In order to ease the transportation of construction equipment from different parts of Massachusetts, the MWRA may construct two transfer facilities. Previously, lighter construction material and personnel have been brought to Deer Island through Winthrop. However, according to Elisa Speranza from the MWRA

public information office, the large tractor trailers needed for this project would be unable to negotiate the narrow streets of Winthrop.

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



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

Affordable Housing — One Step Closer

Applicants for the soon to be built affordable housing units in the Charlestown Navy Yard have been streaming into the Parris Building to pick up the papers that will enable them a chance to be put into the lottery for these units. At press time, over 700 applications had been given out, of which 70% were distributed to Charlestown residents.

The current plans for the units to be built on Thirteenth Street in the Navy Yard include 24 one-bedroom units, 750 square feet in size, three of which will be handicapped accessible: five two-bedroom units at 1150 square feet; nine 21/2-bedroom units with 1300 sq. ft.; 8 - 3 bedroom units at 1350 square feet; and two four-bedroom units with 2070 square feet. Prices for these condominiums will range between \$77,400 to \$88,900 and are-being designated for first time home-buyers of low or moderate income. 70% of the units will be alloted to Charlestown residents and the remaining 30% to residents of Boston.

In talking to many Charlestown residents on their thoughts regarding these units, the response has been overwhelmingly favorable with praise for the Bricklayers and Laborers Non-Profit Housing Co... Inc. for bringing this opportunity into the area for many local families to stay in Charlestown. Many families feel that this might be their last change to stay in the community due to not only the high price of housing, but also the astronomical rents for two and three bedroom apartments.

Others, however, voiced their distrust in the process of selection stating that "those units are already

Five Hour Tobin Bridge Closure On March 29

The lower deck of the Tobin Memorial Bridge, Route I northbound, will be closed for five hours on Sunday, March 29, from 7:00 a.m. to noon while a section of the bridge's supporting structural steel is repaired, Massport has announced.

As part of Massport's ongoing preventive maintenance program for the Tobin Bridge, repair steel is being installed on a cross girder on a portion of the bridge on the lower level across from the Charlestown Navy Yard. The torquing of high strength bolts which fasten the new steel to the cross girder must be done without traffic on the bridge; therefore, vehicles will be restricted from leaving Boston via the Tobin Bridge from Route I-93 and

the Central Artery during the prescribed hours.

Because the repair work requires a full closure on the lower level, Massport and its consulting engineers have developed a plan to condense the work period into just five hours. Work crews will be using large air impact wrenches run by air compressors. Therefore, Charlestown residents who reside in neighborhoods close to the Tobin Bridge may experience an increase in noise during this particular repair procedure.

In addition, a detour will direct traffic leaving the Central Artery to the City Square Constitution ramp. From this point traffic will be diverted north via Chelsea, Terminal, and Medford Streets in Charlestown to Route 99 by way of

Sullivan Square. During the detour, southbound traffic on Chelsea Street will be diverted to Vine Street to avoid interfering with the detour.

"Massport has worked closely with its contractor to minimize the inconvenience to both the traveling public and to the Tobin Bridge's neighbors," said Bridge Director Joseph Greene. "This repair work is absolutely necessary and we intend to complete the procedure as quickly and as efficiently as possible," Greene added.

The placement of closure signs and other traffic control devices will begin around 5:00 a.m. in one closed lane in preparation for the subsequent closure of all three lanes on the lower level. Commencing

promptly at 7:00 a.m., the lower level will be closed to all traffic and work will begin immediately. The torquing process is expected to take no longer than four hours and an additional hour of closure has been schedules to provide for a margin of safety. The lower deck will be reopened at noon.

In case of inclement weather, the shutdown will be postponed to the following Sunday, April 5th. This is the final closure required during this particular phase of structural repairs on the Tobin Bridge.

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Public Works Department Faces Battle To Maintain Services

Pressured by the rising cost of rubbish hauling, an expensive effort to maintain the city's bridges and an inability to attract enough workers, the Boston Public Works Department has no major programs scheduled for Charlestown this year and is struggling to meet the day-to-day maintenance needed for the neighborhood's upkeep.

At a meeting with community residents on Tuesday, March 24, sponsored by the Neighborhood Council, Boston Public Works Commissioner Joseph Casazza said these fiscal constraints and several jurisdictional restrictions prevent him from acting decisively on several of the community's concerns. Major bridge repairs, and construction projects such

as the North Area Central Artery project and the Main Street reconstruction currently underway, are out of his range, he explained.

Maintenance work, including sidewalk repair, street cleaning and street light repair, however is under the Public Work's jurisdiction and much of the discussion at Tuesday's meeting focused on these

According to Casazza, street cleaning for all of Charlestown will begin April 1. Meter maids will begin enforcing parking regulations by first issuing warnings to delinquent vehicles, followed by parking tickets, and if necessary towing will be considered.

Tom McLaughlin of 10 Seminary Street urged Casazza to follow through on a pledge former Mayor Kevin White made to widen his street and install new street lights. Casazza said he would look into the request but doubted that funds would be available.

Steve McHugh of Mead Street asked the commissioner to repair the "forty flights" stairway at the end of his street. The stairway, according to McHugh, is in a state of great disrepair and is dangerous for the children who frequently play on it.

Fred Cefalo of 3 Cordis Street said a light on his street has been out of commission for 18 months. Calls to City Hall about the situation, he added, were ignored. According to Ca-

sazza, the Public Works Department has had trouble replacing many of the City's street lights because of its trouble negotiating a reasonable contract with the manufacturers of the lights.

"The law of supply and demand has gone against us," said Casazza. "Bids have gone out twice, but we are not going to settle for the higher price.

A similar problem in contracts with local towing companies, he said, has hampered the City's ability to haul abandoned cars.

Kennedy, Principal Assessing Clerk was among only 22 employees with 35 or more years at DOR honored at the event. Commissioner Jackson

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paid tribute to Kennedy by citing her dedication in service to the State's taxpayers, "You are a vested owner of the company," he stated. "Your pride in, and appreciation of, what you do makes the Department of Revenue the model agency it is.'



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
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Flatley Company Seeks Permit For Mystic River Work

The Flatley Company is seeking permission from the United States Army Corps of Engineers to accomplish work in the Mystic River at Charlestown for the construction of a parking lot for tenants of The Schrafft Center and a public waterfront park. The work would include dredging a 45,205 square foot area, placing 19,698 cubic

yards of fill in 79,313 square feet of tidelands, and construction of boardwalks, a pier, a water taxi landing, a sailing club, floating docks and a ga-

The application for the federal permit was filed with the Engineers in compliance with Secion 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act which provides for federal

regulation of any work in, under or over navigable waters of the United States and Section 404 of the Clean Water Act which regulates the discharge of dredged or fill material in United States waters, including wetlands.

To assist in evaluating the proposed work, the Engineers are soliciting public comments. Written statements should be forwarded to their office no later that April 20, 1987. Update On The Schrafft Center

Since the Flatley Company purchased the former candy factory two years ago, The Schrafft Center, encompassing 600,000 square feet, has undergone an extensive transformation and is one of the largest private commercial buildings to undergo rehabilitation in the history of Boston. The Schrafft Center nears 50% occupancy in its first year.

Carmella still works at the Schrafft building, although today she is employed by Fotec, a high-tech maker of fiberoptic support equipment. "We discovered there were a lot of highly qualified people that were easy to recruit, who were living in this area and commuting to places like Burlington and Concord. We were able to get the cream of the crop." stated Jim Hayes. President of Fotec.

As Thomas Flatley originally envisioned, the Schrafft Center facility has become an anchor for the Charlestown community while living up to expectations for its utility as a home for high-tech and commercial tenants.

The Flatley Company is incorporating an amenity package for the tenants of The Schrafft Center that is unequaled in the city. It includes an on-site restaurant, a complimentary shuttle bus to public transportation, a sailing club, retail lobby shops, water taxi service and the planned Child Development Center and Fitness Center.

The Child Development Center and Health Club is housed in the former power house which generated all the energy for the former candy factory. The grand opening will take place in April.

The planned water taxi service to Logan Airport will also benefit the tenants of The Schrafft Center. "We're interested in making sure there is easy accessibility to Logan and the water taxi will be very effective," stated Flatley. A public boat ramp is expected to be completed by next year.

The Schrafft Center has welcomed prestigious companies such as Fotec, Orion Research, IMEC Corporation, the Department of Human Services and Target Productions. to name a few.

Chet Collier, a six-time national Emmy Award winning television executive and President of Target Productions has made his home at The Schrafft Center. Target Productions houses over 2.5 millon of the latest video technology and includes two multi-format editing suites, 1,000 square foot production studio, and a complete computer graphics capability. "The whole Center is designed around expansion," stated Collier. President of Target Productions.

Charlestown One Of Four Sites Being Considered For Transfer Facility

sludge treatment center. The only product coming off of the islands through the transfer facilities, according to Speranza, will be clean fill.

"The rumors about sludge just aren't true," said Speranza. "After talking to the community last year, we reopened the search to over three hundred communities."

Design for the transfer facility is scheduled to be completed in January 1988 with construction beginning in September 1988. Construction is slated to be completed in May 1990. Speranza noted that there will be a one-year overlap between the operation of the transfer facility and construction work on the North Area Central Artery reconstruction project. The State Department of Public Works (DPW), however, has assured the MWRA that the area can handle the additional traffic burden. Also, the MWRA plans to implement a detailed traffic mitigation proposal in conjunction with the DPW's own program.

"We won't come plowing through Charlestown without working something out with residents. We want to tailor a mitigation package to the needs of the community," said Speranza.

Still, according to some residents and community activists, traffic mitigation may not be enough. After meeting with the MWRA last week, Neighborhood Council Vice-Chairman Tom Cunha said he believés a transfer facility would be unacceptable to the community. Citing the North Area Central Arterty project, expansion in the Navy Yard, and construction on Main Street, Cunha said that Charlestown has borne a disproportionate amount of the city's traffic and parking problems. Use of the rail lines at Piers 48, 49 and 50 to transport the equipment by train, he added, would solve the traffic problem.

The MWRA estimates that from 1990 to 1993, there will be 190 one-way trips per day, 137 trips per day from 1993 to 1997, and 40 trips per day from 1997 to 1999.

The MWRA is constructing the transfer facilities as part of a federally mandated program designed to clean up Boston Harbor. The facilities are needed to transfer building materials and equipment to Deer and Nut Islands where the agency will be upgrading primary sewage treatment plants and constructing a secondary treatment facility. Construction of the secondary treatment facility, which is required by federal regulations, will not be completed until 1999.

People who sign up will not be subject to waiting periods, exclusions, restrictions, penalties, or premium surcharges of any kind. The premiums for Medex plans do not increase with age and are not adjusted because of late enrollment. This year, all three Medex Programs are available including Medex Standard, Medex 2, and Medex 3.

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





Comprehensive Traffic And Parking Study Underway

Dear Mr. Tobin:

Thank you for your letter dated March 12, 1987 in which you voiced the concerns of the Neighborhood Council regarding traffic and parking in Charlestown. I'd like to take this opportunity to inform the Council and local residents about the City's efforts to address issues surrounding local circulation patterns as well as the larger issues relating to upcoming construction projects.

In recent years, Charlestown has experienced significant changes in density and population that have had significant impacts upon the amount and types of traffic on local residential streets. In response to this, in February, the Department hired the consulting firm of Vanasse/Hangen to conduct a comprehensive study includes the following:

- 1. A comprehensive traffic flow & circulation study;
- 2. A parking study;
- An evaluation of the impacts of the North Area project on areas of the neighborhood not within the project's limit; and
- An evaluation of the transportation access needs of Charlestown.

This planning is designed to ensure proper coordination between the current circulation patterns and the local street system proposed as part of the North Area Project. It is important that careful planning be a part of each action to ensure that changes benefit the entire community and that traffic problems are not merely shifted from one area to another.

I can assure you that neighborhood participation will be an integral part of this planning effort and that no action will be taken without full knowledge of the affected community. I look forward to working closely with you and the Council in the months ahead.



Commuter Water Transportation To Begin On April 6

Through a joint effort of Boston Harbor Cruises and the Boston Redevelopment Authority, peak hour commuter water transportation service will begin on the morning of Monday, April 6, between Pier 4 in the Charlestown Navy Yard and Downtown at Long Wharf. The service is intended as a six month trial which will help demonstrate the current viability and feasibility on inner harbor/inner development water transportation services.

During a meeting with Boston Redevelopment Authority officials, Boston Harbor representatives, current tenants at the Navy Yard, potential users, as well as neighborhood groups, a tentative schedule was drawn up based on the needs of the public and the feasibility to provide these services at peak hours.

According to Jim Lambert, a spokesman for the cruise line, "based on the success of the six month

pilot program, a determination will be made relative to long term, full day service." The commencing of the service coincides with the construction of the five year North Central Artery project. It will offer Charlestown residents as well as North Shore area residents a viable alternative to Route 93 and the Charlestown bridge.

As an incentive for potential users there will be low rate parking available in the 1400 car garage in the Navy Yard and the fee for the boat will be \$1.00 per trip with a 60 ride pass available for \$45.00.

The morning service will leave from Charlestown at 7:00, 7:40, 8:20 and 9:30 a.m. and from Long Wharf at 7:20, 8:00 and 8:40 a.m.

In the afternoon, departures will be from Long Wharf at 4:05, 4:45 and 5:35 p.m. and from Charlestown at 4:25, 5:15 and 6:15 p.m.

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
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
