



E.D.C. Names New Executive Manager

The Board of Trustees of the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation named John T. Gardiner as their new Executive Manager. Mr. Gardiner replaces Robert B. O'Brien, who resigned to become Executive Secretary of the Massachusetts Consumers Council in the King Administration.

Mr. Gardiner is currently serving as Executive Director of the Kennedy Center; and, with the assistance of Ms. Margaret Donohue as Executive Assistant, will manage both organizations.

Mr. Gardiner, who holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Boston University and a Masters Degree from Boston College, has been Executive Director of the Kennedy Center for the past seven years. He has served the Kennedy Center in the capacities of Director of the Summer Neighborhood Youth Corps; Program Analyst for the Title III Program; Director of the Title III Program; and Associate Director since 1966.

"Bob and I worked closely on the formation and implementation of the Economic Development Corporation. I am proud of the accomplishments of the Board of the EDC in the One Thompson Square Bank Building and the conversion of the former Harvard Elementary School into housing for the elderly. I intend to see these two projects completed and efficiently managed, as well as become involved in projects that will provide similar job opportunities for Charlestown contractors in labor intensive activities. The Charlestown Navy Yard redevelopment is an obvious prime target for economic development opportunities, and I intend to aggressively pursue these to benefit the community," stated Gardiner.

EDC President Augustus (Gus) Charbonnier spoke for the Board when he said, "The Board looks forward to working with Mr. Gardiner to avail itself of economic opportunities that would benefit the community and make enough additional profit to turn over funds to the parent agency, the Kennedy Center, to provide much needed social services to our neighbors."



Extra! Extra! Read all about it Kudos to City Councilor Ray Flynn for lashing out at the negative reporting of public affairs.

Flynn was the guest speaker at the "Night Before" banquet last weekend at the Bunker Hill A.L. Post and criticized recent media reports about crime in Charlestown as an example of such negative reporting.

Ward Two Forum: Community Involvement

Recently, Democratic party delegates met at a State Party Convention in Springfield to draw up a State Charter among other things. No charter was able to exit from the convention but a charter or statement of purpose is still needed nevertheless!

I believe that such a charter should come up from the grassroots. Perhaps a series of "Ward Forums" could be developed to help. Since the working people of America have always been the backbone of the Democratic Party, their involvement and support is what this effort for a charter is all about.

Take Charlestown for an example, we have a Ward Two Democratic Committee but what do they do? Most people couldn't name more than one or two members.

In this way the people can be offered an arena where problems can be met and solutions considered. The Forum can bring the party closer to the people and cast issues in their proper perspective.

We are a great many people in Ward 2, Charlestown and this Forum is an idea needed!
















O'Brien Sworn In As Executive Secretary

I would appreciate your printing a copy of the letter that was submitted to the Committee on the naming of the Buildings in the Complex of the new Charlestown High School Athletic Facility. Dear Sir;

Regarding the naming of the Charlestown High School facilities, including the athletic complex, I would like to submit the names of Staff Sgt. James P. Kelley U.S.M.C. and PFC Daniel A. Kelley U.S.M.C.R. for your consideration for the following reasons:

1. Staff Sgt. James P. Kelley died a hero's death at the Coconut Grove Fire on the night of November 28, 1942. After helping to rescue a number of people, he went back into the club to look for a buddy, also a Marine, and he perished in the attempt.






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Editorial Why The Rush?

On Tuesday evening, May 29, over 50 residents and concerned individuals met at One Thompson Square at a gathering called by Maurice Gillen. In a notice submitted for the May 24th edition of The Patriot, Gillen stated that he had been "designated" by the Boston School Committee to "chair a committee of community residents for the purposed of recommending appropriate names for the new Charlestown High School facilities, including the athletic complex"

At that meeting various interested persons submitted names and gave reasons why those names should be considered for the honor, names such as Lt. Michael P. Quinn, Staff Sgt. James P. Kelley, PFC Daniel A. Kelley, Jeffrey Keating, Charlestown Firefighters, and others. At that meeting, it was recommended that a committee of ten be appointed to review names nominated, along with the letters of recommendation, and that this committee would then recommend a name or names (since there are sections of this facility such as field, gym, pool, and the complex as a whole). The recommendation(s) for the naming of the facility would then be brought back to a public meeting for a vote.

Little City Hall Manager Bobbie Delaney also noted at this meeting that Public Facilities still has title to this property, not the School Department, and thus it is in the province of Mayor White to name this complex. She also stated that the Mayor would listen to the recommendations of the community.

Several of the so-named committee members were contacted by Gillen for a committee meeting to be held on Friday evening, June 8th. When told by some that this date would be impossible, he responded that he would get back to them with a new date, and that was the last they heard about it until Wednesday morning, June 13 when several people called to inform The Patriot that a meeting had been held the previous evening (they had heard about it only moments before it started) and that now an election was being planned to decide a name for the facility on the evening of June 28th -- less than a month, and a very busy month in Charlestown at that, from the original meeting on this subject.

The Patriot asks the question "Why the rush?" Why not delay this decision until fall when people have had time to present their nomination to the community and the pleasure of summer vacations and the pressure of political campaigns are but memories. Then maybe the residents can sit down and make a valid decision, giving the naming and subsequent dedication the honor and dignity that it so rightly deserves.

The Athletic Facility has been open several years and the High School for a year without being officially named. Certainly a few more months will not make a difference. DON'T RUSH, CHARLESTOWN --DO IT RIGHT.


