"Swingshift" Band To Be At Charlestown Navy Yard

The National Park Service will host Dick Johnson and his seven piece Swing Shift Band on Sunday, August 21, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. in front of the Commandant's House at the Charlestown Navy Yard. Sponsored by the Charlestown Development Corporation, the Shawmut Bank, and the U.S.S. Constitution Museum, the concert commemorates the 183rd birthday of the Navy Yard and its historic record of production excellence. All festivities are

free and open to the public.

On August 22, 1943, the Victory Parade of Spotlight Bands broadcast live from the Navy Yard to celebrate the third renewal of the navy excellence in production award, the Navy "E" Award, to the Charlestown Navy Yard. This year, Dick Johnson will lead the Swing Shift Band in the tunes from the forties commemorating that historic event which rated the Charlestown Navy Yard the top production facility in the

northeast during World War II.

Dick Johnson, who the great Artie Shaw refers to as "the best clarinetist I've heard, bar nobody," is a talent of the 80s born of the forties and fifties. From road work with Buddy Morrow and Charlie Spivak, to the Monterey Jazz Festival as Woody Herman's featured soloist, the ubiquitous Johnson has done showpiece performances for the Boston

Nucci Emphasizes Importance Of School Race

Before a recent large gathering of supporters and concerned district residents at the North End Union, John A. Nucci, Candidate for District One School Committee (E. Boston, North End, Charlestown), re-emphasized his feeling that the District School Committee races "really do affect each and every resident in our district." Nucci noted that "Approximately one-third of our city tax dollar goes into our public schools. That, obviously, affects us all and should make each and every voter concerned about the accountability of our School Department."

Nucci pointed out to the group that the Boston Public Schools serve as a

very large and significant force in the scheme of the city. "For instance," Nucci noted, "The school system is one of the biggest single employers in the city; the school system is the biggest food-serving facility in the city; the school system is the biggest transportation service in the city besides the MBTA. All of these facts, however, appear insignificant next to the unavoidable fact that, I feel, the quality of our schools is directly related to the quality of life in our neighborhoods". Nucci added that he would like to see our schools be "once again, the hub of community, parental, and youth activity in our neighborhoods".

Nucci, a graduate of Boston Latin School, Boston College, and holder of a Masters Degree in Public Administration from Suffolk University has been travelling energetically across the district discussing school issues with all concerned. He is widely considered to be far outdistancing the School Committee field in District One.



Voter Registration Drive Underway In Charlestown

The City of Boston's Board of Election Commissioners has, since the first of the year, been conducting the largest voter registration drive in the city's history. In cooperation with neighborhood civic groups, officials from Operation Big Vote and individuals throughout the city, the Election Department has conducted nearly two hundred and twenty registration dates. These neighborhood registration sites, along with daily registration drives in such public locations as the Boston Common, Fanueil Hall, and Boston City Hospital, have resulted in over twenty thousand new voters being added to the city's rolls.

Election Department Chairman Michael Joyce states, "This year has seen more new voters registered in Boston than any other year, including 1971 when the franchise was extended to eighteen years old. With the help of our new monitor, Betsy Powers, we look forward to a minimum of problems in this year's elections."

Beyond these special registration drives which are not required by statute, the Election Department is also conducting their regular schedule of registration in each of the city's twenty-two wards. In Charlestown, Ward 2, voter

registration will be held at the Fire House at the intersection of Bunker Hill and Main Streets.

In each case, voter registration will be held according to this schedule.

Said Commissioner Joyce, I realize that we are still in some state of confusion regarding the dates of this year's

elections but, pending clarification, Wednesday, September 7, will remain the last day for voter registration for the preliminary election, as set by law." During all the above-mentioned dates, voter registration will also be held in the Election Department, Room 224, Boston City Hall, from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

To Conduct Blood Drive

On Friday, August 19, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. the American Red Cross will conduct a blood drive in Charlestown, in conjunction with several community agencies, among these the Boys and Girls Club, the Kennedy Center, and the Charlestown Community School. Morse Icon Part Of Museum Exhibit

The great American icon Gallery of the Louvre by Samuel F.B. Morse, who was born in Charlestown, Ma., will be included in the exhibition A New World: Masterpieces of American Painting, 1760-1910 at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston September 7 through November 13, 1983. The exhibition presents 110 of the greatest paintings created by American artists in this 150 year period. Other icons of American art which will also be included are Whistler's Mother, on a rare visit from Paris to the United States, John Singer Sargent's Madame X, and Thomas Eakins' The Gross Clinic.

Organized at the invitation of the Musee du Louvre, Paris, the exhibition will travel, after the Boston showing, to the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C. December 7 through February 12, 1984, and then to the Louvre's Grand

Palais, March 17 through June 11, 1984.

A New World is the first comprehensive exhibition of American art to be seen in Paris in almost 50 years.

The exhibition has been made possible by a grant from United Technologies Corporation.

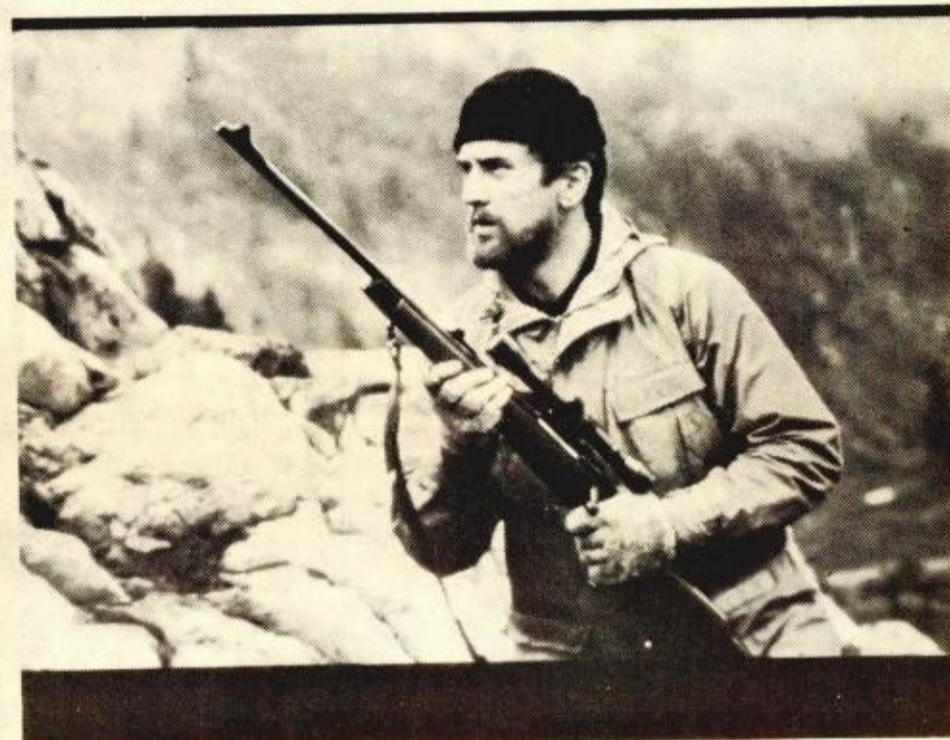

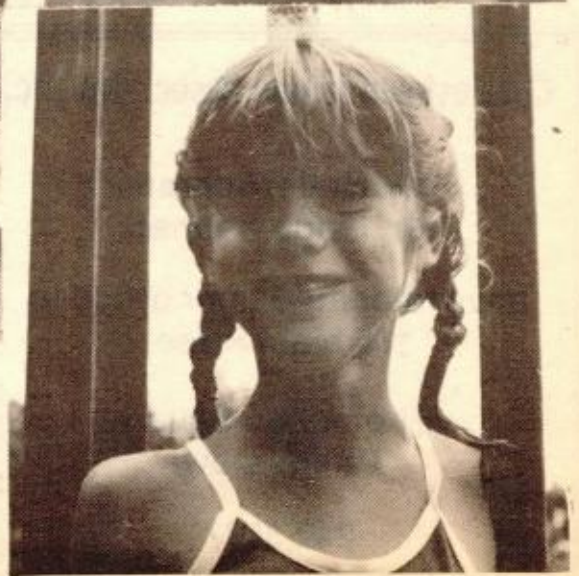
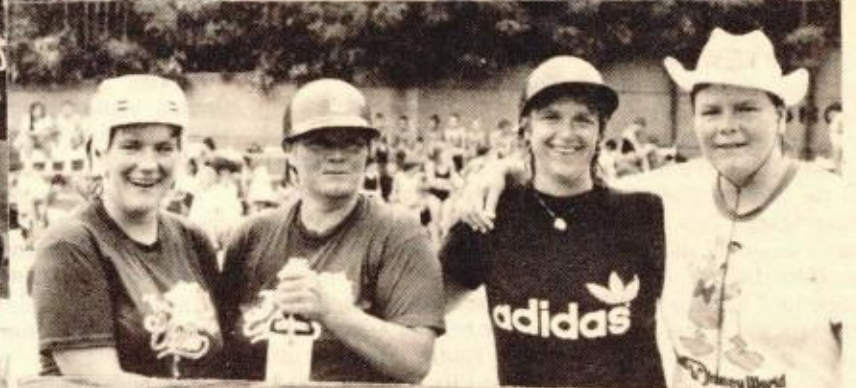

Boston Assessing Department Mails Residential Exemption Applications

The City of Boston Assessing Department is mailing out residential exemption applications to over 85,000 property owners to determine which owners are eligible to receive the exemption on this Fall's (FY'84) tax bill.

Under State law

(M.G.L., Ch. 59, S. 5C) owner-occupied residential properties in Boston may be granted this exemption subject to the approval of Mayor White and the City Council. This exemption shall be in addition to any other statutory exemptions (i.e. disabled veterans,

elderly, surviving spouses).

The credit for the residential exemption for the fiscal year 1983 tax bill saved taxpayers as much as \$132.04.

To qualify for the residential exemption the property must have been the principal residence of the owner on January 1, 1983. Consequently, no owner can receive the residential exemption for more than one property.

To ensure that the exemption may appear as a credit on this Fall's tax bill, the application must be returned by mail or filed

in person at the Assessing Department, Room 301, City Hall, by September 7, 1983. Additional applications are available at the Assessing Department.

Property owners filing after September 7th deadline but prior to thirty days after mailing of the tax bill, will receive the credit on the second half tax bill in May.

Cappucci Presents Proposals At Recent Public Meeting

Public meetings have been held recently in the North End, East Boston, The Marriott Hotel and Faneuil Hall concerning the proposed Third Harbor Tunnel and the depression of the Central Artery.

Robert (Meaney) Cappucci, candidate for the District 1 City Council seat, attended all of these meetings. He was the only candidate from District 1 to offer a specific plan that would insure benefits to both the East Boston and North End communities. If the proposed third tunnel and depressed artery plan is approved, Cappucci stated he supports the plan if the tunnel surfaces on airport property, but more importantly he said, "It should provide a specific design to insure that no exits be included allowing ac-

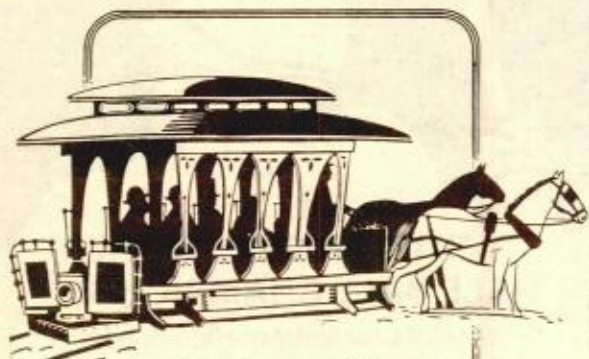

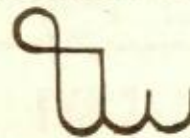

Prevention And Treatment Of Sunburn

This is the time of year when fun in the sun often leads to painful sunburn. Although many people actively try to achieve the "tanned" appearance, the harmful effects of sun exposure are only now being understood. These include (1) aging of the skin, so it becomes more wrinkled and less soft at an earlier age, (2) an increased risk of skin cancer, though these are not usually the major health problems that the name "cancer" suggests, and (3) sunburn.

People vary greatly in their skin's response to the sun. People who usually burn, and tan only with difficulty, are most vulnerable to these effects of the sun. Such people have pale skin color and may, but don't necessarily, have blue eyes, red hair, or freckles. The more easily you burn, the more likely you are to suffer the other effects of unprotected sun exposure.

Some medications also increase the skin's sensitivity to the sun. These so-called photosensitizers include a number of commonly used medications including some fluid and blood pressure pills, tranquilizers and others. This doesn't mean that such medication should be stopped for the summer or skipped on a day you are going to the beach (that doesn't help anyway). It does mean that you should discuss it with your doctor and, if the medication is necessary for you, take extra care to avoid burning.

The part of sunlight that causes most of the effect is called ultraviolet light. This part of sunlight is blocked by glass, among other things, so you don't get sunburn through a closed window even though you see light and feel heat. In the same way, you can get a bad sunburn even when the sunlight doesn't look or feel strong, such as a hazy day or on a cool day. Ultraviolet light can also be reflected by water, sand, and concrete and this makes the exposure even greater.

The best protection is to cover or shade the skin with clothing, hats, etc. Since this is not always possible or desirable, sunscreen preparations are the next best protection. The protection is rated by numbers, up to 15. This number is called the sun protection factor (SPF). A preparation with an SPF of 15 means that 15 hours of sun exposure would cause the same skin changes as one hour without any protection. There are a wide variety of brands and preparations (gels, liquids, lotions, etc.), but look for

the SPF. People who burn easily should use an SPF 15 sunscreen, others may want to use one with lower SPF such as eight or lower. Very dark-skinned people who never burn will only need a sunscreen for exposure to intense sunlight for many hours at a time.

There is no evidence of particular harm to children from sunscreens, but use of T-shirts when swimming and hats to shade the face at other times is preferred to frequent applications of sunscreen to large areas of the body. If cover-up is impossible, sunscreen applications are still much better than sunburn.

If you have failed to take protective measures and you have a painful sunburn, there are some measures that can help. Cool tap water compresses for 20 minutes at least three to four times a day is soothing and beneficial. Moisturizers (Petrolatum, Nivea, Eucerin, Lubriderm, etc.) help soothe the skin and prevent some of the dryness caused by sun damage. The mild hydrocortisone creams and lotions sold over the counter may reduce inflammation and pain. Avoid other over the counter burn remedies. These may be cooling temporarily, but have the potential

of causing skin reactions worse than the sunburn. These include Solarcaine, Unguentine, etc.

A more severe sunburn should be seen by a physician, since like other types of burns, it may need treatment to prevent infection or stronger medications to improve healing.

In summary:

1. In people whose skin tends to burn from sun, sun exposure has other harmful effects as well.
2. The best treatment, by far, for sunburn is prevention.
3. If you must be in the sun and can't or don't want to cover up, sunscreens provide very effective protection (look for a high number - 15 - for maximum protection).
4. Cool tap water compresses and moisturizers can help soothe the damage if you do get a sunburn. Avoid over the counter anesthetic creams and sprays.
5. For severe burns, see your doctor.
