## Dear Mayor Raymond Flynn,

The purpose of this letter is to tell you about my recently murdered cousin, John "Jay" King, the injustice of his younger brother Chris' unsolved murder five years ago, and his mother's valiant yet seemingly futile efforts to bring the murderers of her two very much loved and missed sons to justice.
Jay was a delightful 27 -year-old human being who loved and cared about everyone. He was a people person, the kind of guy you liked immediately when you met him, and I loved him deeply. He had worked summers at Camp Joy with Downs Syndrome children, one of whom was his younger brother Matthew. At family functions and outings he was always entertaining and funny, and very interested in what everyone had been doing since he'd last seen them.
Jay was also a very stabilizing force for his mother after Chris' murder and the unexpected death of his father Champie 10 months ago. His efforts drew his family together once again after his dad's death and he became a pillar for my Aunt Sandy to lean on. Needless to say, Sandy's not doing too well at this point. She had seemingly gotten beyond the unsolved murder of her younger son Chris five years ago, until this third tragedy struck, rekindling her unresolved grief and rage.
I don't know if you have children of your own, but stop for a moment and try to imagine the horror of having them shot dead in cold blood. Not one, but two of her sons died at the hands of thus far unapprehended murderers. It gives one a sense of unease, at best, to know that these murderers are still walking the streets of Charlestown, sitting in its restaurants and pubs and enjoying the fruits of life, while my cousins and their family grieve.
Although no one was ever arrested and charged with Chris' murder, Jay knew the truth about who killed his brother and had confrontations with them. He told his mom just two months before he died that his own life had been threatened. He also told her who issued the threat.
My feeling in a situation such as this is that my lost loved ones will never be forgotten and will always be missed,

## An Open Letter From T.A.M.s (Townies Against Murder)

Well, you've done it again. You've taken the life of another young man from Charlestown. This is not just a letter on behalf of Jay King, this is a letter for all the young men and women (unfortunately, too many to mention) who have been murdered in Charlestown. Should I say killed? I don't think so, for there was premeditation. They were murdered because they were an inconvenience in your big scheme of things and because they had the nerve to stand up and remind you what you really are - murderers and lowlife. Ive no doubt that there is no remorse on your part, no guilt; no tears or condolences for the family and friends (of whom there are many) who you have left bereaved and heartbroken. How could there be? You would have to have a heart for that! You (you know who you are) place no value on human life.

Tell me "Hard Guys," what value do you place on your own lives? What about your families' lives? And to the families of these supposed "Hard Guys," you must be so proud to have raised such compassionate human beings. (Please take that comment as snide as it was meant to be.)

Perhaps if boys learned how to be men before they started carrying weapons, there wouldn't be so much tragedy in such a small town. Being a man doesn't mean carrying out vendettas. Being a man takes more courage and honor than that. You have no courage, it's pretty easy to be brave with a gun in your hand. You'll never be anything more than cowards!

Tell me "Hard Guys," do you think you have friends? You might think so, but you don't. You don't have real friends. You have other lowlife that condone what you do, other lowlife who are wannabe "Hard Guys.
I was born and raised in Charlestown, from the projects on up. I was never ashamed to call myself a Townie. True Townies are always there to support each other in good times and in bad. What I am ashamed to admit is that you "Hard Guys" are Townies! Apparently when they were giving lessons on how to be a True Townie, you all missed the class My condolences to the families and good friends of all the young men and women who have been murdered. Sadly, they will never be anything but young because their lives y, they will were cut short, cut short by someone who jorted haze.
But you know, someday you'll bury one of your own famiy or friends. Or maybe someday you'll think about your own mortality and realize that eventually you'll answer to God. That might be "Hard," huh "Guys?"
