## NEW STUDY TO TRY TO

 PREVENT DIABETESMore than 16 million Americans have adult-onset diabetes, and that number is on the rise. Diabetes is especially common among older adults, overweight individuals and minority populations, particularly African-Americans, Hispanic-Americans, American Indians, Asian-Americans and Pacific Islanders.

People with diabetes have too much sugar (glucose) in their blood. Over time, this extra sugar in the blood can cause blindness, heart attacks, strokes and kidney failure. Diabetes has become the sixth leading cause of death by disease in the U.S.

Because diabetes is such a serious health problem, the Mass. General Hospital is involved in a nationwide prevention study that is looking to find out if people can be stopped from getting adult-onset diabetes. This study is for people age 25 or older who don't have diabetes but have a condition called "impaired glucose tolerance" (IGT). IGT or pre-diabetes means that a person's blood has more sugar in it than normal, but not as much as in diabetes. People with IGT have a greater risk of going on to develop diabetes. The study will see if people with IGT can lower their sugar by losing weight and eating healthy foods, or by taking medicine to lower the level of sugar in their blood.

If you are overweight, if someone in your family has diabetes or if you got diabetes while you were pregnant, you may have IGT now, putting you at greater risk for getting the disease in the future. But there may be something you can do about it. The study staff will have an information table set up on Charlestown's "Healthy Heart Day" between 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Thursday, May 30 at Johnnie's Foodmaster, to answer questions and to give you more information about preventing diabetes. 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## INSTALLMENT SALES:

ONE WAY TO DEFER TAXES
It's not too often that the IRS says, "Don't pay us now. Wait until you have the cash." But that's the idea behind the installment sale method, which is required for certain property sales when at least one payment is received in a year after the sale.

Installment sales occur when the seller agrees to finance the buyer's purchase, instead of requiring the buyer to obtain a loan. The buyer then makes periodic payments to the seller, with interest, until the purchase price is paid.

Under the installment sale method, the seller reports capital gain as payments are received, instead of reporting the entire gain the year of sale. The tax on the gain is due only as payments are received from the buyer.
Installment sales offer advantages to both the buyer and the seller. The buyer can avoid the extra costs of a bank loan, and the seller can enjoy a stream of interest income while deferring taxes on the gain. However, if the seller needs the cash all at once, an installment sale doesn't make sense.
The installment method isn't available for all sales. For example, it can't be used on sales that result in a loss, sales of inventory, sales by dealers, or sales of publicly traded securities. And the installment method does not apply to gain triggered by recapture of depreciation, which is taxed as ordinary income.

Sometimes, you may not want to use the iństallment method, in which case you must elect not to use it. For example, if you have offsetting capital losses, you might want to report your entire gain in the same year. The same is true if the property you sold was a passive activity with suspended passive activity losses.

(continued from page one) "so-called Peace Dividend" from the thawing of the Cold War. Yet, as we remember those who have given their lives for our freedom, we must raise a cautionary voice.

It was not a cold war that sent thousands of Americans, and those from more than two dozen other nations, to the blistering sands of the Persian Gulf. No, it was a brutal dictator who still remains in power More than 260 Americans died in Operation Desert Storm. We remember them today.

It was not the Cold War that sent many of our sons and daughters into Panama to oust a dictator whose soldiers had become aggressive and abusive to American citizens. Nearly two dozen Americans died in Operation Just Cause. We remember them today.

It was not the Cold War that sent troops into Grenada to stamp out a repressive regime and rescue American citizens. Eighteen Americans died there. We remember them today.

And it was not the Cold War that motivated a terrorist to drive a bomb-laden vehicle into a Marine barracks in Beirut, Lebanon in October 1983. More than 250 Americans died. We remember them today.

There seems to be a feeling among many citizens that this nation has not been at war since the long struggle in Vietnam came to a close for America. Yet, nothing could be further from the truth.

On Memorial Day, we gather to remember all those who have fallen in defense of freedom. As we do, let us also
remember what history has taught us about our need to maintain vigilance. And, if there is a "Peace Dividend" to be enjoyed, may the first to enjoy that dividend be America's men and women of the military who made it possible for the world to move away from the terrifying threat of a nuclear firestorm.

It is difficult for Legionnaires and all veterans to listen to the plaintive notes of Taps echoing. Or hear a rifle salute. Or watch as a missing-man formation of planes roars overhead.

As we stand tall at those sights and sounds, a lump forms in our throats, and tears well up in our eyes. For we know, we are remembering those who left with a smile on their face, ready to do what America had asked them to do.

Those smiles live on in the memories of their families. Memories! What would we, as a people, be without our memories?

Memorial Day is a fitting time to remember those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. It is also a fitting time to remember those whose fate is unknown - our Prisoners of War and those Missing in Action.

Memories! We hold them dear to our hearts. We know that the citizens of America are thankful for the sacrifices of these men and women. On Memorial Day, we pause to bring meaning to that sacrifice - by remembering them and thanking them for making it possible to live in the greatest nation on earth - the United States of America.

## Safety First!

With the long-awaited holiday weekend finally upon us, the Boston Fire Department has issued several tips for your safety and well-being.

The following regulations apply to the use of portable charcoal and gas-operated cooking grills within a building or structare, and includes balconies, fire escapes, porches and roofs as a part thereof:

Article 1, section 1.05 (b) of the Boston Fire Prevention Code states the authority may act on any unsafe or dangerous condition not specifically provided for in the code.

Under this authority, the Boston Fire Department disapproves the use of portable charcoal cooking grills within a building or structure for the following reasons

- Improper use of starter fuel resulting in burn injury to persons and/or resultant fire involving property;
- Numerous fire safety complaints to the Boston Fire Department by persons within or near the building;
- Wind velocity affecting open flame;
- Fire hazard conditions, high or extreme;
- Resultant Fire Department response due to persons observing assumed building fire from a distance and/or reports of smoke odor from an assumed building fire
in the area; and
- Lack of attendance resulting in unwarranted smoke pollution.

Gas Operated Grills
The Commonwealth of Mass. Board of Fire Prevention regulation 6.07 (5)(a) prohibits the use or storage of Liquefied Pe troleum Gas containers above the first floor of a building used for habitation. This regulation includes so-called "propane" cylinders attached to portable cooking grills.
A permit is required for the storage and use of LP gas (propane) cylinders on the first floor of a building. Except in quantities in the amount of 42 pounds ( 10 galIons), a permit is required for the storage and use of LP cylinders.
Under no circumstances are LP gas cylinders to be stored in buildings used in whole or in part for human habitation. LP gas is to be used only on the outside of buildings on level, sturdy ground.

Always follow ALL of the manufacturers' instructions and keep written materials and manuals in a safe, accessible place.

It always pays for consumers to be aware that following a few simple safety precautions will help ensure that their outdoor cooking remains trouble-free and enjoyable.
