Main Street Area Eligible For NDEA Low Interest Loans

Recently a section of Charlestown was designated by the city as

part of the Neighborhood Commercial District Program. According to Joe Flaherty, President of the

Charlestown Board of Trade, it is a move the board has been working towards for over a year

and a half.

Although, spokesmen for the Neighborhood Development and Employment Agency (NDEA) which pilots the program, were not sure what part of Charlestown would be designated as a Commercial District, Flaherty said the Main Street area between Thompson Square and Sullivan Square was designated for commercial assistance in the form of low interest loans.

Under the program, a coordinated mix of programs, services and other assistance is available to merchants and investors. These service could include:

—The Neighborhood Commercial Development Bank offering low-interest long-term loans to local

merchants interested in commercial property acquisition, expansion and/or renovations. Four Boston banks participating in this part of the program are The First National Bank of Boston, Shawmut Bank of Boston, Bank of New England and State Street Bank and Trust Company.

—Storefront rebates for merchants who choose not

to apply for a loan but wish to make improvements to their commercial properties:

—Capital improvements to upgrade the physical environment;

—Security patrols to increase public safety for merchants and residents;

—The Economic Development Assistance

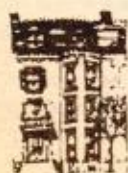

Travaglini Hits Globe For Attack On Charlestown

District City Council candidate Robert Travaglini this week called upon the *Boston Globe* to "apologize to the people of Charlestown" for a recent attack by that newspaper on the Charlestown neighborhood. Last Thursday, May 12, the *Globe* ran a story which accused the people and neighborhood of Charlestown of being racist and violent. Travaglini has asked the *Globe* to retract its story.

"The *Boston Globe* has been no friend to Charlestown over the years," said Travaglini, "but we should not have to expect this kind of second rate journalism which pounces on an isolated

problem and paints the whole neighborhood with

the same brush."

Travaglini told this paper, "The fact is that the vast majority of the people who live here in Charlestown are good, law abiding people who work hard for a living and who deserve the respect of the *Globe*. Instead, because the *Globe* has a tendency to generalize and create stories when there are none, the people of Charlestown are misrepresented by their city's largest newspaper. This must stop, and it must stop

now."

Travaglini pledged to work with community leaders once he is elected to the city council "to improve our image with the city and to demonstrate that this is a caring, solid neighborhood of which we can rightfully be proud. I call upon the *Boston Globe* to offer equal time and space to representatives of the Charlestown community to offer its readers the other, more accurate side of the story."

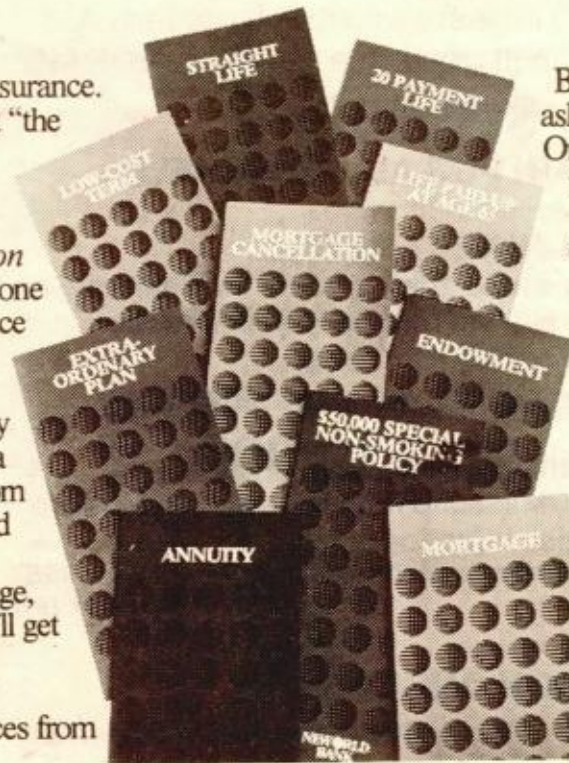

Eligible For NDEA Low Interest Loans

(continued from page 1)

Program (EDAP) offering flexible gap financing loans; and

—Free financial and architectural assistance.

To make low interest loans possible, NDEA is combining Federal Block Grant money with that money loaned by the bank, to allow the bank to charge a low interest. For commercial development loans, the interest rate would equal 2/3 of the Prime Rate for 15 years or more. The maximum loan amount is \$250,000 per building, less any Facade Improvement Loans received for the same building.

Facade Improvement Loans would be made at an interest rate of 6% for up to five years. The maximum amount is \$10,000 per storefront.

Rebates, made to owners who do not wish to apply for a loan, will equal 20% of the actual cost of eligible improvements but cannot exceed \$1800 per storefront.

While all potential borrowers are subject to

approval by the aforementioned banks they are also subject to approval by a Charlestown Task Force, set up to identify merchants' needs.

Presently, that task force includes Flaherty, William Galvin of Bunker Hill Real Estate, Attorney Kevin Roche, former dry cleaner store owner and now realtor Bernard Tuttle, Joe Roselli of Rosev Dairy, Funeral Director Phil Carr, Sheila Sweeney, who assists Flaherty and Cary Tarpinian, manager of Bunker Hill Mall.

Based on the Charlestown Task Force's input, the NDEA staff will determine which mix of services best meet the specific needs of each area.

"We're very happy about it," said Flaherty. "We hope to someday see Main Street transformed into a type of Mall Area." Flaherty mentioned McDonald's and Doctors Robert Esdale and Neil Schram as interested candidates to first use the new program.

"I'm going to try to use

it," said Schram who is already renovating the building at the corner of Main and Green Streets (formerly Computer City) into a medical building. "The money will help me finish faster."

Agreeing with Flaherty that the program is good for Charlestown, Schram said "Enabling people to update their business will bring more people to town, and thus bring in more purchasing power. I expect to see more patients because now I will be accessible to the handicapped."

Not all merchants agree with Flaherty and Schram, however. One merchant who wishes to remain anonymous for fear of repercussions if he chooses to use the program said that he would "put out feelers." "I'll wait and see what happens. Maybe it will be a good idea. Then again, maybe it will be just another way for a chosen few to be graced by city funds legally."

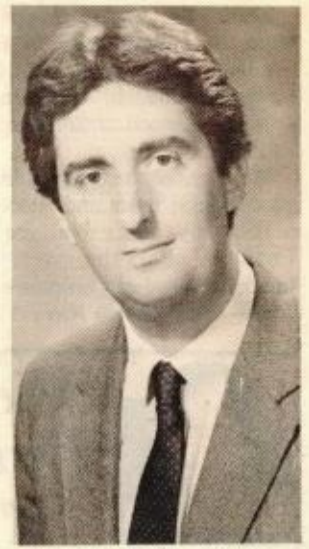

"THEY THAT GO DOWN TO THE SEA IN SHIPS"

Since 1880, seafarers visiting the port of Boston have been the beneficiaries of Boston's Seamen's Mission, a ministry of the East Coast Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church; operating as members of the International Council of Seamen's Agencies, Inc. (Established in 1951).

Mariners representing some thirty countries visit Boston on a regular basis and, since 1968, have been greeted upon arrival by Rev. Wallace Cedarleaf, Boston Harbor Chaplain. For the past ten years the Mission was headquartered at Commonwealth Pier, but is now located at the Charlestown Navy Yard, Building 10, next to "Old

Ironsides." Chaplain Cedarleaf has moved on in his ministry to service seamen in their apostolate's extension to Providence, Fall River and New Bedford, and Rev. Jim Lindgren assumed the duties of Boston Harbor Chaplain this past September.

In addition to general counseling, empathy and encouragement, the Chaplains see to the needs of each and every crew member. Whether it be toilet articles, cigarettes, reading materials, daily newspapers, devotional booklets or maps of Boston, the individual never lacks for his wants, and finds willing ears for any personal problems. Those in need of medical help, through illness or injury, are brought to the U.S. Public Health Hospital (more commonly known as "Brighton Marine"), which also assists fishermen, Coast Guardsmen, Civil Service employees, and active/retired members of our military forces. As a patient there some years ago, we can tell you first hand of the happiness expressed by foreign seamen assisted by Mission personnel. Many of these sailors were away from home for the first time and/or for long periods and, understandably, frightened as a result of being hospitalized in a foreign land. Our own status as a patient enabled us to observe the many kindnesses, generosity and charitable works of Chaplain Cedarleaf through his personal and Mission endeavors. He will be surprised to read of this now ... so many years later.

Too, as a result of this humanitarian project, Boston's temporary visitors are often "staked" to sightseeing tours, e.g. the John Hancock Tower, Old Ironsides, the Aquarium, Stoneham Zoo, et al, and the accessibility of telephone calls to their loved ones helps greatly to remove much of the boredom and loneliness experienced on long voyages, as well as alleviating the very real fears of the dangers engendered in their chosen livelihood. Did you realize that an average five vessels sink to the bottom of the oceans every week?

The Boston Seamen's Mission receives no large grants, and is supported by the tax deductible gifts of "interested individuals and groups who wish to share the dream that our world is one family." You can sign on as a "Member of the Crew," and receive a beautiful citation, and their quarterly paper, by making an appropriate donation. Groups/organizations desiring to learn more of their work

can make arrangements to have a slide program shown to their members. Contact the Mission for further information.

And, Chaplains Cedarleaf and Lindgren, this retired "Salt" adds his own personal THANK YOU, knowing also that a blessed light will continue to shine out of your two eyes "like a candle set in two windows of a house, bidding the wanderer to come in out of the storm."

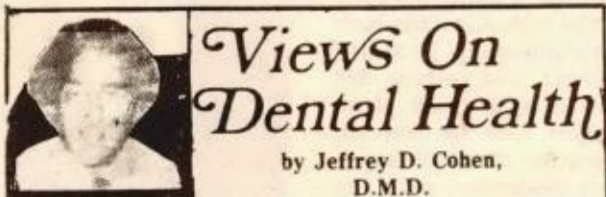
Massport Sponsors C.H.S. Scholarships

Views On Dental Health

FACIAL PAIN IN MOTORCYCLISTS

With the onset of cooler weather, dentists around the country - especially in colder climates - usually have an influx of young adult patients complaining of severe facial pain. A little research will find that most of these patients are motorcyclists who had recently ridden their cycles without any face protection from the wind. This can drop the effective temperature by many degrees as a combination of cold and increased wind against the face.

The pain usually involves both sides of the face and sets in about two hours after the motorcycle ride. It will be a constant, rather than intermittent pain. It will be located in the tooth area of the face which is why these patients usually make a bee-line to the dentist.

The cause has nothing to do with the teeth but rather the sensitivity of the branches of the trigeminal nerve. The pain will be severe enough for many patients to ask to have some teeth extracted. However, the symptoms are easily treated in the office. The best therapy, however, is for motorcyclists to wear face protection during cold weather.

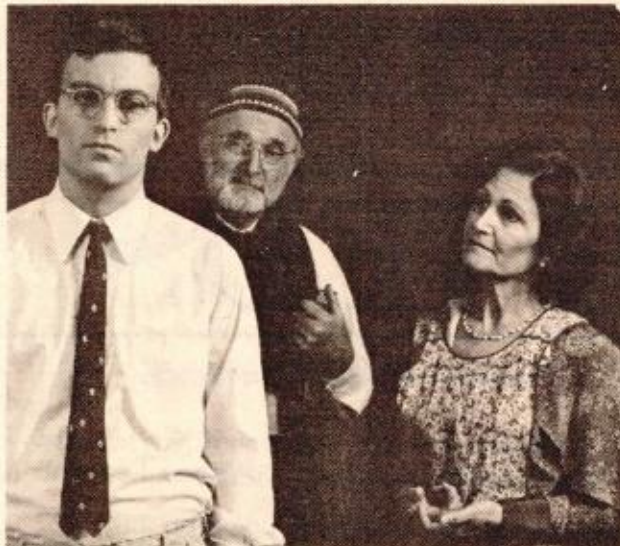

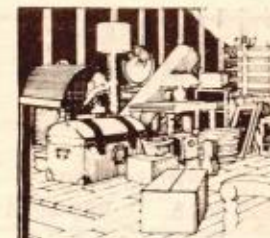

Boston. designated as commercial districts are Codman Square, Dudley Station, Fields Corner, Grove Hall, Harvard Avenue, Allston, Hyde Square, Jamaica Plain, Kenmore Square, Lower Mills, Mission Hill/Brigham Circle, Morton Street/Blue Hill Avenue, Roslindale

So far, there has been no ceiling set on how much money can be awarded to each district. Designation of sites are based on the 1980 census. Because Block Grant money is used in the program, areas designated Commercial Districts must be low income.
