The annual Bunker Hill Day Doll Carriage Parade will be held on Saturday, June 17 at 9:30 a.m. in the Training Field. The deadline for registering children for participation is Monday, June 12. The commemoration of the 220 th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be held on Saturday, June 17. An Ecumenical Service at St. Francis de

Sales Church, atop Bunker Hill, will begin at 10 a.m. A procession will then form on Bunker Hill Street and march to the Monument grounds for the patriotic exercises with Charlestown native Col. James P. O'Donnell, USMC as the Monument Orator.
The day's activities will continue with the 172nd annual meeting of the Bunker Hill Monument Association at 1 p.m. at Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion Hall at 23 Adams St

The Uptown String Band from Philadelphia will present a concert on Saturday, June 17 at 5 p.m. at the Bunker Hill Monument. This is always a toe-tapping fun event for all ages. Residents are asked to remove their cars from Monument Square between Monument Court and Pleasant Street by 4 p.m.

Modica To Kick-Off Re-Election Bid June 11

Boston City Councillor Diane J. Modica will kick off her re-election campaign for the office of District One Boston City Councillor on Sunday, June 11 with announcement ceremonies in each ward of the district.

Plans call for the first announcement ceremony to be held at noon at LoPresti Park in East Boston, followed by a 1 p.m. ceremony at North Square in the North End, and concluding with an announcement from the steps of the

Bunker Hill Monument in Charlestown at 4 p.m. The public is cordially invited to attend.
"My 1993 campaign was about empowering the people of this district," stated Modica. "With their help, I am very pleased to see the beginning of several positive initiatives underway in the district," continued Modica.

Modica cited her support for the re-establishment of the East Boston Ferry, the award of the Main Street Revitalization

Program to East Boston, the re-opening of a police sub-station in Charlestown, increased police presence in the North End and replacement parking for Fulton Street during the Third Harbor TunnelCentral Artery construction, as important beginnings for the district.

Modica, a first-term Democrat, was elected to the Boston City Council in November 1993 running a strong platform of public safety, economic development and transportation.

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Voke Moves To Assure Charlestown Crime Fighting Funds

Vowing to continue his crusade to give local law enforcement professionals the resources they need to fight crime in Boston, Rep. Richard Voke has succeeded in getting another round of community policing grants approved in the House's annual spending plan. Should Voke's plan make it through to final adoption, Boston would be again guaranteed to receive $\$ 1,921,885.50$ to aid the local police department in putting a more neigh-borhood-oriented touch on their public safety efforts.
"Throughout the country, community policing has proven to be an effective tool in the war on crime. Getting law enforcers onto the streets and into
our neighborhoods not only serves to beef-up our public safety presence, it also helps to empower residents, encouraging them to work together with their police to provide a tagteam which can wrestle criminals into submission," stressed Voke

Given that Voke's budget also provides increases in general local aid, educational aid and water and sewer rate relief, news that community policing would again be supported was welcomed by public safety advocates and municipal officials. While Voke says his top priority remains the returning of as much state support for local government as possible, being able to guaran-
tee that more police officers remain on the street is an accomplishment of which he feels there can be no greater.
"Far too many people in our society are prisoners in their own homes, afraid to go out of their houses or afraid of what may be coming into their houses. Certainly a basic tenet of govemment is to provide for the health, well-being and safety of each and every resident. Although historically reserved for municipal responsibility, I could not be more pleased to seek to guarantee in another tight budget year that Boston will automatically receive additional state support to come to the aid of our law abiding

## Navy Guided Missile Frigate Makes Port Visit To Charlestown

The guided missile frigate USS Samuel Eliot Morison (FFG 13) will visit Charlestown, June 16-20. Samuel Eliot Morison is visiting Boston in support of the 220th Anniversary of the Battle of

Bunker Hill (June 17, 1775). The ship will be berthed at Pier 1 in the National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The public is invited to
tour the ship as guests of the commanding officer between June 16-18 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Oliver Hazard Perry Class ship is 445 feet long, 45 feet wide and can
reach speeds in excess of 28 knots. Samuel Eliot Morison carries a crew of more than 170 officers and enlisted members. Cmdr Tom Daniel Jr, is the commanding officer.
Samuel Eliot Morison is designed to provide protection for military and merchant shipping, amphibious task forces and underway replenishment groups. To accomplish its mission, the ship is equipped with digital computers that provide rapid evaluation of potential threats detected by radar, sonar and other shipboard sensors. Samuel Eliot Morison's weapons include both sur-
face-to-air and surface-tosurface missiles, a 76 mm rapid-fire gun and antisubmarine torpedoes.

The ship is named in honor of Rear Admiral Samuel Eliot Morison, one of the nation's most distinguished naval historians. Born in Boston and a faculty member of Harvard University for more than half a century, Morison was first and always a sailor.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had a lifelong taste for naval history, accepted Morison's proposal to be the Navy's historian during World War II, based on actual participa-
tion.
In May of 1942, the professor was commissioned a lieutenant commander of the Naval Reserve and given a set of orders permitting him to move about the world at will. The result of his three-year tour of duty in the Atlantic, Mediterranean and Pacific theaters of war was the celebrated "The History of the United States Naval Operations in World War II" (15 volumes).

As a naval historian on active duty during the war, Morison earned seven engagement stars and the Legion of Merit.

## Agnes Speaks At

## U-Mass/Boston Awards Banquet

On June 14, Peter W. Agnes, First Justice of the Charlestown District Court and Chairman of the Mass. Trial Courts Standing Committee on Dispute Resolution, was the guest speaker at the annual awards banquet and graduation of the Graduate Program in Dispute Resolution at U-Mass/Boston.

Agnes earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy from Boston University School of Liberal Arts and continued his education at Suffolk University Law School, graduating with a Juris Doctorate degree.

During 1982, as chairman of the Mass. Bar Association's Criminal Justice Section, Agnes drafted and was instrumental in the Supreme Court's adoption of a rule change to prevent prosecutors from trying to get information without court approval from lawyers about clients who were targets of criminal investigations.

In 1986, Agnes was appointed by Gov. Michael S. Dukakis as Assistant Secretary to Public Safety and helped establish and
manage the Statewide An-ti-Crime Council. Agnes also worked closely with prosecutors and police in implementing the 1986 drunk driving law which established the first statewide breath-testing program using infrared technology. Three years later, he was appointed as Chief of Operations in the governor's office.
In 1991, he was appointed the First Justice of the Charlestown District Court and in 1993 was appointed by the Supreme Judicial Court to chair the Standing Committee on Alternative Dispute Resolution which is developing a plan to establish dispute resolution alternatives throughout the trial court.
Agnes' recent publications include, "Accreditation and the Unfinished Business of Court Reform," (1994) and "Alternative Dispute Resolution: Developing the Rules of Engagement," (1993).
Agnes was presented with the Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Field of Dispute Resolution by the program director, Prof. David Matz.

by Tess Francesco Adult Librarian Have you ever wondered where some of the "stuff" in your attic comes from? The staff at the Charlestown Branch Library does.

The library has a cannonball inscribed: "Shell from the Rebel gunboat Alabama which lodged in the Kearsarge's side without exploding in the memorial engagement off Cherbourg on 19th June 1864. Presented by James R. Wheeler, of the City. Acting Master of U.S. Gunboat Kearsarge to the City of Charlestown November 21, 1864."

A mystery regarding the background of this donation has been solved. At the same time, a wonderful bit of knowledge about Charlestown history has been added to the library's files.

In February, Harold Wheeler, a descendent of James R. Wheeler, called the library asking if the cannonball was still there and if he could make a visit to the library to see it. He offered to bring material about James R. Wheeler and his involvement in the battle between the Alabama and USS Kearsarge with him. On May 18, Harold Wheeler, great-grandson of James R. Wheeler, came in to the library to see the cannonball. Pictures were taken and the library staff got a chance to hear the story.

James Ruthven Wheeler and his wife Sarah Charlotte lived in Charlestown with their two young sons, Albert and William, from 1860 to 1866 , according to Charlestown City Directories. Before

his visit, Wheeler didn't have this information and didn't know why Charlestown was selected as the donation site.

James spent most of this time at sea as an Acting Master for the U.S. Navy. According to family records, Albert and William attended schools here.

James Wheeler was a captain in the Merchant Service and volunteered his services to the U.S. Navy in April 1861. In October 1861, he was appointed Acting Master, and joined the Kearsarge on Dec. 20, 1861. The ship was commissioned in January 1862. She spent most of her time chasing down Confederate raiding ships. In 1864, the notorious Confederate raider, Alabama, was in Cherbourg, France, its crew hoping to dock for major repairs. This request was denied by an uneasy French government, and Alabama was forced out into the English Channel to meet her fate with only minor repairs.

James Wheeler had been ordered by Captain John A. Winslow to go to Cherbourg to spy on the Alabama and inform Winslow when Alabama was ready to leave port. Meanwhile, Winslow prepared the Kearsarge to leave her port in Flushing, Netherlands to engage the Alabama. According to National Archive records: "Acting Master Wheeler was back on board, and officer of the day, and signed the Log after the battle between the Kearsarge and the Alabama on Sunday, June 19, 1864."

Alabama had captured so much bounty in her two

years at sea, 1862-1864, that she had effectively raised marine insurance rates for the Union side, according to William M . Fowler Jr. in his book, 'Under Two Flags.' With a weakened ship, Alabama's captain, Raphael Semmes, and his men fought courageously, but, according to Fowler, many shots missed their mark. "Those that did hit sometimes failed to explode, including one that actually dug itself into Kearsarge's stem post and then failed to detonate." The Kearsarge won the battle, sinking the Alabama with a shot which hit the engine room. The Alabama sank with 26 men listed as dead.

James Wheeler continued to serve in the U.S. Navy until December 1866, when he was given a medical discharge. In 1869 he was appointed to the post of Consul to Kingston, Jamaica. He died in April 1870 in Kingston, and his remains are buried there.

The battle between the USS Kearsarge and the Alabama took place on a June day, 89 years after the Battle of Bunker Hill. One-hundred and thirtyone years after the naval battle, it is gratifying to have the mystery solved and to have added information to the Wheeler family history.

Note: As the story of the unfired cannonball and its lodging in the side of the USS Kearsarge 131 years ago on June 19th, the fourth ship named after the Kearsarge Mountain in Merrimack County, N.H. made headlines.

It was the USS Kearsarge (LHD 3), christened on May 16, 1992, a multipurpose amphibious assault ship designed to carry a mix of 30 Marine helicopters and jet attack Harriers, and 800 members of a Marine expeditionary unit which made headlines this past week in the rescue of Capt. Scott O'Grady from the woods of Bosnia.

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## Arrives At The Charlestown Navy Yard

Right on schedule, the Boston and national landmark Tugboat Luna arrived recently at its new home at Pier 3 in the Charlestown Navy Yard, where it will be docked for restoration work.

Under a consent order issued by Suffolk Superior Court, the Luna Preservation Society (LPS) had to remove the vessel from Boston Graving Dock drydock by March 28 or lose ownership of the tugboat to the Metropolitan District Commission.

The Luna was successfully towed out o the dry-

PVC roofing to help reduce water intake. After removal from the drydock, the Luna floated for 24 hours in Jeffries Cove in conformance with Coast Guard float test requirements before being towed down the channel to Pier 3. "We're elated to have ownership of the vessel and see her tied to the pier. Now the work of restoring the tugboat to her past glory can really begin," said Douglas Randall, president of LPS, a non-profit organization formed to save and restore the ves-

The Luna was the nation's first commerciallyowned diesel electric tugboat, and the last remaining of its kind. The flagship of Boston's tugboat fleet, the Luna worked continuously in Boston Harbor through the Depression, World War II, and into the late 60 s, helping to dock such ships as the USS Constitution.
The tugboat will be used as an educational resource to teach Boston's maritime history, and engineering and maritime restoration techniques.


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## Exhibit On The First Battle Of International Importance Fought

 By Americans To Open At Charlestown Navy Yard"Siege at Louisbourg 1745: New England and the Struggle for World Empire" will open Wednesday, June 28 at Boston National Historical Park at the Charlestown Navy Yard, next to USS Constitution. Parks Canada, (Atlantic Region) and the U.S. National Park Service, in cooperation with a consortium of New England historical institutions, are presenting this free exhibit, which will be open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week. After Labor Day, the exhibit will close at 5 p.m..

Two-hundred and fifty years ago, Royal Gov. William Shirley, whose home is now a museum on Shirley Street in Roxbury, or-
ganized an expedition of New Englanders to attack the mightiest French Fort in North America, the Fortress Louisbourg. The New Englanders won the day. While colonists had engaged in successful military operations prior to this, the capture of Louisbourg represents the first time that American arms successfully challenged and significantly affected the affairs of European powers.
Today, the Fortress of Louisbourg National Historical Site is North America's largest historical reconstruction. Located on Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, it faithfully depicts what life was like for the French colonists of 1744.

To commemorate the 250th anniversary, the Parks Services of both Canada and the U.S. are using the occasion to expand the awareness of Boston's visitors and residents about life in colonial times.

The multi-media exhibit will feature an impressive collection of artifacts, photos, portraits, models and much more. Several special events are being planned in the Boston area surrounding the exhibit. On June 18, King's Chapel on Tremont Street is reenacting the service given at the church when victory was declared. Strawberry Bank in Portsmouth, N.H. is planning a "send off" on July 8 and 9 for the period

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costumed soldiers who will take part in a Grand Encampment to be held in Louisbourg, and the Shirley Eustis House, 33 Shirley St. in Roxbury, is conducting a symposia in the fall.
