

Elderly Woman Dies In One-Alarm Fire

A one-alarm fire at 83 Dunstable St. took the life of a 69 -year-old Charlestown woman on Tuesday, Feb. 12. Mary Sanborn was pronounced dead at the scene, according to Boston Fire Department officials. The fire alarm was sound ed at 6:09 p.m.
The fire started in the liv ing room of the two-story townhouse located in Mishawum Park, off Main Street. According to Fire Lt. Richard Powers, the cause of the blaze is under investigation. Attached units in the housing complex received minor smoke and water damage, Powers stated. Investigators at the scene estimated the damage at $\$ 20,000$.
One firefighter was taken to the hospital, treated for

MWRA Valve Testing May Cause Low Pressure And Rusty Water


The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority has announced that its Waterworks Division will be testing pressure-reduction valves at Shaft 8 in Brighton, from now through Feb. 22 . The testing may affect areas in Charlestown, causing low pressure and rusty water.
"These valves must be operational in the case of any emergency in the system," said William A. Brutsch, director of the MWRA Waterworks Division. "Testing them period-

ically is extremely important."

Testing includes turning of the valves, shutting down sections of water mains, turning on blow-off valves to dewater parts of the water mains and chlorinating the mains.
The turning and switching of the valves may cause rusty water and loss of pressure at Perkins Street at the Somerville line and on Broadway at the Somerville line.
"Rusty water does not create a health hazard," Brutsch said.

MWRA crews are working closely with community officials to coordinate the project and supply police details when necessary.

## Charlestown Man Pleads Guilty

## To Armed Robbery

Joseph Porter, 19, of Charlestown, was sentenced on Feb. 7 in Suffolk Superior Court on charges of armed robbery while masked, assault with intent to murder, assault and battery by means of a dangerous weapon, two counts of assault with a dangerous weapon and the unlawful carrypon and the unlaw
ing of a firearm.
ing of a firearm.
The Boston Police reported that on Sept. 23, 1990, the defendant entered Newtowne Market on Medford Street in Charlestown brandishing a handgun and wearing a mask. Porter allegedly held the gun to the store owner's head and demanded the owner open the
safe. Porter pulled the trigger and the gun misfired twice. The defendant demanded the owner's sister, who was behind the counter, open the register and give him money. The register, however, jammed and she gave him $\$ 7$ in cash from Lottery ticket proceeds instead. The defendant ran out of the store dant ran out of the store turned and fired a number of shots inside the store. One bullet struck the store owner's father and the bullet exploded on impact in his face. The victim underwent emergency surgery at Mass. General Hospital and survived the incident.
The police arrested th
defendant at his apartment on Starr King Court. The police removed several other firearms from the apartment as well as a large supply of handgun ammunition.
Superior Court Judge Sandra Hamlin sentenced
the defendant to 15 to 30 years at M.C.I. Cedar Junction. Assistant District Attorney Paul Connolly represented the Commonwealth.

ple of Nineveh: "Forty days more and Nineveh will be destroyed." When the people of the great city heard this, from the king to the lowest subject, they all put on sackeloth and ashes as a sign of repentance and they did not eat or drink for 40 days. The Lord was moved by their penitence and the city was spared (Jonah 3:10).
It is in the same spirit of repentance and atonement that Catholics enter the 40 days of lent in a spirit of prayer, fasting and penance. In order to atone for past sins, their own and those of the community, during these 40 days many Catholics abstain from meat on Wednesday and Friday, abstain from alcoholic drinks, give up sweets and desserts. The church recognizes these acts of penance but encourages more positive acts such as daily attendance at Mass, visiting the sick, donating food and clothing to the poor, volunteering to assist in some worthy community projects and family prayer.
Through the pages of history, it seems that all of the great wars were an aftermath of periods of social decadence and immorality. Great disasters seemed, almost, to be divine retribution for abandoning the Judaeo-Christian moral code and adopting a Hedonistic code. In the story of the twin cities, Sodom and Gomorrah, immorality was rampant. (continued on page 18)

Birmingham Calls For Restoration Of Home Care Funds

Sen. Tom Birmingham delivered a letter to Gov. William F. Weld this week expressing his grave concern over the governor's proposal to cut $\$ 5$ million from home care for the elderly.

Birmingham told the governor: "As a member of the Human Services and Elderly Affairs Committee. I must take exception to your planned reductions. I have received scores of phone calls from constituents who fear that if these cuts are realized, they will lose their independence and be unnecessarily consigned to nursing homes. Not only would this represent a false
economy, it would also constitute poor social policy. Those who would be most affected by the proposed cuts are presently able to live normal and productive lives with only a minimum of state support to assist them in carrying out everyday chores."
Birmingham went on to say that state governmen must answer some hard questions in the days ahead, adding that there will not be easy answers but there are wrong answers. "Balancing the budget on the backs of the needy and deserving seniors is not the answer to our state's problems," concluded Birmingham.
