Elderly Woman Dies In One-Alarm Fire

A one-alarm fire at 83 Dunstable St. took the life of a 69-year-old Charlestown woman on Tuesday, Feb. 12. Mary Sanborn was pronounced dead at the scene, according to Boston Fire Department officials. The fire alarm was sounded at 6:09 p.m.

The fire started in the living room of the two-story townhouse located in Mishawum Park, off Main Street. According to Fire Lt. Richard Powers, the cause of the blaze is under investigation. Attached units in the housing complex received minor smoke and water damage. Powers stated. Investigators at the scene estimated the damage at \$20,000.

One firefighter was taken to the hospital, treated for

CANA Project Approaches 40 Percent Completion

Vehicular and pedestrian traffic will be redirected around the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project excavation site in City

Square starting Feb. 19. Appropriate signs and detail police officers will guide commuters and walkers through the construction area.

Outbound vehicle traffic on Rutherford Avenue will be moved from its present location to a newly constructed Rutherford Avenue, moving traffic from City Square to the new North Washington Street Bridge and the new Rutherford Avenue now built over the tunnel running under Chelsea Street.

Pedestrians will follow the enclosed barrier walkways from the North Washington Street Bridge. These walkways will be marked with the red Freedom Trail stripe. They will lead pedestrians in two directions. The first route will lead walkers onto Water Street

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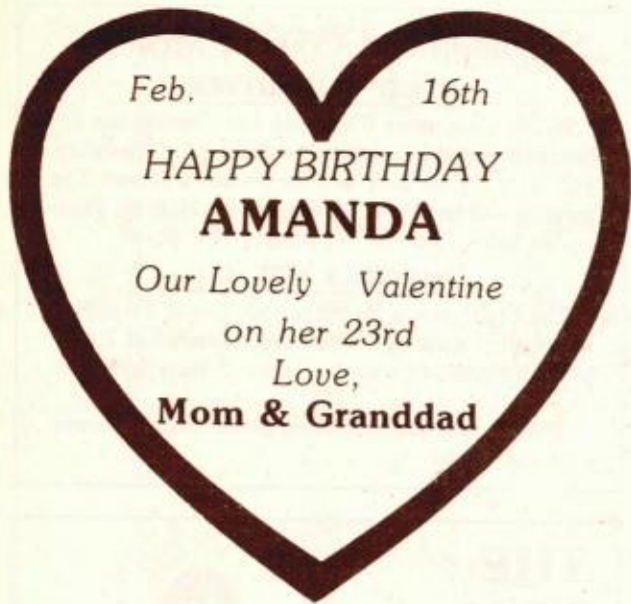

**MWRA Valve Testing May Cause
Low Pressure And Rusty Water**

The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority has announced that its Waterworks Division will be testing pressure-reduction valves at Shaft 8 in Brighton, from now through Feb. 22. The testing may affect areas in Charlestown, causing low pressure and rusty water.

"These valves must be operational in the case of any emergency in the system," said William A. Brusch, director of the MWRA Waterworks Division. "Testing them period-

ically is extremely important."

Testing includes turning of the valves, shutting down sections of water mains, turning on blow-off valves to dewater parts of the water mains and chlorinating the mains.

The turning and switching of the valves may cause rusty water and loss of pressure at Perkins Street at the Somerville line and on Broadway at the Somerville line.

"Rusty water does not create a health hazard," Brusch said.

MWRA crews are working closely with community officials to coordinate the project and supply police details when necessary.

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Charlestown Man Pleads Guilty To Armed Robbery

Joseph Porter, 19, of Charlestown, was sentenced on Feb. 7 in Suffolk Superior Court on charges of armed robbery while masked, assault with intent to murder, assault and battery by means of a dangerous weapon, two counts of assault with a dangerous weapon and the unlawful carrying of a firearm.

The Boston Police reported that on Sept. 23, 1990, the defendant entered Newtowne Market on Medford Street in Charlestown brandishing a handgun and wearing a mask. Porter allegedly held the gun to the store owner's head and demanded the owner open the

safe. Porter pulled the trigger and the gun misfired twice. The defendant demanded the owner's sister, who was behind the counter, open the register and give him money. The register, however, jammed and she gave him \$7 in cash from Lottery ticket proceeds instead. The defendant ran out of the store, turned and fired a number of shots inside the store. One bullet struck the store owner's father and the bullet exploded on impact in his face. The victim underwent emergency surgery at Mass. General Hospital and survived the incident.

The police arrested the

defendant at his apartment on Starr King Court. The police removed several other firearms from the apartment as well as a large supply of handgun ammunition.

Superior Court Judge Sandra Hamlin sentenced

the defendant to 15 to 30 years at M.C.I. Cedar Junction. Assistant District Attorney Paul Connolly represented the Commonwealth.

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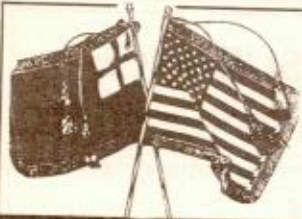

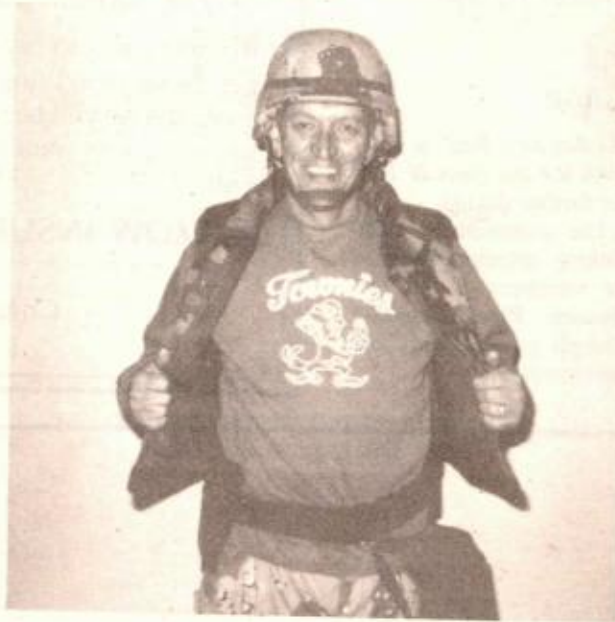


O'Toole On Duty In Saudi Arabia

(continued from page one) toward the Charlestown Navy Yard or onto the Gray Street overpass to Park and Henley streets. The second route will cross over the excavation site into City Square ending opposite Roughan's Hall at Park Street.

CANA Coordinator Ed Barr announced that Chamber Street will be closed for a period of three to four days while portions of the remainder of the North

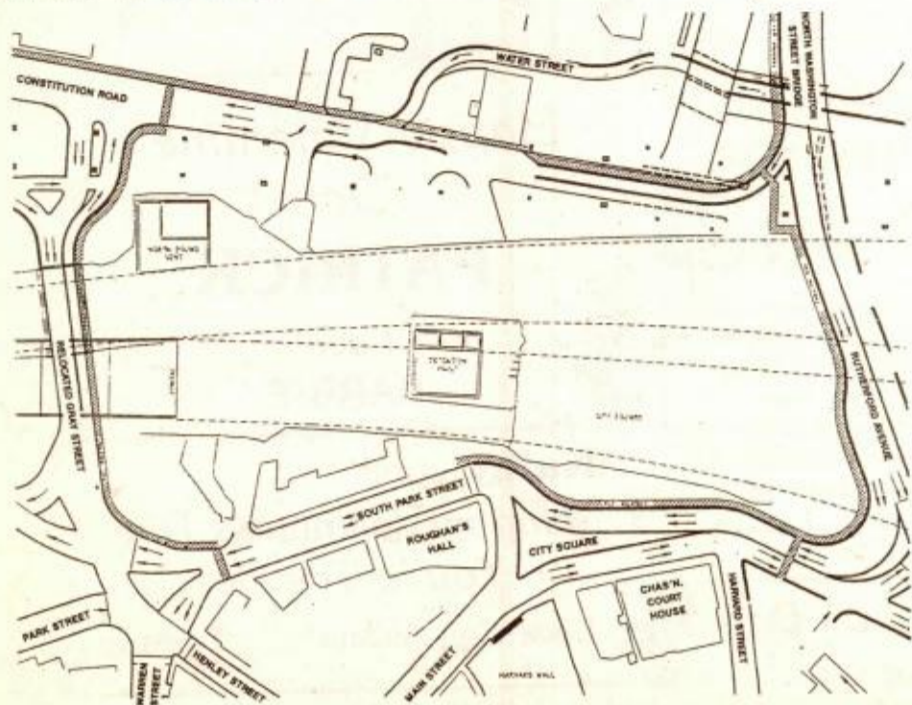
Washington Street Bridge are removed.

As this portion of the project progresses, the elimination of public parking in City Square will be necessary, Barr stated. He also said that the project is on schedule, with 40 percent of the tunnel work completed.

This information was announced at a CANA community meeting on Feb. 6. Community attendance at this meeting was extremely low and as a result, North

Area Task Force co-chairman Ken Stone requested a change in location for any future meetings. Residents also requested that Henley Street be cleaned of debris, and that the newly planted trees on Rutherford Avenue which have died be replaced.

Barr stated that these requests would be taken care of as part of an ongoing working relationship between the project and the community.

Many times we are told that there are other young men from the community who are stationed in the Gulf as part of Operation Desert Storm, but the person telling us has no other information than the news that they are there. 'Your Forehead Is Smudged'

Yesterday, many people were seen walking with what seemed like a black smudge on their forehead. The apparent smudge was a meaningful sign and symbol of the Catholic Church. It was a cross made of ashes placed on the forehead of the parishioner with the admonition: "Remember that you are dust and into dust you shall return" (Gn. 3:19). This ancient writ of the Catholic Church is centuries old. It marks the beginning of the Lenten season, the 40 days preceding Easter. Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and penance. The church, aware of our human weaknesses, sets aside every year a time for self discipline and mastery over the appetites of our body.

The act of doing penance for sins and human weaknesses is found in a theme running through the Old and the New Testament. In the Book of Jonah, written about the fifth century BC, the prophet Jonah is sent by God to warn the peo-

ple of Nineveh: "Forty days more and Nineveh will be destroyed." When the people of the great city heard this, from the king to the lowest subject, they all put on sackcloth and ashes as a sign of repentance and they did not eat or drink for 40 days. The Lord was moved by their penitence and the city was spared (Jonah 3:10).

It is in the same spirit of repentance and atonement that Catholics enter the 40 days of lent in a spirit of prayer, fasting and penance. In order to atone for past sins, their own and those of the community, during these 40 days many Catholics abstain from meat on Wednesday and Friday, abstain from alcoholic drinks, give up sweets and desserts. The church recognizes these acts of penance but encourages more positive acts such as daily attendance at Mass, visiting the sick, donating food and clothing to the poor, volunteering to assist in some worthy community projects and family prayer.

Through the pages of history, it seems that all of the great wars were an aftermath of periods of social decadence and immorality. Great disasters seemed, almost, to be divine retribution for abandoning the Judaeo-Christian moral code and adopting a Hedonistic code. In the story of the twin cities, Sodom and Gomorrah, immorality was rampant.

Birmingham Calls For Restoration Of Home Care Funds

Sen. Tom Birmingham delivered a letter to Gov. William F. Weld this week expressing his grave concern over the governor's proposal to cut \$5 million from home care for the elderly.

Birmingham told the governor: "As a member of the Human Services and Elderly Affairs Committee. I must take exception to your planned reductions. I have received scores of phone calls from constituents who fear that if these cuts are realized, they will lose their independence and be unnecessarily consigned to nursing homes. Not only would this represent a false

economy, it would also constitute poor social policy. Those who would be most affected by the proposed cuts are presently able to live normal and productive lives with only a minimum of state support to assist them in carrying out everyday chores."

Birmingham went on to say that state government must answer some hard questions in the days ahead, adding that there will not be easy answers but there are wrong answers. "Balancing the budget on the backs of the needy and deserving seniors is not the answer to our state's problems," concluded Birmingham.

Abraham pleaded with Yaweh to spare the city of Sodom for the sake of even a few righteous men who might dwell there (Gn. 18:20-33). When the two messengers for Yaweh were assaulted in an unnatural way by the men of Sodom, the cities were doomed. Lot and his wife were warned to leave the city and both Sodom and Gomorrah were destroyed by a rain of fire and sulfur (Gn. 19:24). The citizens of Nineveh heard the voice of the prophet Jonah and repented. The citizens of Sodom and Gomorrah harkened not to the

voice of the Lord and they were destroyed. Catholics today enter the first week of lent aware that our nation has in many ways turned away from God in the last several decades. The cities of America today have become cesspools of vice and corruption. A walk along 42nd Street in New York City between 7th and 8th Avenue will expose a person to every kind of solicitation from drugs, to male and female prostitution to pornographic movie houses — all functioning under the aegis of freedom of speech and freedom of expression.

The newspapers of our cities, as of this very writing, are narrating stories of children murdering their parents, wives and husbands executing their spouses and, last year, one million six hundred thousand mothers gave the death sentence to their own flesh and blood by choosing abortion. roughshod over all of the Commandments that we wonder for our future.

Hopefully, the prayers and penances of many Americans this Lenten season will awaken in us the spirit of repentance and atonement for our own personal sins and those of our nation. Perhaps God will hear our voices and observe our penances and hopefully God will look upon us as He looked upon Nineveh rather than the manner that He looked upon Sodom and Gomorrah.
