As the Parks' Regional



Thompson Square Gateway Park — Final Planning Stages Begin

Now that the Hayes Square Gateway Park project is nearly done, the city of Boston has begun final planning for Thompson Square. Both these projects were jointly initiated in 1984 by the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force and the Charlestown Preservation Society's Main Street Committee. The projects were first funded in 1986 by the city's Edward Ingersoll Browne Trust.

The Thompson Square project will include the beautification of the two triangular traffic islands at the intersection of Main, Warren and Austin streets. Thompson Square is important to Charlestown as a major entrance to the community, a busy business area and an historic place.

The square was named for the Thompson family,

long-time residents of the area, in the mid-19th centruy. The Thompson were descendents of James Thompson who settled in Charlestown in 1630. The square is adjacent to the Town Hill National Historic District, the historic Breeds Hill area and a number of noteworthly Federal-period buildings including the Warren Tavern, the Thompson Triangle and the Austin Block. From 1901 to 1975, the square was a stop on the elevated train line through Charlestown. When the "El" was demolished, the area was paved over with asphalt.

The beaufitication project is being overseen by the Browne Fund and the Boston Parks Department. Final approvals by various city agencies will occur over the next few months and construction bids will follow. The city reports that construction should begin in the fall of 1991.

A maintenance fund has been established for the square by the Preservation Society with contributions from individuals and businesses and proceeds from two Preservation Weeks. The Boston Redevelopment Authority has also committed \$10,000 to the fund. A maintenance agreement will be established among the Preservation Society, the Browne Fund and the Parks Department.

Jeffrey Schiff, the artist who designed the new Thompson Square, and Nicholas Reed, the landscape architect, have worked with the Browne Fund and the community since the project began and have designed a gracious green space which all can enjoy.

* Handicapped Woman Burnt - The Anchorage Apartments on Ninth Street in the Charlestown Navy Yard was the scene of a onealarm fire on Monday, May 13 that resulted in severe burns to a handicapped resident.

Susan Dunkle, a 48-yearold resident of the building who is confined to a wheelchair, was rushed to Massachusetts General Hospital with first- and second-degree burns to approximately 70 percent of her body.

The blaze was discovered in the third-floor unit after smoke detectors tripped off the building's alarm system. The New England Telephone Company relayed a call to Boston City Hospital for medical assistance for the victim after receiving a call for help from her.

According to Boston Fire Department Public Relations spokesman Lt. Richard Powers, the victim was able to reach the telephone in the living room to make the call while she was on fire, as evidenced by scorching to the floor and remnants of burnt clothing found by the Fire Investigation Unit. Powers stated that the fire started in the kitchen, but it is yet to be determined if the cause of the fire was due to an open flame from cooking or by the careless discarding of a cigarette.

According to Powers the apartment was equipped with both smoke detectors and a sprinkler. The smoke detector was activated, he stated, but the sprinkler did not go on because the heat of the fire was not intense enough to activate the system. Damage to the apartment was estimated to be around \$500.


In an unrelated incident, Powers reported that a onealarm fire of suspicious origin occurred on Saturday, May 11 at 8:52 p.m. at 161 Bunker Hill St. Person(s) unknown set fire to a plexiglass window in the metal door on the first floor of the building, he stated. The Arson Squad is investigating the fire that caused an estimated \$100 damage.

City Square Park Committee Seeks Community Input

The City Square Park Committee announces the resumption of community meetings to oversee the design for the new park in City Square. Upon the completion of the CANA project, City Square will have a one-acre parcel of land available for the new park. Located at the entrance to Charlestown from downtown and at Charlestown's colonial-period town center, the park will be the size of the Training Field.


City Square Park, which will replace the much smaller one taken for construction of the CANA tunnels, will contain the WWII Veterans Memorial and the plaque commemorating Paul Revere's ride, both formerly in the area, as well as information concerning the Great House, the first meeting place of the Massachusetts General Court, once located on the site. Funding for design and construction of the park has been committed by the State Legislature and a consultant for the first design phase has been selected.

The committee is now looking for opinions from residents about uses, landscape treatment and artwork and help in developing designs that meet public needs and are pleasing to the user. Residents are asked to complete the questionnaire below and to deposit it in the ballot box at the Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main St., or mail it by May 24 to: City Square Park Committee, P.O. 




