


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Help! Help! It's Your Parade

The Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 14, marking the 223rd anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and dedicated in honor of the Boston National Historical Park and its mission of "Preserving the Past for Future Generations," is less than three weeks away. The contributions toward hiring bands, drum corps and other units are coming in very slowly.

If this trend continues and the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee is unable to raise the \$35,000 in funds to underwrite the expenses of the over 25 musical units and other units already committed to march, the committee will have no alternative but to cut the size of the parade drastically. The committee cannot put bands and drum corps in the parade if it cannot afford to pay them.

It is up to you, the residents, business persons and community organizations to come forward immediately and contribute financially to the Bunker Hill Day Parade so that the committee can continue to put the type of parade on the streets that the community has come to expect and of which it can be proud.

Although the monument, which appears each week in the Patriot, acknowledges contributions of \$25 or more, any donation is welcome. Residents of limited means, might consider donating the cost of going to a movie or renting a video, a small price to pay for the Mummer's Band Concert on the eve of the parade and the parade itself, an afternoon of great entertainment.

New Telephone Hotline To Troubleshoot Traffic And Parking Issues In Boston

The pedestrian who wants to report a faded crosswalk, the driver with comments about signal timing at a particular intersection and the resident who is questioning new parking regulations on her street can all voice their concerns to City Hall more simply with the establishment of a telephone hot-line implemented to troubleshoot traffic and parking issues in Boston.

635-4-BTD is a constituent service designed to provide Boston residents, pedestrians and drivers with direct access to the Boston Transportation Department (BTD). Dial 635-4-BTD to speak to a BTD staff member and to provide or receive information on traffic and parking issues of concern.

Boston Mayor Thomas M. Menino said, "For our constituents, the 635-4-BTD program simplifies the process for dealing with traffic and parking problems in the city. By establishing a central location for receiving calls, the

Transportation Department is able to more quickly respond to constituent issues."

Examples of calls to be screened through the 635-4-BTD service in-

- · Comments on construction permitting issues in downtown neighbor-
- Questions about the abandoned vehicle program;
- · Traffic complaints;
- · Requests for new parking regula-
- Missing sign reports.

According to Acting Boston Transportation Commissioner Andrea d'Amato, the 635-4-BTD program is one in a series of initiatives designed to make the BTD more constituent friendly. For example, another initiative is the city's Goodwill Ambassador Program, designed to assist pedestrians walking through the Central Artery/Tunnel work area this summer. Fifteen college-age interns will be charged with staffing six information booths and providing directions, construction information on adjacent work sites and support to local busi-

This Goodwill Ambassador Program compliments an additional new program geared toward downtown pedestrians, "The Central Artery/ Tunnel Pedestrian Trailblazers," a sign program designed to guide people walking through CA/T impacted areas on to popular destinations, such as, the Downtown Shopping District, the North End and Quincy Market. Other initiatives include the scheduling of community meetings throughout the city this summer and the establishment of a Community Relations Division within the department.

"The most important aspect of these new programs and 635-4-BTD is that we want to hear from you!," stated Menino.

Suffolk DA Helps Community With Special Funds

Suffolk County District Attorney Ralph C. Martin, II has announced that \$20,000 in forfeiture funds will be available to local non-profit organizations working to keep adolescents off drugs and away from crime.

Applications will be available on June 1 and are due by July 31. Grant awards range from \$5,000 to \$7,000.

The money is disbursed from the DA's Forfeiture Reinvestment Program which takes cash and assets seized from drug dealers and turns them into grants that Suffolk County organizations can use to fight crime and child drug use.

"This is part of my ongoing plan to prioritize youth crime prevention and juvenile justice," Martin said.

"These grants will help our young people fight the invasion of drugs in their schools and neighborhoods." This is the sixth consecutive year Martin has offered the grants.

Applications may be picked up at the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office on the sixth floor of the New Court House, or by calling 725-8600 to request mailing.

Questions should go to Community Relations Director Deborah McDonagh at 725-8750.

Proposals are reviewed by a seven-member residents' selection committee appointed by the DA.

The grant funds are a percentage of money and property seized from drug dealers by the DA's office. State law allows up to 10 percent of money from auctions of drug dealer's property and confiscated funds to be returned to the community.



BHCC Receives Historic Preservation Award

Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC), has been chosen the recipient of the 1998 Mass. Historical Commission Preservation Award. In an announcement made by Commission Chairman William F. Galvin, Secretary of the Commonwealth, the college has been designated for this honor in recognition of its historic preservation of the old Chelsea Post Office in Bellingham Square while developing the site as its new BHCC Chelsea campus.

In a congratulatory letter to BHCC President Mary L. Fifield, Galvin stated, "Through your work, you have demonstrated a commitment to historic preservation which is above and beyond what is normally expected."

He added, "It is for this extra effort that we have selected this project for this honor."

Renovation of the former post office building, built in 1910, began in April, 1997. Considerable effort was made in retaining many of the original features in the front lobby area, including the marble walls, terrazzo floor, cast iron writing tablets and two-story palladium windows.

The three story, 33,000 square foot building opened in January 1998. It houses nine classrooms, including two computer rooms, a health skills and science lab that features an authentic hospital operating room set up, instructional resource room, a daycare facility, library, student lounge, com-

munity room able to accommodate 200 people for meetings, and office space. One thousand students are ultimately expected to attend classes each semester at the new campus.


BHCC will receive this prestigious award at the annual Preservation Awards Ceremony that will take place at the Old South Meeting House tonight, May 28.





YOU CAN MIX BUSINESS AND PLEASURE

Business travel can be a grind. But with proper planning, it's possible to combine a business trip with a short personal vacation and still keep your tax deduction.

For example, let's say you fly to a three-day business meeting somewhere in the U.S., and you stay for one day of recreation after the business portion of the trip is over. Since your trip was "primarily" for business, the entire airfare is tax-deductible, even though the airfare also gave you the opportunity to enjoy a personal day.

Here's another example: Let's say you have outof-town business meetings on Friday and Monday. If it would cost more to return home for the weekend than to stay over, your weekend meals and lodging can be treated as tax-deductible business expenses. What if you arrive on Saturday for a Monday business meeting? You can still write off your weekend food and lodging, if you can show that it cost you less to arrive on Saturday and stay overnight, compared to the cost of traveling on Sunday or Monday.

With foreign trips, all travel costs generally must be allocated between tax-deductible business and nondeductible personal expenses. However, no allocation is required if your foreign trip meets one of three conditions: the trip lasts for seven days or less, less than 25% of the trip is spent on personal matters, or you can show that a personal vacation was not a major consideration in making the trip.

The tax rules are even more complicated if you travel with a spouse or take a cruise. If you are planning a business trip, please give us a call. Chances are, we can help you combine some pleasure with business.

RESIDENT OPINION SURVEY

In 1993, the Healthy Charlestown Coalition surveyed community residents, business persons and human service agencies to determine the most pressing needs facing Charlestown. The information gathered during the survey process, as well as through the nine focus groups, was published in the Healthy Charlestown Needs and Resource Assessment. Community organizations have used this document over the past five years to determine how to best utilize the valuable resources in the community.

Through the assistance of the Mass. General Hospital Community Benefit program, the Healthy Charlestown Coalition is conducting a five-year reassessment. The survey will be compared to the survey results of Charlestown residents, to resident attitudes in 1993. This process will allow social service agencies to determine the progress as a community and to define future work. Although the survey is generally the same one as five years ago, some minor changes do exist. These changes are necessary in order to get more specific data about particular health and lifestyle issues, that statistics show, are more evident in Charlestown than in other parts of the city and state.

Survey results will be included in an addendum to the Healthy Charlestown Needs and Resource Assessment. This addendum will also include data pertaining to certain health indicators that the Community Benefits program will track over the next few years.

Publishing the Healthy Charlestown Needs and Resource Assessment in 1993 was a much more involved process than the current project. The committee is trying to reach as many residents as possible. Surveys may be picked up and returned to the following agencies: Charlestown Community Center, MGH*Charlestown HealthCare Center, Charlestown Boys & Girls Club and the Kennedy Center. Residents interested in a copy of the survey or would like to help distribute surveys, are asked to contact Dan Ryan at the coalition office at 241-3756.




