

Charlestown Residents Will Get Another Chance To Voyage On 'Old Ironsides'

Some lucky Charlestown residents will have their own day on board USS Constitution on Wednesday, June 17 when the nearly two-century-old ship makes a special cruise as part of a "Salute To Charlestown" on the 217th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill.
The oldest commissioned ship in the U.S. Navy usually makes one turnaround cruise annually on July 4 It is returned to its berth at Pier 1 facing the opposite direction to allow both sides of the ship to be exposed equally to the Eastern sun and the weather. This turnaround has become so popular that attendees are chosen by lottery for one cruise only. This year, the participants for the "Salute To


Charlestown" cruise will be selected by separate lottery. "This will be the last opportunity for several years for the officers and crew of USS Constitution to say thank you to the residents of Charlestown for all the support and care they have given to the ship over the years that the town has been its homeport," said Cmdr. Richard Amirault, USN commanding officer of the
ship and the 63rd in command since its launching on Oct. 21, 1797.
"This will be Charlestown's special day prior to 'Old Ironsides' going into drydock in the fall for repair and restoration in preparation for her 200th birthday celebration," added Amirault.
According to Amirault, Charlestown residents who are registered voters will be invited to sign a special form and have their names placed in the "Salute To Charlestown" lottery. Sail ors from USS Constitution will act as security for the lottery box and members of the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, Bunker Hill Post No. 26 The American Legion and he Bunker Hill Monument Association will man the registration desk, checking the eligibility of those entering the lottery. To apply, the person must be a Charlestown registered voter.

$\star$ Bunker Hill Monument . . . Ambulan ces, Boston Fire Department Engine Co. 41 and National Park Service Police vehicles positioned at the front steps of the Bunker Hill Monument at noontime on Tuesday May 12 brought more inquiries from resi dents than answers could be found.

However, after calling BFD Public Rela tions Officer Lt. Richard Powers, the Patriot was able to find out that a tourist attempting to climb the Monument steps suffered a heart attack. Firefighters and EMTs had to carry the man down the stairs and into a waiting ambulance for transportation to the hospital The man's condition could not be determined at press time
According to Powers, Engine 41, which is out of Brighton, was covering for Engine Co 50 on Winthrop Street which was undergo ing routine maintenance at the time of the incident.
$\star$ Charlestown Man Shooting Victim . . A 52 -year-old Decatur Street resident was shot in the head as he attempted to get out of his car. The shooting occurred on Tuesday, May 12 at approximately $9: 30$ p.m.

The incident happened outside 74 Decatur St. in the Bunker Hill Housing Development. Boston Police Department sources stated that four gunshots were fired into the vehicle, with at least one of them hitting the victim, James Boyden, in the head.
Boyden was rushed to Mass. General Hospital where, at press time, he was listed in very critical condition in the Intensive Care Unit.

The police report that they have no suspects in the shooting, which is under investigation.

- The Mitigation Committee will meet on Tuesday, May 19 at 7 p.m. to discuss landscaping plans for the former Revere Sugar Refinery site on Medford Street. The meeting will take place in the second-floor cafeteria of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) headquarters at 100 First Ave. in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

MWRA Community Relations Coordinator Carrie Fuchs states that equipment has arrived at the Medford Street site to make soil preparations. This equipment had been ordered previous to the postponement of the May 4 CNC meeting, she said, and would
not be able to be used for quite some time if cancelled. Fuchs stated that no landscape work will begin at the site until after the Mitigation Committee and residents agree on landscape plan.
The meeting will be conducted by Chair man Moe Gillen and Vice Chairman Bil Galvin.

$\star$ Public Safety $=$ Be Alert $\ldots$. The monthly meeting of the Neighborhood Council Publis Safety/Police Community Relations Committee brought out information on crimes that are on the increase in the community and squelched rumors on the number of assaults believed to have happened against women
Community Relations Officer Joe McNulty reported that automobile break-ins are on the increase in Charlestown. Two vehicles parked at the Bunker Hill Mall were broken into last week, he stated, along with other breaks reported elsewhere throughout the community. He advised residents not to leave personal items exposed in their cars. Item such as golf clubs, radios, clothing and rada detectors, if visible from the outside of the vehicle, make an easy target for thieves.
McNulty stated that residents should also make sure that their homes are secured against house breaks, reminding homeowners and apartment dwellers to make sure windows and doors are locked when they are not at home.
After a reported sexual assault on April 19, rumors have run rampant in Charlestown that up to 11 women have been raped during the past year. McNulty said that just two in cidents of sexual assault have been reported to the Boston Police over the past year. One incident, he stated, involved a young boy who was assaulted by a man in a van. This individual was arrested shortly after the incident. The April 19 incident, he reported, is still under investigation.
In addition to these two incidents, McNulty stated that a 14 -year-old girl was approached on Polk Street by a men in a red vehicle who tried to pull her into the car. The young girl was able to get away from the man, and fled to safety. McNulty described the man as a white male, approximately $5^{\prime} 8^{\prime \prime}$ and driving a small red motor vehicle.
McNulty said that this community is per haps the safest in Boston in which a woman can walk or jog at anytime. He added that all persons should be alert to their surroundings at all times, no matter where they are, to better ensure their safety.
Residents in the area of the Eden Stree Park and the Edwards Middle School reported that conditions have improved since the last Public Safety meeting. The presence of Municipal Police cars parked in the schoolyard "pit" has resulted in the noise diminishing tremendously. Residents have complained for months that youngsters were trespassing on private property, causing disturbances and being a general nuisance.
Municipal Police Sgt. Simone Schafano and Sgt. Diego Flores stated that police cars will be dispatched routinely to drive through the area to check out any problems. According to the officers, arrests will be made if youngsters are caught in violation of the newly posted "No Trespassing" signs, or if caught drinking.
Peter Looney, vice chairman of the Neighborhood Council, asked McNulty to have spray cans containing ribbon-like colored streamers banned from being sold at the Bunker Hill Day Parade. He stated that vendors should be stopped from selling these items because they have become a serious nuisance to marchers and have damaged parade vehicles over the past few years. Mc Nulty said that the Boston Fire Department
has sent out notification that these canisters are flammable and should not be sold. He added that he would bring the situation to the attention of Deputy Robert Hayden to be discussed prior to the June 14 parade.
$\star$ Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . The Boston Redevelopment Authority Street Reconstruction Project progresses on Chestnut, Adams and Essex streets and Nearen Row
Ralph Cunningham, resident engineer with Bryant Associates Inc., the engineering firm overseeing the project, states: "The contractor continues to install water mains on Chestnut Street from the lower end of the street to Adams Street. A couple of extra bends had to be added," he said, "to get through the existing utilities in Adams Street. An electric conduit duct bank was found on top of the water main and had to be removed and replaced to allow for the installation of the new water main.
Cunningham said that the work is somewhat tedious because of the existing utilities, but progressing very well.
Nearen Row work continues to progress
toward completion with the installation of the curb and grading work. Residents of Tremont Street inquired as to why no handicapped access ramps were cut into the curbs on Nearen Row. Cunningham informed the Patriot that the cuts will be made facing Tremont Street, not on Nearen Row due to the steep incline of that roadway
The gas services to the new lights on Nearen Row were installed prior to grading the street, and curb strip was installed for house number 2 .

The contractor, John Mahoney Construction Company, Inc., also started work on Essex Street this week, stripping pavement and removing the cobblestones. The drainage was installed at the Rutherford Avenue end of Essex Street, including new connections for the roof drains
Cunningham stated that the no-parking and leaflet distribution program seems to be working quite well. "Only a handful of cars have had to be towed since the beginning of the project," he said.
