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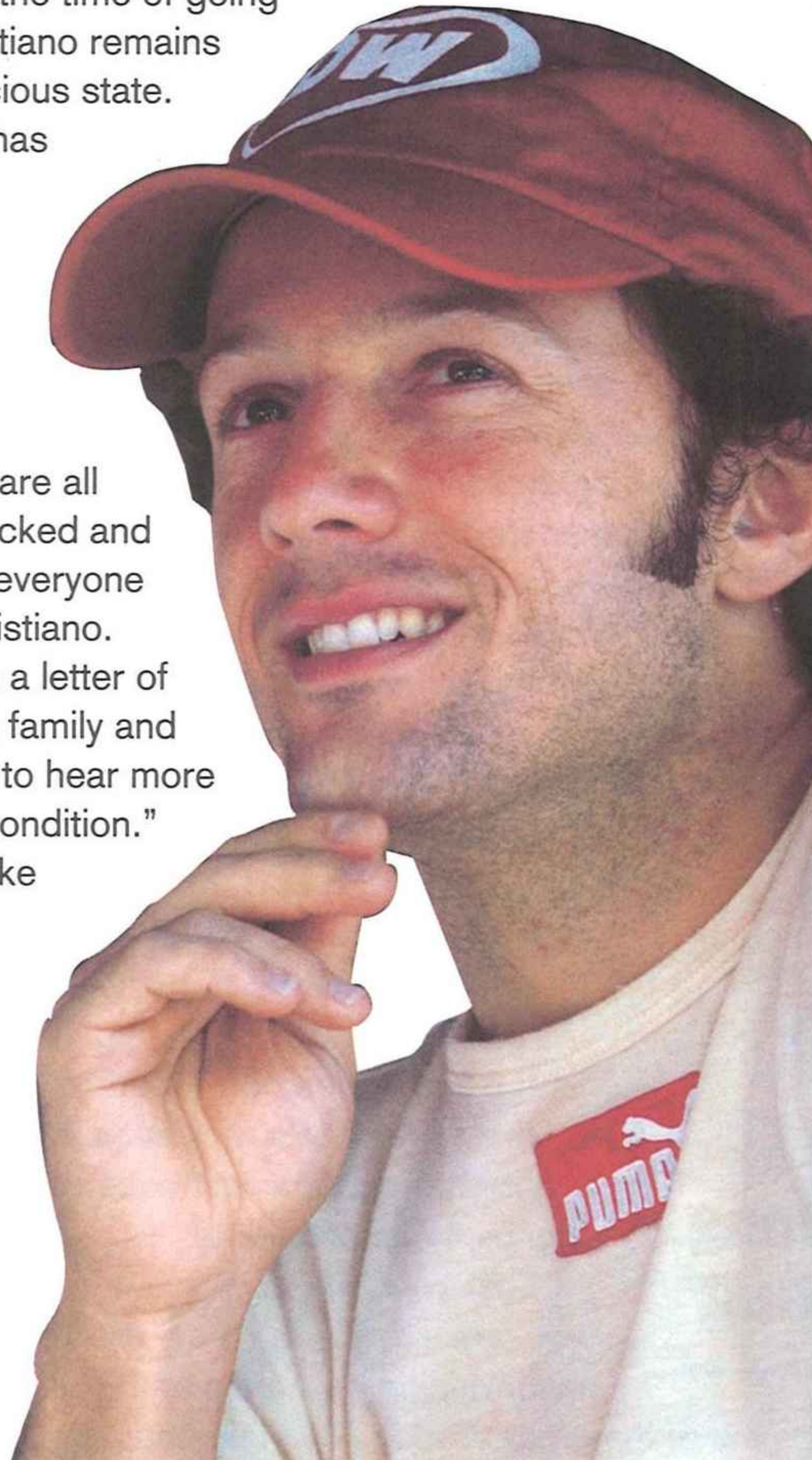
# PACESSETTER

**IF YOU THINK THE** fans in Germany were a bit mad, you should check out the ones in Hungary. In the campsite behind the track, a group of Dutch fans have brought along a music system to play the sounds of F1 cars (below) and a bloody great cannon – hence the ground-shaking explosions every 20 minutes. They've been coming to the Hungaroring for six years and this is the second they've brought the cannon, which is run by computers. Last year they used their weapon to fire footballs, but they lost the ball, so this year they're just making as much noise as possible to scare the locals.



**FORMER F1 DRIVER CRISTIANO DA MATTA** has been seriously injured at a Champ Car test session on the Road America course at Elkhart Lake. His car collided with a deer, which had escaped from the woods beside the track. Rescue crews were on the scene immediately and Cristiano was airlifted to the Theda Clark Memorial Hospital in Neenah, Wisconsin, before undergoing surgery to remove a blood clot from his brain. Doctors say it's too early to tell if there will be any permanent damage. "A head CT scan showed Cristiano had suffered a subdural hematoma," stated Champ Car medical director Dr Chris Pinderski. "He was urgently taken to the operating room for the surgical removal of the haematoma and is now being observed in the intensive care unit". At the time of going to press, Cristiano remains in an unconscious state.

John Howett has personally expressed the Toyota team's deep concern. He told The Red Bulletin: "We are all extremely shocked and sad because everyone really likes Cristiano. We've written a letter of support to his family and we're waiting to hear more news on his condition." **COLIN KOLLES IS PROBABLY F1'S BIGGEST CAR NUT.** An aficionado with the means to indulge his passion, he owns more cars than Hertz and many of them are competition GT cars and rally cars. We asked Colin to take us through his top 10 all-time favourites, while in our flannel panel we've nominated the cars we lie awake at night dreaming about. Cars designated with an asterisk are owned by the Kolles family:

**1. FERRARI 250 GTO\*** – One of the rarest Ferraris, and my personal favourite. It was only in production from 1960 until 1962 and there are very few of them left. Some have even fetched as much as \$15 million at auction (not that I would consider selling mine).

**2. FERRARI 365 GTB/4 COMPETIZIONE\*** – With only minor modifications from the road-going version, the Daytona in competition trim did very well against some of the crack sports prototypes of its day. Fast and gorgeous, it's still an engaging car to drive.

**3. FERRARI 250 SWB COMPETIZIONE** – This is the car I'd love to get my hands on, especially one of the Le Mans racers. It's one of the best dual-purpose cars Ferrari ever produced.

**4. FERRARI 250 LM\*** – Another of my favourites, although I've only ever driven it once. One of only 32 built, mine sits in a museum. Built for homologation purposes, the 250 LM secured Ferrari's last overall victory at Le Mans.

**5. FERRARI 250 CALIFORNIA SPYDER** – Yes, this is the car from the movie Ferris Bueller's Day Off. Essentially a competition car with an exquisite, hand-sculpted body, it's probably the prettiest Ferrari of all time.

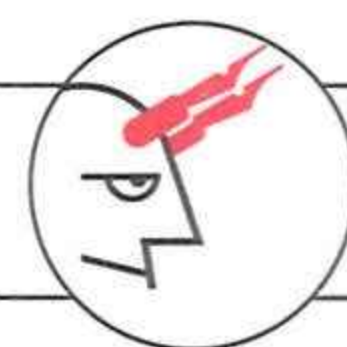
**6. FERRARI 275 GTB COMPETIZIONE\*** – Can you tell I like front-engined Ferrari GT cars? Rare, fast and beautiful, this car is extremely satisfying to drive.

**7. LAMBORGHINI MIURA SV\*** – OK, it's not a Ferrari... But the Miura is just too sexy to ignore. It's pretty quick, too.

**8. MERCEDES 300 SL GULLWING** – This car should make every enthusiast's top 10 list. It has all the requisite qualities of a supercar: looks, performance and historical significance.

**9. LANCIA STRATOS GROUP 4** – Well ahead of its time, the Stratos was the most beautiful and dominant rally car of its time. Even today, it remains impressive in every sense.

**10. AUDI QUATTRO GROUP B** – This is the weapon Audi used to thrash its rallying competitors into submission. Brilliantly engineered with all-wheel drive and ferocious amounts of power, it was simply unbeatable.

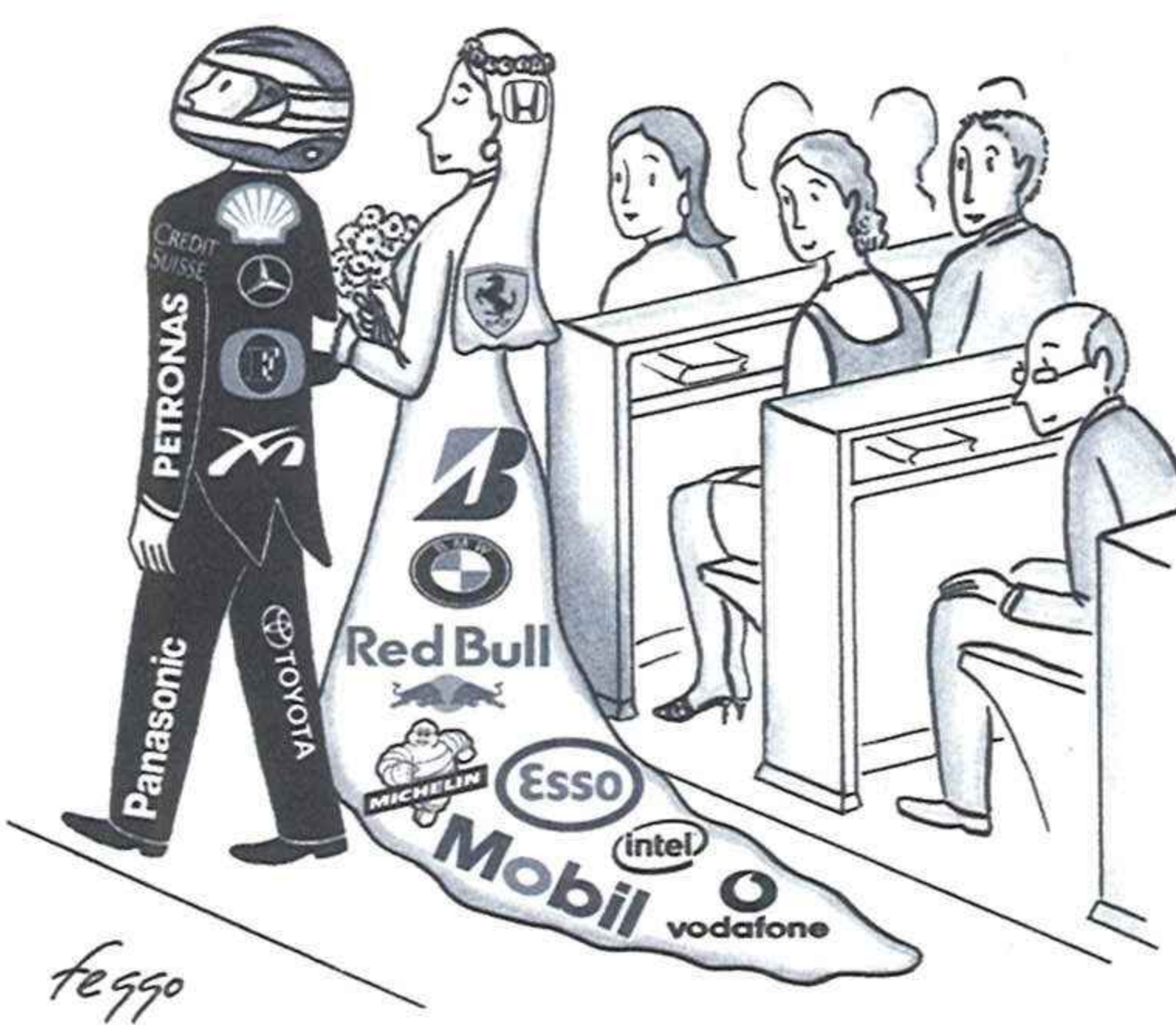

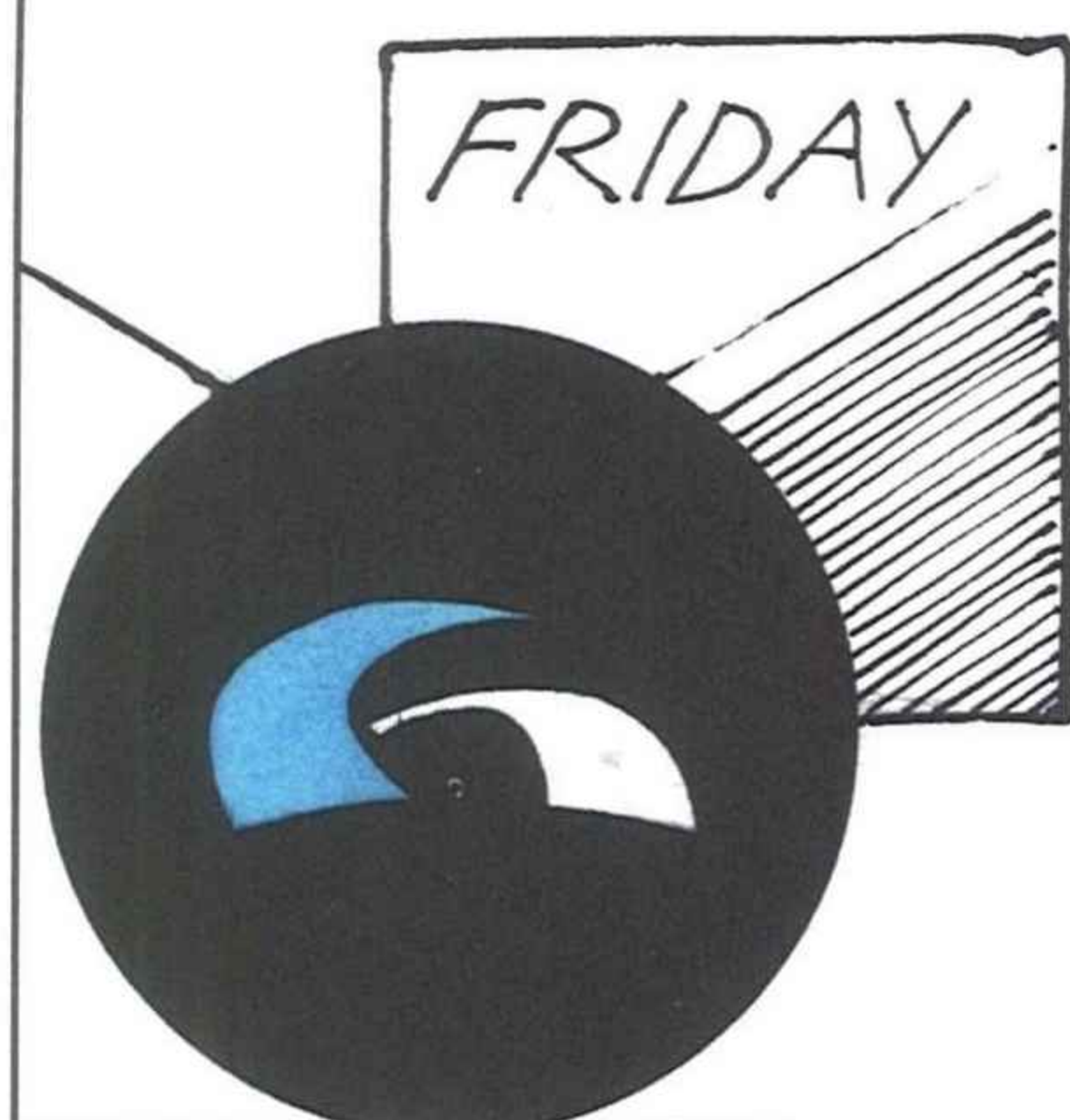

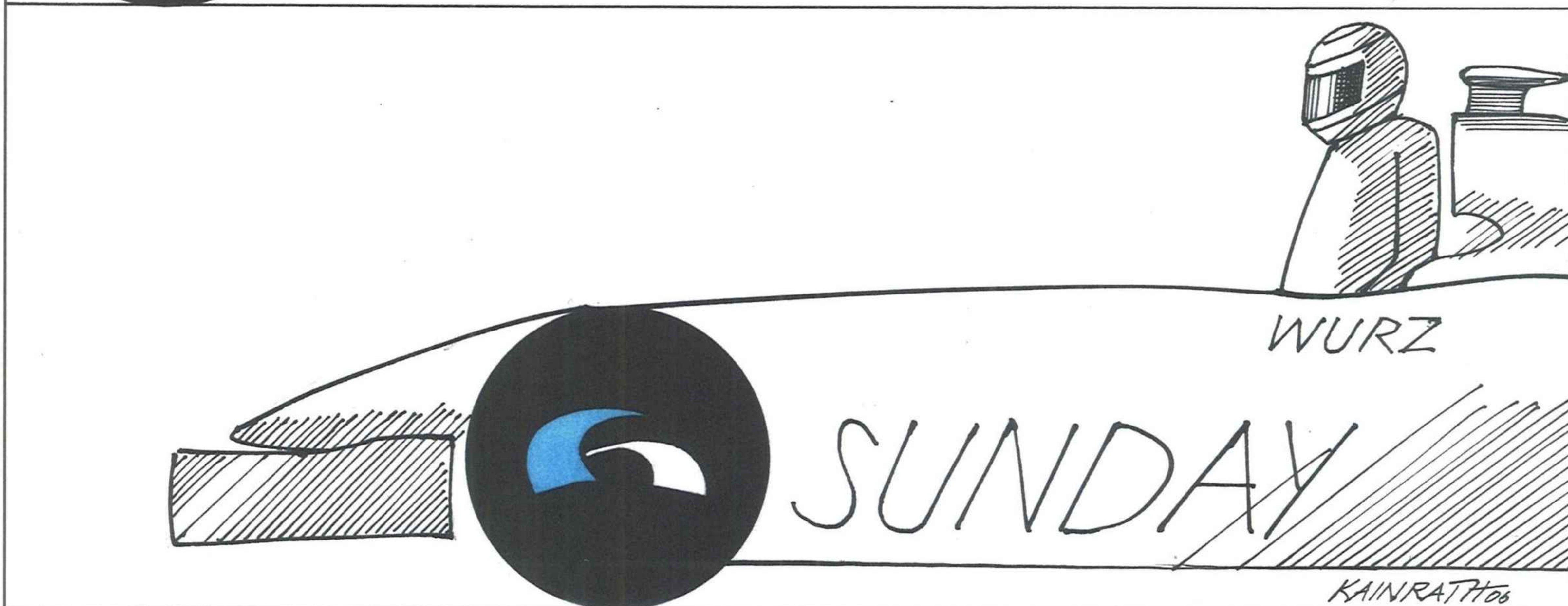

## A LONG AND WINDING ROAD BY GERHARD KUNTSCHIK

**4** When Williams announced their driver line-up for 2007 this week the Grove-based team caused a few surprises. Confirming Alex Wurz as race driver along with Nico Rosberg in the Toyota-powered cars gives the Austrian some late weekend work after six seasons' absence.

Wurz came into F1 as a Benetton reserve driver in 1997, substituting in three grands prix (with a podium finish at third attempt at Silverstone) in the car of a sick Gerhard Berger, and raced for Enstone from 1998 to 2000. Failing to reach a management agreement with Benetton's Flavio Briatore then was one reason his career there ended. From 2001-05 Wurz worked his way as test and reserve driver for McLaren-Mercedes, racing in the 2005 San Marino GP, replacing an injured Juan Pablo Montoya. The Monaco-based Austrian finished third in the end – making him the only McLaren-Mercedes driver with 100 per cent podium scoring statistics... "And with the best points average of any silver arrow driver," as Alex himself noted with a smile.

While McLaren-Mercedes did not seem to be excited about continuing with Alex for 2006, Frank Williams took the chance as soon

as he found out Wurz was available. In seven months of testing for Williams Alex proved his worth to the team through technical feedback and communication with the engineers and by driving skills. Obviously, Wurz' Friday performances in heavy cars, especially in Monaco (Thursday there of course), did not go unnoticed by Sir Frank and his management. Arriving back in the race seat after six years of stand-by work is possibly the most astonishing comeback of recent F1 history. Alex Wurz will be 33 on his return in 2007, three years younger than Damon Hill and six younger than Nigel Mansell in their title-winning seasons.

"It was big news on a quiet day," Alex said. "It means the time will end soon when I have to watch from the outside as the other boys have fun." Or, as many in the paddock realise: seeing other guys taking the honours for work that was at least partially done by Alex.

**'Since Wurz left Benetton, he has always admitted he has unfinished F1 business'**

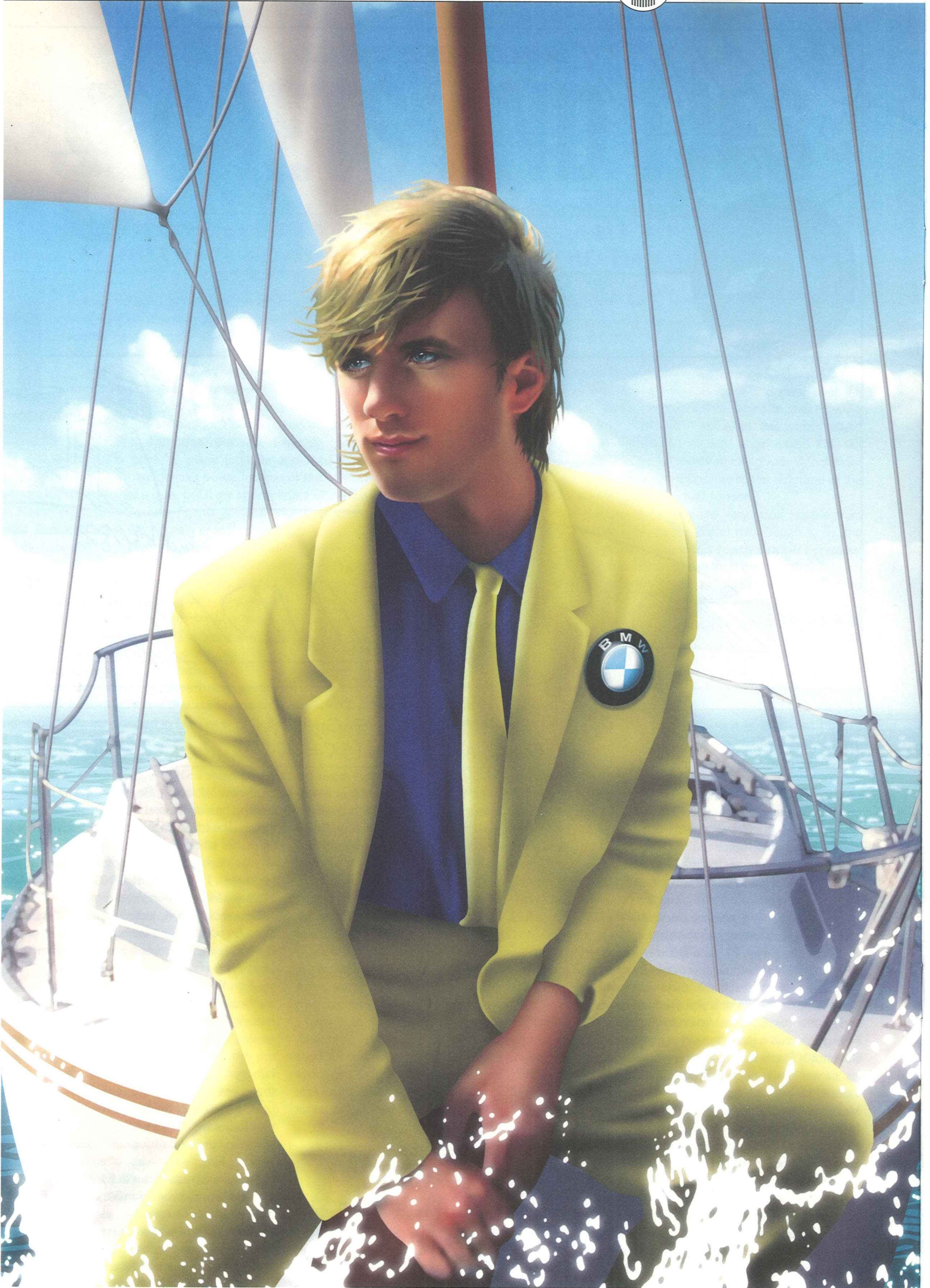
Since Wurz left Benetton, he has always said he has unfinished business in F1. He had the chance to return to racing earlier a couple of times but either denied it to himself (for Prost) or was denied by somebody else (Jaguar and McLaren). The contract for 2007 was obviously in place already when Wurz signed for Williams in December 2005, including an option for the team on his services for either race or reserve driver. This time, politics and the driver market went Alex' way.

For Williams, the combination of one of the hottest talents in F1 and one of the most experienced and technically astute drivers seems to be a near-perfect basis for a new era with a new engine partner. "I am extremely hungry to prove I am still a race driver after all those years," Wurz said.

Come 2007, he can prove his capabilities on Saturdays and Sundays again. And there are many in the paddock who look forward to seeing Alex, who was often underrated in recent years, race again in F1.

And Wurz's promotion is a boost for F1 in his native Austria. Contributing at least one, maybe two, drivers and certainly two teams to the field is not a bad number for a small country.

**A: Liver**

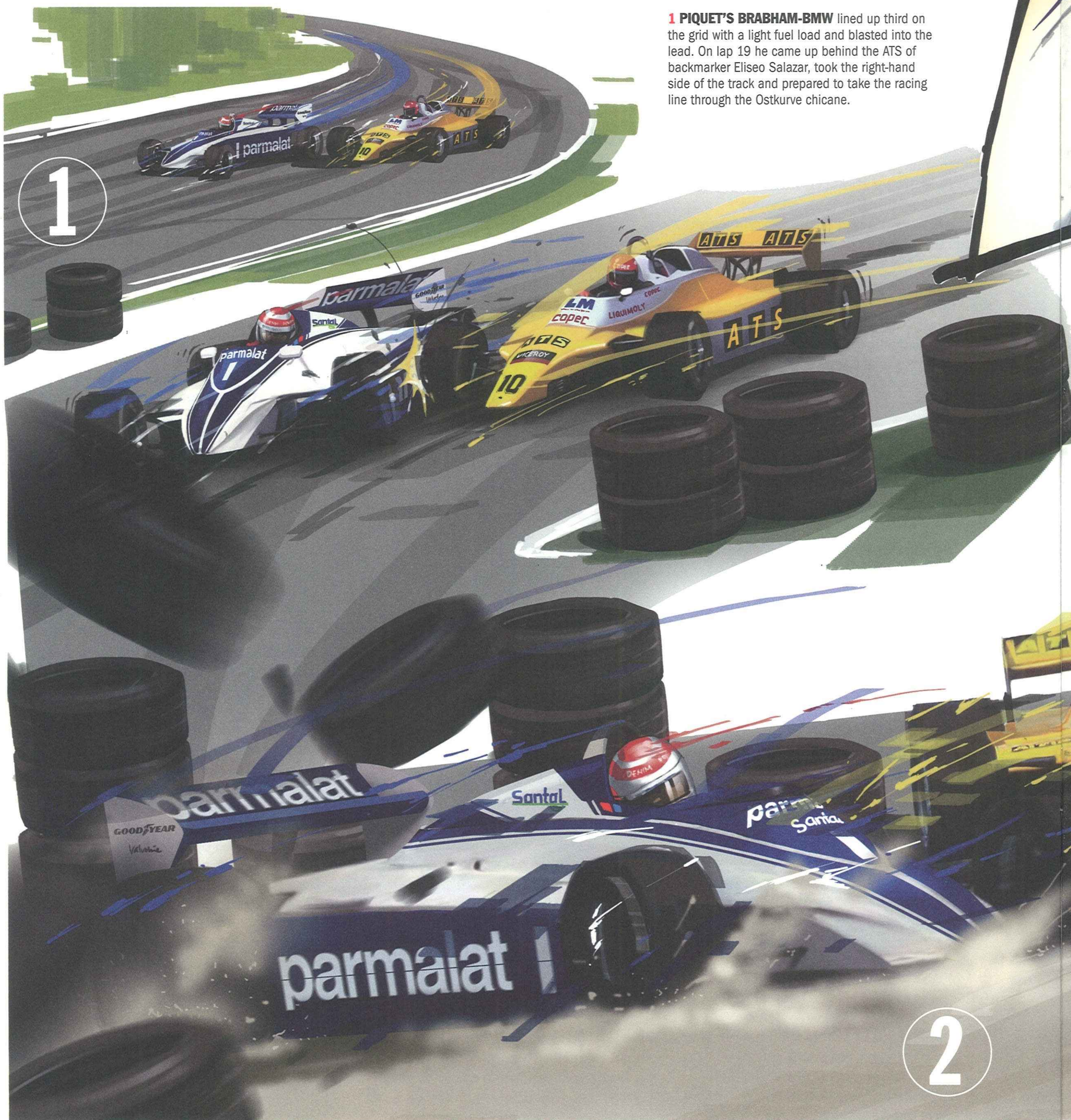

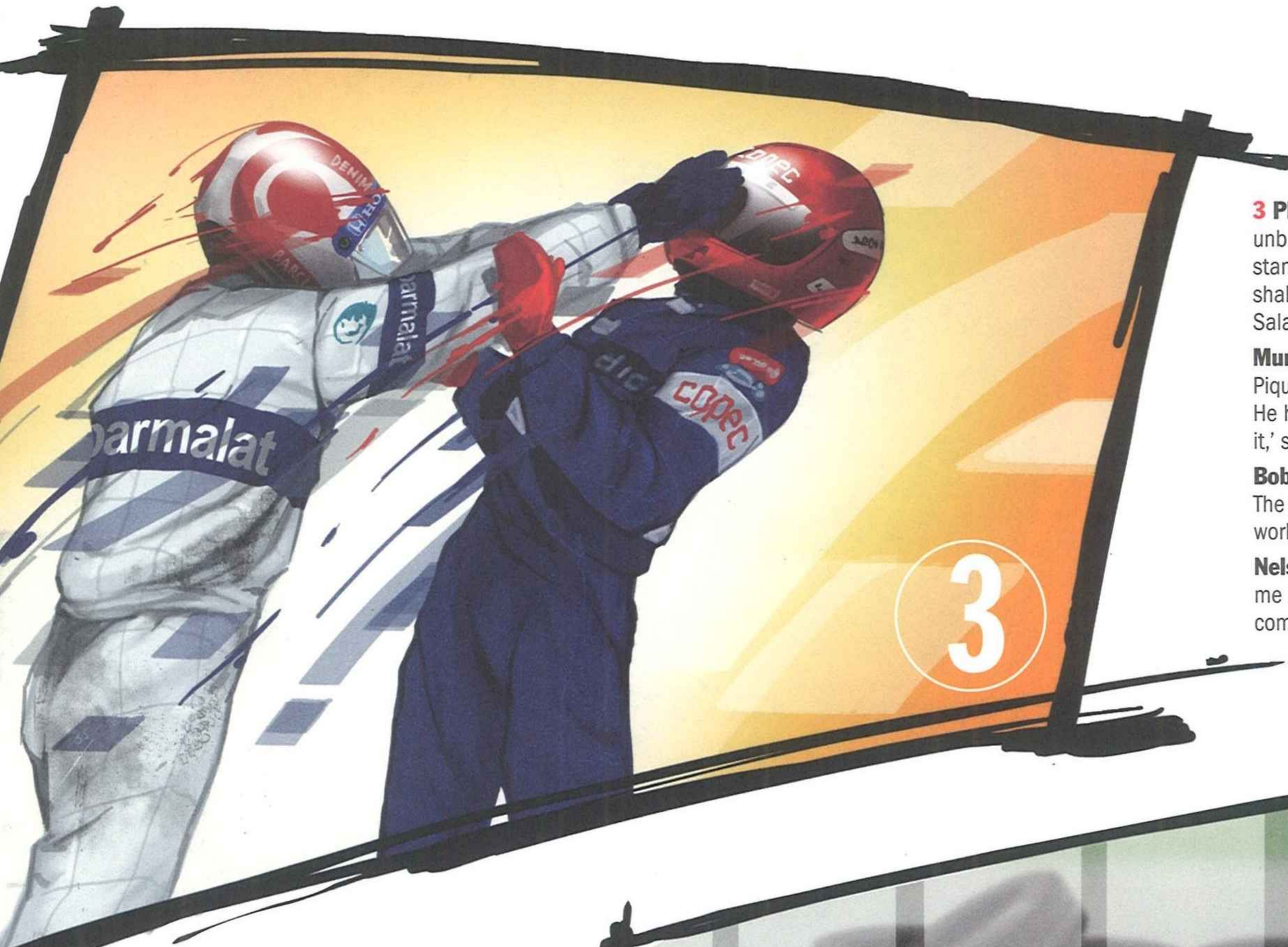
# 'I LOOKED A COMPLETE IDIOT WHEN I TRIED TO KICK HIM'

**HOCKENHEIM, AUGUST 8, 1982. LAP 19.**

Defending world champion Nelson Piquet was on course to win the 1982 German Grand Prix, but instead he ended up in a tyre wall thanks to a backmarker. But the crash was just the appetiser. The main course was when Piquet laid into Eliseo Salazar.

**1 PIQUET'S BRABHAM-BMW** lined up third on the grid with a light fuel load and blasted into the lead. On lap 19 he came up behind the ATS of backmarker Eliseo Salazar, took the right-hand side of the track and prepared to take the racing line through the Ostkurve chicane.





**3 PIQUET WAS INCANDESCENT.** He'd started to unbuckle his harness before the car had skidded to a standstill, thrust himself out of it and strode up to Salazar, shaking his fists in rage. He slammed a double punch into Salazar's helmet, and then went to kick the Chilean.

**Murray Walker (BBC TV commentator):** "And out goes Piquet, my goodness! It seems like the Brabhams are fated. He has hit Eliseo Salazar and he's furious! 'I couldn't help it,' says Eliseo. Take that, and oh my goodness!"

**Bob Constanduros (F1 journalist):** "It was laughable. The press room couldn't believe that here was the reigning world champion looking so pathetic and kicking like a girl."

**Nelson Piquet (Brabham driver):** "The fight between me and Salazar has bothered me for years. I looked a complete idiot when I tried to kick him and missed."

**2 SALAZAR FAILED TO YIELD** track position, braked too late and cannoned into the side of the Brabham, sending Piquet sideways into the tyre wall and into the gravel. Both men's races were terminated.

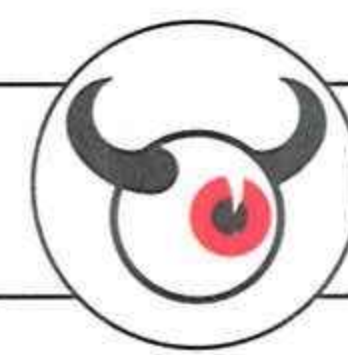

At which point Nelson jumped into the driver's seat and sped off, leaving Eliseo stranded.

**Herbie Blash (Brabham team manager):** "We were as upset as Nelson. Salazar robbed us of a victory. But by the time he got back to the garage, Nelson had calmed down."

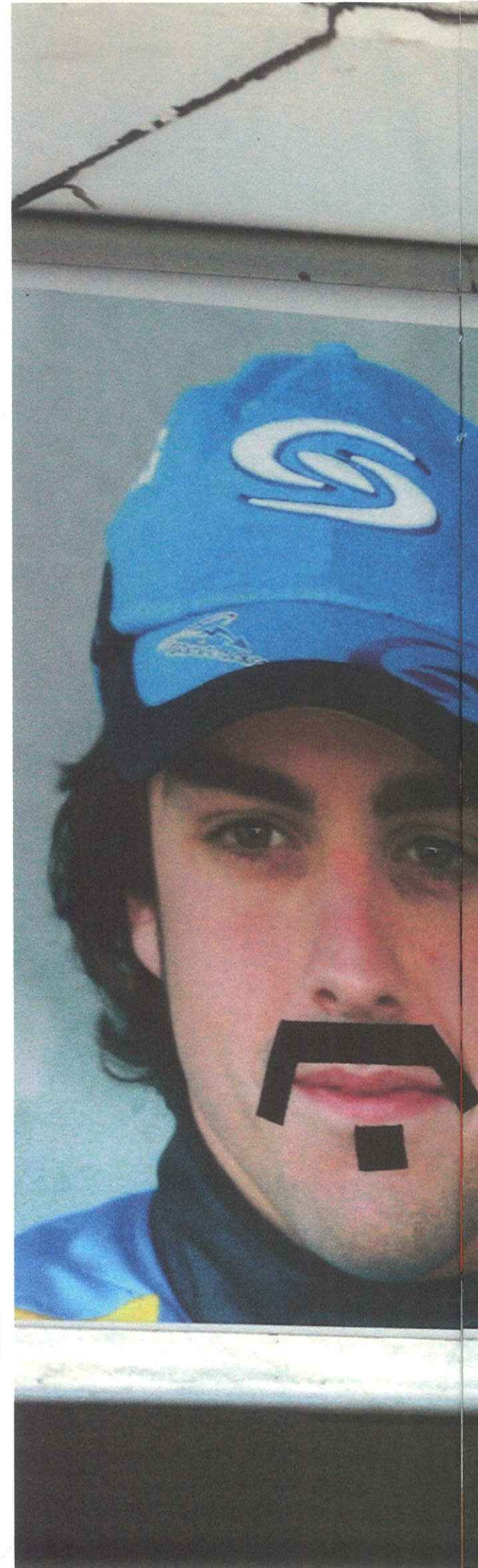
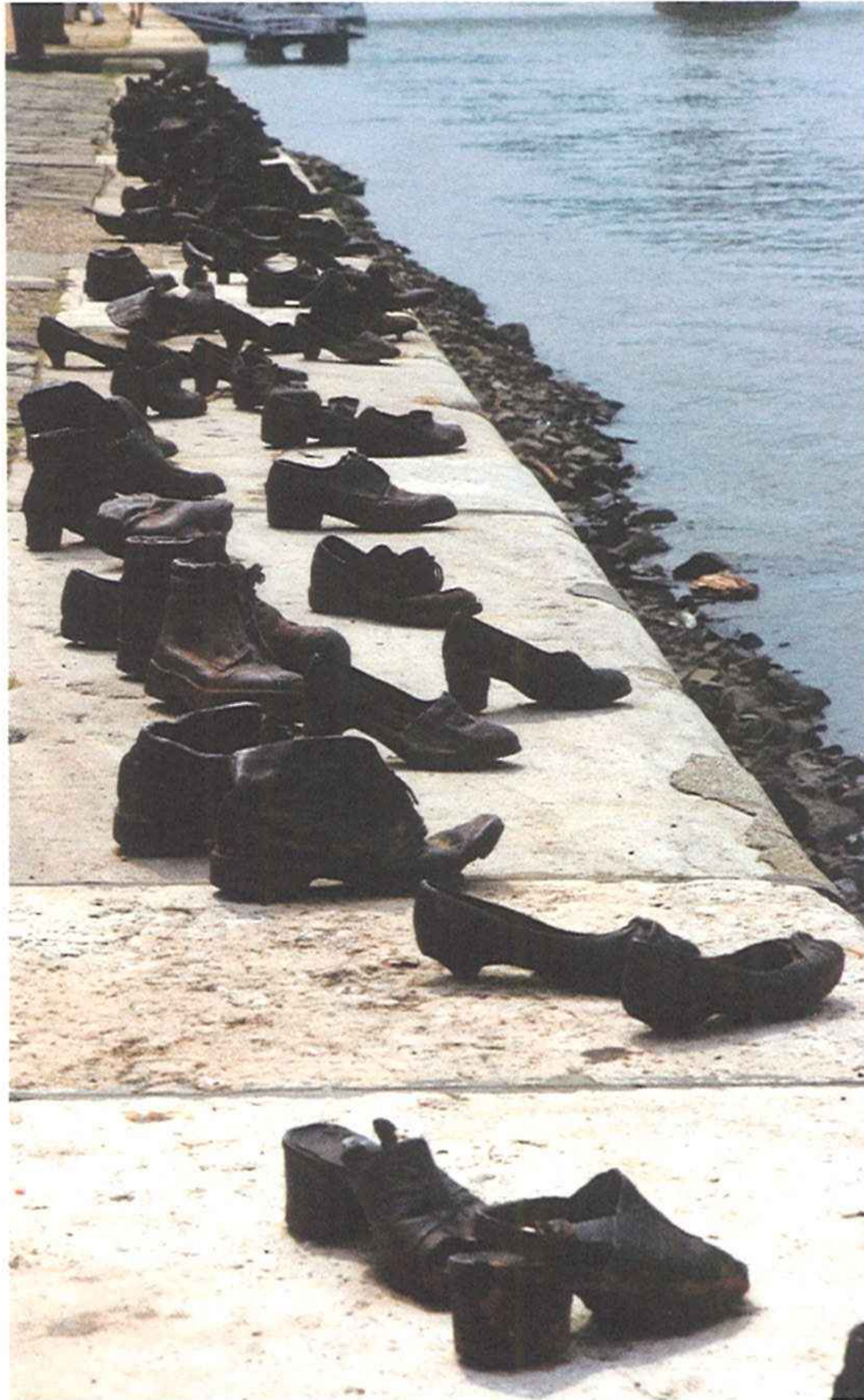
**Freddie Af Petersens (F1 journalist):** "It was the South American championship in heavyweight boxing. Ten years after the event, Paul Rosche of BMW admitted to Nelson that the fight was unnecessary as his engine was ready to blow within two laps. Nelson said: 'You fucking bastard, I made myself look like a prick in front of the whole world!' Nelson had a hot temper, and it was great fun."

**Eliseo Salazar:** "We're still on good terms and whenever we meet, usually twice a year, we always bang our fists for fun."

McLaren launch their new car and driver line-up, Mika Hakkinen and David Coulthard, at Estoril in Portugal at the start of the 1996 season. Just 92 days before, Hakkinen had been badly injured at Adelaide. He had tested the car a few days prior to the launch; this was his first public appearance since his accident.

**NAME: MIKA HAKKINEN**  
**POSITION, 1996: MCLAREN DRIVER**

Mika spent two years with Lotus prior to becoming test driver for McLaren in 1993. At the end of the year, he had replaced Michael Andretti at Estoril and promptly out-qualified team-mate Ayrton Senna. After finishing two years in the top six in the championship, he won back-to-back titles in 1998 and 1999, before retiring in 2001. He now races for Mercedes in DTM.

Coton was working with Keke Rosberg at the time, as Mika's manager. As part of this role he was instrumental in giving Mika all the support he needed during his recovery. Didier now runs his own driver management company looking after five drivers and is still helping Mika.

"Mika never changed very much, did he?" remembers Benson. "I think he probably got fed up with questions about how it felt to nearly die. This was Benson's debut in F1; he now works on BBC Sport's website, attending two or three grands prix a year.

"There was a lot of doubt as to whether he would a) be taking part and b) whether he would still be the same force as he was before," says Dodgins, now a freelance journalist. 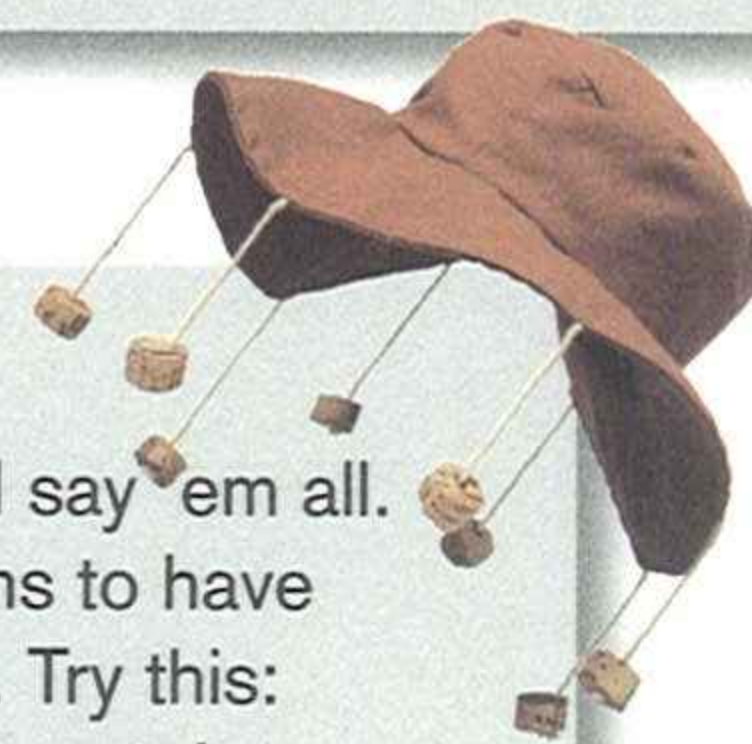


## 5 FIG-JAM

Dear John  
Thank you for your e-mail, I think it has clarified the position very well, though as we've now received the two demo units, everything makes a lot more sense. Just a couple of quibbles though. Firstly, I know that these are just the test versions, they're a bit, um... heavy. We installed one into the car last night and it dropped through the bottom of the chassis and left an engine-shaped hole in the floor. It's landed in the canteen and we're using it as a table until we can rig up some sort of a super-reinforced block and tackle. Also, when we had it on the dyno, it only managed 550bhp - is this some sort of emergency limp-home mode? The other one looks a little rough - are you quite sure we've got the right evolution? One end of the block has a highly unusual finish that our time-of-flight mass spectrographic analysis has classified as 'hacksaw and chisel debris'. 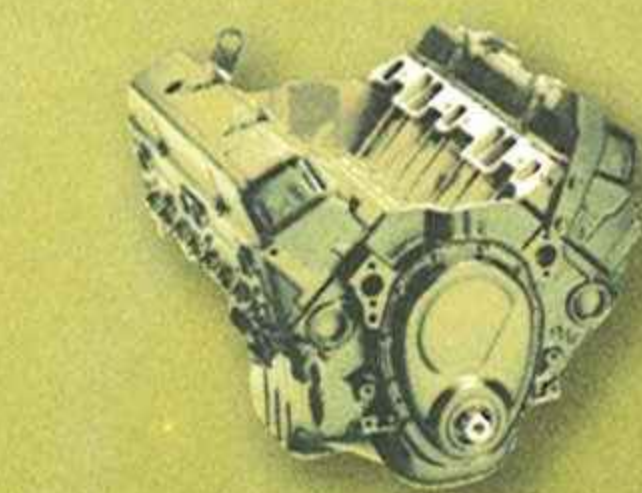

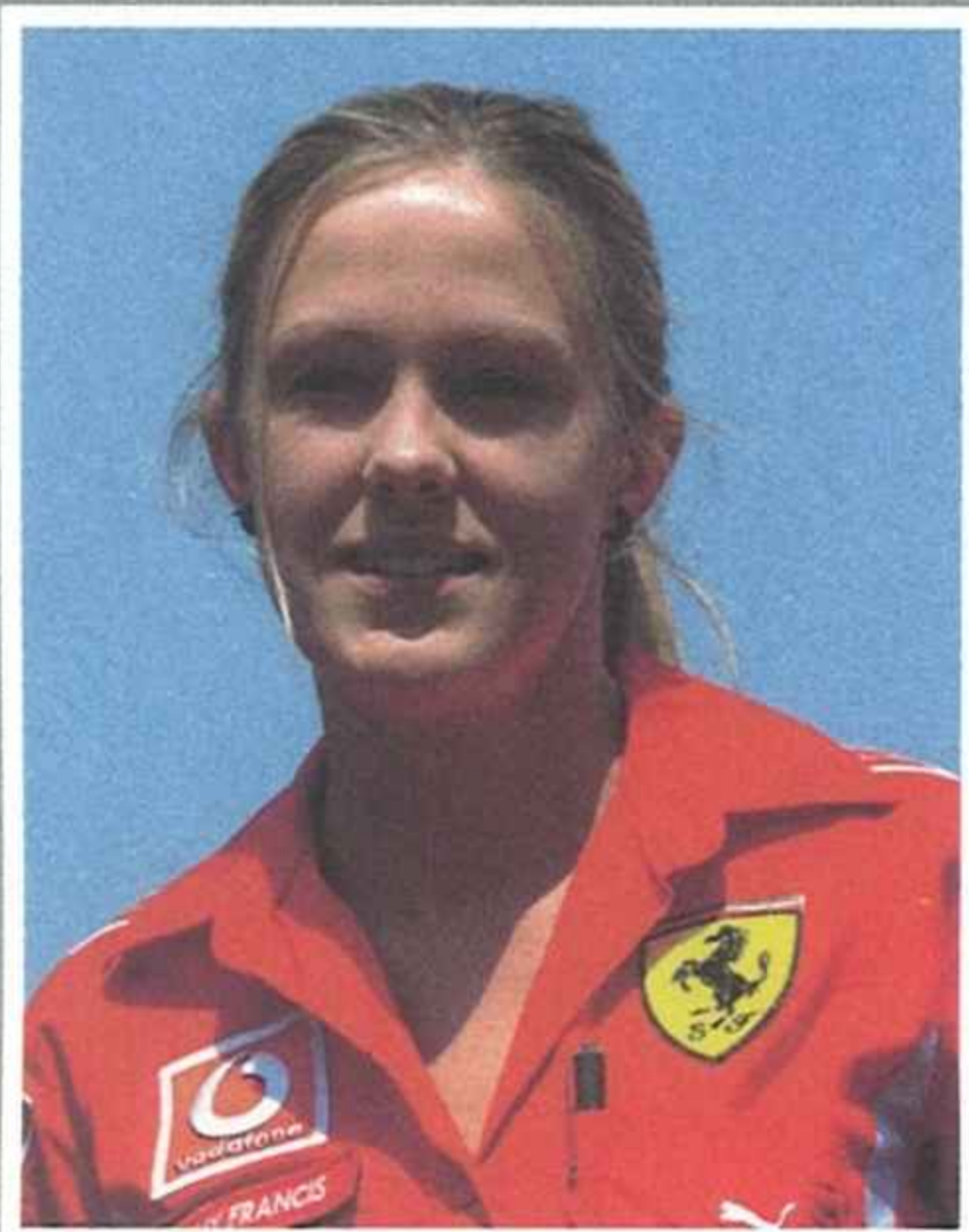

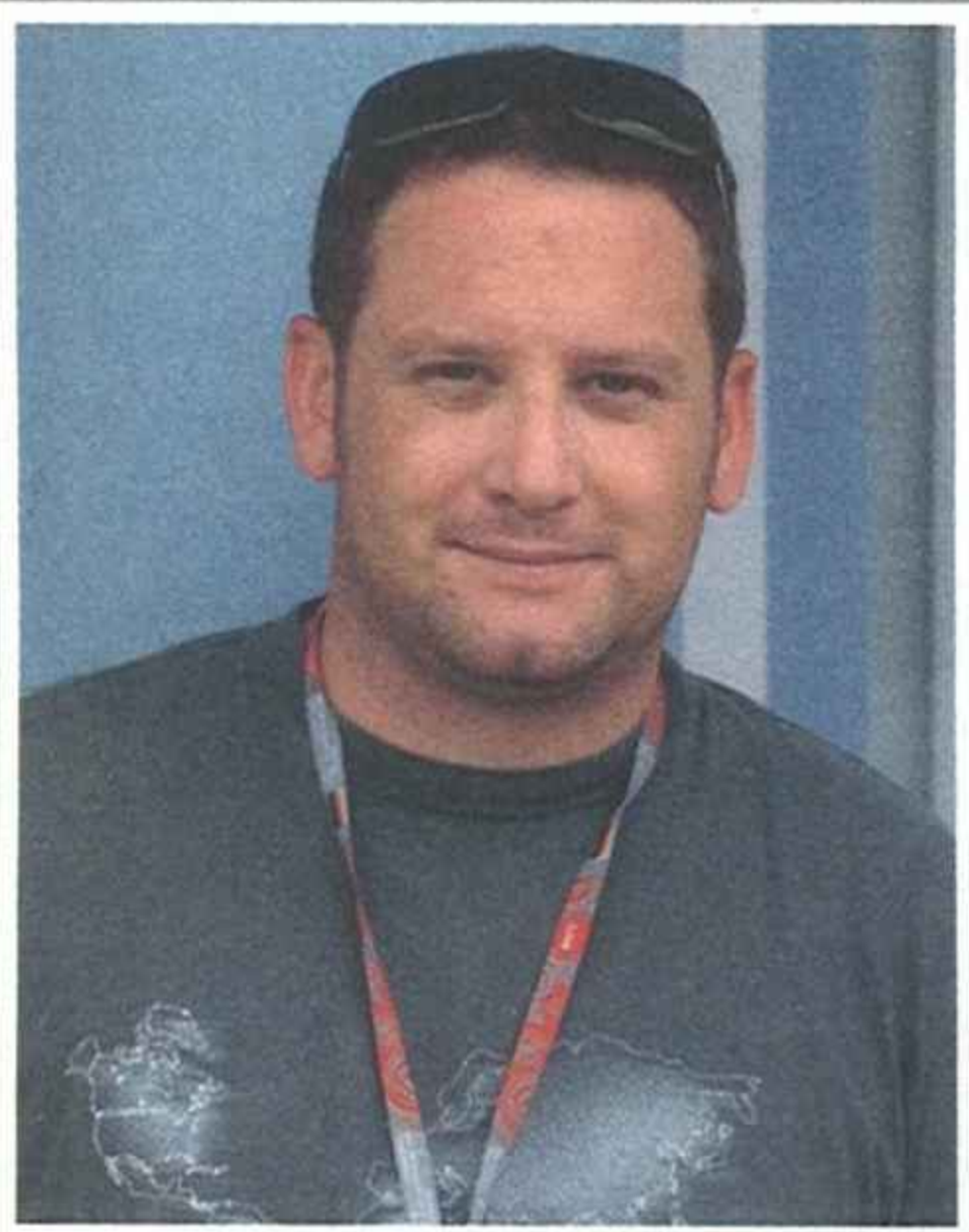
## LIFE &amp; TIMES

## HONDA TEST TRUCKIE

### COUNCIL DUSTMAN

**"I WAS A DUSTMAN** for 12 years and was responsible for carting 40 tonnes of rubbish a day around Northampton, England. You're basically dealing with shit all day long, but it was actually an alright job and I was happy doing it.

**"I WAS THE DRIVER,** so I didn't have to get my hands dirty very often. It's the cleanest part of the job, and I really enjoy driving heavy-goods vehicles and have done for 20 years – carrying everything from worthless waste to million-dollar race cars.

**"WORKING IN REFUSE WAS** dull most of the time, but sometimes we'd be chased down the road by people in their pyjamas who'd suddenly realised they'd thrown out their wage cheques. One time a young lady came running out of her house in just her nightgown, jumped over her rose bushes and screamed at us to stop the crusher. She'd accidentally thrown out £10,000 cash! But once it goes into the crusher, that's it: gone. And putting that much money in a bin bag is just plain careless.

**"THE BEST THING ABOUT** working for the council was the security, and having a stable job was of paramount importance to me when I had a wife and family to support. But I separated from my missus, and as a free man I felt the world was my oyster. My brother-in-law is Getty F1 photographer Mark Thompson. He encouraged me to try out for a Formula 1 truckie job, saying it would be fun. So Mark had a chat with Paul Edwards and soon I was looking after the hospitality trucks for Toyota and then Honda, before going in-house.

**"I WOULD DRIVE TO THE** European races, set the motorhome up and oversee security at the back of the garages. Then I moved across to the test team and am mostly concerned with tyres these days. Because of the EU law that lorry drivers aren't allowed to work more than about 48 hours a week, I have to fly out to the circuits now and agency drivers take over delivery. I quite miss this aspect of the job. And I love the travel, which can be very exciting, but I was away too much to manage my son's under-11 football team, like I used to.

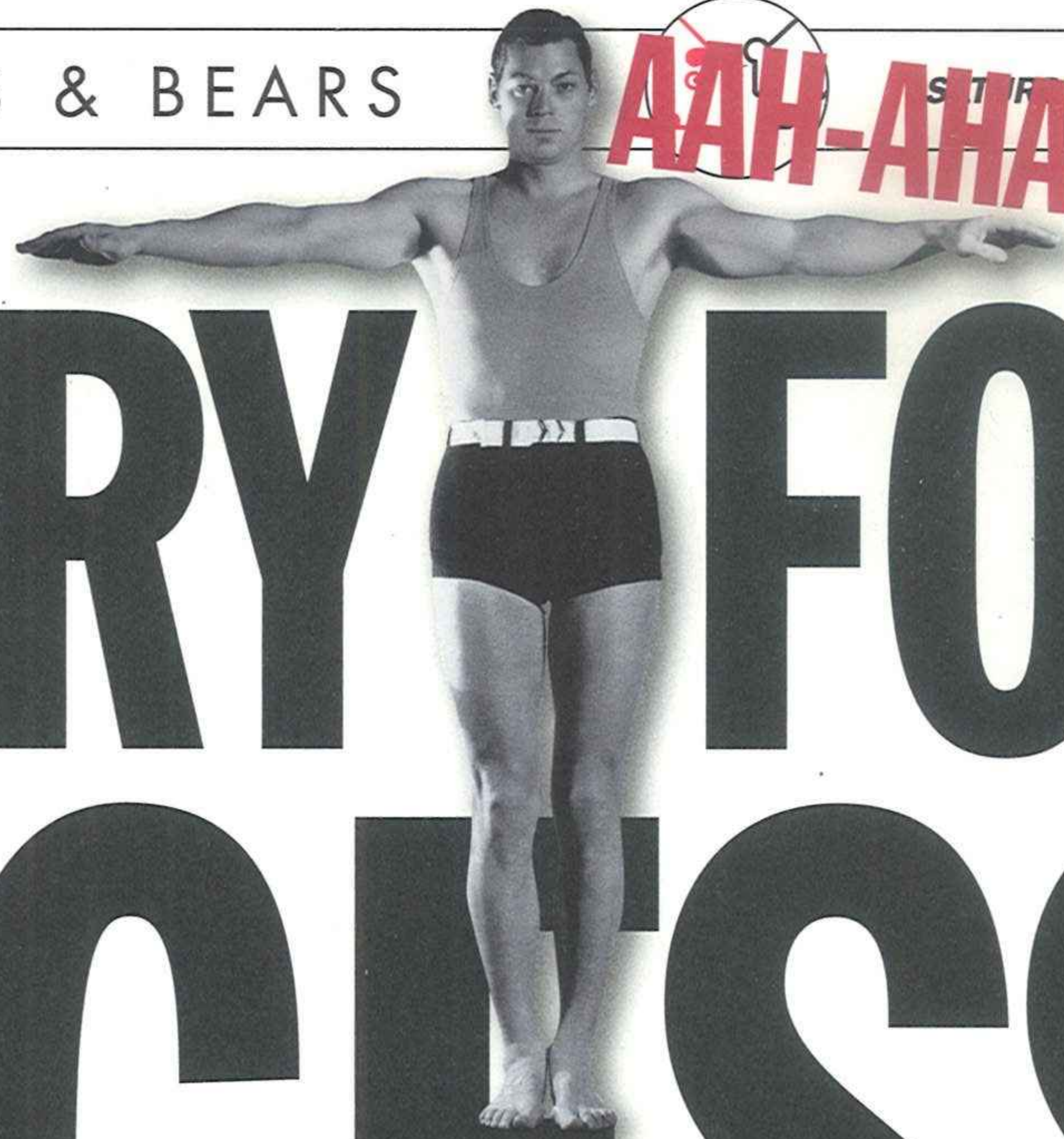
**"COMING INTO F1 AND** getting given a state-of-the-art truck was a real culture shock, having come from driving bin lorries. Presentation has to be perfect, and that wasn't always a high priority when we were out doing the refuse job. But the get-in and get-out mentality has some parallels and there were many other similarities. Whether you're emptying bins or keeping an F1 team on the road, either way you have to put up with a lot of shit." ■

# HUNGARY FOR SUCCESS



Some you'll know, some you may not, but Hungary has produced some truly talented individuals. Who's the greatest? You decide...

## HARRY HOUDINI (1874-1926)

Think David Blaine, think David Copperfield, then think of someone good. Harry Houdini was probably the greatest magician of all time. Born Ehrich Weiss in Budapest, he was performing as a trapeze artist aged nine. A keen student of magic, Houdini's flare for the dramatic made him a hit with European and American audiences as he performed apparently impossible escapes, such as being suspended upside-down and bound in chains in the Chinese water-torture chamber. When not performing his daring stunts, he used to expose fake spiritualists and mediums, a pastime he continued even in death – in his will, he promised to contact his wife from the afterlife, if it was possible. He never got in touch. **In his own words: "No performer should attempt to bite off red-hot iron unless he has a good set of teeth."**

## BELA LUGOSI (1882-1956)

Forget Christopher Lee or Gary Oldman, the definitive portrayal of Dracula was by this former cavalry officer. Lugosi first played Bram Stoker's vampire nobleman on Broadway and then in the 1931 film. Unfortunately, his work was so good – and his accent so strong – that he became typecast and never really escaped the role. Eventually, he became addicted to morphine and his health declined. Late in life, his biggest fan, Edward Wood, cast him in several films, including the cross-dressing melodrama *Glen or Glenda* and the bizarre *Bride of the Monster*. Fittingly, Lugosi's last film was made when he was dead, the truly appalling *Plan 9 From Outer Space*. Lugosi and Wood's relationship will live on forever in the film *Ed Wood*. **In his own words: "No thank you, I never drink... wine." (Dracula)**

## FERENC PUSKAS (BORN 1927)

One of the greatest footballers of all time, Puskas was the talisman of the Magnificent Magyars, who became the first overseas team to beat England at home, won Olympic Gold and fell just short of World Cup triumph in 1954. In 1956, he defected to the West but found himself without a home or a club. Depressed, the dumpy player started gaining weight and was written off at age 30. But when Emil Oestreicher, his former coach at Honved, brought him to Real Madrid, he struck up a partnership with Argentine Alfredo Di Stefano, which had its greatest expression in the 7-3 defeat of Eintracht Frankfurt, which brought Real their fifth

European Cup as Puskas became the only man to score four times in a European Cup final.

**In their own words: "Look at that little fat chap. We'll murder this lot." (unnamed England player shortly before England's 6-3 loss to Hungary)**

## ZSA ZSA GABOR (BORN 1917)

Before Paris Hilton, before Joan Collins, before Liz Taylor, there was Zsa Zsa. As witty and beguiling as she was beautiful, this blonde bombshell left a trail of men reeling in her ample wake (Paris's great-grandfather, Conrad, was hubby number two). Another ex-husband, Jack Ryan, invented the Barbie Doll, possibly as a tribute. Zsa Zsa started young, claiming Turkish national hero Kemal Atatürk as her first conquest at age 15. She became Miss Hungary in 1936 and married a wealthy Hungarian civil servant. Nine marriages made her a multi-millionaire. Hardly a great actress, Zsa Zsa lived on her wits, particularly as a guest on chat shows, delighting audiences with her outrageous gossip, one-liners and 'dahlink' catchphrase. **In her own words: "I have never hated a man enough to give his diamonds back."**

## TONY CURTIS (BORN 1925)

He was born in the Bronx to Hungarian parents but you can stretch a point when it comes to the one-time Bernie Schwartz. He's the first in our top 10 to feature on the cover of Sgt Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. He's also a considerably better actor than most gave him credit for: he had a great touch for comedy seen best in *Some Like It Hot*, he was chilling and pathetic as *The Boston Strangler* and then there was *Spartacus*. Not unlike Zsa Zsa, beyond

his physical attraction, a lot of his charm lies in the fact that he doesn't take himself too seriously. **In his own words: "I wouldn't be seen dead with a woman old enough to be my wife." (attributed)**

## LÁSZLÓ BÍRÓ (1899-1985)

The inventor of the disposable pen that still bears his name, László Ball-Pointpen was a man of many talents. He was a journalist, magazine publisher, sculptor, and painter before he came up with his great invention. When Bíró was working in publishing he noticed newsprint ink dried much faster than ink from a fountain pen. Working with his brother Georg, a chemist, he came up with a design for a disposable pen. The invention was a hit and with his profits, Bíró bought a Bugatti, which inspired him to come up with the first reliable design for an automatic gearbox. Presumably, the schematic was drawn up with a Bic. **In his own words: "Why can I never find a bloody pen when I need one?"**

## JOE ESZTERHAS (BORN 1944)

Who? Only one of Hollywood's most highly-paid screenwriters, that's who. Hard-living, foul-mouthed and controversial Eszterhas wrote such exploitation epics as *Basic Instinct*, *Sliver* and *Showgirls*. Born in Csakanydoroszlo, he moved to the US as a boy and turned his talents to writing, moving to *Rolling Stone*. The Sylvester Stallone movie *F.I.S.T.* made his name but his true talent lay in thrillers, from the classy *Jagged Edge* to the truly crap *Basic Instinct 2*. After his scripts for *Jade* and *Showgirls*

were nominated for Worst Screenplay at the Razzie Awards, the category was renamed the Eszterhas Dis-Honorarial Worst Screenplay Award. **In his own words: "My characters smoke... and they look cool and glamorous doing it."**

## ERNŐ RUBIK (BORN 1944)

Born in Budapest, his mother was a poet, his father an aviation engineer. That mix of arts and science led Rubik to study sculpture, architecture and design. In 1974, 29-year-old Rubik satisfied his life's ambition – to come up with a way to bring the entire world to a standstill. The Rubik's Cube became one of the best-selling toys in history and made Rubik the first self-made millionaire from the communist block. Today, he runs a foundation to help promising inventors in Hungary. **In his own words: "After a while I decided to put the cubes back in order. And it was at that moment that I came face to face with the big challenge."**

## PETER LORRE (1904-1964)

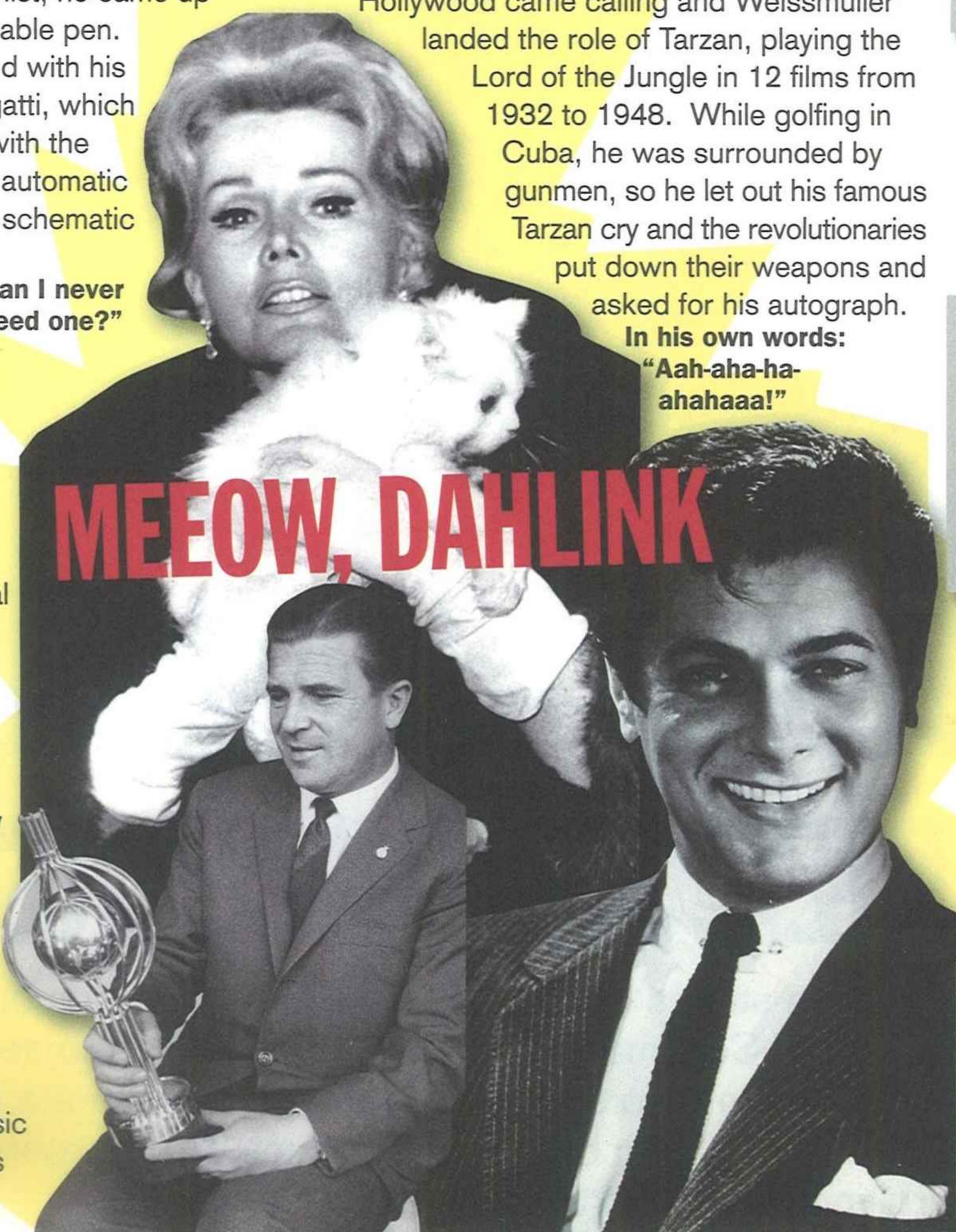
A student of Sigmund Freud, no less, no-one could play sinister as well as the scene-stealing Lorre and no-one could elicit as much sympathy doing it as the legendary actor. Charlie Chaplin called him the greatest actor alive. His most important role was in Fritz Lang's *M*, in which he played a child murderer and yet still shows himself to be a victim of society – quite literally – as he is hunted down by a mob. **In his own words: "You despise me, don't you?" (Casablanca)**

## JOHNNY WEISSMULLER (1904-1984)

Arguably the greatest Olympic swimmer of all time and a Sgt Pepper cover model, Janos Weissmuller was born near Temesvar in the Banat region of Hungary and emigrated to the USA with his family when he was three. He was a supreme athlete and set 28 world records in the pool at the 1924 and 1928 Olympics. Then Hollywood came calling and Weissmuller landed the role of Tarzan, playing the Lord of the Jungle in 12 films from 1932 to 1948. While golfing in Cuba, he was surrounded by gunmen, so he let out his famous Tarzan cry and the revolutionaries put down their weapons and asked for his autograph.

**In his own words: "Aah-aha-ha-ahahaha!"**
