

## Retired Warren-Prescott Principal Dies

Retired principal of the Warren-Prescott School, Thomas G. Dolan, passed away suddenly in St. Petersburg, Florida, on Saturday, April 28th. Mr. Dolan opened the Warren-Prescott School as its first principal in February of 1963 and served in that capacity, ably and with great dedication and love for the children of Charlestown, until his retirement in 1974. He leaves behind a multitude of friends, both, former pupils and parents

of the school, as well as the teachers who worked with him during his eleven years as administrator.

During his tenure as principal, Mr. Dolan was recognized for his leadership at the Warren-Prescott School and for the many programs put on by the children recognizing the varied patriotic observances. These same programs are carried on to this day. A plaque recognizing Mr. Dolan for his efforts in this regard stands visible in the lobby

of the school.

As a teacher who worked with Mr. Dolan, I experienced his love for the children of this community and a feeling for the people of Charlestown. We were blessed to be able to share so many years of his guidance in one of our public schools. He will be missed and we ask God to grant him eternal rest. May his family be comforted in their time of sorrow. Mr. Dolan is survived by his wife, Millie, and five children.

Langone has sponsored movie and ice cream parties for more than 200 Senior Citizens groups across the city annually.

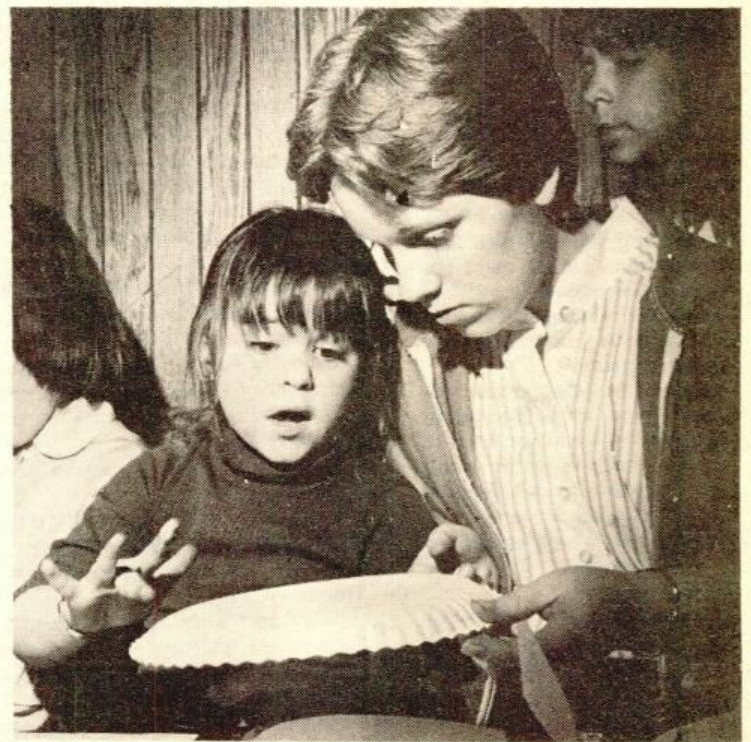

The six enrollees, all young ladies from Charlestown, were busy as usual, directing afternoon arts and crafts activities at the recreational center on High Street. And of course on Good Friday, the club was bouncing with the preparation of Easter bonnets and baskets—some of them resembling rabbits—for an Easter parade.

The YES enrollees—Michele Fitzgerald, 18, Kathy Feeney, 18, Michelle McNeil, 18, Shelagh McNeil, 17, Patty Mitchell, 17, and Debby Murphy, 17—teach classes at the club for girls, 6 to 12, in cooking, macrame, sewing, pottery and even candlemaking.

The young "teachers" are all high school students who work part time through the City of Boston's youth employment program, Project YES.

I can remember how even the partisan Red Sox fans cheered for Score as he slammed fast ball after fast ball into the catcher's mitt.

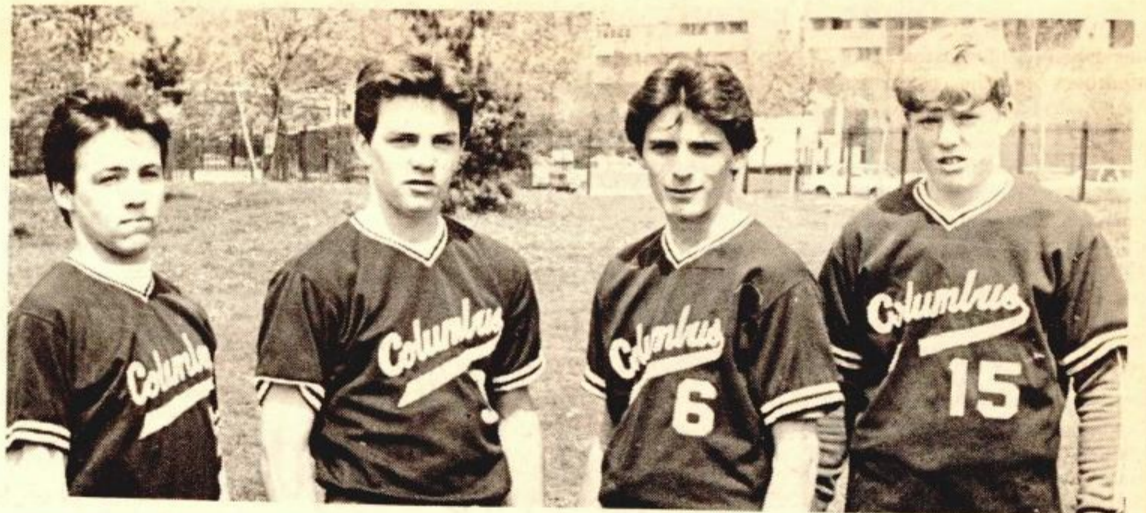
And who can forget the magic years of Dick Radatz when he mowed down enemy batters with his exciting style?

## Mini-White House Conference On Aging

A Mini White House Conference on Aging will be held at Bunker Hill Community College in Charlestown on May 23-24 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The conference is the culmination of Older American forums, in which participants have been studying the achievements of the 1971 White House Conference and comparing the recommendations with existing conditions. The purpose is to update the work of that conference in the light of eight years of experience.

Participants will draw up recommendations for policy and action which will be referred to councils and boards for incorporation in annual plans or presented to government officials for action. Major attention will be given to the issue of employment, income maintenance and housing.

On opening day, following welcoming addresses by Dr. Harold E. Shively, president of Bunker Hill Community College and William M. Craft, dean of the Open College, Frank Ollivierre of the Regional Office of the Administration on Aging will speak on "Looking Ahead to 1981."

The participants will then go to classrooms for group discussions on the major issues and sharing of ideas

In addition to the college, the conference is being co-sponsored by the Area Agency on Aging VI (Boston) and its Advisory Council; the Mayor's Advisory Committee of Boston Commission on Affairs of the Elderly; the Area Agency on Aging IID (Revere, Winthrop, Chelsea); Legal Research and Services for the Elderly of Boston and by members of the Councils on Aging, and the Boards and Ad-

visories of the Home Care Corporations and Area Agencies.

Registration should be made in advance by calling the local office of the Council on Aging or Francis Olrich, coordinator at the college, 241-8600, ext. 288 or 411.

Representatives of Charlestown Youth Policy Council, the Exceptional Childrens' Program and the Kent Community School met on Tuesday morning with officials from the National Parks Service at the Charlestown Navy Yard in a conference lasting for more than two hours.

Jack Millerick, Joe McGonagle and Jerry McCormick presented their views on community use and access of the National Park facility at the Navy Yard. Mr. LaPierre, acting superintendent, presented the views and policies of his agency. The result was that the Exceptional Childrens' Program, Special Olympics Disco will be permitted to use the Officers Club facility Saturday, May 19.

Further accessibility for special events in the yard was discussed in detail. It was agreed that the community should and does have access and each application would be considered on

the merits of its sponsoring organization and the purpose for the function. The National Parks Service Staff explained their application system, explaining that the point system is used in National Parks throughout the country. National Parks Service personnel expressed concern about their image in Charlestown, and this program was discussed in detail. Jack, Joe, and Jerry felt that the meeting was constructive and productive for both parties and expressed hope that the community's relationship with the National Parks Service would from this point improve.

I second the motion by Representative Richie Voke that there is a public demand within Charlestown for the Downtown bus service and all of us must send a message to the MBTA to keep it!

Before the MBTA relocated the Orange Line, people could get into Downtown Boston on one fare but many residents, especially further up in Charlestown find the walk to Community College Station, too much.

The convenience of Downtown Boston buses are a necessity we deserve!

The Transportation Planning Department of the Boston Redevelopment Authority has been passing out survey cards on both Charlestown bus routes and if you haven't filled one out yet contact the BRA for one.

This survey conducted by the BRA can have a major impact on whether or not the downtown buses continue after September 8 when the Federal money runs out. The cards are already stamped and need not be signed.

For several years now the bus stop sign near the Training Field at the corner of Common and Park streets has been missing, and passengers exiting or boarding the Route #93 bus find the buses constantly stopping smack in the middle of the intersection.

Many residents, young and old alike, find this irritating and potentially hazardous.

No bus stop sign has been there for at least two years, maybe more.

REP. Richie Voke's Office is checking out this situation as had Rep Jimmy Collins before him. It seems that the MBTA is a hard egg to crack. Maybe, if our elected representatives had more community voices added to theirs, this chronic problem could be licked! Let's hope so!

### CDBG Meeting Site

The Community Development Block Grant program is one of the greatest steps taken to revitalize the needs of the urban neighborhoods.

I think that the recent special council meeting held at the Harborside Community School in East Boston in reference to

CDBG funds for 3 different neighborhoods was ill-advised.

## Meets With President



BOSTON CITY COUNCILLOR RAYMOND L. FLYNN recently met with President Carter at the White House as part of a day-long briefing for Massachusetts political leaders on current foreign and domestic policy issues. In addition to discussing Carter's urban strategy, the energy crisis and human rights in foreign policy with administration staff advisors during the meeting, Flynn, who is a leader in the pro-life movement, urged the President to convene a Special White House Conference on the Unborn.

## From The Office Of Representative Richard Voke

Today, Representative Richard Voke of the Joint Legislative Committee on Insurance was pleased to announce some further consumer advances in the area of automobile insurance rates. Voke's comments were in reference to House Bill 3119 which has successfully passed the legislature and now awaits the Governor's signature. This landmark legislation prohibits discrimination according to age, sex or marital status in the making of auto rates. Representative Voke hailed this revolutionary legislation by saying that it makes "Massachusetts a pioneer in the area of non-discriminatory rate setting."

While the Bill outlaws age discrimination, its provisions continue to allow those citizens over the age of 65 a 25% reduction on automobile premiums. The 25% was legislated in 1978. In rationalizing the elderly rate reduction, Representative Voke stated that "a high inflation rate hurts those on fixed incomes and pensions the most and hopefully this premium reduction will make life a little easier for the older citizens of the Com-

monwealth."

During his tenure in the House of Representatives Voke has been a forceful leader in balancing the interests of the consumer with respect to automobile rates. On being appointed to the Insurance Committee Voke vowed that he would fight "to achieve fair and equitable rates for the motoring public." The passage of H. 3119 is certainly a step in this direction.
