# We Want To Let The People Of Charlestown Know

The family of Albie Titcomb would like to thank everyone who came to pay their respects to Al and his family, and also to thank the people who sent the most beautiful flowers and the many who contributed to Al's burial. We cannot thank you enough.

Many of you have read the Herald and Globe and the stories written about our son, some negative. I have not been able to sit with them as of yet and talk about Al, as I haven't been able to open a spiritual bouquet. I want to let the people of Charlestown know the story before I talk to any reporters.

People who know us, know the struggle our son had with drugs. Al started to use drugs at the age of 14 1/2. His first place for treatment was in St. Johnsbury, Vt. in a 30-day program. He spent one year at the Honor House in Springfield, time at the Kitty Dukakis Center in Walpole, several times at South Cove and many other places. Al resented us for always sending him to detox, but he looked great when it was over. We did it because we loved him.

Al struggled every day with life, but one thing we know is he loved his girlfriend Mary and his son

I talked to my son on Tuesday, Nov. 22 at 2:45 p.m. I knew Al was using because of his voice and speech. I said to him, "What did you take today?," and his answer was, "Nothing, Ma." At 4:30 p.m. I got a call at work telling me that my son was dead. I can't begin to tell you how I felt, but I know one thing, Al was really, really messed (continued on page 3)

(continued from page 1) up on drugs from what people have told me and also from the people who saw my son that day. If Al's eye was itchy, I don't believe my son could have scratched it.

My son was murdered by cowards who would never have been able to fight him with their fists because he would have eaten them up. The only way they could get him was in the condition he was in on Tuesday, Nov. 22, and you know what? They shot him in the back of the head - cowardly. They knew if they beat him, he would have been

back on Wednesday, so they had to kill him. Pretty sad. And believe me, it wasn't over \$50! I just want to let the people of Charlestown know, and many, many of you already do know, we loved our son! We stuck by him through thick and thin and nobody knows the pain we are suffering. It will never, ever go away. One thing I do hope and pray to God is that Al is the last. I would never want another family to suffer the way we are.

I just want The Charlestown Patriot to print the first story on Al. I will try to have the article in

Thursday, Nov. 24's edition of the Globe retracted which stated that Al was a prime suspect in the September robbery of an armored car driver who had just left Tia's restaurant in the Marriott on Long Wharf. Well, Globe reporter Judy Rakowsky, my son did six months at South Cove. His release date was Oct. 22 and unless South Cove let him out for the day, this is impossible!

All I want is the truth written about my son. Al didn't have a cocaine problem. He wasn't a coke head. His drug was multiple choice - all drugs.

I made a promise to my

son Al on Saturday morning before I left the funeral home, and that promise is that the cowards will pay. They had no right and have no rights as of now. And I won't rest or be able to grieve for my son until justice is done.

I would also like to thank Al's friends for being pall bearers at his Mass.

A wide variety of employers will be in attendance, including major hospitals, retail stores, banks, insurance companies and various other business-related companies.



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



# Mayor Launches Children's Health Access Project

Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently outlined a city campaign to make sure that every child in Boston has access to affordable health care services. The comprehensive outreach project that will make sure that all children have services as well as access to health insurance is a coordinated effort with the Boston Schools, the consumer advocacy group Health Care for All and many public and private agencies.

Rob Restuccia, director of Health Care for All, said, "Health benefit programs which pay for your child's health care are available. Our goal is to reach out to families and let them know what exists for their benefit. Many

health benefit programs are subsidized or use a sliding fee scale. These programs are designed with specific eligibility and coverage details. Unfortunately, some are under-utilized and under-enrolled because people don't know what's available for them. This campaign will change that."

"Studies show that uninsured children in Mass.
visit a doctor only half as
often as insured children,"
said Ann Maguire, chief
of Health and Human Services. "They get less hospital care and are often
sicker due to a lack of primary care services. As
part of our outreach, the
city will help parents with
information and enrollment through the Mayor's

Health Line at 534-5050, the schools, the community centers, the Housing Authority, Boston City Hospital and the health centers.

Boston school nurses have already received inservice training in identifying the obstacles to care, and benefits as well as enrollment and eligibility overviews for existing health benefit services. The Zone Office Parent Information Centers and the Citywide Parents Council have also been trained in health access outreach. In addition, the school department will distribute multi-lingual news about the program in eight languages to the parents of Boston school children.

Among his activities, Mr. McGuinness is a Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post No. 26, The American Legion; Vice Chairman of Naval Affairs for the Mass. Department of The American Legion; Past President of the Old Charlestown Schoolboys Association; member of the Bunker Hill Associ-



# BHA's McGonagle Pledges Work On Hayes Square Problems

Residents from the Hayes Square area and Boston Housing Authority (BHA) Deputy Administrator Bill McGonagle faced each other at a meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) Basic Services Committee on Nov. 29. The meeting was called so that both parties could take a long, hard look at the area problems rising out of the use of the vacant lot between Chelsea and Hunter streets.

Bill Galvin chaired the committee meeting, and was joined by CNC members Gregg Nolan, Jim Conway and Peter Looney.

McGonagle took the floor to outline what the BHA has done and what it will be able to do with the property. He said that a little progress has been made cleaning up the lot in question. He noted that the huge pile of dirt is gone and will not return, adding that most of the loose debris is also gone with the exception of the few piles that still remain.

McGonagle went on to say that the storage containers will be gone once the current phase of rehabilitation in the Bunker Hill Housing Development has been completed, estimated to be next June

According to McGonagle, the Construction Management Division of the BHA has been ordered not to lease the site and is prohibited from using the site to accommodate future BHA contractors. He added that this policy change would increase the cost of some future contracts in providing a staging area, noting that the dirt cannot be stored there anymore.

He said that he will attempt to address the short- and long-term concerns relative to the lot, adding that he doesn't know what the long-term use would be. Since a portion of the land is under the Tobin Bridge, he does not know what the legal and economic handicaps

The only commitment McGonagle made on short-term usage is to see that the weeds are kept down and to work out with residents the least intrusive site for the entrance to the lot. In response to a question from the gathering, McGonagle said that there wasn't money for landscaping the lot. He did take note that there was unanimous agreement that the entrance be on Chelsea Street at Vine.

McGonagle said that if a workable concept is proposed, there may be a possibility that the lot could be sold for \$1, adding that this would not apply to a for-profit proposal.

Galvin stated that the site would be ideal for a public safety building. Conway added that the committee should get a definitive legal statement as to what uses can go on the site. Looney recommended that an official word should be obtained from Massport.

Joe Barnes told Mc-Gonagle that the raking and weeding will still leave the lot an eyesore. David Whelan, who just had a duplex home constructed overlooking the area, complained of the blowing dirt that has left his home filthy and with ruined rugs. He then spoke about his excessively high water bill that was a mystery until he found a worker using his outside water faucet. McGonagle took note of the residents' complaints.

Gaivin recommended that another meeting of the committee be held with an invitation being extended to McGonagle and a representative from Massport.

# A Dreaded Billboard Looms On The Horizon

Once again, a notice from the city's Board of Appeal (BOA) has alerted residents that Rite Media is seeking approval to locate one of its billboards here in Charlestown. The notice bore the request for permission to erect a 20foot by 60-foot billboard on a single 100-foot pole on the property of New England Frozen Foods, formerly the site of International Ice Cream, at 490 Rutherford Ave.

Charlestown Neighborhood Council Billboard Committee Chairman Ken Stone had called a meeting on Nov. 28, prior to the Dec. 6 BOA Hearing. Rite Media told Stone it would withdraw its appeal until some issues are resolved between the company and the landlord.

Stone introduced Pete Murphy from Rite Media who was representing the company on an "unofficial basis." Murphy said that the company is looking at a 14-foot by 48-foot two-sided sign with the height yet to be determined.

He noted that the object is that the sign with its rented space would be seen by motorists on Route I-93. He went on to explain that the two sides would be at a slight angle and the community would only see the nighttime illumination, not the advertising on the sign.

Murphy stated that an application for the location of a sign must be approved by both the state and the city. He noted that local codes are more stringent than the state and so the city permission is sought first.

Murphy was questioned about how aesthetically pleasing such a billboard is and the impression such a sign has on a motorist's perception of the town. A resident commented that much work has been done to improve the community and he was critical of the idea that motorists would view an advertisement instead of the Bunker Hill Monument.

Committee member Bill Galvin made a motion that the committee members, including Stone, Dan Kovacevic and Mel Stillman, report to the full CNC at its Dec. 6 meeting noting its opposition to the proposed billboard. He added that the members see no benefit to the community and called it a terrible impact that would be a setback to the town.

The members all agreed on the motion, and were supported unofficially by the residents present.

Stone stated that the residents are "squeezed all the time by outside forces and they would like to keep the town as a neighborhood."






#### Bosco Basketball Team Readies For Season


Tom Cavanaugh, basketball coach at Don Bosco Technical High School, is looking forward to working with this year's players. He says, "They are a hard working, good group of kids."



#### A HARVEST OF VITAMINS

Harvest time is here and brings with it a whole array of the fresh vegetables that we look forward to all year. The variety of vegetables is great, the cost is much lower when vegetables are in season, and the nutritional value is also better when in season. What better time to stock up, try new varieties and combinations, and explore new recipes.

The American Cancer Society recommends that we eat more cabbage family (cru-ci-fer-ous) vegetables and more vitamin A rich vegetables for cancer prevention. Also, all vegetables (except avocados) are natural low fat, low salt foods so they are perfect for anyone trying to follow a heart healthy diet.

The trick to healthy vegetables is to avoid over cooking them and smothering them with extra fatty toppings like butter or margarine. Do buy them fresh and eat them often. Vegetables in season now, which are cruciferous and/or are good sources of vitamin A, are all types of salad greens, broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, kale, pumpkin, spinach, sweet potato and all types of winter squash.

Instead of recipes, try a little imagination when preparing vegetables, steam them, bake them or stirfry them. Or you can add vegetables to existing recipes like stews or spaghetti sauce. Here is another quick idea:

Vegetable Pasta Toss

Using any vegetable combination you like, (broccoli, cauliflower, carrots and spinach are good) steam or microwave the vegetables until they are tender. Toss with any or all of the following:

1-2 tsp. olive oil (not too much) 1-2 Tbsp. grated parmesan cheese dash of basil or a few leaves of fresh basil dash of oregano

onion and garlic powder and pepper to taste Toss the vegetable mixture with tender cooked spaghetti, ziti or macaroni and enjoy. Aujust amounts according to number of servings needed,



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#### ONCE AGAIN, IT'S GIFT-GIVING SEASON

The IRS allows you to give away up to \$10,000 each year to as many people as you want, without triggering gift tax. If you and your spouse "split" your gifts, you can double this \$10,000 annual gift-tax exclusion and give \$20,000 per recipient.

If you're thinking of sharing your wealth, here are some important gift-giving considerations.

- All gifts during the year, including birthday and holiday presents, count toward the \$10,000 (or \$20,000) annual gift tax exclusion. For example, say you give a \$500 birthday present to your grandchild. You may give another \$9,500 to that grandchild during the year without triggering the need for a gift tax return.
- A gift made by check isn't complete until the recipient actually deposits or cashes the check.
   Plan accordingly when making year-end gifts, especially if you want such gifts to be counted toward this year's gift-tax exclusion.

 For a gift to be valid, you must part with ownership. Pay special attention to gifts of stock in the family business or gifts of your personal residence.

Carefully consider the type of asset before you give it away. Property that has substantially appreciated in value may not be a good candidate for giving, especially if you are well up in years. If you own stock or other property that has declined in value since you acquired it you may be better off selling the property and giving away the proceeds. Giving away a life insurance policy can be an excellent strategy, but it's a subject to some tricky rules.



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## Historical 1812 Holiday Tree Cutting Ceremony Scheduled

Cmdr. Richard B. Amirault, commanding officer of USS Constitution, several members of the crew, officials from the Department of Environmental Management and members of the Mass. 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


