Newman Flanagan, District Attorney of Suffolk County was the Monument Orator at the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises held on the Monument Grounds on Friday, June 17, 1983. These ceremonies, marking the 208th Anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, were under the auspices of Bunker Hill Post 26, American Legion and were dedicated in memory of the late H. Vincent Strout. Chairman for the Exercises was James W. Conway, Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post 26, and presently National Historian of the American Legion.

The ceremonies began with an Ecumenical Service at St. Francis de Sales Church atop Bunker Hill. Reverend Daniel J. Mahoney, Pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church welcomed the gathering. Readings were offered by John J. Alves, Vice President of the Bunker Hill Monument Association and James W. Conway, Chairman of the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Exercises. Music was provided by the Colonial Pipers Bagpipe Band of Dorchester, with inspirational hymns rendered by the St. Francis de Sales Organist, Choir

and Soloist Thomas Hickey.

A reading from the Gospel was given by Reverend Emilio Lobo of St. Francis de Sales Church, a prayer by Reverend Thomas Conway, Pastor of St. Catherine of Siena Church and the Homily was delivered by Reverend Isaiah Sears, Pastor of the First Baptist Church.

A Memorial was delivered by James W. Conway in honor of the late H. Vincent Strout, who served as Master of Ceremonies for the Bunker Hill Day Exercises for some thirty years and had been active in the American Legion on the local, county, state and national level as well as serving as President of the Bunker Hill Monument Association and Past President of the Charlestown Historical Society.

Bunker Hill Post 26 Color Guard posted and retrieved the colors for this ceremony and taps was rendered by Jacent Guista of Charlestown, a student at the Kent School and by James Werman of Charlestown, a student at the Edwards School, both members of the Tigers Marching Band of District 7 of the Boston Public Schools.

A procession then formed, led by the Bunker Hill Post Color Guard, which marched down Bunker Hill Street to the Monument Grounds for the Commemorative Exercises.

Colors were posted by the Bunker Hill Post Color Guard and the Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard.

The invocation was delivered by Reverend Daniel J. Mahoney, Pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church. Chairman James W. Conway welcomed the gathering and introduced guests present. Greeting were brought by Hugh D. Gurney, Superintendent, Boston National Historical Park; Arthur L. Hurley, President of the Charlestown Historical Society; Mrs. Rutherford Bingham, representing the

Notice Of Public Hearing

CHARLESTOWN PUMP STATION FACILITIES PLAN

The MDC will hold a public hearing on the draft facilities plan for the Charlestown pump station on Tuesday, August 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Kent Community School Auditorium, 50 Bunker Hill Street, Charlestown.

The engineering study addressed alternatives involving the rehabilitation of the existing station or replacement with a new pump station. The study recommends construction of a new pump station on vacant land on Alford Street, across the street and slightly north of the existing pump station.

The public hearing will present the technical criteria, environmental impacts and the cost of the project to users of the MDC system. Copies of the draft facilities plan will be available for public review from July 5 until the day of the hearing at the MDC office, 20 Somerset Street, 4th Floor, Boston, and at the public libraries in Charlestown, Cambridge, Somerville, and Medford.

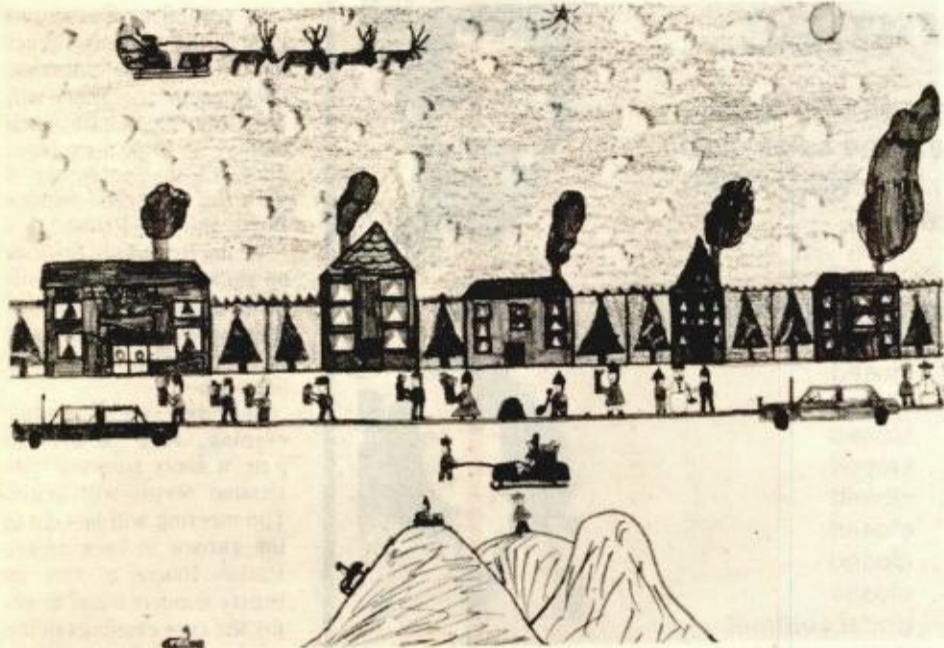
Public Schools.

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City Gardens

Gardens for Charlestown is beginning a regular column to talk about various aspects of gardening in the city. A patch of flowers, herbs, or vegetables can brighten up an apartment or home and become a fascinating pastime. We will address topics of interest, and welcome your suggestions and comments.

Almost every book on gardening begins with the advice that soil should be tested for pH. Why? The dirt at our feet is made up of five main components: inorganic particles of rock; decaying organic matter like last year's leaves and weeds; water; air; and thousands of living creatures such as earthworms, insects, and bacteria. Soil varies greatly in different areas and at different depths. The upper layer, topsoil, is important as the plant's roots spread and draw

nutrient's from this level. Before planting, the soil must be prepared to ensure a hospitable environment so the plants will flourish. Soil is tested to determine its pH - acidity and alkalinity - on a scale of 0 (pure acid) to 14 (pure lye), with 7 as the neutral point. Most plants prefer a slightly acidic soil, about pH 6.5, to thrive. Rarely will plants survive in soil more acidic than pH4 or more alkaline than pH 8. When the pH is known, it can be adjusted by the use of limestone to increase alkalinity, or by the addition of peat moss or flowers or sulphur to increase acidity.

The Suffolk county Cooperative Extension Service offers free soil testing to the residents of Charlestown to determine pH. In addition, free lead contamination testing can be done at the same time, to make sure that the food crops

grown are safe and healthy. Lead is everywhere, and dust from leaded paints and gasoline exhaust can end up in the soil. Lead does not disintegrate in the soil. It can be absorbed by plants, particularly in the leafy green vegetables. Children are particularly susceptible to lead due to their small, growing bodies.

The Extension Service will send an information packet on how to take soil samples - call them Monday through Thursday 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. at 482-9258.

Note that pH testing is always free. Lead contamination testing is free for the first time the soil is tested; subsequent tests are generally not necessary and are subject to a \$5.00 charge per sample. Extensive nutrient status and fertilizer recommendations are also available at a cost

It is indeed an honor to stand before you today. This is the 208th Anniversary of the Battle which signifies the struggle of the American people against forces within and from without which attempted to deny us the liberties which we cherish.

It was a hot day back in 1775, like today, when the British forces marched on a small fortification built the night before on top of Breed's Hill. The builders of that fort were called the "Colonial Army", but we know that the soldiers were ordinary townspeople, local craftsmen, silversmiths, farmers and doctors; rich and poor. Untrained in the skills of war, they stood together to hold back the elite troops of the British Army.

Their names need not be repeated, for we all know who stood shoulder to shoulder here on the hill. Together they pushed back the British Army, not once but twice, causing severe casualties, falling back only when the ammunition ran out. They did not give up their battle, rather their spirit remained strong and they threw themselves into the war against the British, fighting for the liberties we enjoy today.

The great history of the community spirit in Charlestown began at that Battle, on the place where we stand today. Over the course of history, Charlestown men and women have stood together in the tradition of the people who fought at Bunker Hill. Their pride, their determination, their care for one another, are all part of the Charlestown tradition.

Daniel Webster once said, speaking from this Monument back in 1825 that "Nothing is impossible on Bunker Hill." Well, that sentiment remains true today. Throughout our country's history men and women from Charlestown have carried the message of Bunker Hill to the four corners of the world. The rights and freedoms gained through battles like Bunker Hill, do not come cheaply. On many occasions the men and women of Charlestown have made the ultimate sacrifice to preserve those freedoms.

The people of Charlestown can be proud to say that they have upheld the phrase "Duty, Honor, Country": Duty to their family and community, Honor to themselves and their homeland, and Service to their country as they carried forth the ideals remembered here. We honor today those who fought abroad to save mankind from dictators and oppressors and those who would oppress freedom, justice and equality for others. We also remember those who fought even when their country did not fully appreciate their sacrifice for the ideals that made this land great. Let today be a renewal of the faith and hope of our ancestors as we pledge ourselves to carry on the fight against those who seek to destroy our freedom.

The fight for freedom also continues across the world. The same Battle we fought 200 years ago is being fought every day and night in countries like Poland and

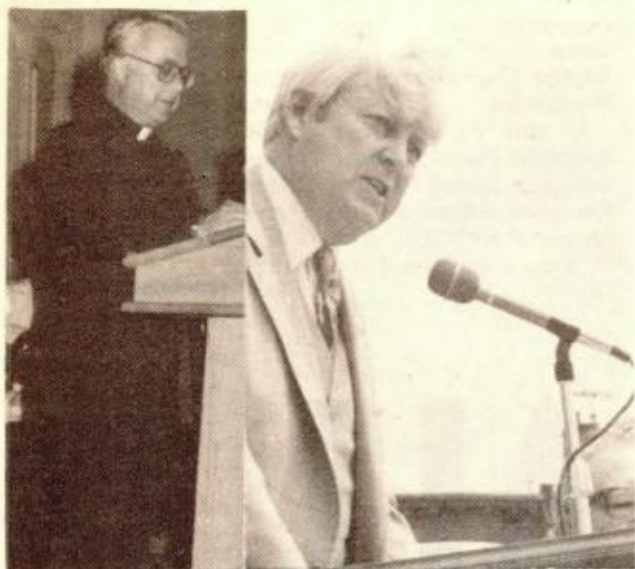
Afghanistan. Just like our forefathers, small bands of freedom fighters struggle for freedom, justice, and equality. We should never lose sight of what those freedoms cost us, and we must always support those who still struggle for those rights. Let us hope that some day those fighters for freedom can gather before a similar monument in their own countries and celebrate, as we today, victory in that struggle.

The battle for the freedoms we won 200 years ago has not ended at home. Every day we face fresh challenges, from forces that seek to destroy those rights we have worked for. As your District Attorney for the past five years, I have the honor of working for you in the Criminal Courts of Suffolk County. Criminal acts of violence strip us of our freedom. However, the protections of our Constitution do not apply only to those accused of violating the law. Victims of crimes and witnesses to crimes have rights as well: The right to protection from harassment and undue delay; the right to a fair and just prosecution of those charged with the crime; the right to a criminal justice system which does not permit the guilty to escape punishment on a mere technicality.

For too long our system has not paid sufficient attention to the needs and concerns of victims. Those law abiding citizens who are victimized by lawbreakers deserve our encouragement and our assistance. Without citizens like you, willing to make the sacrifice required to testify in a criminal trial, we would never be able to continue the fight, nor win the battle against crime. The same commitment to freedom exemplified by those fearless souls who fought at Bunker Hill, is required for our fight to preserve an orderly, just and safe society.

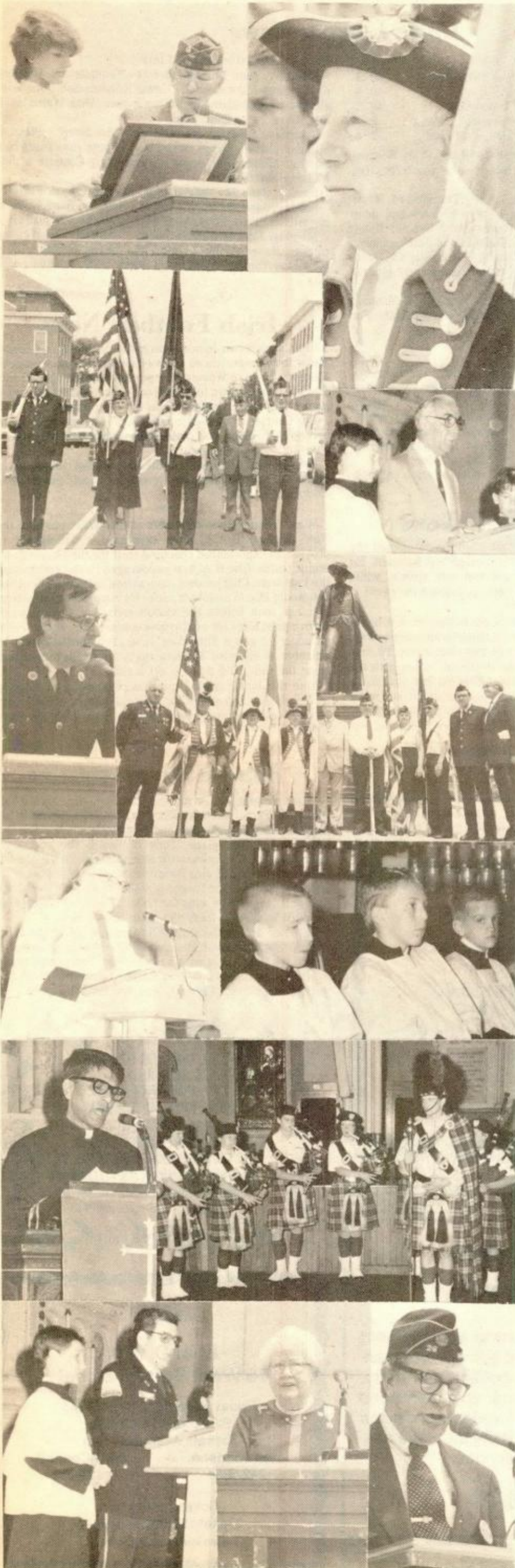
If the people of Charlestown and Suffolk County lose sight of, or apply unequally the principles of freedom for which we have struggled and for which this Monument stands, then there is no hope for the continued strength of America. The next generation would never know the pleasure of these freedoms. But, I do not foresee a bleak future for Boston. Small townspeople like our ancestors, yes, like you, like me, make the difference. Through you, the memories of farmers and doctors, rich and poor who fought for freedom justice and equality will never die. As long as we who gather here, remember what they fought and died for, then the people of Charlestown, will never let freedom, justice and equality be empty words.

Abraham Lincoln once said that "Those who deny freedom to others, deserve it not for themselves." Within our great town and country there are those that try to destroy what we fight for. The good people of Charlestown will not stand for this! Neither will I! As we commemorate their struggle we affirm our commitment to those principles, I ask that you stand by me and work with me to continue the great tradition started here. Together, "Nothing is impossible on Bunker Hill!"

Cappucci Voices Concerns Of District

Robert (Meany) Cappucci, candidate for City Council, District 1, held his official "Kickoff" campaign fund raiser at the Ramada Inn, East Boston on Monday evening. There were well over 1,000 well wishers, supporters and friends from East Boston, North End and Charlestown who attended the event.

Cappucci told the enthusiastic crowd that he would be available to all his constituents and would deal with all their problems and concerns no matter how large or small. As City Councillor, Cappucci stated his chief concern would be to increase both the Police and Fire protection that has been taken from us over the last few years. "No one should ever have to live in fear of a small minority of criminals and thugs, and no one should ever have to fear the thoughts of fire ravaging their home due to the lack of proper fire personnel and equipment." Cappucci also believes that a more serious concentration of effort should be placed on the education of our children. Their future lies in our hands and it is the duty of elected officials to see to it that they are not denied an equal opportunity due to a poor education." Cappucci stressed the serious need for improvement and expansion of our Parks and Recreation centers. "It is a real disgrace when a brand new recreation center remains closed for a long period of time or when thousands of taxpayers' dollars are spent on park improvements only to have the end product look the same as when it started.

This trend cannot continue and as your elected City Councillor I will see to it that it does not." Cappucci went on to say that the taxpayers of his district deserve better city services for the amount of tax dollars they pay and vowed to see to it that they will receive their fair share.

A final concern and just as important as the others, Cappucci said was the in-

adequate housing available for the low, middle class and elderly citizens who make up the backbone of this city. "We cannot afford to turn our backs on this group and as your councillor I assure you I will not!!!"

Cappucci's strong attitude of concern on these issues was well received by the large crowd at the Ramada Inn.

The Rights Of Boston Voters

Nothing is more important in a democracy than citizens being able to control their elected officials, either through a veto of their acts by the initiative petition, referendum procedure or removing them from office before the expiration of their term (recall elections). The referendum procedure enables citizens to take an ordinance passed by their local officials and place on the ballot for the voters

consideration. If the voters approve, it remains an ordinance, if not approved, the ordinance is eliminated as a city law. The initiative petition procedure allows citizens to pass local laws. Citizens would gather signatures on a petition and their proposed law would be placed on the ballot. If the voters approve, it becomes a city wide law. For example:

1. Citizens could pass a law preventing the closing of schools, police and fire stations.
 2. Citizens could pass a law to eliminate specific wasteful local government practices or programs.
- Veto powers and recall election are "tools" by which citizens can eliminate corruption and waste from local government. These "tools" or rights, as most people refer to them, are absolutely necessary to insure quality government and responsive officials.

Today citizens of every community in Massachusetts, except Boston, have the rights of initiative petition and referendum. Many communities are also gaining the right of recall elections. Boston in previous years had all of these rights. Do we need these rights? Are we entitled to them? Shouldn't we have them? How do we regain what we lost?

There are three ways of regaining these rights. Two of these methods allow the Mayor, City Council, and/or State (continued on page 11)

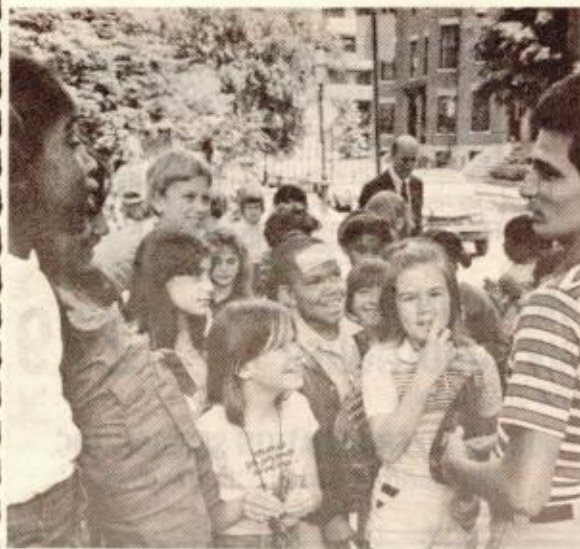

Legislature to add them to the City Charter. Are they likely to do so? No! Remember what happened to the recall election bill in the State Legislature. Fortunately, there is a third way which does not require the approval of any elected officials. This is the Charter Commission process which, under a 1966 Amendment to the State Constitution, allows us to change the City Charter without requiring the approval of our elected officials and hence gives Boston Citizens an opportunity to regain the rights of recall elections and veto powers over their city officials.

Boston is supported by a large number of civic groups and citizens including City Councillors Bolling, Hennigan, Iannella, McCormack, McDermott, Tierney; Mayoral candidates DiCara, Finnegan, Flynn, Kearney, Kiley, King, Langone.

The first step in regaining these lost rights is to gather signatures and place the question of establishing a charter commission on the November ballot. If you want to help by signing a petition, call the Association of Neighborhoods for Charter Reform at 734-0296 or Ann Wallace at 241-8889.

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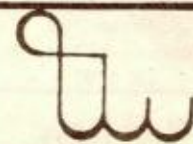
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
