The oldest existing list on Maltese butterflies is a manuscript one drawn up by Dr. F.X. Schembri, Rector of the University between 1854-1880. In this list are enumerated the insect species contained in the collection of Father Ignazio Libassi. which by 1889 was already "an empty box." Father .. Libassi was in Malta between 1865 and 1873. The following 12 species are listed: Papilio machaon L., Aporia crataegi L., Pieris brassicae L., Artogeia napi L., Colias hyale L., Gonepteryx rhamni L., Vanessa cardui L., Fabriciana adippe D. & S., Maniola jurtina L., Pyronia bathseba F., and Lasiommata megera L.

HISTORY OF MALTESE BUTTERFLY COLLECTING

Alfred Caruana-Gatto when referring to this list in 1891 writes that the collection of Libassi contained "several other examples which are foreign to the Island", and is of the opinion that A. napi. A. crataegi, C. hyale, F adippe and Pyronia bathseba were not taken in Malta.

RARE WORK

In the now very rare work 'Repertorio di Storia Naturale', published in 1889, Profs. Gulia deleted from the above list the following species: A. napi, C. lesbia and P. argus and recorded instead and for the first time Coenonympha pamphilus L. (Note: in Seitz. Macrolepidoptera of the World Vol. 1 the f. crucivora is attributed to A. napi and not to P. brassicae.)

Mr. Fraser in a short note in "Nature" of January 2, 1890, records Aglais urticae L., and Nymphalis polychloros L., as flying about in the garden of his hotel in Sliema. He must have mistaken these two Nymphalids for worn examples of the common V. cardui or V. atalanta.

Alfred Caruana-Gatto in Notes on the Lepidoptera of Malta', published in the Daily Malta hronicle of November 9, 1891 p. 85-88, lists 11 species of which Pararge aegeria L., Lampides boeticus L., and Polyommatus icarus Rott., are all recorded for the first time. Of G. rhamni which is today extinct from Malta, if it ever was with us and not the famale of cleopatra. Caruana-Gatto says that it was then already very rare and that he had seen only one example in the coliection of Mr. R. Briffa taken in Spring from Hastings gardens in Valetta.

> The same Col. H. Harford took one example of the widely distributed A. aurota from San Anton Gardens on July 19, 1910. This example, as Caruana-Gatto points out, could not but have originated as a caterpillar or pupa on some imported exotic plant.

Harford again, during the same period, recorded from Sliema another species new to our list, namely Melitaea, probably M. didyma Esp. ssp. meridionalis Stgr. This specimen was only noted in flight and could have wind." Gatto, S. pirithous L., which has 13 species of butterflies all of now become fairly well established with us, was collected for the first time by Harford from St. Julian's on October 29, 1910. The fact that it does not appear in the list of P. Borg of 1932 indicates that it remained a rare butterfly for many years after. In fact it was not recorded again before 1944 by Anthony Valletta.

The last addition in this work is the large Danaid, Danaus chrysippus L., var. alcippus Cr. The first example was collected by H. Harford on June 4, 1923 from Hastings gardens in Valetta during a strong SE wind. Two other examples of this African butterfly were taken by Mr. Anthony Valletta on April 10, 1952, from Wied is-Sewda, Attard: while two others were seen close to Villa Gomerino in the limits of

on April 6.
In The Lepidoptera of the Maltese Islands', published in 1932, Paul Borg enumerates 28 species of butterflies of which Leptidea sinapis L., Clossiana dia L., Melitaea cinxia L., Polygonia c-album L., Pryonia tithonus L., and Lysandra bellargus Rott., all figure for Malta for the first time. This list is not held by local lepidopterists as a reliable reference, in fact none of the above species were ever met with again.

Profs. John Borg, brother of Paul, in his 'Our Insect Visitors', published in 1939 in Archivum Melitense Vo.X no.4, records that he took a specimen of Callophrys rubi L., from Wied Encita (no date is given).
