## The 220th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill

The highlight of the celebration of the 220th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and the 50th anniversary of the victory of World War II, will be the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday afternoon, June 18 through the streets of Charlestown.

The parade is sponsored by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the city of Boston.

Giving the command Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Thomas M. Hickey.

Being Chief Marshal this particular year has a very special meaning for Hickey, as the parade will not only be honoring those who fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill, but also honoring those who served during World War II.

As a member of the U.S. Army, Hickey fought at the Battle of the Bulge. A paratrooper during his stint in the Army, he belonged to a group called the " 509 " and had made many close friends of the men in the group who served in the war together.

Just before the 509 was to go on another mission, Hickey and three other paratroopers were trans ferred to the artillery
group on the Rhine River in Germany. It was there that he and his three friends later learned that the entire 509 had perished.

Married to the former Bridget Veronica Doherty, the couple has three children, MaryEllen, Tom and Brian, as well as six grandchildren. An employee of the Revere Sugar Company until his retirement in 1973, Hic-
key has been an active and enthusiastic member of the Charlestown community his entire life. A former barbershop quartet singer, Hickey has been the premier soloist at St . Francis de Sales Church for many years. It is most often his voice that can be heard at most Charles town services, ceremonies and events.

$\star$ Board Of Appeal Hearings . . . A hearing will be held at noon on Tuesday, June 20 in Room 801 of Boston City Hall on the petition of Claudia A. Hunter to have the roof raised and a dormer installed on a one-family dwelling at 291 Bunker Hill St.
$\star$ District Attorney To Distribute Forfeiture Funds . . . For the third consecutive year, local community groups in Suffolk County can compete for grants under the District Attomey's Forfeiture Reinvestment Program. Applications are now being accepted. "Last year $\$ 25,000$ was divided into five grants," Suffolk County District Attorney Ralph C. Martin II noted.
"This program provides modest reinvestment grants to qualified public service agencies," Martin said. "It's a way of transforming tainted money into funds for community empowerment."

The funds are a percentage of the money and assets seized from drug dealers by the district attomey's office. Martin uses the money to provide awards to programs that treat or prevent drug use among young people. "Directing forfeiture monies toward programs that tum young people away from drugs is part of my ongoing commitment to prioritize youth crime prevention and juvenile justice," added Martin.
Qualified applicants are invited to pick up materials on the sixth floor of the Suffolk County Courthouse, or call Community Relations Director Deborah McDonagh at $725-8640$. Proposals are reviewed by a seven-member resident selection committee appointed by the district attorney. The filing deadline is July 31 .
State legislation provides that up to 10 percent of confiscated funds and proceeds of drug dealer's property sold at auction be awarded to organizations to assist in efforts to eradicate drug sale and use in the neighborhoods.
$\star$ Bunker Hill Street Update . . . Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, announces that there are three possible locations, with appropriate power sources, for the installation of the "prototype" lighting units on Bunker Hill Street.

1) Bunker Hill Street, between Moulton and Vine streets. This location, in

front of the Kent School, provides a fairly open area with power to place several units. In addition, several acorn units are in proximity to this location for comparison. This area provides a neutral site with the best visibility.
2) Bunker Hill Street at St. Martin Street. This area is located adjacent to the Doherty Playground and has closely aligned trees along the proposed lighting area.
3) 247 Bunker Hill St. at Allston Street. Located at the mid-point of Bunker Hill Street, this area is somewhat congested and may not provide the optimum sight lines.
The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Basic Services Committee will meet on this issue soon. Flyers will be distributed and the notice will be published in the Patriot.

夫 HousePainting Grants Extended . . Homeowners who want to take advantage of a new program that will provide house painting grants and summer jobs for teenagers have until June 27 to apply. $\star$ Direction On India Street To Be Reversed ... Beginning Sunday, June 18 , the direction of traffic along the entire length of India Street, which currently runs southeast from State Street to the Surface Artery, will be reversed to run northwest. The Central Artery/Tunnel Project and the city of Boston are making this change in the traffic pattern to ensure that traffic continues to flow smoothly during construction on the new underground Central Artery.

* Atlantic Avenue And The Surface Artery To Become One-Way . . . Over the weekend of June $24-25$, Atlantic Avenue and the Surface Artery will be made into a pair of one-way streets between High Street and State Street. Atlantic Avenue will run one-way northbound. The Surface Artery will run oneway southbound.
Atlantic Avenue will also be one-way northbound from State Street to Cross Street. The Surface Artery will remain a two-way street between State Street and Cross Street. Traffic on Atlantic Avenue northbound headed to the Callahan Tunnel entrance will continue to be directed to the Surface Artery northbound at State Street.

## Charlestown Neighborhood Council June Meeting Focuses On Street Lights, Dogs And Parking On The Dock

The agenda was varied, to say the least, at the June meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council. Members attending the monthly meeting were: Chairman Peter Looney, Billy Galvin, Tom Cunha, Jim Conway, John Dillon, Marty O'Brien, Edna Kelly, Jim Mansfield, Ken Stone, Kate McDonough, Russ Sergeant, Judy Brennan, Mel Stillman and Bill McCabe. Two new members were also seated: Don Haska of Precinct 4 and Bill Wall of Precinct 6.
Public Works Commissioner Joseph Cassazza and Frank O'Brien of that department presented ideas for the upcoming Bunker Hill Street's street lighting improvements. Reconstruction of this area is on hold until residents and the city reach an agreement on the kind of lighting to be installed.
Petitions to the city have been circulating among Bunker Hill Street neighbors requesting gas lamps similar to those installed along Main and Warren streets. However, Cassazza suggested to residents and council members in attendance that they consider imitation gas lamps, which he believed to be safer and easier to maintain. Residents argued that the issue was more about money than safety, that more affluent areas of Charlestown are currently lit by gas lamps.

Cassazza agreed that gas lamps are more costly to install and require more maintenance, however, cost was not the only deciding factor.
"In my opinion as an
engineer, I don't think any place with gas lights are adequately lit," Cassazza said. He went on to explain that the imitation gas lamps looked exactly like the real thing but used electric bulbs instead of gas mantles to produce a cone of light several feet longer along the sidewalk and street.
Cassazza suggested that within two to three weeks Public Works would install prototype imitation lights near an area in Charlestown currently lit by gas lamps for residents' comparison. If residents do not agree, Cassazza said that plans would go back to the drawing board for reconsideration. Acorn lights, such as those in the Training Field, could also be under consideration, he said.

In addition to paying less attention to different areas of Charlestown, residents and council members also expressed their concerns that decisions on lighting not be made without them.

Council Chairman Pe ter Looney wanted Cassazza's assurances that "people will have a say and that people can count on that."
"No decisions have been made, I just want minds to be open," Cassazza said, "I would just like you to try it."

A special meeting on Bunker Hill Street lighting will be scheduled through the council's Basic Services Committee after the prototype lights are placed in Charlestown.
"If your dog does his doodie, do your duty," Looney said as the council
continued an historic tra dition in serving as the public forum for residents disgusted with irresponsible dog owners. The June meeting allowed the coun cil to revisit this neighborhood problem.

The recently formed Charlestown Dog Association presented its request to identify a way to accommodate responsible dog owners who do not want to leash their dogs.
"It's not good for a dog to be constantly leashed," said Mary Walsh. "We are looking for a compromise. Neighbors don't have to be split like Right to Lifers and Pro-Choice."
The subject of roaming dogs in parks has been a long-standing issue for neighbors. Some dog owners disregard city leash and cleanup laws, which neighbors argue present a potential danger and unsanitary conditions for children playing in the parks.

Park Ranger Ethan Beeler explained how the National Park Service has been responding to the problem in its jurisdiction, such as the Bunker Hill Monument grounds.
"We've addressed the increasing concern over loose dogs over the years, and it continues to be a problem," Beeler said. "We have been working on increasing public awareness."

Beeler said that while the problem has not been resolved, it has been greatly reduced. Rangers have been thanking the people who keep their dogs on leashes and clean up after them. Violators have been approached first with fly-
ers asking cooperation, then verbal warnings, official warnings and finally with citations.
"We don't want to scare dog owners away, because most are responsible." Beeler said, "and this has been working because we're not like storm troopers."
The Charlestown Dog Association requested an opportunity to work with the community on identifying solutions for dog owners who want some unleashed time for their animals. Although no agreements were reached at the monthly meeting, the council agreed to consider discussions with these dog owners in the near future.

The council voted to send a letter to the city licensing board requesting that the scheduled June 21 hearing for a daily entertainment license for the Warren Tavern be deferred. The Basic Services Committee also agreed to arrange a meeting with abutters and the tavern's new owners to discuss concerns. That meeting has been set for 8 p.m. on Monday, June 19 at the Mary Colbert Apartments, 20 Devens St.
Residents near the Warren Tavern told the council that they are already unhappy with current conditions at the business. They believe that it is inappropriate for an entertainment license in a residential area and more so by extending existing entertainment hours in an historic building that cannot be soundproofed.
Shipway Place condominium owners in the Navy Yard requested sup-
port from the council to follow up on Shipyard Marina's apparent misuse of 200 feet of public waterfront walkway near Piers 6 and 8.
George Temple, who represented the condominium owners, said that they had not been notified of any change in use before some 50 parking spaces appeared on the walkway. The Marina has also been charging for this additional parking. He said that the Boston Redevelopment Authority had not approved any change in use of this area and neither had the Department of Environmental Protection, which has jurisdiction.
Zoning Committee Chairman Tom Cunha, who has been involved with the Navy Yard's redevelopment since 1986, was shocked.
"I can't believe they're parking on a public walkway and charging for it," Cunha said. "Where'd that money go and how can we get it back for the community."
The council voted unanimously to send a letter to the BRA strongly opposing parking on the walkway. Members also voted to pursue any legal lien for money generated from this parking for the community improvement fund and that the walkway be returned to its original condition.

## Committee Updates

- Public Safety: The committee met on May 9 with Boston Police Officer Bill Smith to discuss resident's complaints about the Boston Police Department's response to incidents around the Edwards

Middle School. Since then an arrest has been made. The police were requested to provide information on moving violations along Warren Street and how they are cracking down on drugs in Charlestown. Cruisers are also paying attention to Tibbetts Town Way because of neighbors' complaints about rowdy teens in the early morning hours.

- Environmental: A May 31 meeting with Massport officials concerning the former Revere Sugar Refinery on Medford Street responded to three primary resident issues: rodent control, air quality and truck routes and traffic. It was reported that no rats have been found at the site, however, two raccoons were removed. Asbestos removal is underway and air quality readings are being done regularly. Hours of operation at the site will be from 7 a.m. to $3: 30$ p.m. to contain truck traffic and 24 hour security is being provided.
- Emergency Fund: It was announced that the first directors of the Community Emergency Fund have been replaced. Mel Stillman will serve as chairman, Maureen McCabe will serve as treasurer and Jacqueline Russell will also serve on the board. Bill McCabe commended Billy Galvin on his legal work for this community benefit program.
The full council will not meet until September. Any emergency business that should occur during the summer will be addressed by the executive committee.

## The Uptown String Band To Appear In Concert At The Bunker Hill Monument On Saturday, June 17

Making its first appearance in Charlestown in celebration of Bunker Hill Day, the Uptown String (Mummers) Band will have a foot-tapping, handclapping good time in store for residents on Saturday, June 17 , beginning at 5 p.m., as this string band from Philadelphia, Penn. presents a concert on Monument Square in front of the Bunker Hill Museum. This concert is sponsored this year by a generous donation of $\$ 2,000$ from the Prins Recycling Corp. It is part of the celebration planned by the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative committee, marking the 220th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and the 50th anniversary of the victory of World War II.

A mummer is defined as "one who goes merrymaking in disguise during festivals." Mummery can be traced back to medieval Europe when men and women would lead festal rites during the Christmas holiday season. History records that when the pioneer Swedes came to this country, they settled in an area known as Tinicum, bringing with them many customs of the old country.

Important among them was the age-old habit of visiting friends the day after Christmas through the first day of the new year. They would travel in bands of men through South Philadelphia engaging in a seres of festivities. This informal celebration continued until Jan. 1, 1901 when the first organized parade was established, and hence, tradition was set.
The Uptown String Band was organized in 1937 by a handful of men interested in performing "Mummers style." It has grown over the years into a well-organized band with over 100 musicians and marshals, and is a family oriented organization with more than 10 father and son combinations. None of the members are professional musicians. All work and do mummery as a hobby.

The Uptown String Band is a very young band (agewise), with the youngest member being 12 , and the senior member 78. Band members relate that they have never missed a New Year's Day Parade in Philadelphia in their 58 years of existence.
Uptown has performed in
many states, and even in Cuba many years ago. The band performs in nursing homes, children's hospitals, homes for the retarded - to name a few - at no charge, raising funds by doing parades, concerts, the yearly "Show of Shows" and selling cassettes and video tapes. This was one of the earlier bands to record mummer tunes and, in 1947, they made a record of "I'm Looking over A Four Leaf Clover," which was a big success, with over one million recordings of that tune being sold. The band is now known as the original "Four Leaf Clover" Band.
The costumes for the band average between $\$ 50,000$ to $\$ 70,000$ a year. The fierce competition in the New Year's Day Parade requires the outstanding costumes, and parade rules require that new costumes be presented to the judges each year. Uptown is one of 23 string bands who participate annually in the parade, along with a multitude of non-musical brigates and clubs. Unlike the Rose Parade and other famous marches, the Mummers' Parade is not commercially sponsored. Competition in the par-
ade is fierce, not so much for the prize money (first prize money of $\$ 7,000$ merely dents the costume bill), but for bragging rights within the proud Mummers community.
This year's theme for Uptown is "Off The Wall With King Tut." The 1995 repertoire for Uptown includes tunes such as "Fanfare To The King," "Fharaoh's Song," "Mr. Sandman" and "You Belong To Me," to name a few.
The costumes are britliant and certainly contributed to the fifth-place finish by the band on New Year's Day and the capturing of third place by Captain Jamie Caldwell.

The Perimeter (Club) suits are the High Priests of Ancient Egypt. Their backpieces are gold falcon wings, the body suits are leopard skin, gold lamé and white satin trimmed in turquoise and gold. The rich apparel of the court of Thebes, The Pit suits and the Royal Guards with an overscaled Egyptian headdress are kilts, tunics and capes embossed in jewels and sequins.
The captain is King Tut whose costume is rich in splendor, bejeweled and

gilded. His backpiece is two Egyptian fans with a golden serpent and the wings of the Royal Falcon. In his hands are the royal "crook" and "flail," the symbols of kingship.

All are welcome to join the Uptown String Band in
concert on Saturday, June 17 at $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. In addition to Saturday afternoon's concert, the string band will strut through the streets of Charlestown during the Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 18.

## NO PUBLIC DRINKING

This city ordinance will be strictly enforced on June 18, the day of the Bunker Hill Day Parade, so that the community may have a pleasant day, a successful parade, and a celebration not marred by any unpleasant incidents.

The program, according to Standing Committee Chairman James W. Conway, past commander of Post 26 and Past National Historian of The American Legion, will begin with an Ecumenical Service at St. Francis de Sales Church, 313 Bunker Hill St. at 10 a.m.
Following the service, the veteran, military, militia and patriotic organizations will assemble outside the church and form a procession. The participants will march to the Bunker Hill Monument grounds to the music of the Colonial Band of

Lawrence for the Patriotic
Exercises, commencing at 11 a.m.

The Monument Orator on this, the 220 th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, will be Col. James P. O'Donnell, USMC, who is currently serving as director of the Requirements Division, Marine Corps Combat Development Command, Quantico, Virginia.

O'Donnell, a native of Charlestown and a graduate of Stonehill College, was commissioned a second lieutenant in November 1970. He has served three tours of duty as an infantry officer in both the First and Second Marine Divisions in numerous command and staff assignments.

His First Marine Division assignments include command of Headquarters Battalion during Operation Desert Storm and command of Battalion Landing Team 1/1. He also served as the Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff
$\mathrm{G} / 3$ in the First Marine Division and as a Platoon Commander, Company Commander and Battalion S-3 in the Second Marine Division.

Among O'Donnell's independent tours of duty are: Commanding Officer, Marine Barracks, Brunswick, Maine; Officer in Charge, Officer Selection Office, Hartford, Connecticut; and Executive Officer, Marine Detachment, USS Oriskany (CVA-34).
