## Amesbury Man Indicted For Illegal Asbestos Removal And Disposal At Massport Facility

An Amesbury man was indicted Sept. 21 on charges of illegally removing and disposing asbestos at a Massport facility in Charlestown, the Mass. Environmental Strike Force announced.
James Ross of Amesbury was charged with disposing and contracting for the disposal of solid waste (material containing asbestos) at an unapproved facility. He also was charged with two violations of air pollution regulations for removing asbestos without wetting it, and for failing to ensure no release of asbestos from the work area. The alleged crime occurred around February 1993.
"Illegal asbestos removal and disposal creates a serious health risk to neighbors and workers alike," said Attorney General Scott Harshbarger. "It

## harms the business and

 reputation of all legitimate asbestos removal contractors.""Leaving the asbestos where children could get into it is unthinkable," said Environmental Affairs Secretary Trudy Coxe. "What kind of person just dumps asbestos in a building and leaves it there to endanger a neighborhood? This kind of case makes me angry. It also makes me very proud of the investigators from the Department of Environmental Protection."

Ross allegedly contracted with Massport through a fictitious business entity called Industrial Recovery and Resupply to perform salvage work at the former Revere Sugar Refinery facility on Medford Street in Charlestown. Equipment being salvaged allegedly included a convey-
or system covered with asbestos.

Rather than pay for a legal asbestos removal and disposal job, Ross allegedly ordered his workers to do the work themselves. The removal work was allegedly performed without measures required to prevent the asbestos from being released into the air, such as wetting the asbestOS and sealing and properly ventilating the work area.

The asbestos was then allegedly dumped in the basement of an abandoned building at the refinery facility. Twenty-five to 30 garbage bags full of material containing asbestos were discovered by the Strike Force in the basement.

If convicted, the maximum penalty for the alleged solid waste offense is two years in the House of Correction and a
$\$ 25,000$ fine. The maximum penalties for each of the alleged air pollution violations is one year in the House of Correction and a $\$ 25,000$ fine.

The Mass. Environmental Strike Force is an interagency enforcement body overseen by Harshbarger and Coxe. It was created to identify and prosecute high-priority environmental cases in the state. Assistant Attomey General Bennet L. Heart of Harshbarger's Criminal Bureau is prosecuting the case. The administrative investigation was conducted by a number of Department of Environmental Protection inspectors, principally Steve Spencer and John MacAuley. The Mass. Environmental Police conducted the criminal investigation.

Feb. 131995 has been set as a trial date.

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## TAX BRIEFS - AN UPDATE

- It was expected that some expired and soon-to-expire tax breaks would be reinstated as part of health care reform legislation. However, Congress adjourned in October without bringing such legislation to a vote. Therefore, self-employed individuals will no longer be allowed to deduct $25 \%$ of their health insurance premiums. That deduction expired at the end of 1993 . The targeted job credit expires Dec. 31,1994, as does the exclusion from taxable income of up to $\$ 5,250$ of educational assistance provided by employers for workers. There is a possibility that these breaks could be retroactively reinstated as part of legislation in 1995.
- The IRS recently issued proposed regulations defining "clubs" for the new tax provision that disallows a business deduction for club dues. The deduction would be disallowed for dues paid to organizations formed with a principal purpose of providing access to entertainment facilities, such as country clubs, golf and athletic clubs, airline clubs, hotel clubs and clubs operated to provide meals under circumstances not conducive to business discussion. Dues would still be deductible for such organizations as bar and medical associations, business leagues, trade associations, chambers of commerce, boards of trade and real estate boards. Dues paid to civic organizations, such as Kiwanis, Lions and Rotary would also continue to be deductible.
- The IRS raised the interest rate it charges on overdue taxes and pays on overdue refunds, the second increase in as many quarters. For the last quarter of 1994, the IRS will charge $9 \%$ on tax underpayments and pay $8 \%$ on certain refunds.
- A new IRS ruling is good news for businesses that want to operate as S corporations. S corporations may have no more than 35 shareholders. The new ruling allows S corporations to form a partner ship which, in effect, allows the 35 shareholder limit to be circumvented. For example, if 70 indivi duals wanted to operate a business as an S corporation, they could form two separate $S$ corporations and conduct business as a partnership.
