## Voter Registration Drive Underway In Charlestown

The City of Boston's Board of Election Commissioners has. since the first of the year, been conducting the largest voter registration drive in the city's history. In cooperation with neighborhood civic groups, officials from Operation Big Vote and individuals throughout the city, the Election Department has conducted nearly two hundred and twenty registration dates. These neighborhood registration sites, along with daily registration drives in such public locations as the Boston Common, Fanueil Hall, and Boston City Hospital, have resulted in over twenty thousand new voters being added to the city's rolls.

Election Department Chairman Michael Joyce states, This year has seen more new voters registered in Boston than any other year, including 1971 when the franchise was extended to eighteen years old. With the help of our new monitor. Betsy Powers, we look forward to a minimum of problems in this year's elections.

Beyond these special registration drives which are not required by statute, the Election Department is also conducting their regular schedule of registration in each of the city's twenty-two wards. In Charlestown, Ward 2, voter

This is the time of year when fun in the sun often leads to painful sunburn. Although many people actively try to painful sunburn. Although many people actively try to
achieve the "tanned" appearance, the harmful effects of achieve the "tanned" appearance, the harmful effects of
sun exposure are only now being understood. These include sun exposure are only now being understood. These include
(1) aging of the skin, so it becomes more wrinkled and less soft at an earlier age, (2) an increased risk of skin cancer, though these are not usually the major health problems that the name 'cancer' suggests, and (3) sunburn.
People vary greatly in their skin's response to the sun. People who usually burn, and tan only with difficulty, are most vulnerable to these effects of the sun. Such people have pale skin color and may, but don't necessarily, have blue eyes, red hair, or freckles. The more easily you burn, the more likely you are to suffer the other effects of unprotected sun exposure.
Some medications also increase the skin's sensitivity to the sun. These so-called photosensitizers include a number of commonly used medications including some fluid and blood pressure pills, tranquilizers and others. This doesn't mean that such medication should be stopped for the summer or skipped on a day you are going to the beach (that doesn't help anyway). It does mean that you should discuss it with your doctor and, if the medication is necessary for you. take extra care to avoid burning.
The part of sunlight that causes most of the effect is called ultraviolet light. This part of sunlight is blocked by glass, among other things, so you don't get sunburn through closed window even though you see light and feel heat. In the same way. you can get a bad sunburn even when the sunlight doesn't look or feel strong, such as a hazy day or on a cool day. Ultraviolet light can also be reflected by water, sand. and concrete and this makes the exposure even greater.
The best protection is to cover or shade the skin with clothing, hats, etc. Since this is not always possible or desirable, sunscreen preparations are the next best protection. The protection is rated by numbers, up to 15 . This number is called the sun protection factor (SPF). A preparation with an SPF of 15 means that 15 hours of sun exposure would cause the same skin changes as one hour exposure would cause the same skin changes any protection. There are a wide variety of brands without any protection. There are a wide variety of brands
and preparations (gels, liquids, lotions, etc.), but look for

the SPF. People who burn easily should use an SPF 15 sunscreen. others may want to use one with lower SPF such as eight or lower. Very dark-skinned people who never burn will only need a sunscreen for exposure to intense sunlight for many hours at a time.
There is no evidence of particular harm to children from sunscreens, but use of T-shirts when swimming and hats to shade the face at other times is preferred to frequent applicants of sunscreen to large areas of the body. If cover-up is impossible, sunscreen applications are still much better than sunburn.
If you have failed to take protective measures and you have a painful sunburn, there are some measures that can help. Cool tap water compresses for 20 minutes at least three to four times a day is soothing and beneficial. Moisturizers (Petrolatum, Nivea, Eucerin, Lubriderm, etc.) help soothe the skin and prevent some of the dryness caused by sun damage. The mild hydrocortisone creams and lotions sold over the counter may reduce inflammation and pain. Avoid other over the counter burn remedies. These may be cooling temporarily, but have the potential
of causing skin reactions worse than the sunburn. These in clude Solarcaine, Unguentine, etc.
A more severe sunburn should be seen by a physician. since like other types of burns, it may need treatment to prevent infection or stronger medications to improve healing.

## In summary

1. In people whose skin tends to burn from sun, sun exposure has other harmful effects as well.
2. The best treatment, by far, for sunburn is prevention. 3. If you must be in the sun and can't or don't want to cover up. sunscreens provide very effective protection look for a high number - 15 - for maximum protection) 4. Cool tap water compresses and moisturizers can help soothe the damage if you do get a sunburn. Avoid over the counter anesthetic creams and sprays
3. For severe burns, see your doctor
