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## Charlestown Reviews Resident Parking

A 90 -day review of Charlestown's controversial residential parking program in the Precinct 1 area managed to draw more than 200 residents and business people to the Knights of Columbus Hall for an April 14 two-hour discussion with Richard Loring, Boston Transportation Department's acting director of traffic and engineering.

Precinct 1 is actually the second Charlestown neighborhood to develop a park-
ing program. The Brigh-ton-Parker Street area near Sullivan Square implemented resident parking several years ago to discourage Boston-bound commuters from leaving their cars on neighborhood streets for the day
While most seemed to agree that Precinct 1's similar efforts to drive commuters out of the area have been successful since resident parking was implemented in January, not all residents, the elderly and
business people share the same benefits from an effective parking program.
Loring and Judy Evers, Charlestown coordinator for the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, facilitated the meeting to review the impact of resident parking on Austin, Devens, Harvard, Lawrence, Park, Prescott, Seminary, Union and Washington streets and Old Rutherford Avenue.

State Rep. Eugene L. O'Flaherty recently testified in support of a bill which would protect the tenants of governmentally involved housing when federal rent protections xpire.
O'Flaherty offered his support of House Bill \#2113, a home-rule petition offered by the city of Boston. If passed, the bill would restore state protection for low-income rental rates now controlled by federal law. Current federal law controls the rental prices on government subsidized, owned or regulated housing so long as the property owners are still paying off the mortgages to those developments. Once those mortgages are paid off, owners are free to raise the rents to "market level."
In 1996, Congress allowed owners to prepay heir mortgages in full, thereby ending their obligation to offer their rental units at prices regulated for ow-income renters. The regulations do not apply to small-property owners with private mortgages.

## Expert On 19th Century Culinary Arts Presents

## A Full Course At The USS Constitution Museum

Culinary historian and award-winning chef Sandy Oliver will whet the appetites of her lunchtime listeners at the USS Constitution Museum on Wednesday, April 30, with her delectable descriptions of New England coastal cook ing in the 19th century.
"Seafarers' Fare" will be presented at noon in the USS Constitution Muse um's Figgie Theater. The lecture is open to the general public free of charge. Listeners are invited to bring a brown bag lunch and beverages will be provided.
Oliver, a native New Englander, has devoted more than 25 years to researching and cooking what would have been served in the kitchen of a typical small-town Yankee
storekeeper or aboard ships like USS Constitution when in foreign ports far from home in the 1800 s.
In her cookbook, "Saltwater Foodways: New Englanders and Their Food at Sea and Ashore in the 19th Century," Oliver not only provides recipes but also includes first-hand observations from the era: "I never ate such a meal that I relished better in my life; it was a true farmer's meal. We had both coffee and a bowl of bread and milk, the true homemade brown bread, 'punkin' pie, honey, pancakes and cider, excellent butter and cheese" the words of Connecticut seaman John Perkins who enjoyed a hearty breakfast before embarking on an 1846 whaling voyage.
"Saltwater Foodways"
won the Intemational Association of Culinary Professionals Julie Child Cookbook Award. Oliver worked at Mystic Seaport in Mystic, Conn. for 16 years where she taught early 19 th century fireplace cooking. Oliver lives in Islesboro, Maine and works as a private chef and independent consultant. She holds a history degree from Clark University in Worcester.
"Seafarers' Fare" is part of the "USS Constitution 200 Years" series, which will be offered monthly through November 1997 during USS Constitution's Bicentennial Celebration. The series is presented as part of the Samuel Eliot Morison Lectures sponsored by the Lowell Institute.

## Mass. Tuition Advantage Program Offered At Bunker Hill Community College

Bunker Hill Community College will participate in the Tuition Advantage Program (TAP), or "Opportunity Program," beginning this fall. The TAP/ Opportunity Program rewards community college graduates, who earn an associate's degree with at least a $B$ average, with a 33 percent discount on tuition costs at any four-year state college. This discount would amount to upward of $\$ 1,000$ per student over the two years of continuing education.

BHCC President Mary L. Fifield stated that students who meet all TAP requirements will be entitled
to the tuition discount. These requirements include: maintaining a 3.0 (B) average or better, completion of an associate's degree program, state residency, transfer to a fouryear state college within a year following graduation from BHCC and participation in the state's joint admissions program.
The Joint Admission Program guarantees admission to a state college or UMass campus upon completion of an approved associate's degree program. In addition, students must maintain a B average at the four-year college to continue to receive the dis-
count for the second year.
"Bunker Hill Community College has continuously offered students an opportunity to achieve an excellent educational background," Fifield stated, adding, "With TAP, students are offered a further incentive to broaden their horizons with enrollment in a four-year college."

(continued from page 1) swers to all of your questions," Loring said at the start. "Give us a chance to review your comments and concerns, and we'll come back in approximately 30 days with final recommendations."
Loring added that he could assess already that some areas may have been over-regulated and that the elderly at two senior housing facilities may have been disserviced.

The city's resident parking programs are aimed at providing the first on-street parking opportunities to residents and people who need access, according to Loring. However, resident parking will not ensure that anyone will be able to park in front of their home or business.

The evening's most often repeated concems were that the program: 1) does not allow ticket-free parking for visitors to the area's elderly housing; 2 ) is pushing commuters to other congested residential streets in search of free parking: and 3 ) is discouraging access to business for patrons and employees.

Loring said that BTD is committed to making changes around the Mary Colbert Apartments on Devens Street, such as changing some regulations from res-ident-only to two-hour parking, to allow visitor, nursing and home-medical service access to elderly residents.
Other Charlestown neighborhoods, not restricted to areas described as voting precincts, Loring said, could approach BTD
for their own resident parking program.

Although businesses do not have the same priority as residents, Loring explained, local business people did not want meters to ensure short-term parking for customer access. He added that meters are costly to install and monitor. Two-hour regulations may address problems for businesses created by resi-dent-only parking in certain areas, Loring said.
Businesses and residents seemed at odds several times during the discussion, however, Loring said that the BTD's policy addresses resident parking concerns first. Charlestown Business Association Vice President Carol Bratley asked Loring, residents and businesses to work together.
"Let's look at options and variations," Bratley said. "People are losing business. Let's make sure that Charlestown maintains healthy businesses."

While business people generally asked for less stringent regulations to create turnover parking for patrens, residents seemed to champion 24 -hour resi dent-only parking. Loring said comments and concerns heard in Charlestown are consistent with other areas of the city beginning resident parking programs.

The April 14 meeting was planned to review a three-month pilot period in Precinct 1 . Loring said that BTD will consider community concems and provide a full recommendation for longer term park ing regulations in that area in 30 days.

## Cultural Council Awards Funds: Charlestown Draws Grants

Boston's Local Cultural council warded more than $\$ 280,000$ to a range of cultural and educational programs for children and adults. The council received the funds, for the purpose of distributing them at the local level, from the Mass. Cultural Council, a state agency that enjoys the strong support of Senate President Tom Birmingham and Rep. Eugene O'Flaherty.

The Local Cultural Council accepted application in the fall and carefully reviewed requests for compliance with state guidelines and local priorities.

STEPHEN KANEB of the Catamount Management Corporation, located in Chelsea, updated the members of the Charlestown Business Association (CBA) on plans for the H.P. Hood plant on Rutherford Avenue at a luncheon meeting at $R$. Wesley's Bistro in Sullivan Square. Kaneb spoke of this facility being "the oldest house on the block," noting that there will be "new uses and new occupancy" with the development of the property. He said that part of the site will be for Hood offices and $a$ warehouse and the first tenant, a freight air cargo firm, is scheduled for July occupancy. The 20 acre site contains three buildings and a power plant, adding the oldest of the buildings is scheduled for demolition. He stated that they have done a small amount of initial landscap-

ing, adding trees and removing some chain-link fence to make the entry more "welcoming." He also said that trucks will exit out the back
of the property. Kaneb is confident that the development will be a success, noting that they have "stepped into a reasonably good real
estate market." He said that the site is being called Hood Business Park and will incorporate the Hood logo, taking advantage of having
a known signature known location. He estimates a work force of 400 500 at the site when it is completed. He invited the

CBA members to tour the site in the fall. Kaneb said he looks forward to the project which will put new life into the building.

# Thicker Than Blood <br> Family Ties Strong For Panthers' Fitzgerald and Coyotes’ Tkachuk

MIAMI - Phoenix forward Keith Tkachuk heard his cousin Tom Fitzgerald would be sitting out the Panthers' game against the Coyotes with a sprained ankle, and the agitator in him stirred.
"Ahh, he's probably just intimidated," said Tkachuk, who leads the Coyotes in points and penalty minutes. "All those times he beat me when we were younger, he knows it's payback time."
Tkachuk, whose mother Gerry, is the sister of Fitzgerald's father Tom, has been known to put his foot in his mouth. But on this occasion his tongue was in his cheek. The truth is, Tkachuk and Fitzgerald couldn't be closer if they shared the same last name.

They were nearly inseparable as kids, growing up less than an hour apart in the Boston area. A series of events recently tightened the knot between them. There was the death of Fitzgerald's maternal uncle and godfather, Jim "Crash" McNeil, which came as a blow to both players, each of whom regarded the retired firefighter as a second father.

The day after Fitzgerald returned from his uncle's funeral in Charlestown, Fitzgerald's wife Kerry gave birth to their second child, Casey. Three days later, Tkachuk was married to Chantal Oster, his girlfriend of three years, in Phoenix.

From burial to birth to a blessed beginning, life's compendium was capsulized for Tkachuk, Fitzgerald and their families in one neat row on the calendar.
"You can get the worst news possible and the next day get the best news," Tkachuk said. "That's the way it was that week. There were a lot of phone calls being made."

Tkachuk who just turned 25, and Fitzgerald, 28 , always have been as close to each other as the telephone.
"In some families, you have cousins, but you don't speak to them," Fitzgerald said. "It wasn't that way at all with us. Growing up, we did every thing together - whiffleball, ball hockey, whatever. We spent every holiday together and had cookouts all the time in the summer.
In those days, Fitzgerald was the natural leader. Tkachuk was the awkward, over-

been the first head-to-head meeting between the cousins. But Fitzgerald sustained an abdominal injury a few days before the game and wasn't able to play.
"Not being able to play against him doesn't really bother me," Fitzgerald said. "Not being able to play against him that first time really bothered me."

Among those who delighted in charting the cousins' parallel careers was McNeil.
"I considered him my uncle, too," Tkachuk said, because he treated me like family."

In 1993, McNeil was diagnosed with emphysema. His health eventually deteriorated to the point where he had to carry an oxygen tank around with him. It was a nuisance, to be sure, which is why the last time Fitzgerald saw him, sitting across the visitors' bench during the Panthers' game against the Bruins at the FleetCenter on Jan. 23, there was no oxygen tank in sight.
McNeil wasn't feeling well enough to visit with Fitzgerald afterward, but a few weeks later, Fitzgerald got a call out of the blue from McNeil. He was planning a trip to South Florida in March, he said, the words rushing out of the receiver in gusts. Could Fitzgerald get him some tickets to a couple of the Panthers' home games?

Of course, Fitzgerald said, gladdened to hear McNeil's voice. The two talked for a while longer before McNeil ran out of breath. Fitzgerald hung up and didn't give the conversation another thought until the phone rang on Feb. 22 as he was getting ready to leave for the Panthers' aftemoon game against Philadelphia at Miami Arena.
It was Fitzgerald's father breaking the news that McNeil had passed away.

As Fitzgerald hung up the phone, stunned, he remembered his last conversation with McNeil and something clicked.
"I thought back to the game in Boston when I had seen him and I realized how tough it must have been for him physically just to be there," Fitzgerald said. "I thought back to some of the things we talked about that day he called. It's kind of like that call had a purpose."
It wasn't easy going out and playing with a heavy heart against the Flyers. It didn't get any easier when Fitzgerald's right skate caught a rut in the ice in the first period. He played on with a twisted ankle, even managing a breakaway in the second period that Flyers goaltender Garth Snow thwarted, before leaving the game.

He hasn't returned to the lineup since. In an odd way, the injury has been, as he put it, "a blessing in disguise."
Not being able to practice made it easier for him to steal away to Boston for the funeral. He also was at home relaxing when Kerry's water broke. He was able to drive her to the hospital and help with the delivery, just as he had been able to do when the couple's first child, Ryan, 2 , was born during the lockout.
"Eerie how that's worked," Fitzgerald said.
There was something peculiar, too, about the conversation he had with Tkachuk the day after Tkachuk's nuptials.

Tkachuk asked about the baby, then casually said, "Maybe someday Ryan and Casey will have a cousin."

From Perpetual Kid Tkachuk to Pop? "It was weird," Fitzgerald said. "I never thought I'd hear him say stuff like that:"

## THIS NEW TAX BREAK

REQUIRES CAREFUL PLANNING
For the past 10 years, large pension payouts have been subject to a $15 \%$ penalty tax. For the next three years, this tax will be suspended. Taxpayers are rarely presented with such an attractive planning opportunity - and the issues are seldom so complex.

In 1996 , the $15 \%$ penalty tax applied to retirement plan payouts of more than $\$ 155,000$ per year, and lump-sum distributions in excess of $\$ 775,000$. For example, say you received retirement income of $\$ 195,000$ in 1996. Since this was $\$ 40,000$ more than the threshold of $\$ 155,000$, you would have paid a penalty of up to $\$ 6,000(\$ 40,00 \times 15 \%)$, plus regular income tax on the entire amount. What happens if you receive the same payout through 1999? You'll still pay regular income tax, but the penalty will be waived.

The 15\% penalty tax is scheduled to resume in 2000 , so you might be tempted to withdraw as much as possible during this three-year window. In some cases, this will be a good strategy, but in other cases it could be a costly mistake. As a very general rule, retirees over age 70 are most likely to benefit from accelerating their withdrawals. People with a relatively short life expectancy could also benefit, since there's an estate version of this penalty tax that 'isn't suspended. But many younger people will still be better off taking the minimum from their retirement plans and letting the balance grow tax-deferred, even if they end up paying the $15 \%$ tax down the road.

Here's the best advice in this complex area: If you are potentially subject to the penalty tax, see us before you make any moves affecting your retirement plans.

MGH HealthCare Center Professionals Speak Up About Speech-Language Problems During May, Better Hearing and Speech Month.

People seldom talk about speech problems, but speech, voice, and language disorders are serious, treatable conditions that affect 14 million Americans. Since 1921, May has been designated as Better Hearing and Speech Month, a time to raise public awareness of hearing, speech and language disorders.
"Speaking comes so naturally for most of us we take it for granted," said Senior Speech-Language Pathologist Elizabeth A. Delnickas of MGH-Charlestown HealthCare Center. "But for someone with a speech or language problem, words don't come easily. Expressing any thought is a struggle."

Speech and language disorders take many forms. Babies can be born with these disorders. Accidental injury or illness can cause them at any age. Whatever their kind of cause, speech and language disorders have serious consequences. Speech and language disorders can limit academic achievement, social adjustments and career advancement. Fortunately, most people with speech and language problems can be helped," said Delnickas. "Even if the problem cannot be eliminated, we can teach people with speech and language problems strategies to help them cope. People may not fully regain their capacity to speak and understand, but a Speech-Language Pathologist can help them express their needs and live more independently."

Some common speech and language disorders include stuttering, the most widely recognized problem; articulation problems that cause people to pronounce sounds incorrectly, making their speech difficult to understand; language disorders that limit a person's ability to understand spoken or written words; and voice disorders that make speech impossible or extremely difficult.

Aphasia is a speech-language disorder that frequently follows stroke or brain injury. People with aphasia can think clearly, but cannot effectively express their thoughts. An estimated 1 million Americans have aphasia.
Speech-Language Pathologists are the professionals who treat all types of speech, language, and related disorders. They hold at least the master's degree and are certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. In Massachusetts, they also are licensed by the state. SpeechLanguage Pathologists work in schools, private practice, hospitals, clinics, and other health and education settings.
"Anyone who has any difficulty speaking or understanding should consult a Speech-Language Pathologist," said Delnickas. "A communication disorder is just too important to ignore."
