Voter Turnout Low In Lack-Luster Presidential Primary

Just over 33 percent of the total registered voters in Ward 2, Charlestown, went to the polls on Tuesday, March 10 to cast their ballots in the Presidential Preference Primary, and elect a State Committeeman and State Committeewoman along with the local Democratic and Republican Ward Committees.

Out of a total voter registration of 8,339 in Ward 2 (5,415 Democrats, 703 Republicans, 19 Independent Voters Party members and 2,202 unenrolled voters), 2,748 voted on Tuesday.

Rep. Richard A. Voke, running for State Committeeman, was the top votegetter in Charlestown.

As was expected, Massachusetts' native son Paul Tsongas topped the local Democratic Presidential ticket and President George Bush passed the 55 percent mark in the Republican tally

Several politically active residents noted that this was the first time in memory that presidential candidates, with the exception of Bill Clinton, did not have house and polling signs nor poll workers.

There was no contest for the Republican Ward 2 Committee as only five candidates were on the ballot for the 35 slots available. There were also five writeins for the committee.

For the first time, the Independent Voters Party was on the ballot and two of this party's members from the town took the time to vote—and both voted for Democrat Paul Tsongas on a write-in.

The only interest on the local scene was generated by the Ward 2 Democratic Committee election. Twenty-two candidates sought election to the 21-person committee. A "slate" of 21 residents had joined together to form Group 1 and ask for votes as a unit. All

21 were elected, but nongroup candidate Bill Galvin came within 12 votes of being elected to the committee — almost beating the 21 to 1 odds he quoted in his

McGann stated that the purpose of the meeting was to seek community input on ideas to revitalize the schoolyard in a way that would accommodate the needs of the community. Suggestions forthcoming from the meeting were that the basketball court and the children's wading pool be reconstructed.

McGann explained that representatives from the Charlestown Community Schools had approached the Browne Fund a few years ago to do something in front of the elementary school. As a result, a \$15,000 grant was awarded to beautify the area. The grant only allows for the creation of a park, including trees, benches and shrubbery,





o get away from the hard surfaces of concrete and bricks. The Browne Fund also granted the Steering Committee junds to hire an architect to create a park design, McGann stated, and last October, the John Crowe Associates archiectural firm was hired. Architects from that firm met with community residents for the first time at last Monday night's meeting.

Money to refurbish the playground is now being sought by the Public Facilities Department.

Residents told the group that they wanted the area to be made usable for persons of all ages, and include a park setting and athletic activities.

The Arts Commission has allocated an additional \$25,000 for the creation of a public art piece to be placed within the playground.

McGann stated that the Steering Committee will continue to meet with the architects and PFD. He added that two more public meetings will be held before a final proposal is submitted to the Browne Fund. Information on these public meetings will be published in the Patriot.

★ Housebreaks, Crime And Vandalism — An increase in the number of housebreaks and vandalism of private property has been reported from throughout the community during the past few weeks.

According to Mel Stillman, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee, residents have to take more care in protecting their homes and possessions. He reported that some of the housebreaks occurred after doorbells were rung in buildings with multiple housing units and residents released the door lock allowing the caller in without checking to see who it was.

Stillman also suggested that residents make sure that all doors and windows are locked when leaving their homes. He also stated that old "Townie" traditions of looking out for each other be reinforced by neighbors. "Report any suspicious person or happening in your neighborhood to the police by dialing 911. It's better to call the police at once if you think something isn't right," he said, "than to be sorry later that you didn't."

Housebreaks was just one of the complaints heard at the monthly Public Safety/Police Community Relations meeting held on March 10. Residents reported an increase in public drinking by teen-agers at numerous sites throughout the community. Part of the problem, according to Public Relations Officer Joe McNulty of Area A of the Boston Police Department, is the availability of liquor to young people as a result of adults purchasing it for them

McNulty stated that police patrols will be beefed up at all liquor stores in the community to try to catch adults buying beer, wine, etc., for minors. Arrests will be made, he said, if adults are caught for this criminal offense.

Stillman reported that residents of Shipyard Quarters Marina related that a number of boats docked at the Water Street marina had been vandalized during the past few weeks. Residents of the marina attended Tuesday's meeting to request a more visible police coverage of the area after boats and cars were broken into and property was des-

troyed. No robberies took place during these incidents, the residents stated, only malicious damage. McNulty promised the residents of the marina that the location will be added to the nightly patrol areas for more coverage.

McNulty also reported that drug-related arrests have been made in Charlestown recently. As a result, he said, the police have determined that there in an increase in marijuana on the streets and PCP is readily available in the town. It has also been determined, he said, that PCP is being made in the area. Residents are asked to call the Area A Detectives at 247-4571 with any information on drug activity.

According to McNulty, arrests for public drinking have also been made. In searching the offenders after each arrest, packets of cocaine have been found in their posses-

sion. There were two car fires last week in Charlestown. The first occurred at 7 p.m. on March 8 on School Street with over \$4,000 in damage resulting from the suspicious blaze. The second car fire happened on March 9 on Carney Court at 1 p.m. Some \$2,000 in damage resulted from this blaze, which is also classified as suspicious.

Boston and Municipal Police have increased patrols around the Edwards Middle School and the Eden Street Park neighborhood after numerous complaints were received that young teen-agers were vandalizing homes in that area. The problem has been compounded by the availability of alcohol to these young people.

jority Leader, told the Natural Resources panel that the "MWRA's high rates cannot be allowed to exist," and that the package of legislation he has co-sponsored needs to be acted on quickly to "spare our ratepayers from a burden many simply cannot afford.

"I have filed seven bills which are all aimed at saving ratepayers from shouldering the costs of the Boston Harbor clean-up and other MWRA activities. It is essential that this panel affirmatively act upon these bills, as our constituents are drowning on the rates being

charged by the MWRA." Voke told committee mem-

Included in the legislation he has filed are measures to roll back what Voke termed "exorbitant" pay raises, grant the MWRA Advisory Board more budgetary power as a means of improving accountability, allow homeowners to deduct water and sewer charges from their taxes, transfer unassociated projects away from the MWRA district and eliminate water taxes not used to pay for the actual cost of providing water to MWRA

Also noting that the federal government only contributes about four percent of the cost of the Harbor clean-up project, while it pays for up to 90 percent of similar projects around the country, Voke said it is imperative that Washington accept its responsibility and give local residents what

they deserve - rate relief. After the hearing, Voke stated that on March 9 the House debated a measure to save ratepayers in the 60 communities comprising the MWRA district over \$200 million in bonding costs. Labeling as outrageous the law designed to

force only local ratepaye to pay for items which have benefitted the entire Con monwealth, Voke has le the charge to spare ratepay ers by pushing repeal legis lation through the House

"Equity is what we ar seeking. Both the federa and state governments can and should do more to ad dress the spiraling wate costs local residents are fac ing. With this in mind, will continued to do whatever is possible at the State House to knock down the costs that MWRA assumes and passes along to local ratepayers," concluded

St. Patrick And The Play

Because of our religious upbringing, those of us who attended St. Francis de Sales School back when the oil first began to pollute Dewey Beach, St. Patrick's Day represented either one or two things, heaven or hell. Had it not been for our religious upbringing, it may have represented Utopia or the pits. The determination would hinge entirely upon one's regard for the limelight, for St. Patrick's Day at old Saint Francis meant only one thing . . . THE PLAY!

THE PLAY was not just an annual occurrence, it was a happening. Rehearsals began sometime in early February and continued on until the final leprechaun vanished from the middle of each March. Each grade had its own skit to perform and most of the performances were musical in nature. This was a mistake, a horrid mistake, for the "special parts," as they were called, went not to the talented, but to those students who received the highest grades.

Now, if my memory serves me correctly, intelligence and singing ability did not necessarily go hand and hand. Oh, there were exceptions, of course, but in most cases the voice box and the IQ were packed in separate suitcases and stored in separate closets.

By the time the month of February rolled around, everybody knew to whom the "special parts" were going. The initial reports filtered on down to the rest of the student body via the "milk carriers," for they, while performing their daily duties had the opportunity to visit every classroom in the school. On a small section of chalk board in each of these rooms was a list of names of those students who had made THE HONOR ROLL. And these would be the "special parts" people. Could they sing? Could they dance? Were they able to face an audience without soiling a perfectly good set of under-

wear? Nobody really cared, for they were the honor roll students, and they would get the "special parts." This, I might add, was good reason NOT to get honor grades until the last two marking terms of each year.



In the third grade, under the tutelage of Sister Elizabeth Ann, I innocently made the mistake of "making the honor roll." Hell, I was only 7 years old. Nobody prepared me for the consequences, and my parents' pride in my scholastic achievement allowed them to conveniently forget to tell me about my forthcoming "reward."

So that is how I became Dennis Day, that great Irish tenor. It is also how Leo McNiff became Bing Crosby, Herbie Faulkner, new to Charlestown from Virginia or some such place, became Gene Autry, and Mary Murphy, Frannie Rocco and Patricia O'Heir became the Andrew Sisters.

My best friend at the time, in spite of his tying me to a chair and giving me a haircut which was not only new to the modern world but totally infuriated my father, was Danny Flanagan. He was the Master of Ceremonies, and I think he probably paid somebody off for the job, because I don't think Danny EVER made the honor roll. How he got the job really isn't all that important . . . the fact that he got the job, however, is important, for his introduction of Leo McNiff as "that great crooner, Bing Crosberries," is forever imbedded in one small corner of my mind. I cannot base this premise on absolute fact, but I think Danny may have been the only non-honor roll member ever to have been given a special part in a St. Francis de Sales School St. Patrick's Day Play.

As for me, my rendition of "Peg of My Heart" as Dennis Day went over so well that I have been banned from singing in public ever since. As a matter of fact, when my children were growing up, I never yelled or threatened bodily harm when they occasionally strayed from the narrow path. No, no, no. I only began to sing, and what results I got! "Please, Dad, please stop. We'll never do it again, honest." I am certain that, had the child abuse laws been written to include my singing, I would surely be a guest of the Commonwealth.

Much to my chagrin, I have discovered that when I sing in the shower, the water turns cold. It used to stop, but the gods of the showers apparently felt stopping was not as punishing as cold.

Once as a younger person, a warm summer night found me sitting on a bench at the Doherty Playground. With nobody around to disturb, I began to sing. Within a matter of minutes, I was surrounded by a pack of wild, howling dogs. Where was the Leash

Law when I needed it most?

A dress rehearsal was held on the Friday before the big weekend at St. Francis, and it was here where we witnessed firsthand just how bad we were. Knowing that we were to perform before a packed house on Saturday and Sunday nights brought panic attacks to all except those who were lucky enough to have minor parts and be placed in the back row.


The back row was an enviable position, for it was from here where you could throw things like gum wrappers and rubber erasers at those with "special parts." You could also heckle without being detected, and when it came time to sing with the rest of the group, you needed only to move your lips. In fact, some in the back row were threatened with bodily harm if they did anything but move their lips.


Sometimes, when a voice was so bad, the nuns would have Mr. Raspy open and close the curtains rather than take an actual part in the play. Was it you, Tony McLaughlin, who held that job for eight consecutive years and did it so well that the nuns wanted you back, even into your high school years?


When we were told to sing higher, we sang louder . . . and when we were told to sing lower, we sang more quietly. To a third grader, higher means louder, and lower means more quietly, does it not? It was all so very natural.

I left St. Francis de Sales School in 1954, Had the St. Patrick's Day Plays not been so much fun, I doubt they could have survived so long in memory.

For that and many other things, I thank you Sisters Hilda, Reginald, Rosemary, Elizabeth Ann, Mary Austin, Jerome, Clarasina, Mary Trinita and Evelyn Catherine . . . wherever you are.
