Gillen Takes Command Of Bay State Office

At first, this appears to be Annapolis; the cadets are cleancut, wear pressed uniforms and walk erectly with decision and purpose down the hallways of West Roxbury High School in Boston.

Boston? I thought you said Annapolis!

Well, it could be, because the skipper runs a tight ship, no slouch-and-grunt hangabouts in bozo pants and nearly every teen-ager has a Big "A" commission in periscope — there's always room for good officer material in the U.S. Navy.

Now say "Hello" to Commander Robert L. Gillen, head of the Naval Science Department, former Commanding Officer of the USS Constitution and new president of the Massachusetts state department of the Military Order of the World Wars — elected by a landslide vote.

Of Irish heritage, Gillen achieved a distinguished service record... more of that in a moment... but it's the new facet of training youth that excites him now.

Soon after the Junior ROTC was established in 1980, he launched a threepoint program.

First, he is serious about class study — no paper airplanes, spitballs or gum chewing. He points to a young man absorbed in a notebook as he reviews for today's class in navigation. Gillen relates: "Age 15, great-grandson of slaves, mother a scrubwoman, can hardly wait to get into Officer Candidate School and his hands on the stick of an F-15."







Work Proceeds On Hayes Square

The city of Boston Trust Office reports that the renovation of the central park at Hayes Square in Charlestown, which began this past fall, has reached the midway point and should be completed this spring.

The major restoration project was made possible through a \$300,000 grant from the Edward Ingersoll Browne Trust Fund at the request of the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force and the city of Boston Parks Department.

The Browne Fund is one of a number of major trust funds bequeathed to the city by philanthropic citizens and administered by the city's Trust Office.

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, who serves as Trustee of many of the city trust funds including the Browne Fund, praised the project as a "shining example of the city and the community working together to restore and beautify our neighborhood parks and open spaces for the benefit of neighborhood residents.

The park, which is located between the Harvard/ Kent School and the Bunker Hill Housing Development, had fallen into a state of disrepair over the years. In 1987, a group of concerned neighborhood residents led by Mary MacInnes and John Ballard contacted the city's trust office to seek

assistance for renovations. A design was developed with community input and subsequently approved for construction funding in two phases by the Browne Fund Commission.

The new design allows for a bricked in area with shady trees, granite paving and a public work of art which will depict artisans from Charlestown's history at work at their respective trades such as The Stonecutter and The Candlemaker. Each figure will appear on a stone numeral which will form the pattern of a sundial with the inscription, "Charlestown, 1629."

The art pieces were designed and fabricated by noted sculptress Lu Stubbs after numerous meetings with Charlestown residents, particularly those residents from the adjacent Bunker Hill Housing Development.

In his remarks, Mayor Flynn praised the work of the city's Trust Office in "maximizing the use of non-city funds during these fiscally lean times for the benefit of neighborhoods such as Charlestown."

Robert J. Fleming, executive secretary of the Trust Office, said: "The funds we administer, such as the Ed-

ward Ingersoll Browne Fund represent monies which were left to the city of Boston by generous benefactors to be used for good causes and charitable works. Under the Flynn administration there has been renewed emphasis to use these funds for neighborhood projects such as the







Gillen Takes Command Of Bay State Office

(continued from page one) Secondly, Gillen strives to create a school presence at public events and the ROTC was the first Boston Public School representatives since desegregation to march in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in South Boston. You can see the street sideline crowd snap to attention as the West Roxbury white-gloved cadets march

Thirdly, Gillen is concerned about geographical orientation. Kids of all races, from modest neighborhoods to dilapidated coke/ crack alleys, take officersupervised training flights to Newport, R.I., Jacksonville and Key West, Fla., and learn the meaning of ethics, strategy, tactics and human management as a commissioned officer-to-be of the U.S. Navy. Sixtyeight percent of Gillen's students are Afro, Hispanic or Asian.

Gillen is a native of Charlestown where the Silversmith Paul Revere waited to see two lanterns hoisted in the belfry tower of Old North Church across the river, then rode to Lexington to warn colonial farmers the British were coming.

As a teen-ager, he'd swim in the Charles River, then sneak aboard the Constitution to try to filch one of the crew's special traditional period tar-hats for a souvenir.

In 1951 at age 17, he enlisted and began his rise through ranks. As a CPO in the Cruiser-Destroyer Force in 1962, he received a direct commission as Ensign of a special support team during the Cuban missile crisis. This was followed by OCS at Newport and duty in the Philippines with the 7th Fleet, which included assignment with the 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade in Da Nang - and authority to wear the Fleet Marine Combat insignia, along with his eight other decorations.

Movement to new posts means stress for some officers, but the adaptable Gaelic character in Gillen seemed to wear well at Adak, Alaska; Rota, Spain; with Amphibious Group 2 aboard SS Guam during the earlier Jordanian crisis; and later with the Commander Striking Fleet Atlantic.

On R & R in 1953, he flew from Morocco to Ireland in search of relatives - and found a bride: Eileen Paula Therese Foran. one of 14 children of an office manager of the Guinness brewery.

The Gillens, who reside on Wallace Court, have two children, Robert L. Jr., a graduate of The Citadel and now a career officer in the Navy; and Eileen Mercedes Gillen, a young executive in the investment industry.

John McCarthy, the city of Boston's recycling coordinator, spoke at the Charlestown Recycling Committee meeting on Feb. 4. He explained what is presently ongoing within the city regarding recycling.

Last February, Jamaica Plain was chosen as a pilot community for curbside pickup of three-color glass, newspaper and HDPE-#2 which includes plastic milk and water jugs. McCarthy reported that there is a 76 percent participation in the area which has a 7,000 population.

The city has printed a flyer listing the five dropoff sites within the city, with one open each Saturday of the month. The first Saturday is in South End/ Roxbury; the second in Jamaica Plain; the third at U/Mass Boston, Harbor Campus; and the fourth is

The publicity committee has left some of these flyers at the Charlestown Branch Library. It lists how to recycle and what materials can be deposited at each site. Since December, tin, including any bi-metal, steel or aluminum food or beverage cans, is collected at all the sites with the exception of Allston/Brighton. All these sites are run by volunteers in cooperation with the Department of Public Works. The city is also in the process of investigating a citywide newspaper pickup.

McCarthy stated that because of the interest shown in East Boston as well as in Charlestown, a grant has been submitted for containers earmarked for the two communities. Presently, the Ordinance which was passed in July 1990. This ordinance mandates recycling for the city and he outlined the goals of participation with and without a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). The goals are:

Boston Recycling Coordinator Speaks At Charlestown Meeting

> July 1, 1992 to June 30, 1993 - without a MRF, 20 percent and with a MRF, 28

· July 1, 1995 to June 30, 1996 - without a MRF, 25 percent and with a MRF, 38 percent; and

 July 1, 1998 to June 30, 1999 - without a MRF, 35 percent and with a MRF, 50 percent.

A MRF acts as a transfer/ storage area for recyclable materials. Massachusetts has one in Springfield which collects and processes various recyclable materials including three types of glass (clear, brown, and green), newspapers and

plastic. Subsequently these materials are sold and revenue is realized. Usually communities that use such a facility do not have to pay tipping fees and thus save money from disposing of materials in a landfill.

McCarthy also distributed a flyer on the city's upcoming "Recycling Awareness Poster and Writing Contest." The publicity committee is working to make sure this information is distributed to the schools in Charlestown as well as

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
