

Voke Has Earned Support In Re-Election Bid

Democratic voters in the Second Suffolk District, which includes Charlestown and all but one section of the city of Chelsea, will be called upon next Tuesday, September 18th to cast their ballot in the Democratic Primary for their Representative to the Great and General Court (House of Representatives) of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Coleman Rally Set For Tonight

The following is a press release submitted by the Coleman Campaign Committee.

A final five-day campaign blitz that will bring State Representative candidate Phil Coleman to each precinct in the combined Charlestown-Chelsea legislative district begins tonight, Thursday evening, September 13, with a Campaign Rally and Dance at the Knights of Columbus on Charlestown's West School Street.







Local Chapter Of The Alliance For The Mentally Ill Being Formed

The Alliance for the Mentally Ill (AMI) of Massachusetts, Inc., is a statewide coalition of more than 29 local Alliance for the Mentally III chapters. Until now, there has not been a chapter for Charlestown residents to belong to. However, through the efforts of the Community Mental Health Unit of the Bunker Hill Health Center and the Erich Lindemann Mental Health Center, a chapter is now being formed.

The Alliance is an

organization for the families of the mentally ill who are interested in improving the conditions and treatment available for their seriously troubled family members and relatives. Organizations like AMI have been instrumental locally and statewide in improving the conditions and care of the mentally retarded and of those afflicted with various types of physical problems. However, due to the stigma associated with mental illness there has

not, until now, been any such group for the mentally ill. As a result, when decisions are made at local and statewide levels about how to allocate resources for human services, the mentally ill have often been left with little monies to support the services they need.

In the past few years, groups have finally begun to form across the nation to correct the neglect of the mentally ill. AMI groups exist as local. independent chapters

which function within the context of the statewide AMI coalition, which in turn is a member of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill.

The local Alliances are groups of concerned family members and citizens who meet for the purposes of mutual support and of advocacy for the rights and care of the mentally ill. "Sharing and caring" is the way they describe their efforts to provide compassionate support and understanding for the families of the mentally ill; they want family members to know that they are not alone. They also seek to educate themselves and the public about what mental illness, and in particular, what long term mental illness is. They also want to help the public realize that people with mental illness are often less dangerous than the average person. Finally, they also actively seek to improve housing and hospital conditions for the mentally ill and to better treatment programs. They do this through working with legislators, area boards, and community support systems. Each groups is self-governing and self-directing within the state coalition.

The state Alliance, AMI of Massachusetts, is governed by a 15 member board of directors elected by delegates from the affiliated local chapters

the objectives of the organization as a whole. It is active in state and federal legislative matters and assists local chapters through a newsletter, workshops, consultations, a speaker's bureau, and an annual conference. Some of the problems that the AMI of Massachusetts is addressing at this time include: a) insufficient funding at both state and federal levels for both the care of the mentally ill and research into mental illness; b) ineffective care problem for the mentally ill in Massachusetts when other states are trying innovative programs which could improve conditions and possibly cut care costs in the long-run; c) inadequate, sometimes non-existent, community programs to enable improving patients to live successfully in the community; d) lack of proper medical care for the mentally ill whose physical care often also suffers because they are in poorly funded and staffed programs; and e) below standard hospital care in Massachusetts where many state institutions for the mentally ill are not accredited, leaving staff and patients trying to function in poor conditions and leading to the possible loss of insurance monies that could help improve the

awafe, long term mental illness is a catastrophic disorder whose origins are still poorly understood. It is characterized by disturbances of thinking, feeling, and relating, and afflicts over 55,000 people in Massachusetts and more than 5 million people in the United States. This means that nationwide about 15 million family members live with an affected person. Mental illness is the number one reason for hospital admissions in this country, of which more than one quarter are for people with long term mental illness. The disorder occurs in all classes and ethnic groups in equal proportion and is found all over the world.

The local chapter now being formed is for the family members of the mentally ill residing in Charlestown, Chelsea, Revere, East Boston, Winthrop, the North End, Beacon Hill, and the West End. There will be an organizational dinner and get-together in late September. 

will be ahead of the game. There are ways of talking and listening that we can learn that will help. First: listen patiently to you child,

not thinking about your next response. Withold that quick response, and give the child all the time he/she needs to talk. Second: try repeating back to the child what he/she said, adding how you think he/she feels about what he/she said. Then the way is open for the

parents response.

"I" messages are another technique in communication. Instead of: "Turn down that music, you have it blaring every night!" Try saying "I really have trouble relaxing in the evening when that music is so loud." "I" messages are successful because they do not attack or criticize the child. It gives a child a chance to respond to your feelings. This takes practice, but we can learn how to do them.

Honesty, respect, and acceptance are elements that are necessary for good communication. All parents can check themselves in these area. It is possible to not accept a child's behavior and yet accept the child. There is a big difference between: "You are a liar" and "You lied to me today."

Clarity, timing, trust, consistency, and sense of humor are all ideas important to communication.

In drug conversations, be calm and natural. If you have done your homework, you will probably know more than your kids - except the experience! Listen to your child's viewpoint, correct misinformation, and be firm in requiring certain behavior. Be patient and respect confidential material. Confront the subject together. Don't confront each other.

Next week we will look at what to avoid.

The Charlestown Community School Council will hold its Adult High School Diploma Program annual election on Tuesday, October 2nd from 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 55 Bunker Hill Street. All Charlestown residents, 18 years of age and older, are eligible for election to the Council. Nomination papers are currently available at the Community School Office at the Medford Street Gym. The Community School Council is comprised of neighborhood residents, elected democratically each year to two-year terms. It is responsible for overseeing all Community School Programs operating at the High School and Kent Community Schools. Members are elected for precinct and at-large seats. There are three at-large and seven precinct seats up for election on October 2nd.

Courses are broken down into three different categories: 1) High School Diploma and Equivalency courses, 2) College Credit courses, and 3) interest or hobby. City Roots Alternative High School

City Roots is an alternative high school program that helps students pass the GED tests or gain an external high school diploma. It is geared for 16 to 21 years old who are out of school and are also seeking part-time employment while in the program. The staff also helps students to make decisions about career plans, educational counseling, financial aid, S.A.T. information, apprenticeships program information, etc. It help students prepare for the world of work, find a job, interview for a job, resolve on-the-job conflicts, and advance to higher positions once they have a

If you are between the ages of 16 and 21, a resident of Boston, and have not completed your high school education and are not presently enrolled in a public or private high school, then you may be eligible and appropriate for the City Roots Program. The external diploma program is designed specifically for adults who want a Boston high school diploma. Students work at their own pace in small classes and in individual tutoring sessions to prepare for the three tests and five take home tasks required in the program. The tasks include projects that deal with life such as:

- finding and keeping a job
- · learning about careers
- · knowing health and safety standards
- · using resources in the community
- · understanding government and law

When students have completed all of the tasks at an acceptable level of mastery, they are awarded a Boston high school diploma. There are classes available for the E.D.P. both morning and evening

G.E.D. Preparation Classes and Testing

The G.E.D. is a high school equivalency certificate awarded by the Massachusetts Department of Education. To receive the certificate, a person must pass the five multiple-choice exams: reading, writing, social studies, math, and science. With the help of teachers and tutors, students work with materials that are similiar to the actual G.E.D. tests. The G.E.D. testing is held at the Community School every other month. The next series of G.E.D. tests in Charlestown will be held on November 6, 7, and 8. There are G.E.D. preparation classes available in the mornings and evenings during the week.

College Credit Courses

The following courses are taught be community school staff on-site with college credit awarded by Bunker Hill Community College. Enclosed is a brief description and schedule for the college credit courses:
