

**NEA** Trustees Give Nod To Proceed On Dry Dock 5

The cold winter winds of Dec. 18 were in sharp contrast to the late summer day in 1988 when the tentative plans for a new world-class aquarium within the Charlestown Navy Yard were presented to a handful of community residents by New England Aquarium and city representatives at the Parkman House.


Since that original proposal for a Dry Dock 2 siting was made public, community residents have recorded hundreds of hours of meeting time, some vicious public and private attacks on individuals supportive of the project, and a threatened law suit that made continued planning for Dry Dock 2 an impossibility.

Some residents had suggested consideration of Dry Dock 5 in the Yard's End portion of the Navy Yard as a preferable site. This would leave historic Dry Dock 2 intact and preserve the adjacent Shipyard Park for public use. Aquarium planners determined that Dry Dock 5 alone would not provide adequate space to build the facility and include necessary education and research components.


In August of this year, Boston Redevelopment Authority officials announced that negotiations with The



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## New England Aquarium Trustees Vote To Begin Planning For World-Class Aquarium At Dry Dock 5

(continued from page one) Raymond Group were underway to include Parcel 5 with the Dry Dock 5 site to allow space for contruction of an aquarium within the dry dock along with four and a half acres on Pier 11.

Since the late summer, aquarium planners have been working to develop a plan that would include the major exhibits originally proposed for Dry Dock 2. In the last 90 days aquarium planners arrived at preliminary plans and a model for a facility at Dry Dock 5/ Parcel 5 that was presented to the aquarium's trustees this past Monday.

The aquarium board of trustees voted unanimously to pursue the relocation of a new aquarium and aquatic research center at Dry Dock 5/Parcel 5. In making the announcement, Dean W. Freed, president of the board stated, "The trustees are fully confident that a world-class facility can be built at this location which will be superior to our proposed plan for Dry Dock 2. This action will enable us to go forward with the development process."

Just prior to the public announcement of the board vote, Aquarium Project Manager William Whitney outlined the Dry Dock 5/ Parcel 5 proposal for members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council. Council chairman Dennis McLaughlin noted that this was an informational meeting for neighborhood representatives conducted as a courtesy to the council before the aquarium released the board's vote to the press. He stressed that members were there to listen and ask questions, but no action by the council

would be taken until the proposal was presented to Charlestown, along with a traffic and parking management plan and a community benefits package.

In describing the preliminary architectural plans, Whitney said the structure was designed to be industrial in character, appearing as though it fit into the Navy Yard. It would feature gabled roofs on the building along First Avenue, with a glazed roof over the exhibit area, providing natural sunlight for the animals and their visitors on the building's second floor. A suspension system would be developed for this glazed roof to avoid numerous columns, thus there would be only eight support columns placed 90 feet apart and 150 feet across.

The 280,000-square-foot facility would encompass two levels of aquatic exhibits. Visitors would enter

through a concourse that maintains the original shape of the dry dock and includes an exhibit dedicated to the Navy Yard workers. They begin their travels through a diversity of marine habitats and life, ranging from the deep ocean to the coastline and the arctic

to the tropics. As visitors proceed into the aquarium, they would find a seal pool and an opportunity to see ocean waves from a fish-eye view. There would be a bird exhibit and conveniently located workshop areas and

classrooms. Passing the sal-

mon exhibit, the visitor would enter an amphitheater with an unobstructed view of a giant ocean tank,

with such fish as tuna and mola mola, through an 80foot window. This would be (continued on page 26)

## 'Townie Santa' Volunteers Deliver Christmas Packages To Elderly, Needy Shut-Ins

Once again this year, the day for the delivery of Christmas packages to some 120 elderly, needy Charlestown shutins had escaped a major winter onslaught, and volunteers gathered to be Townie Santas for a day.

Last minute packing of fruit, juice, milk and bread was undertaken by a crew at the Mary Colbert Apartments while packages were arranged for easy pick up. A last-minute check of the names and addresses of the recipients was made, delivery teams were organized and Townie Santa was ready to go.

Meanwhile, at the headquarters of Scalli Caterers on Sackville Street, family and friends gathered to assist Bob and Carol Scalli in the preparation and packaging of nearly 150 hot turkey dinners that would be delivered along with the Christmas packages. Mayor Ray-

mond Flynn joined the volunteers at the Scalli home. donned a red and white Santa hat and apron and, rolling up his sleeves, joining the assembly line to package the dinners.

Teamsters Local 25 provided its van, and retiree Roy Herrick drove. The crew loaded the van and began delivery to recipients in the Bunker Hill Housing Development.

Volunteers began delivery at 11 a.m. People from all walks of life, ranging in age from 7 to their 70s. were all there to help in any way they could. Many businesses and organizations were represented, as well as individuals and families who just wanted to help.

The volunteers were faced with the awesome task of delivering two boxes containing food items, toiletries and gifts, along with two plastic shopping bags and a turkey dinner.

As with any task, willing hands make the project easier and Sunday was no exception. The volunteers

included representatives from the Teen Connection, the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, a team from the USS Constitution, led by Commanding Officer David Cashman, as well as a team from the National Park Services, led by Bill Foley. Rep. Richard Voke was on hand, leading a team in deliveries, as were Boston City Councillors Michael McCormack and Robert Travaglini. Travaglini also brought his wife Kelly to work on this year's delivery.

It was not an easy task, but as the volunteers returned to the Mary Colbert Apartments to enjoy a sandwich and a cup of coffee, each and every one of them expressed delight in being able to take part in this holiday program.

Thanks from the recipients has been arriving at the Patriot office and, in turn, is being forwarded to the Townie Santa committee. Several recipients stated that their cupboards were bare, and this delivery of

food and toiletries would tide them over during this cold winter. This program would not

year. The Townie Santa committee extends its thanks to all who participated in any way, and wishes all a Happy Holiday!







things never change, you know. Merry Christmas!"


Daniel and Grandma walked home, past humble and dignified buildings, down streets from other generations. Old and new Christmas seasons sparkled in life and love and hope.

I remember the dish. It was yellow, it was purchased at the Five and Ten on Main Street near Thompson Square, and it cost 20°. I remember it because it was the first Christmas gift I ever bought for my parents with my own money. The fact that it matched nothing in my mother's cupboard meant not a thing to me, but because I don't really remember it being there very long, it must have meant something to Ma. The dish was part of a Christmas more than 40 years ago, and I am sure that neither Ma nor Dad remember it, but I know of one gift they most certainly do remember.

And how about these favorites from Christmases of your childhood? Four crows sitting on a fence just waiting to be struck by a rubber suction-tipped missile fired from a spring-operated dart pistol.

Lincoln Logs. If one was careful, one could accumulate enough logs from one Christmas to the next to build a small village of rural cabins.

Didn't everybody have an erector set, tinker toys, a Monopoly game, and a chemistry set?

If one was lucky enough to receive a pair of roller skates, those that were clamped to the shoes and tightened with a skate key, he would immediately begin hoping for warm weather.


Think about this, though. After a certain age, didn't you seem to begin to more readily remember Christmases of other years by recalling what you gave rather than what you received?





comfortable with this to allow his operation to stop. However, if we feel he is falling way behind in the contract schedule, there will be no extensions granted. When the final date comes, he will pay \$10,000 for each day the project is overdue."

McDermott stated that CANA officials should have notified the community of the work interruption, a point Ken Stone, co-chairperson of the North Area Task Force, agrees with. Stone was not aware of Perini's decision, and his attempts to obtain a reasonable explanation were unsuccessful.

CANA coordinator Ed Barr stated: "This is no big deal. Most contractors do it. It happens every year, and it won't interfere with the work schedule. There are two holidays during that period, plus half-days on the day before each holiday that would be lost anyway."

Community liaison for the CANA project David Flanagan stated that Park Street will be reopened for

"Park Street will officially reopen for traffic on Dec. 21.," Flanagan said. "No parking will be allowed on one side of the street to allow for two lanes of traffic entering from City Square onto Warren Street. The community wonders why there was no notification of work being stopped and what will happen when winter storms hit in February and March.

As one area resident put it: "We are forced to endure the traffic headaches and inconveniences with patience and understanding. The project will take enough time before we see any relief. Why should we have to suffer longer than we were told? There will be many winters with many winter storms that will, I'm sure, give the contractor unwanted delays."

## New England Aquarium Trustees Vote To Begin Planning For World-Class Aquarium At Dry Dock 5

(continued from page 3) one of the two exhibits within the 528-foot dry dock.

A technology center is planned between the ocean tank and the whale walk, allowing visitors a hands-on experience with high-technology marine equipment, such as a Rover that was used in obtaining artifacts from the **Titanic**.

A 20-foot wide concourse would bring the visitors into the walk with the whales — what Whitney calls a "show-stopper exhibit." The aquarium visitor would traverse the 100- by 200-foot exhibit on an acrylic and concrete walkway, with whales and dolphins swimming above, below and beside them.

High speed elevators would bring the visitors to the second level overlooking the whale and dolphin exhibit. There would be expansive views of this level from balconies as well as several seating areas for programs and viewing. Diving birds, seals and breaking waves would enhance the marine atmosphere. Also included would be an area so that visitors might observe the care of animals that have been saved by the aquarium.


A cafeteria on the second level is planned, as is a restaurant on the harbor side of the facility. Administrative offices would also be included on the second level, along with a book store and gift shop.

Visitors would complete their visit to the facility by descending a circular walkway around a coral reef, similar to the one that has been the centerpiece for the aquarium's Central Wharf facility for the past 20 years.

The exterior of the facility will feature windows at various locations and levels to allow the public to ob-


serve some of the aquarium's displays from the piers. Whitney added that it will be necessary to completely rebuild Pier 10. A pocket park is planned for the harbor side of the structure, the integrity of the harbor walk along the piers will be maintained and there will be sitting areas and opportunities for bullmarket carts to be set up in warm weather. Whitney stated that it is planned that tour boats will be able to dock at the pier, and offered the possibility that marine research vessels could tie

up at that deep-water pier. Both Whitney and the aquarium's executive director John Prescott have expressed great enthusiasm with this new aquarium plan. Prescott noted that they would be doing more in less space, focusing on education. He said that the visitor will be afforded more choices in the new plan.

Aquarium officials are budgeting the construction of the facility at \$150 million. However, Whitney explained that some \$14 to \$15 million will have to be allocated for foundation work and to reconstruct the dry dock. Construction is tentatively set to begin in 1991, with completion in 1995.

Mayor Raymond Flynn joined Freed, vice president George Lovejoy, BRA director Stephen Coyle, Mc-Laughlin and Prescott on the aquarium's ship **Discov**ery on Monday following the board's vote.

The mayor opened his remarks by noting that "America's most historic neighborhood, and that's what Charlestown is, will (continued on page 27)



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

(continued from page 26) have America's finest aquarium." He went on to say that it will be good for Charlestown, the city and the state. He stressed the importance of community process in bringing the project to fruition. Flynn added that with the focus on education today, "what better chance do we have to teach the young people of today" than through the development of such a facility. He noted that concerns were raised by the commu-

nity on the aquarium coming into Charlestown, adding "when those concerns are addressed we will have a better project.'

Lovejoy stated that it has been found that the project is feasible and affordable and the aquarium can have an improved facility at Dry Dock 5. He said that it has expansion capabilities within the planned facility, giving more flexibility to future programming. He expressed gratitude to the Charlestown community,

noting that "it is never easy to have someone come into your backyard." Lovejoy stated that the next step will be to finalize arrangements with the city for purchase of site and plan for the disposition of the Central Wharf site.

Coyle spoke of the 15 months of meetings on this project. He stated that now that the aquarium trustees have decided to go forward with Dry Dock 5, the BRA wants to work with the neighborhood council and

Coyle told the gathering that it was the city's commitment to the community and the aquarium to get the facility built, a facility that would generate \$100 million a year into the city's economy. He said that the trustees' vote indicates that the project is economically feasible; the neighborhood council and community residents have identified areas of concern; and the responsibility is on the city, the community and the aquarium trustees to take up the challenge and make the aquarium happen in Charlestown. McLaughlin stated that


the council hasn't had an opportunity to discuss this new proposal, adding that the council has its job cut out for them regarding traffic and parking. He said that the council has asked the BRA for a document on

the master plan including all developments relative to the Navy Yard for the members to review. McLaughlin did state that in general conversations, residents felt that this was a better proposal than the one for Dry Dock 2 and that some of the issues had been addressed, noting in particular Shipyard Park.

Prescott briefly outlined the plans for the facility using sketches and a model.

He said that the exhibits will be exciting and it will be a great opportunity to teach about the sea and that is what the aquarium is all about - education and research.

At the end of what was a busy and tension-filled day, Prescott remarked, "There were struggles to get here but I feel that the whole process has led us all to a better facility."

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
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## To Be Featured On 'Moments In Charlestown'


