Lions Club Helps Rumanian Teen Receive Sight-Saving Surgery

The Charlestown Lions Club recently received a request from Beth Beaumont, R.N., director of nurses for the Mass. General Hospital Satellite Health Clinics, for assistance in bringing a 17-year-old Rumanian girl to the United States for sight-saving surgery.

"Nobody's Children," an organization that assists children without parents around the world who are in need of medical attention, had contacted Beaumont and had all the medical assistance in place, but they needed help in transportation costs.

The Charlestown Lions Club agreed to help and committed itself to round-trip transportation costs.

This project was brought to the attention of other Lions Clubs in the immediate area at a meeting in Braintree and before the night was over, 20 clubs had pledged to help out. The club not only reached the airfare costs of \$600, but had a surplus of \$250 which was donated to The Mass. District Governor's Lions Emergency Fund

When this project became public at the Lions October dance, several organizations and individuals offered help but the help wasn't necessary. These offers prove once again what a great community Charlestown really is and displays the caring and generosity of our peo-

In late September, Victoria Ocunshi from Constantza Rumania was operated on and treated by a volunteer medical staff from Ophthalmic Consultants of Boston for corneal and retinal problems and she returned in the middle of the month with 20/20 vision corrected with glasses after being virtually

sightless and facing permanent loss of sight.

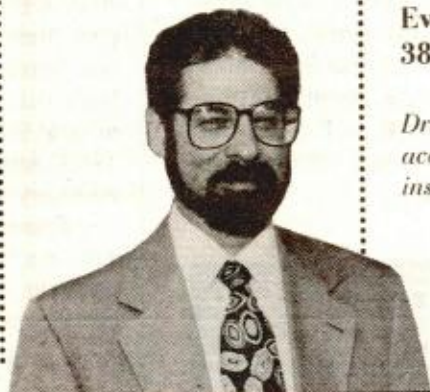

Kelly Gay Selected As 'Woman Of The Year' By Boston Network For Women

Sixth District Governor's Councillor Dorothy Kelly Gay has been selected as the 1994 Woman of the Year by the Board of Directors of the Boston Network for Women in Politics and Government at the John W. McCormack Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Mass. at Boston.

The Network honors a woman each year who has made an outstanding contribution to public service in Mass. Julia Ketterer, executive director, said: "The Board of Directors was especially impressed with the work Councillor Gay did in helping to bring AIDS Education into the Somerville school system when she was on the school committee there, and in influencing the Governor's Council to commute the life sentences for two of the Framingham

Eight, battered women who killed their abusive boyfriends while defending themselves." Kelly Gay will be the guest of honor at the Woman of the Year Award dinner on Dec. 7.

Gay has also been very active on a variety of matters during the current session of the Governor's Council. She was co-chairperson of a committee with Fifth District Councillor Edward Carroll of Lynn, that studied the process for all financial payments made by the state with council approval. Elizabeth Kilcoyne, deputy state comptroller, declared: "Gay's support made it possible to change a 70-year-old accounting procedure and save \$5 million a year."

Every week, Gay checks all extra work orders by state departments for contracts in advance of the council's meetings to make sure that they are

appropriate and in proper form. She has also worked with the Secretary of State's office to update regulations concerning qualifications and utilization of Justices of the Peace and to improve application forms for Notaries Public.

Kelly Gay recently has made proposals to increase the independence of the council during the coming term. She would like the Governor's Council to have a "separate, but equal" budget and office from that currently within the Governor's office, and new television coverage of important hearings and meetings. Gay believes these measures will ensure that the council more effectively represents the concerns of the citizens of the commonwealth and not the special interests on Beacon Hill.

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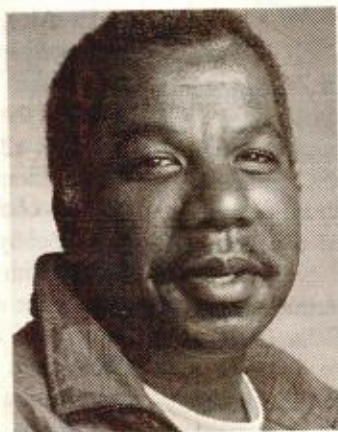

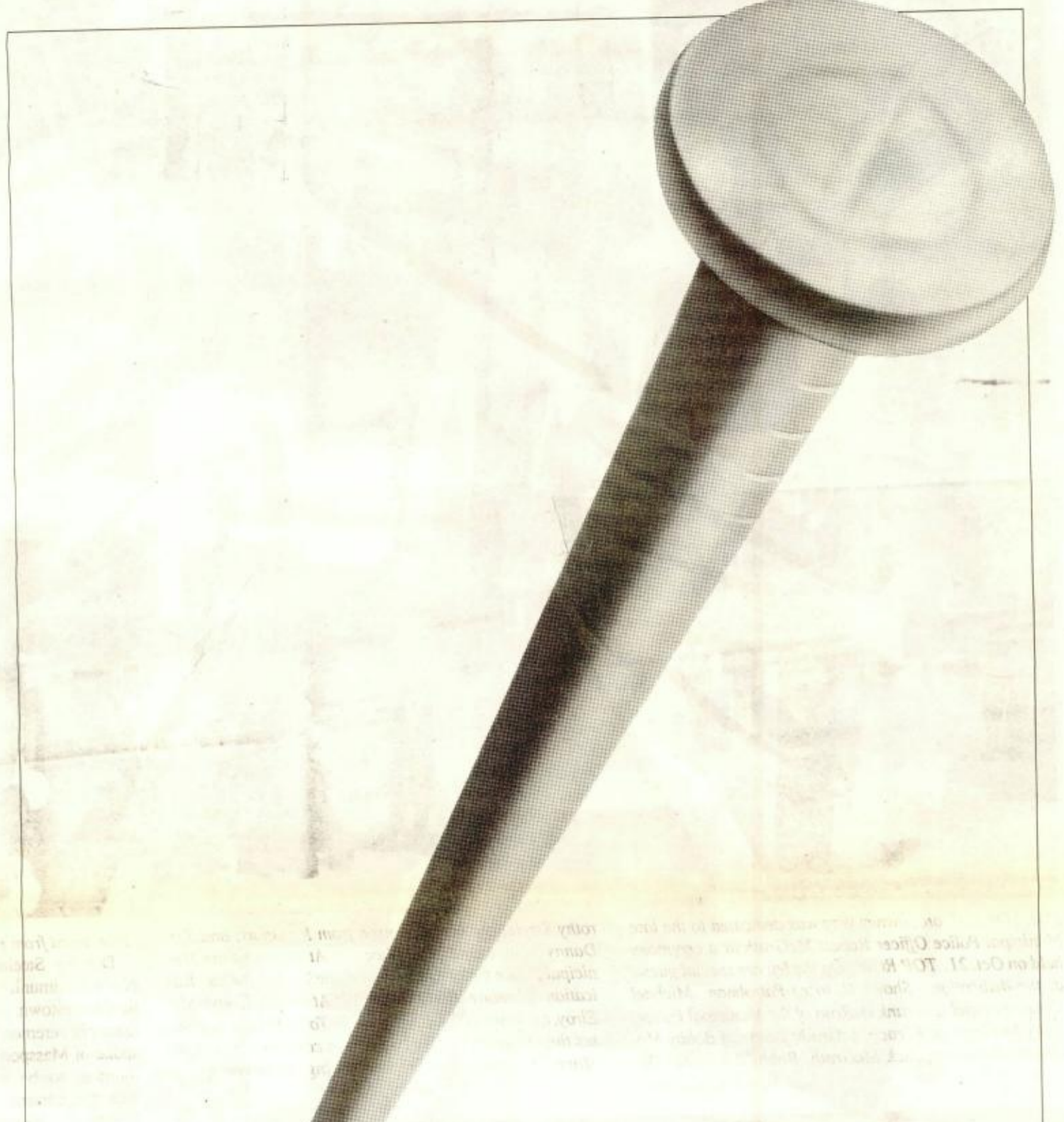

Twenty-four Charities Benefit From Voke Celebration

The Knights of Columbus Hall was standing room only on Oct. 21 as Rep. Richard A. Voke, House Majority Leader, sponsored his fourth annual Charlestown Charities Night. Family members, friends and supporters of Voke were joined by members of the Massachusetts Legislature, several other elected and appointed state officials and candidates for public office for an evening of music and dancing.

Music by Andy Healy and his Country Roads Band kept the dance floor filled to capacity throughout the evening. A performance by members of the Green School of Irish Step Dancing brought an enthusiastic round of applause from the gathering.

Also, Tom Hickey took the microphone for a couple of rousing tunes as his children at the back of the hall held a cellular phone so his wife could hear the performance from their Belmont Street home.

John "Sugar" Whelan acted as master of ceremonies, introducing the guest

of honor and a number of the visiting dignitaries. Whelan called the event a "unique party," noting that people are usually asked to bring money to such a gathering. For this event, the cost is just \$2 per person and the money raised is turned back to organizations in the community.

Whelan did make a plea to those present to vote NO on ballot question 4 in the upcoming State Election. He noted that the passage of that referendum would limit the term of office to eight years and "that would not be good for us." Voke has served now for 14 years and, Whelan added, "we couldn't find a representative to serve this community as Voke has done."

Whelan traced many of Voke's accomplishments in the past 14 years as though he was marching in the Bunker Hill Day Parade. He told the audience to look at the many facelifts along the route, starting with the Head Start facility in Hayes Square. The next stop was the Bunker Hill Housing Development which is un-

dergoing extensive renovation and where Voke has worked hand-in-hand with the tenants.

Whelan spoke about plans for the repair of Bunker Hill Street and Voke's work with the city on renovations to the Doherty Park. The next stop was Sullivan Square where the representative secured an ambulance and its depot, and then it was the Golden Age Center on Main Street and his concern for the elderly.

The MDC Skating Rink was the next stop with millions of dollars being invested in the facility because Voke saw the money was in the state budget and, at the end of the parade route, the Kennedy Center on Winthrop Street. Whelan stated: "He supports all the residents of this community."

In introducing Voke to his friends, Whelan said that "in a few years to come, we may be addressing Richard Voke as Mr. Speaker."

Voke commented on the "great crowd," noting that it gets larger each year. In referring to his 14-year tenure as representative, Voke said

at the outset, his motto was "give a young man a chance and now it is there is no substitute for experience."

Voke spoke about the deep commitment that is demonstrated by the people of Charlestown. He said that in the past three years, there has been no more than 14 local charities asking for assistance from this annual drawing, but this year there are 24 seeking help.

Voke said that this interest and concern "shows the real fabric of this community" where scholarship funds are set up and other organizations are working for the good of the residents. He added that this community is where you may see four generations living and working together.

Voke then called on eight residents to draw the names of the charities that would realize the extra prize money in this year's drawing. The awards were as follows: Rita Sullivan drew the \$300 prize for the James F. Donovan Scholarship Fund; Marty O'Brien Sr. drew \$275 for Friends of Camp Bunker Hill; St. Ca-

therine's Color Guard received \$250 from the drawing by Bud Coleman; \$225 will go to Life Focus Center, drawn by Edna Kelly; Kitty Donovan drew the \$200 prize for the Bunker Hill Tenants Task Force; Mary MacInnes drew \$175 for Celebrate Our Children; \$150 will go to the Friends of the Clougherty Pool, drawn by Pat Harty; and Jim Doherty drew the \$125 prize for the Charlestown Healthy Aging Program.

Each other organization that submitted a letter of request will receive a check for \$75. MONITORING CASH FLOW IN YOUR BUSINESS - PART 2

In Part 1, we outlined the three areas of cash-flow management - speeding cash inflows, slowing cash outflows, and optimizing use of cash assets. Here are some practical tips for improving cash flow in each of these areas.

To speed cash collections, invoice customers when you ship the goods, not a few days later. Make sure that your invoice clearly shows the payment due date and the penalty for late payment. If you use a monthly billing statement, time it to arrive a week or so before the end of the month. Many companies pay bills just before month-end, and that way you may catch their payment cycle. Another tip: follow up promptly and in person on disputed bills or delinquent accounts. It's human nature to avoid these problems, but time only makes them harder to resolve.

Focus on two areas to reduce cash outflows - inventory control and accounts payable. Review your inventory to identify slow-selling and high-priced items. Are you carrying too many of these items; can you make them special order items? Are there ways to cut your re-supply time, allowing you lower levels in inventory?

Look at payables to make sure you are taking discounts where it makes sense, but otherwise using the full grace period. If you have employees who travel, consider using credit cards instead of cash advances.

Using your cash efficiently means knowing what you have in the bank and putting it to work for you. Many companies go to great lengths to collect receivables, only to have the check sit in the accountant's safe for days at a time! Make daily deposits and invest the funds, even if only for a few days.

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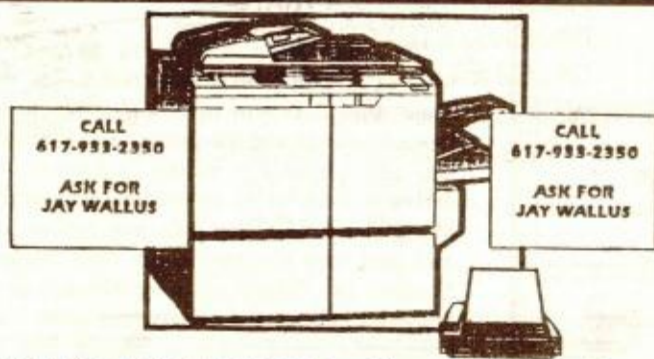

FREE FLU SHOTS

The flu season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins. We will start giving flu shots during the week of Oct. 31. Please call to schedule your flu shot.

Influenza or flu is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days.

Everyone feels sick with influenza but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that as many as 10,000 Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older.

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza that is expected to be around in a given year. The vaccine is prepared from inactivated influenza virus, and a new vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza. Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot have gotten an unrelated illness, not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reaction to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot.

If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should seriously consider getting a flu shot. Priority will be given to Bunker Hill Health Center patients and elders of Charlestown. FREE flu shots are available by calling the Bunker Hill Health Center at 724-8186 for an appointment.

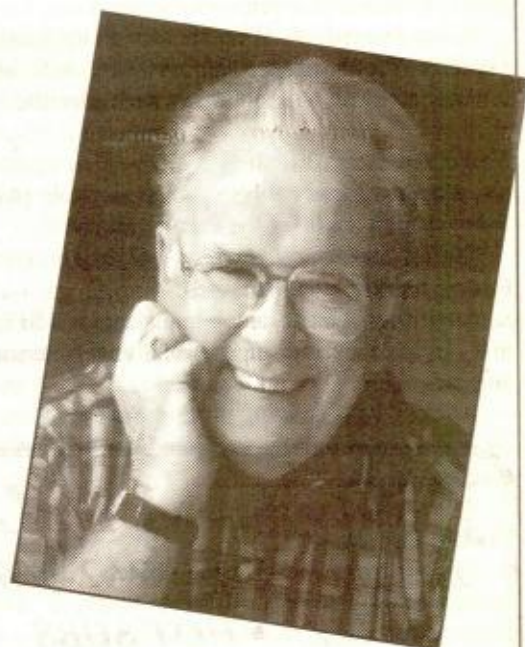

Your leaves are vital to the success of Boston's new citywide composting efforts. Put out your leaves between Oct 29 and Nov 19, on Saturdays, at your regular trash collection location and we'll use them to make soil for community gardens and park projects.

To join this important project, put your leaves in:

- brown paper leaf bags, available at hardware stores
- an open garbage barrel

Acceptable: leaves, grass clippings, plant cuttings, small twigs, brush trimmings and branches under 1/2" thick.

Please do not include: tree stumps, trash and litter.

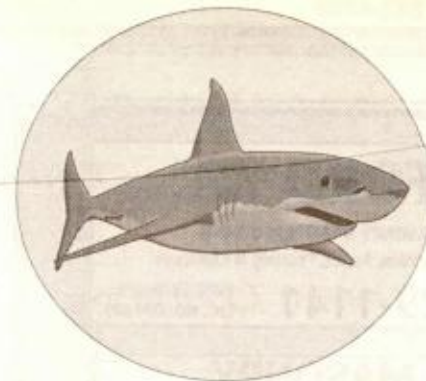
Put out the leaves before 7:00am, rain or shine.
