protest. As we continue to move forward, it is essential to remember the roots of Pride and to advocate for the rights and dignity of all LGBTQ+individuals, ensuring that the struggle for equality remains at the forefront of this empowering movement.
