



Helen Lawler Dead At 72

Helen J. (Leahy) Lawler of Saint Martin Street passed away on Wednesday, March 16, following a brief illness. Helen was a patient at Massachusetts General Hospital at the time of her death. She was 72 years of age.

A lifelong resident of Charlestown, Helen was very active in elderly activities up to the time of her death, planning bus trips, social events and weekend outings for Charlestown seniors.

From 1973 to 1983, she worked for the Mayor's Commission on Elderly Affairs as a neighborhood coordinator, helping senior citizens obtain emergency services and referring them to appropriate city services when the need arose. She was extremely helpful to the elderly of Charlestown during the blizzard of 1978.

In 1979, she served as a senior intern for former Speaker of the House Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill at the Annual Congress on Aging in Washington D.C. In 1980, during Charlestown's 350th anniversary jubilee, Helen was selected as Charlestown's Grand Bostonian.

Helen also served on the Mayor's Housing Task Force for the Elderly and the Handicapped, the Mayor's Transportation Task Force for the Elderly and the Mayor's Emergency Transportation Task Force. She also found time to be active in her Parish of Saint Francis de Sales as a member of Court Saint Jude No. 1123 of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas.

Helen attended Charlestown schools, graduating from the High School in 1930. She was a member of the Old Charlestown Schoolgirls Association. It was a rare event when


Uncovered beneath the shingles were four sets of political posters, complete with the candidates' photographs, probably set in place by a political activist of the era, soliciting votes for the Primary Election of November 16, 1905. The two candidates so posted were the Honorable John F. "Honey Fitz" Fitzgerald, seeking election as Mayor, and Edward L. Cauley, running for Alderman.

The building has housed a convenience store on the first floor for many years, while the upper floors have remained unoccupied since the building was severely damaged by fire in the mid 1970's. According to O'Donnell, who is the owner of the building, the structure is being renovated with three stores on the first floor and eight apartments


CHARLESTOWN HEADSTART FIRE FUND

Questions have been raised as to the exact total of the Fire Fund. The answer is not too encouraging. As of this date, there is a total of \$18,076.30 towards a community goal of \$100,000.

The \$100,000 is only a portion of the \$500,000 total required to rebuild the facility at the Old Kent School in order to open the doors once more for the Charlestown Headstart Program. The Charlestown Headstart Fire Fund Committee is making a plea to each business, organization and individual to join in the enormous project to raise these funds.

The building, which was owned by the City at the time of the fire, was not insured. Donations are being sought and the help of all is needed. Donations in any amount are welcome - no contribution is too large or too small. New Lighting To Be Installed In Harvard Mall

by Kathy Giordano On Wednesday, March 16th, the Friends of the Harvard Mall met with Boston City Councillor Robert Travaglini to discuss the replacement of twentysix street lights in the Harvard Mall. The group told Travaglini of their months of struggle to have the City replace the original lighting that had been removed and placed elsewhere in the City. Their desire to have these original lights replaced rather than have a temporary lighting system installed was expressed as was their fear that "nothing is more permanent than something temporary."

The fact that the City budget for this year had included funds for park improvements inspired the group to seek the estimated \$15,000 it would take to have the lighting replaced.

Councillor Travaglini addressed the concerns of these area residents to have proper lighting installed in the Mall for public safety and better use of the Mall at night. He stated that he felt the amount requested for the replacement of these lights was "economically feasible." "I feel confident

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we'll get what you are asking for," he continued. "This is the smallest request for repairs in any park that the City has received."

Travaglini stated that the Commissioners of Public Works and Parks and Recreation would meet on Friday, March 18th to discuss the matter.

Following that City Hall meeting, a spokesperson for Councillor Travaglini announced to the **Patriot** that funding was approved for the installation of the original street lighting for the John Harvard Mall. A date has not yet been set as to when work will begin, but Travaglini has assured the residents that his office will keep pressuring the Public Works Department to establish a time frame for the completion of this work.







In an effort to deal more effectively with the ongoing mitigation process between the community and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MW-RA), residents gathered on Monday evening, March 21 at the Kent Community School to share ideas and concerns regarding the potential problems and possible solutions as the time draws near for MWRA to occupy the former Revere Sugar site as an equipment transfer facility.

Mitigation Committee Chairman Moe Gillen stated that the residents should be working as a team to first define the issues and then determine what the community should receive from the MWRA as mitigation measures. He said that he hopes to keep the regularly scheduled MWRA mitigation meetings "succinct and concise," and to include "questions . . . not conversations."

Gillen encouraged the residents to speak out on their concerns and suggestions — and speak out they did. Among the issues raised were noise abatement measures, including the soundproofing of homes, a dedicated service road, rail transportation, additional police and fire protection, jobs and a grant to benefit community organizations.

Resident Bill Galvin pointed out that in mitigation agreements between MWRA and Winthrop and Quincy, monies went directly to those communities. He said that such an arrangement would have to be different with Charlestown since it is part of the City of Boston.

Later in the meeting, Galvin noted that Charlestown has been dumped on for many years and now the community may have an opportunity to get something in return.

The issue of residential involvement in this process was raised. One resident questioned the advisibility of holding the mitigation meetings in the MWRA Offices in the Navy Yard, an area with limited accessibility. She suggested the possibility of utilizing a hall, such as the one at Saint Francis de Sales Church, Fran Southern said that she was surprised that there were so few in attendance from that neighborhood. Dennis McLaughlin suggested that the subject of a meeting location be addressed at the next mitigation meeting.

Jim Walsh, District Representative for Congressman Joe Kennedy, stated that he has the perception that the subject has been widely reported in the media and he senses that people feel that they don't have to attend to know what is going on and also, people tend to leave the fight to a few. Walsh added that he would like to see more people involved and that it might be worth an appeal to Father Dan Mahoney at Saint Francis for use of his church hall.

Walsh stated that many persons are not concerned with a problem unless they live in that particular area. He referred to the opposition to a proposed asphalt plant in the City Square area that arose some four years ago, noting that even though the plant was essentially a City Square, Harvard Street and Washington Street fight, the whole town was involved.

Walsh cautioned the residents that if there is any perception on the part of MWRA that the town is not united, they may "try to get away with things."

Area resident Karen Konuch expressed her desire to remove the truck traffic from Medford Street, possibly to a dedicated access road. She said that she was concerned as to whether Charlestown was receiving a "deaf ear" from MWRA and Massport. She stated that she wants her voice heard, adding that it has to be a "community voice."

McLaughlin stated that the community can't seem to get MWRA and Massport together at the same time on a "high staff level." He pointed out that if one authority sends "high staff" to a meeting, the other

sends community liaisons ... and vice versa.

In referring to a letter from Massport's Executive Director Dave Davis to the Neighborhood Council in which he stated that he didn't consider Massport a partner in the mitigation process, McLaughlin stated that he didn't know how the community could work out an agreement with MWRA without Massport's involvement.

Massport's master plan for the expansion of Moran Terminal and their access to the waterfront were issues raised by Bob Konuch. He stated that Massport should show the community these plans, noting the impact of these trucks on Medford Street.

Bob Wallace stated that the community has got to become more militant, even suggesting the residents walk out of a meeting if the request for certain requests are not met, letting the authority and the Boston newspapers know the reason why. He commented that militancy has become a "dead issue" in Charlestown. Wallace related the success of the militant acts by the community in defeating the proposed asphalt plant and retaining Engine 50.

The meeting turned to a discussion on obtaining land along the railroad tracks, running parallel to Medford Street, to build a dedicated access road to alleviate truck traffic. Walsh suggested that an independent legal counsel investigate on behalf of the community whether MWRA "start-up" monies could be directed toward the leasing of land for this purpose. He pointed out that MWRA was leasing, not purchasing the Revere Sugar site.

Resident Ron Taylor suggested requesting companies along the proposed access road donate the land or sell it to the City at a reasonable price, adding that Massport owns 70 percent of that land. He stated that they will benefit from the road in 10 years. He said that labor should also be fighting for the road as the Teamsters and the ILA would benefit.

Residents Meet To Share Concerns

On MWRA Mitigation Issues

Ed Connolly from the ILA agreed with the need for an access road. He stated that the area along the tracks from the Sullivan Square fire station to the Mathews Company is too narrow for a two-lane roadway. Connolly added that the area from Revere Sugar to Terminal Street could be paved quickly, with traffic then being directed from Terminal Street over the Little Mystic onto Chelsea Street. He added that he didn't want to see the cost of the road as part of the mitigation.

McLaughlin said that MWRA would be in operation before a road could be built and he felt that an interim solution of re-routing traffic should be considered. There was also some questions as to methods of halting truck traffic completely on Medford Street. Joe Kent said that the

traffic should be directed out to City Square. Although John Lynch expressed concern that the road going out into Sullivan Square might make the Ryan Playground dangerous, he questioned the interference between the truck traffic and the work on the CANA project in City Square.

Walsh asked whether this question should be brought back to the Massachusetts Department of Public Works.

One resident questioned the suggestion of an access road directing traffic into a deadend in City Square. She noted that the present completion date of the CANA project is 1994, well toward the peak of truck traffic by MWRA.

Ken Stone, Co-Chairman of the North Area Task Force, stated that access through City Square could be very difficult throughout the span of the CANA project. He said that Phase One will commence in 1990 with Chelsea Street becoming a dead end at Park and Warren. Streets. Gillen pointed out that MWRA trucks would increase in number each year from 1990. Stone also agreed that the delay in the completion of the CANA project appeared to be a valid reason for the selection of the Revere Sugar site over the originally proposed Piers 48, 49 and 50.

Galvin said that the community should determine specific, objective, reasonable requests as part of the mitigation —things that are needed in the community that are not funded by the government. One of his suggestions was the establishment of a community fund that would be administered by a community board and another was a nursing home in the town.

The issue of jobs within the MWRA project became the object of an heated exchange between union members and Galvin. On one hand, ILA's Ed Connolly related that loss of union jobs on the waterfront over the past few years and the impact this has had on their membership.

Galvin countered, stating that he wants future jobs for Charlestown people. He noted that given a choice between a job for a Charlestown resident or a member of the ILA from outside the community, he would have to go with the Charlestown resident. He also warned Connolly that if he (continued on page 18)

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

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
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Charlestown Youth Hockey News





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
Crusaders "Man-ly Cup" Champs!





They formed their own regiment calling themselves the "Royal Irish Troops." A young Sergeant by the name of Patrick Richardson from Cork took command and was the first to go over the hill. Another Irish hero was General John O'Neil from County Monaghan.







went outside of Charlestown to fill jobs, then it should not be used as mitigation for Charlestown.

Gillen stated that whether the ILA gets jobs is a jurisdictional issue with the union and MWRA.

Walsh announced that Guilford Transportation (GTI) had accepted an invitation to attend the next mitigation meeting to speak on rail transportation to the MWRA site. He suggested residents consider what is feasible, noting labor, equipment, route and the ability to deliver the supplies with a minimum number of transfers. Walsh also recommended that residents look at what GTI can and cannot do in servicing MW-RA, taking into account that the concept may be feasible, but GTI might not

be the best vendor.

Several residents stated the difficulty in determining priorities and developing realistic objectives. Gillen advised each individual to devise their own list and discussions would be held at subsequent residential meetings. He also stated that a representative from the Winthrop mitigation committee was willing to attend an upcoming meeting. ****

MEDICAL STUDENTS AT THE MGH - BUNKER HILL HEALTH CENTER

The MGH-Bunker Hill Health Center performs the important task of training medical students so that they will become the doctors of tomorrow. These students, primarily from the Harvard Medical School, work under the supervision of Staff doctors at the Health Center. We hope that they gain from this experience not only increased medical skills and knowledge but also an interest in making a career in providing the kind of high quality community care that the Health Center strives to give.

Both patients and students benefit from their contact at the Health Center. A physical examination done by a medical student, after approval by the patient, includes a very thorough medical history (discussion with the patient of the current and past health) and a thorough physical examination. The student then discusses the history and physical examination with a staff physician, who sees the patient and double checks the results of the examination. The staff physician then decides on any tests or treatment that may be needed.

Some commonly asked questions about the medical student teaching program at the Bunker Hill Health Center are:

Q: Do the medical students know what they are doing?

A: They are well-trained. However, since they do not yet have the knowledge or experience of a physician in practice they are closely supervised by one of the staff physicians, and all decisions are made by the staff physician.

Q: What happens to me when the student leaves?

A: Most students are at the Health Center for only one month. The supervising physician continues to see you whenever needed. In other words, during and after the student's time at the Health Center the staff physician is available as your doctor.

Q: How will I know if I am seeing a medical student? A: You will never see a student without being told. and you always have the right to refuse to see a student.

Q: How do I benefit from this?


A: In most cases, you would get an appointment for a full examination sooner than would be possible otherwise. Importantly, the student will be able to devote considerable time to your needs, and this thorough evaluation will continue to be helpful to you over the vears to come.


Of course, you would also have the satisfaction of having helped in the training of a future doctor. Q: How about the cost?

A: Like all visits to doctors at the Bunker Hill Health Center, you would be charged by the Massachusetts General Hospital according to the amount of time the doctor spends on your care (not according to the time spent by the student). Usually, you would be charged less than you would for such a complete exam by the staff physician alone.

Q: Are there any drawbacks?

A: Only that if you make an appointment for a complete examination by a medical student, you should expect to spend the whole morning at the Health Center, to allow time for the medical history, physical examination and review of your case by the staff physician. This is time well spent, but some people may simply not have that much time available. You can also see a medical student if you don't want a complete physical examination, but just a more limited evaluation of a specific problem.

We believe that the medical student teaching program at the Bunker Hill Health Center provides an excellent opportunity for patients, as well as for the students. It also stimulates the staff of the Health Center to keep up-to-date on medical science and new approaches to patient's problems.



Main And Common Street Proposals On Agenda For March 29th Meeting


The Housing and Development Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council has re-scheduled their meeting, originally slated for March 22, to Tuesday, March 29 at 7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

The committee will review the proposal by Navid Realty Trust to construct four two-bedroom condominiums with four parking spaces on a 2,446 square foot parcel at 23-24 Common Street. The plans were originally presented at a community meeting on

Area residents voiced their opposition to this proposal at a February 23rd

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meeting and subsequently formulated guidelines they felt should be considered by the developer. These guidelines were then forwarded to Neighborhood Council Chairman Dennis Mc-Laughlin.

The developers requested and were granted a deferral by the Board of Appeal at a March 1st hearing.
