ALUMNI TEAM UP TO EXTEND CLASSROOM TRADITIONS INTO BOOK



UST ALUMNUS BECOMES NEW CHIEF PROSECUTOR

John Bradley '81 took the oath of office as the criminal chief prosecutor in the Office of the Attorney General in July 2019.

Bradley's territory is the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands in Saipan, an unincorporated territory of the United States in the Northwest Pacific Ocean, "where America starts its day," he said.

"I previously worked as the attorney general for the Republic of Palau after retiring from serving as the elected district attorney in Williamson County, Texas," Bradley said. "I'm specializing in island-based jobs now."

Bradley said his education at UST enhanced his career. He studied English, which gave him a lifelong love of the written word and provided him with the skills to read and write in the legal field without losing his humanity. He also met a biology major, Leslie Brahney, who became his wife and partner in travels.

"Her similar Catholic education and background provided a solid foundation for raising three kids and having a 38-year marriage that is still surprising me," he said.

The many international students at UST also educated him to a world outside Texas.

"It prepared me for the adaptation and tolerance needed for work on isolated Pacific islands," he said.
