O'Shea, called upon for his expertise in career and vocational training, visited factories, schools, and hospitals on the tiny islands.


A delegation from Saint Kits/Nevis will come to Boston in April to review the findings of the planning team's preliminary report.



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Charlestown Navy Yard Update

by Marianne Martin

The Charlestown Navy Yard which once served as a major employer of many Charlestown residents at the height of the World Wars, has, for the most part, become a separate entity from the town, with fewer residents venturing within the walls of the yard.

Since the Navy vacated the property some ten years ago, the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) became responsible for regulating the renovation of the area into mixed office, retail and residential uses. According to BRA officials, they would like to change the "keep out private property" image the yard has and make the property more accessible to the general public.

Physically, the yard has not presented a welcome mat to the residents, with the looming granite wall, several entrances closed by steel

grates and a 24 hour security guard at the only open gate, Gate 4.

This past summer at several community meetings, BRA Director Stephen Coyle expressed surprise when he learned many residents felt separated from the yard. Thus, three months ago, the security guard was removed.

Within the Navy Yard there is a total of 35 buildings and/or parcels which were at one time such facilities as machine shops, a chain forge shop, forklift repair shop, barracks and drydocks, which will now become residential units, office and retail space, parking garages and even a couple of restaurants and possibly a

Presently, the Navy Yard is divided into three sections of development: the Shipvard Park, the Historic Monument Area, and the

New Development Area.

The Shipyard Park is a public park of 4.5 acres of open green space, a large fountain pool and children's playground.

In an attempt to lure residents and the general public into the yard, the Shipyard Park, which is presently in the third phase of development, will link Gate 4 to the waterfront.



The Charlestown Preservation Society is a non-profit organization formed in 1967 "for the purpose of preserving for posterity and for use buildings, sites and objects of historical value or interest, as well as for providing modern living accommodations in Charlestown at sites and from materials that would otherwise be destroyed, neglected or abandoned." (Articles of Organization)

The Preservation Society has achieved much in its 18 year history, starting with the saving of a number of federal structures (built c. 1780-1800) from demolition during urban renewal. These buildings include the Warren Tavern, the Thompson Triangle houses, the Deacon Larkin House and the Wylie House. Other achievements include:

-Preserving and restoring bricks, cobblestones, ironwork

 Contributing to the on-going maintenance and research of the 17th Century Phipps Street Burial Ground.

 Providing seed money for the restoration of the stone Austin Block (c. 1822).

 Encouraging restoration efforts in Charlestown through house tours, home fairs and library programs.

-Working with other community groups and government agencies to make historic preservation an important part of the revitalization of the neighborhood.

The House Tour is the major fundraising activity of the Charlestown Preservation society as well as a celebration of Charlestown life. This year's theme "Charlestown...Boston's Oldest Village" attempts to portray Charlestown's sense of intimacy and community spirit unrivaled in any other Boston neighborhood. Charlestown is steeped in history and is the site of some of New England's oldest houses. There are certain sections of Charlestown which are so intact and well-preserved that one can visualize an 18th and 19th century town. (continued from page 6) will be developed by the First Charlestown Development Group which, accor-

ding to English, is comprised of 18 Charlestown business people who "were given designation on these buildings in order to expand their businesses.

Building 33, the former Frazier Barrracks, and Building 34, originally a blue print shop, are to be renovated beginning in July and completed by July 1986.

The other two, Buildings 38 and 39, respectively a former Library Movie Hall and Shipyard Commander's home, are slated to be renovated beginning in July 1986 and finished July 1987.

In an effort to expedite renovation of these four buildings, English stated that the BRA will impose a rental fee which will double each month until construction begins. Once the construction has begun, the rental fee will be half of the last payment. According to English, the financial loss will encourage the developers to keep the development schedule.

On Seventh Avenue is Building 107, which once served as a machine shop. The National Park Service has been utilizing this facility as storage space and last month the Park Service took title of the property.

Two proposals are intended for Buildings 75 and 106, and three are for Buildings 266 and 114, and Building P (which was not included in the BRA developer kit but was included in two proposals submitted).

The Nicosia Company and Basilica Associates Limited Partnership are two development teams who have submitted proposals for buildings 75 and 106.

In the proposal submitted by the Nicosia Company both buildings would be used for office space, while in the Basilica Associates Limited Partnership proposal the plans are mixed. In Building 75, they would construct 25,000 square feet of office condominiums and in Building 106, there would be a mix of 9,750 square feet retail use, 61 condominiums units, and 87 parking spaces.

The problem with the Basicila proposal is the element of condominiums. Since the building are on leased land, there is a question as to sale of the units.

As for Buildings 266 and 114, three development teams are seeking tentative designation.

The Conroy-Heafitz Development Team is proposing to create five office suites

in Buildings 266 and P.

Fifth Avenue Professional Center Limited proposes four office suites for Building 266.

The third proposal is from Housing Associates and includes Buildings 114, 266 and P.

In Building 114, they propose to construct 70,000 square feet of office space and a possible 10,000 square foot restaurant. For Buildings 266 and P, they propose office usage.

After the director makes his recommendation to the BRA board on which development should receive tentative designation, a second round of advertising will begin, involving the remaining buildings and two parcels, stated English.

The third section of the Navy Yard, which is known as the New Development Area, is bounded by the Shipyard Park, Fifth Avenue and the harbor.

Immobiliare New England is responsible for the development of several buildings and parcels within the new development section of the Navy Yard.

Building 42, the former machine shop, has been completely renovated and occupied by 367 units of housing, named Constitution

Building 103 will become 111 units of elderly housing and named Anchorage Apartments. On Wednesday March 13, this building was the site of a six alarm fire, which will delay construction. The building was expected to be completed by June 1986.

Shipway I, which was once a concrete ramp where ships were slid into the harbor, is now 21 two and three story townhouse condomin-

Presently, Immobiliare is constructing a 200 slip marina at Pier 8.

English reported that Immobiliare will be begin construction at Building 177 in the future. The former electronics shop will become home to 154 condominium units, a parking garage, and restaurant on the top floor.

According to English, Immobiliare has also submitted a proposal to construct 66 townhouse units at Pier 7.

English stated BRA Director Coyle has not made a decision on Pier 7 as of yet since "he wants to more public access to piers and Harborpark."

Other future plans of Immobiliare include the construction of 55 units of elderly housing in the former shoplifter shop, Building 104; 450 residential units on Parcel 4A; and a third marina at Pier 10.

Plans for Pier 11, also referred to as the "hotel site," have not been finalized, stated English, although he did not rule out the possiblity of a hotel.

At the corner of First Avenue and Eighth Street is Building 36, a former sail loft. According to English, the Incubator Development Team is presently converting the building into office spaces and an Italian restaurant.

English stated that Incubator will invest a total of \$6 million into the project.

Another possible tenant at the site may be Sail Magazine, who plans to make Charlestown their new headquarters.

The BRA, which was recently awarded a \$3.7 million loan in order for renewal of streets and utilities in the Navy Yard, recently hired a design firm, stated English.

The loan will not only enable the BRA to construct sidewalks, lighting, and other physical improvements, but also create 500 on site parking spaces.

Overall, rehabilitation of the Navy Yard will be an investment of over \$360 million in private monies and approximately \$12 million in public funds.

At the height of activity at the Navy Yard, there were approximately 50,000 people employed full time, estimated English. In the 1970s, this number dropped to 6,000.

"We expect that we will have replaced all the jobs that were lost and exceed that number by 12%," stated English.

In the end, new development in the Navy Yard will take the form of 12,050 residential units, 550 marina slips, a possible 350 room hotel, new jobs, and increased public access.
