Giving the command "Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Martin J. O'Brien Sr.

Martin J. O'Brien Sr. was born in Charlestown on May 5, 1925 and attended elementary school in Charlestown. He then went on

* Street Reconstruction Update . . . The Boston Redevelopment Authority Three Streets reconstruction project continues to proceed according to schedule. The work is still concentrated on Union, Tremont and Winthrop streets in an effort to get things in shape for the upcoming parade.

The roof drain connections and the storm drainage improvement work on Union Street is nearing completion. New catch basins have been installed to help alleviate drainage problems. Crews are in the process of setting concrete bases for new gas street lights, which will shortly be followed by installation of gas service piping by the Boston Gas Company

Tremont Street is scheduled for the initial course of paving on Friday. The old pavement surface of the entire roadway has been removed and a new gravel base course has been placed. Crews will begin excavating the existing sidewalks and resetting the granite curbstone next week. Work will be limited to one sidewalk at a time to allow safe passage for pedestrians.

Work is progressing on the new retaining
wall in front of the Harvard Kent School. Masons are currently setting bricks on the faces of the wall prior to placement of a concrete cap. An aluminum pipe railing will then be installed along the top of the wall to complete it.

On Winthrop Street during the past week work crews completed the granite curb and concrete sidewalk installation. Wheelchair access ramps have been installed at the street comers. A brick strip will be inlaid in the concrete to mark the freedom trail and the brick crete to mark the freedom trail and the brick the sidewalk at the Training Field.

In preparation for Sunday's Bunker Hill

Day parade, all construction areas located within and surrounding the parade route have been cleaned and secured. No disruptions to the Bunker Hill Day activities are expected as a result of the construction project.

Weekday parking restrictions remain in effect on Union, Winthrop and Tremont streets. Residents are requested to continue to cooperate and comply with these restrictions so that reconstruction work can be completed as quickly as is practical.

# Birmingham Announces Senate Ways and Means Budget Proposals to Benefit Charlestown 

The Senate Committee on Ways and Means this week takes up a $\$ 16.3$ billion proposal for the next fiscal year that keeps faith with legislative commitments, eschews expanded gambling and gambling advertising and provides a tax credit for low-income working families.
"This budget is particularly relevant to the working families of Charlestown,' stated Senator Thomas F. Birmingham. "It lives up to our commitments," the Charlestown native, who is
also chair of the Ways and Means Committee, said. "The budget plan also promotes values - supporting education, work and family, while opposing state-sponsored advertising aimed at undermining those values," said Birmingham.
"We hold ourselves dutybound to adhere scrupulousy to promises already made through the legislative process," he avowed. The commitments met or surpassed include full funding of the second year of education reform; providing more than
he agreed upon $\$ 40$ million increase in unrestricted local aid; improving upon last year's commitment to MWRA rate relief; funding loans for lead paint removal; and a three percent cost of living adjustment on the first $\$ 9,000$ of pension income for state and municipal employees.

Birmingham noted that the Governor's proposed budget was balanced on "illusory revenue sources. We reject the temptation to balance our budget by counting on long-shot bets paying
off,' he said referring to the Governor's reliance on revenues from state-sponsored casino and riverboat gambling to balance his budget. "An honest, fiscally respon"An honest, fiscally respon-
sible budget is always my top concern in crafting a budget," he added. Birmingham noted that without this $\$ 125$ million in "illusory" revenue, the legislature is able to provide for expansion of far fewer worthy programs.

Birmingham pointed out that the legislature last year acquiesced to the Gover-
or's expansion of the lottery to include Keno games and accepted the Govemor's revenue estimate of $\$ 50 \mathrm{mil}$ lion. "We lived to rue the day," he said, indicating that the Weld administration now admits Keno will fall about $\$ 30$ million short of that figure.
"Perhaps we should not be surprised that the administration is prepared to continue to rely on speculative gambling revenues as a substitute for responsible budgeting," Birmingham suggested. "That's precisely the

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ype of false hope we spend millions of dollars a year to encourage through our lottery advertising expenditures." Birmingham proposes eliminating lottery advertising spending, for a savings of $\$ 5.2$ million. Five million dollars of this savings is retumed to cities and towns in the form of increased local aid. Despite the fiscal constraints imposed by meeting legislative commitments such as the local aid increases, Birmingham noted that the budget expands community policing; provides a significant increase for public higher education; and funds bail reform legislation, which he supports.

Birmingham's spending plan also returns some tax dollars to taxpayers. "We seek to give a break to the working poor, to reinforce the message that work does pay," said Birmingham. The proposal increases non-taxble income from the present level of $\$ 8,000$ to $\$ 9,000$ and creates and new Head-ofHousehold tax status to extend to single parents the tax advantages afforded to ther family heads. The budget plan also includes a correction in the investment tax credit for the acquisition of equipment. "This targeted tax cut should prove to be benefit to the high tech industry - perhaps the sector most important to the economic future of Massachusetts," said Birmingham.

As chair of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, Birmingham is charged with drafting the Senate version of the Commonwealth's budget for fiscal year 1995, which begins July 1, 1994. Following the Committee's action on the bill, it will proceed to the Senate floor for debate. From there is will move to a House and Senate conference committee to iron out differences between the two versions of the budget.

## Ceremony Marks Beginning Of <br> The Bicentennial Of The USS Constitution

The United States Navy celebrated the 200th anniversary of the Naval Armament Act of 1794 recently. The act authorized the construction of the first six ships of the Federal Navy, including the frigate USS Constitution.
The Commanding Officer of USS Constitution, Cmdr. Richard B. Amirault, and Charles F. Adams, chairman, Old Ironsides Bicentennial, hosted the Charlestown Navy Yard event which featured a special ceremony, and a series of displays and demonstrations in Building 24 .
Approximately 500 invited guests enjoyed the Navy Band Newport, one of the 17 official bands of the U.S. Navy, performing a program of patriotic music. An historic color guard and a performance of the National anthem by professional singer Sandy Martin were a part of the aftemoon's festivities.
Amirault introduced dignitaries who gave brief remarks. This was followed by the presentation of a special Constitution memento to Edmund Harth, namesake and direct descendant of the man whose Boston Shipyard built "Old Ironsides" back in the 1790s.

Guests at the event had the unique opportunity to make their names go down in history by signing pieces of copper sheathing. Old Ironsides is currently undergoing a major preservation in the John Quincy Adams Drydock at the Charlestown Navy Yard, the same drydock where she underwent her first drydocking in 1833. In the great tradition established by Paul Revere, who procured the original copper for the ship in the late 1790's, Old lronsides' hull will be sheathed with pieces of corrosion-resistant copper that will cover her below-the-water-line
The purpose of the copper sheathing is threefold. First, it serves as an "anti-fouling" agent to resist wood-damaging manine growth on the hull of the ship. Second, the copper provides protection for the hull's caulking. Third, the sheathing smoothes out and streamlines the underwater hull to allow for more speed through the water.
Each piece of 30-gauge copper to be nailed to the ship's hull will be punched with holes by feeding it through an antique hand-cranked press. Several punched sheets, each measuring $14^{\prime \prime}$ by $48^{\prime \prime}$ were signed by attendees using electric etchers. These signed pieces of sheahing will be among the 3,400 sheets that will affixed to Constitution's hull with well over a half-million nails before she leaves the drydock as she prepares for her 200th birthday
Refreshments, reflecting the taste of the past, were served courtesy of The Warren Tavern, the Union Oyster House, Durgin Park restaurant and Carlson Orchards.

Americans were killed, wounded or captured. This contest put the amateur American militia against the seasoned British troops, and at first it appeared that America could not win. Among those killed on June 17, 1775 was Major-General Joseph Warren, whose part in the battle and American history evoked a special kind of praise ked a special kind of praise
from those he left behind.
from those he left behind.
The colonists began thei preparation with the fortification of Breed's Hill. They built a redoubt, which is a small fort, and an entrenchment around the area spreading from where the Monument now stands to Concord Street. This action defied the orders of the British and their threats of buming Charlestown to the ground.

Warren, who had pushed for the revolution, had arrived at the battlefield on June 17. He had not yet received his commission on that day so he graciously took orders from General Putnam.

Warren told him "Don't think I come to seek a place of safety, but tell me where the onset will be most furious." Putnam pointed to the redoubt saying "That is the enemy's object, and if that can be defended the day is
ours." Warren fought bravely, and was one of the last men to leave the redoubt. When the time came to retreat, he did so, but soon after a ball struck him in the forehead and he fell dead on the battle field. His body was buried on the spot where he died, but it was reburied the following April, after the British evacuated Boston.

Warren was finally laid to rest in his family vault under St. Paul's Church in Boston. At the ceremonies Perez Morton delivered an eulogy to this patriot and martyr who was "widely beloved [and] more highly valued." Morton said "Among the dead was MajorGeneral Joseph Warren; a man whose memory will be endeared to his countrymen, and to the worthy in every part and age of the world, so long as virtue and valor shall be esteemed among mankind."
The passing of Joseph Warren made a lasting impression upon the society and
people he left. At the time of his death, Warren was Grand Master of the Free-Masons for North America. In recognition of his position in the Masons and his bravery on the battlefield, the King Solomon's Lodge of Freemasons of Charlestown erected the first monument on Bunker Hill in honor of their fallen brother.
On December 2, 1794, a monument, of wooden contruction, was placed at the ite of the battle and dedicatthe of the ed. There was a procession of Lodge members, citizens, town officials and clergy. John Soley, Jr., Master of the Lodge, delivered a dedicatory address which was followed by the discharge of nine minute-guns. The procession then returned to the Lodge, located at One Thompson Square, where Past Master Josiah Bartlett delivered an eulogy on Warren.

## f The Construction ıoden Monument

The monument, which cost about $\$ 1000$, was a wooden Tuscan pillar, 18 feet high, placed on a brick pedestal two feet high, with a fence around to protect it. On top of the monument was an urn which read "J.W. aged $35^{\prime \prime}$. On the south side of the pedestal was the inscription :

ERECTED, AD, MDCCXCIV
By King Solomon's
Lodge of Free-Masons, Constituted in
Charlestown, 1783, In memory of
Major-General Joseph Warren,
and his Associates,
who were slain on this memorable spot, June 17, 1775.

The next year, the monument was damaged and the Freemasons decided to raise the height of the pedestal to

six more feet, and a tablet was placed on the pedestal with an additional inscription from Warren's oration at the Old South Church on March 5,1772 on the second anniversary of the Boston Massacre, It read :
"None but they who set a just value upon the blessing of liberty are worthy to enjoy her.

In vain we toiled; in vain we fought; we bled in vain,if you, our offspring, want valor to repel the assaults of her invaders.
Charlestown settled 1628; burnt 1775; rebuilt 1776.

The enclosed land given by Hon. James Russell."
On March 8, 1825, the Lodge voted to present the land to the newly formed Bunker Hill Monument Association and subsequently vandals destroyed the monument. This association had plans to build a "more enduring" tribute to the battle which was called the
"grand opening scene in the drama of the American Revolution."
On June 17, 1825, the Bunker Hill Monument Association, with the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts and King Solomon's Lodge om attendance, laid the comerstone of the present Bunker Hill Monument. This cereHill Monument. This cere-
mony was attended by over 100,000 people, including such notables as General Lafayette and Daniel Webster, president of the Bunker Hill Monument Association who delivered one of his greatest orations during the celebration.
Today, a marble model of the first monument sits in the well room of the new monument directly in front of the entrance. The inscription on the model reads:
'This is an exact model of the first monument erected on Bunker Hill which with the land on which it stood was given A.D. 1825 by King Solomon's Lodge of this town to the Bunker Hill Monument Association that they might erect upon its site a more imposing structure. The Association in fulfillment of the pledge at that time given have allowed within their imperishable within their imperishable
inserted with appropriate ceremonies by King Solomon's Lodge. June 24 A.D. 1845'
The granite Monument that stands today was dedicated in 1843. This simple obelisk atop Bunker Hill, which evolved from a plain wooden pillar, remains a fitting tribute to the men who fought and died that we might enjoy freedom from tyranny.

（continued from page 9） parade in 1901，but is ap－ plied to both old and new tunes．Band members range in age from teens to people in their 70 s．

It takes a minute or two for people to absorb what we are，but once they do，they understand it and enjoy it， and in a minute or two they＇re clapping along，＂says band captain Scott Moyer．
The 1994 repertoire in－ cludes aviation tunes such as＂Off We Go Into The Wild Blue Yonder＂and ＂Blue Skies．＂But the band
also plays the＂Mummers National Anthem，＂a spiri－ tual－inspired tune called ＂Oh，Dem Golden Slip－ pers．＂
The Greater Kensington String Band has traveled extensively，appearing re－ cently in Hibbing，Minn．to honor the town＇s founding and in the annual Christmas parade in Knoxville，Tenn．， last December．The band has a strong following in New England where it has often helped celebrate In－ dependence Day，and in New York City，where it
has participated in the His－ panic celebrations．

The band＇s history in－ cludes appearances at the US Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs，Colo．， various functions in Wash－ ington D．C．，and even a trip to pre－communist Cuba． Philadelphia sponsored the first Mummers＇Parade at the turn of the century， but working class Philadel－ phians gathered for many years prior to that on New Year＇s Eve to mimic public officials，shoot off guns （Mummers are sometimes
called＂Shooters＂）and greet the new year．These tradi－ tions are traced back many centuries to a mix of Euro－ pean folk cultures．

Today，the blue collar imprint of the parade has gi－ ven way to sophisticated costuming，which can cost up to $\$ 70,000$ per club．Pa－ rade rules require that new costumes be presented to the judges each year．
＂That＇s why we are in a constant state of practicing， performing and fund－rais－ ing，＂says Capt．Moyer． ＂We owe it to our fans to
offer great costumes and entertaining presentations．＂ Competition in the par－ ade is fierce，not so much for the prize money（first prize money of $\$ 7,000$ merely dents the costume bill），but for bragging rights within the proud Mummers community．
Greater Kensington is among the cream of the Mummers crop，having fin－ ished in the coveted Top 10 ranking of bands 12 times in the last 13 years．It won the championship in 1979 and 1988 and finished a strong
seventh in 1994.
＂By the time our perfor－ mance is over，everyone will know what a Mummer is，＂says Moyer．＂And we＇ll do our best to make sure they are happy to meet us．＂

In addition to Saturday afternoon＇s concert，the Greater Kensington String Band will strut through the streets of Charlestown dur－ ing the Bunker Hill Day Parade on June 12 ．

## Police Lanterns Return To Charlestown

It has been about 20 years since the police lanterns that once marked the entrance to Division 15, the former police station in City Square, were discarded during renovations to the building. Fortunately, the lanterns are intact today, thanks to the efforts of a carpenter who saved them during the renovations, and a preservationist who bought them and tried to find them a home for the next 20 years.

Nan Fleck recently presented the pair of 30 inch metal and glass lanterns to Rosemary Kverek, president Rosemary Kverek, president
of the Charlestown Preserof the Charlestown Preser-
vation Society. Fleck drove from Florida to Boston for a visit and gave the lanterns a safe return to Charlestown. The two lantems have metal arms and large blue glass globes, with the words Police etched into them. Each one weighs about 15 pounds.

The route these two lanterns took to return home to Charlestown is a story in itself. Fleck described the distance the police lanterns had travelled, "when I was renovating a house in South Natick...I purchased them and never used them. In 1977, I moved to Indiana, to the farmhouse my greatgrandfather built and proceeded to start renovation work, intending to use them in the library." For a number

of reasons, she eventually sold the farm and stored the lantems for another 10 years. Finally, she moved to Florida, and early in 1993, retrieved them from Indiana.. By this time, she decided it was time to retum the to Charlestown. Then Fleck began to try to find a Charlestown preservation group.

Fleck's search ended in St. Louis last October, at the National Trust for Historic

Preservation Conference. More than 2,000 people were at this week long conference. By chance, Fleck sat down next to Carol Bratley, a Charlestown resident and vice president for Endangered Properties of Historic Massachusetts, Inc. Historic Massachusetts, Inc. and struck up a conversation about Boston. She asked whether Bratley knew anyone from Charlestown, because she wanted to return

## GUN BUY-BACK PROGRAM NO QUESTIONS ASKED NO I.D. NECESSARY

Guns may be turned in Monday, June 13 through Friday, June 17 at St. Catherine's Rectory, 49 Vine Street between noon and 7 p.m., as the citywide Gun Buy-Back program comes to Charlestown for the second year. The guns may also be turned in between noon and 7 p.m., Monday through Friday, between now and July 8 at any Boston Police Station.

- Guns must be in working condition, unloaded and in a clear plastic bag inside another container (such as a gym bag, back pack, etc) when transporting the weapon to a drop off location.
- The person who turns the gun in voluntarily and complies with all announced conditions will not be asked to identify himself.
- The Boston Police will issue a receipt for every gun turned in and the receipt will not identify the receipt holdturned
er.
- Every person who voluntarily turns in a gun and complies with announced amnesty program conditions will be granted amnesty from the Boston Police Department and the Suffolk County District Attomey for illegal possession or carrying a gun connected with its surrender.
- The person holding the receipt may present it along with a copy of the police report, without I.D., to any Bank of Boston and receive $\$ 50$ cash or to Tower Records in Boston and receive $\$ 75$ worth of merchandise.

## MAKE SURE YOU ARE FULLY COMPENSATED IF YOUR <br> PROPERTY IS CONDEMNED

Government, whether it be local, state or national, has the right to take property from private owners. And, as long as the property is being taken for a legitimate public purpose (such as a new highway, prison, school or landfill), there's really not much that citizens can do about it.

As a property owner, however, you have the constitutional right to be paid full price for your loss. And if you can't agree with the government on what that amount should be, you're entitled to your day in court. Unfortunately, most people don't bother to exercise their rights. Instead, they accept the first offer that's presented to them, even if it's lower than they think it should be. That's almost always a mistake.

Property owners, for instance, are entitled to compensation based on appraisals often made months or even years earlier. Such offers may be off the mark by thousands of dollars.

It's important to hire an attorney as soon as you're aware your property is being taken. An attorney who specializes in eminent domain can advise you of your options. And, if your attorney can't prevent your property from being seized, you will at least be secure in the knowledge that you will receive full price for your real estate.

Hiring an attorney to represent you may not be as costly as you might expect. In fact, it may not cost you a single cent. These cases are unlike personal injury cases where the lawyer may get a third of the amount he recovers. In many states, reasonable legal fees are awarded by the court over and above the amount finally settled upon and must be paid by the agency that took your property.

## Voke Calls For A

## COLA

Rep. Richard A. Voke announced that there is great news for state, county and municipal retirees contained in the budget proposal for the state's Fiscal Year 1995 Included in the $\$ 16$ billion spending plan was a provision which calls for a $3 \%$ cost of living adjustment for their pensions.
"I am pleased to see the retirees receive a modest, but well-deserved, COLA increase. Many pensioners are living on fixed incomes and are struggling to make ends meet. This measure is aimed at assisting thousands of retired workers and their families," stated Voke.

Retirees last received a COLA in 1992 after two gubernatorial vetoes were overridden by the legislature. While budget funds continue to be tight, Voke said he made it a priority to secure the COLA increase.

Voke stated the COLA was not the only provision in the budget which strives to assist pensioners in maintaining a quality standard of living. Through the efforts of Voke and other senior advocates in the House, the Council on Aging's budget was increased $100 \%$ and the home care services account was also increased by over $\$ 2$ million dollars.

The city of Boston's Recycling Program is pleased to announce its new and expanded curbside program which begins July 1 in every neighborhood throughout the city of Boston.
As of July 1, newspapers, brown paper bags and corrugated cardboard (not cereal or tissue box type cardboard) will be col-
lar trash day. If you have two trash pick-ups a week, your collection will be on the first day. For three-day trash pick-ups a week, your collection will be on the middle trash day every week.

Here is how it works:

- Save your newspapers, magazines, brown paper bags, and
corrugated cardboard (not cereal or tissue box type cardboard).
- Put your materials in a brown paper bag or tie with string.
- Put out bundles next to your regular trash before $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. on trash day EVERY WEEK, rain or shine.
