Sen. Kennedy Lays Wreath At Mass. Korean War Veterans Memorial

Zoning Commission Approves Provision To Limit Billboards

A new zoning regulation, approved recently by the Zoning Commission and supported by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA), gives the city of Boston substantial power to limit the ongoing proliferation of billboards along major, federally-assisted roadways, including the Southeast Expressway, the Mass. Turnpike Extension and Routes 1-A and I-93.

The amendment to the Zoning Code requires Board of Appeal approval for any new billboards along these roadways.

For a number of years, groups in Dorchester and

other Boston neighborhoods have been seeking more stringent action at the state level regarding billboards. More than three years ago, neighborhood groups working with the city identified more than 200 Boston billboards, both along major thoroughfares and in residential and commercial districts, which appear out of compliance with state regulations administered by the Commonwealth's Outdoor Advertising Board.

However, the Board has not taken significant action on these 200 billboards. Recently it approved seven

new billboard faces along I-93 in Charlestown and the Southeast Expressway in Dorchester, despite opposition from the city of Boston and neighborhood groups. The new provision will require Board of Appeal review for the seven new billboards.

"For too long, community groups like the Dorchester Allied Neighborhood Association have been ignored by the Commonwealth. This amendment is a crucial step in empowering the city and the neighborhoods in this important quality of life issue," said

CUT LIFE INSURANCE COSTS WITH A BLENDED POLICY

If you are looking for a way to save on life insurance commissions, consider purchasing a so-called "blended policy." Such a policy lets you buy a combination of whole life and term insurance. It can be a real money-saver. By combining different types of insurance into one policy, you can typically save 30% over the premium for comparable whole life coverage.

Blended policies allow you to obtain paid-up additions — mini whole life policies purchased with the earnings on your cash value — which gradually replace the term coverage. But blended policies can have a downside. If interest rates drop, the whole life policy can not accumulate the dividends and the paid-up additions you expected. Thus, you may have to kick in a higher premium since you would then have to pay for the paid-up additions or increasingly expensive term coverage to maintain the anticipated death benefit.

A few years ago, blended policies were only available for the rich. But now, some insurance companies are selling them to people who want as little as \$300,000 in coverage. Many require that whole life represent at least 25% of the blended coverage; other companies insist on a minimum dollar amount, such as \$200,000 of whole life.

You must keep an eye on your policy's blend to be sure that it meets the Internal Revenue Service rules on maximum premiums for cash-value policies. The IRS guidelines are designed to prevent people from using cash-value contracts as tax dodges by accumulating tax-deferred earnings and then pulling the money out as tax-free loans. You should make sure that your premium for the blend won't exceed the premium limits set by the IRS for the whole life portion alone. If it does, it will eliminate a valuable tax advantage of some blended policies — the option to withdraw money tax-free through policy loans.

Sequicentennial Of The Dedication Of The Bunker Hill Monument

In honor of the sesquicentennial of the Bunker Hill Monument, the Boston National Historical Park and the Charlestown Preservation Society will sponsor a grand reenactment of "The Toasts and Music of Dedication" from the State Dinner at Faneuil Hall following the dedication of the Bunker Hill Monument on June 17, 1843. Present that night at the "Cradle of Liberty" were President John Tyler with his entire cabinet, the governor of Massachusetts, the mayor of Boston, and throngs of politicians, militiamen and Freemasons. Newspapers of the day invited the citizens of Boston to dine with the president for \$3 (\$60 in today's currency). The finale of that most festive day in the history of New England was the series of toasts proposed from the stage, together with the tumultuous responses from the band and the crowd.

On Sunday, Oct. 24 at 4

p.m. at Faneuil Hall, Daniel Webster will rise again and raise both festive cup and voice in honor of the Monument. D.C. Hall's New Concert and Quadrille Band will respond with marches, hymns and songs from Rossini to Old 100th to Yankee Doodle. Toast for toast, and anthem for anthem, a great night from 150 years ago will be recalled. Scrupulously researched and planned, the event promises to prove that history can inspire vivid entertainment.

At 5:30 p.m., the festivities will continue as D.C. Hall's New Concert and Quadrille Band will lead The Commonwealth Vintage Dancers in "A Benefit Ball" of Bunker Hill related music. Ticket holders will be invited to partake of the edibles and comestibles of the 1840's and to join in the dancing.

D.C. Hall's New Concert and Quadrille Band, con-

sisting of strings, woodwinds and brass, winner of the prestigious 1990 Noah Greenberg award for early music, are specialists in the period. They performed recently at Worcester's Mechanics Hall, Old South Meeting House, Newport mansions, The Van Buren Homestead, as well as at several National Park Service sites. Their discography includes a 1993 release from Dorian entitled "Grand Concert."

The Boston National Historic Park and the Charlestown Preservation Society join with the Bunker Hill Monument Association, the

Charlestown Historical Society, the Ancient and Honorable Artillery, King Solomon's Lodge A.F. & A.M., the Massachusetts Charitable Mechanics Association and the Charlestown Historical Courthouse Charitable Trust in inviting the public to attend their concert and ball to benefit the restoration of the historic paintings in the Charlestown Courthouse and the restoration fund for Faneuil Hall.

★ **65 Chestnut St.** . . . 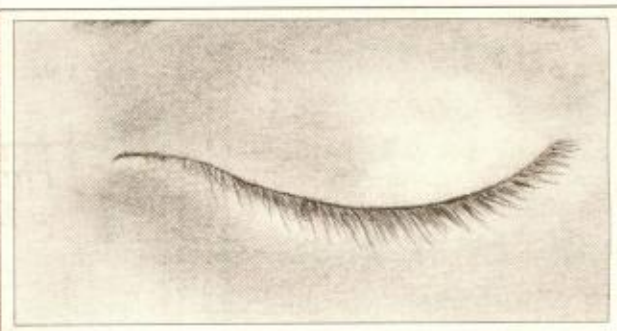

Charlestown Neighborhood Council Reviews Summer - Plans For Fall

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) got back into gear on Sept. 7 following a month-long hiatus. Vice chairman Tom Cunha presided as Chairman Peter Looney was detained.

Members present included Mel Stillman, Bob Scalli, John Dillon, Jim Conway, Bill Galvin, Kate McDonough, Edna Kelly, Jeanne Davis, Tom Pitts, Ken Stone, Marty O'Brien and Nancy Keyes.

Cunha introduced Ronald Quigley, location manager for "Blown Away," the MGM film with Lloyd Bridges, Jeff Bridges and Tommy Lee Jones. Many scenes have been filmed in Charlestown over the past several weeks and the local filming will conclude this week leaving more than one star-struck resident in its wake.

Conway asked if the production company would make a contribution to Charlestown non-profit organizations as has been done by companies who filmed here previously. Quigley said they would do something through the CNC chairman.

Cunha asked the members to support a letter to the Boston Police Department requesting six additional traffic supervisors at strategic intersections to assist the over 300 students at the new Charlestown Catholic Elementary School in crossing some dangerous intersections. The request was approved.

A Development Committee report by Cunha focused on the plans by local architect Jack French to convert the First Baptist Church property at 5 Monument Square from a

church and day-care center to five condominiums and a professional office. Cunha related that French met with abutters in mid-August and presented his plans before the Development Committee on Aug. 26. He went on to say that concerns raised by abutters, mostly on access to parking and landscaping, were addressed by French and abutters offered no negative comments at the public meeting. The plan was approved by the CNC.

Cunha related that following a meeting for abutters to the Kevin's Brick Oven restaurant proposed by Kevin Smith for 229 Bunker Hill St., the CNC Executive Board voted to send a letter to the city's Board of Appeal (BOA) in favor of the plan and Cunha asked for an affirmation of that action. He said that issues to be addressed by the

developer include the height of the smoke stack, parking and trash concerns. An abutter to the property told the CNC that as planned, the stack would be below his second floor window, pointing out that BOA member Paul Parks suggested that a higher stack be put above the roof line.

Conway, chairman of the Veterans Committee, stated that the CNC should feel proud that they were the local public access that helped the Korean War Veterans Association (KWVA) obtain the land in the Charlestown Navy Yard to build the Korean War Veterans Memorial. He said the KWVA will continue to sell bricks to provide for the upkeep of the memorial, and he thanked each member of the CNC and the community for its support. Several members commented on the outstanding design of

the memorial and of their pride in having it sited in this community.

Paul Harvey, director of the Armed Services YMCA, had been listed on the meeting's agenda to speak on the plans and programs at the Y. He was not present at the meeting, a fact blamed on miscommunication. One resident spoke on behalf of senior citizens who would like to use the Y pool but can't afford the \$400 membership fee. A motion was made and approved unanimously that Harvey be invited to come before the council's Basic Services Committee to review the membership fees, the programs and to inform the committee about the housing of women and children at the site under the Department of Social Services.

Vincent Raggiucci from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority told the council that personnel transfer from the former Revere Sugar site on Medford Street was underway. He said the number of cars parking at the facility had been downscaled from 350 to 150. Some discussion ensued on canteen trucks going onto the site. The CNC requested that preference be given to local operators.

McDonough was appointed chairman of the Election Committee. Members

representing the seven precincts in the community will be elected in October.

Several members expressed concerns with the plans for the Charles River Crossing aspect of the Central Artery/Tunnel Project, in particular the 14-lane bridge in one design and the northbound off-ramp that would take a large portion of the Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) playing field and affect several businesses in the area. Galvin stated that the exit should go into Sullivan Square, and Conway added that the CNC should be opposed to the ramp. Stone felt that it was important that the CNC prepare a letter in opposition before the Oct. 5 deadline for comment. Keyes asked the CNC not to do anything at the moment as BHCC has hired a consultant and suggested that it be addressed after the Sept. 14 hearing when the college has presented a plan. Looney stated that CNC members will be meeting with BHCC representatives and he would go through the Executive Board for a decision on a letter.

Oct. 5 Deadline To Submit Letters On Charles River Crossing Plans

Tuesday, Oct. 5 is the deadline — the deadline for written comments to be submitted on the Charles River Crossing Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement/Report.

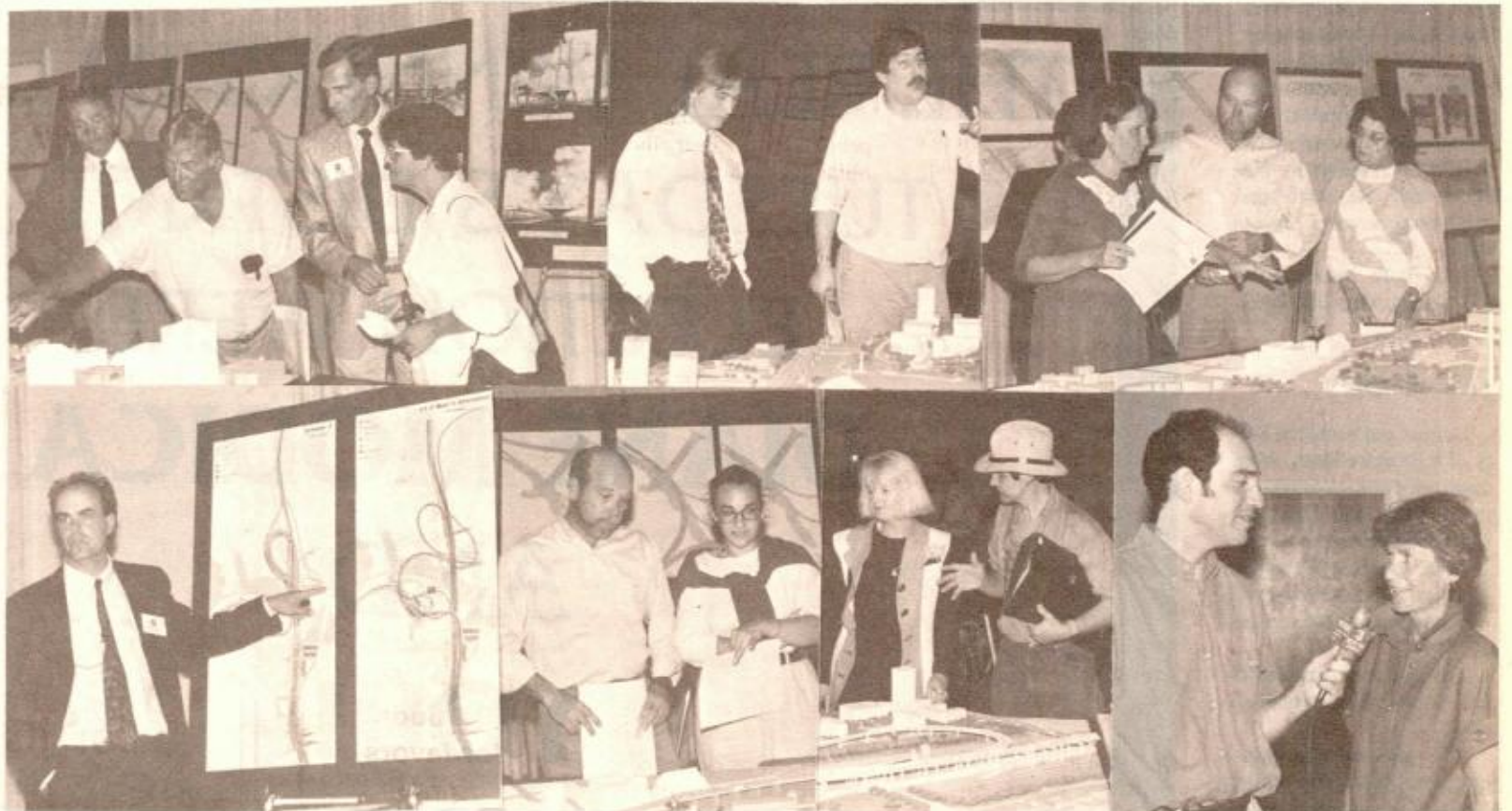
This report contains four plans to carry traffic to and from Route I-93 and the Tobin Bridge to connect to the planned Central Artery/Tunnel (CA/T) project on bridges of 10 to 14 lanes over the river just to the east of City Square.

In addition, three of the plans have moved a northbound off-ramp from a City Square location in the infamous Scheme Z plan to impinge on A Street businesses, bisect the playing fields at Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC) and drop thousands of vehicles per day onto a signalized intersection on Rutherford Avenue in the vicinity of the Mishawum Housing Development.

On Sept. 9, Michael Lewis, assistant CA/T project director from the Mass. Highway Department, took residents through the four plans for the Charles River Crossing at an informational meeting at the K. of C. Hall. He compared and contrasted the plans and took questions and comments from the audience.

Criticism was raised in the timing of the informational meetings and public hearing on Sept. 14 as being too close to summer's end, and the question was asked more than once — "What's the rush, why the push?" — with no answers.

Another point brought up was the disregard for the community in the planning. The Bridge Design Review Committee (BDRC), a 42-member group appointed in February 1991, met for 17 months to look at Scheme Z and devise alternatives to that plan. The members arrived at a plan called 8.ID

Mod 5 which included a single elevated loop ramp on the East Cambridge/Charlestown side of the river to replace the six loop ramps of Scheme Z. The plan also called for a cable-stayed bridge carrying 10 lanes of traffic over the Charles and a series of tunnels under the river, the North Station railroad and Leverett Circle.

When state and federal officials reviewed the plan, concerns were raised about the volume and nature of excavated materials, the problem of Leverett Circle and a curving high-volume movement in the tunnel. Engineers on the project then came up with two alternatives to the BDRC plan — the Reduced River Tunnel Alternative and the Non-River-Tunnel Alternative — and the BDRC was not brought back in to consult or comment on these

designs. State and federal officials were present at the Museum of Science on Sept. 14 at the official public hearing on the design options.

A number of Charlestown residents, business persons and representatives of agencies and BHCC were on hand to give testimony.

Ken Stone, chairman of the North Area Task Force and a member of the BDRC, spoke in opposition to the alternatives to 8.ID Mod 5 stating that they moved away from the BDRC plan back toward Scheme Z with one of the plans calling for 14 lanes crossing the Charles — just two lanes less than Scheme Z. He was critical of the bridge's shading and the highway noise that would be created. Stone called for the implementation of the desires of the BDRC, the re-

locating the proposed Rutherford Avenue C-L off-ramp from BHCC to Sullivan Square and the development of a cooperative effort between the state and the community working to attain a positive project for both.

C. Scully Styles, president of BHCC, focused on the location of the proposed I-93 northbound off-ramp onto Rutherford Avenue with the negative impacts centering on increased traffic adjacent to and through the BHCC campus and on the local roadway network. He was critical of the report that he said does not sufficiently or adequately identify or assess the impacts of the ramp on the college or the adjoining community. He went on to say that the report fails to address the issues of traffic, air quality, noise, cultural resources, visual impacts and construction impacts.

Stykes questioned the safety of the public if an emergency vehicle cannot respond. He talked about the ramp acting as a generator for the Charlestown community, thus overloading the already congested local streets. He spoke of traffic already backed up on Rutherford Avenue on a daily basis, and he referred to the resulting adverse air quality and noise levels.

Another of the main concerns expressed by Stykes is the proposed taking of 1.5 acres of land for the off-ramp, essentially putting the college on the inside of a cloverleaf. He noted that the full range of impacts on the college is not considered in the report and that the off-ramp will adversely affect the existing facilities, the planned growth, the environmental quality of the campus and the future student body.

Jim Conway, representing


the Life Focus Center, addressed the hearing members on behalf of the center which has tentative designation to develop a parcel of land at A Street and Rutherford Avenue. He was critical of the proposed off-ramp and stated that it would preclude the development of the land for a facility for the mentally retarded and physically handicapped.

Elaine McCarthy, in her testimony at the hearing, asked the state to consider the 8.ID Mod 5 plan. She called for officials to look toward Sullivan Square for the I-93 off-ramp. She stated that "in the 1990s, Charlestown deserves a highway system that is kinder and gentler to our residents."

According to Lewis at the informational meeting in Charlestown, the state is required to respond to all testimony on the report, whether it be oral or written and all comments will be addressed.

Residents and businesspersons, along with agency and organization representatives who have concerns and comments on this project should make it a point to submit a letter to that regard by Tuesday, Oct. 5.

Zoning Commission Approves Provision To Limit Billboards

 BRA Director Paul Barrett. "This is an important first step in regulating billboards citywide."

The amendment to the Zoning Code will require neighborhood review and Board of Appeal approval for any new billboard to be constructed within 660 feet of a federally assisted highway.

Currently, there are over 900 billboards in Boston. Community groups and others have often expressed concerns about billboards, both for their diminishing effect on the urban landscape and the alcohol and cigarette advertisements they frequently carry.

Representatives from community groups in Charlestown, Allston-Brighton and Dorchester spoke at the hearing.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, spoke in support of the amendment. She said: "I feel that this amendment will give the community more input and control on an issue that adversely affects our quality of life."

Ken Stone, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Billboard Committee, presented petitions signed by community residents in support of the amendment. He related the experience of residents in appearing before the Outdoor Advertising Board in opposition to the proposed billboard on 50 Brighton St. and the inconsiderate treatment they received by the board members. He spoke of the board overruling its own hearing officer who agreed with the residents and city and recommended denial of the billboard ap-

plication, and also the board's failure to recognize the Caldwell Street Playground as a park. He stated: "The Caldwell Street Playground is as much of a park as the Boston Common."

Also speaking at the

hearing was Rosemary Kverek, president of the Charlestown Preservation Society.

"It is very important that people living near these billboards have a say in the process," said Joe Chaisson, treasurer of the Dor-

chester Allied Neighborhood Associations.

Recently, despite neighborhood opposition, the Outdoor Advertising Board approved two new billboard faces at 50 Brighton St. in Charlestown and five in Dorchester.

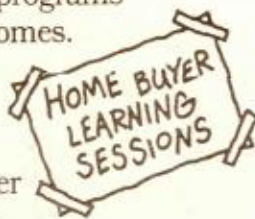

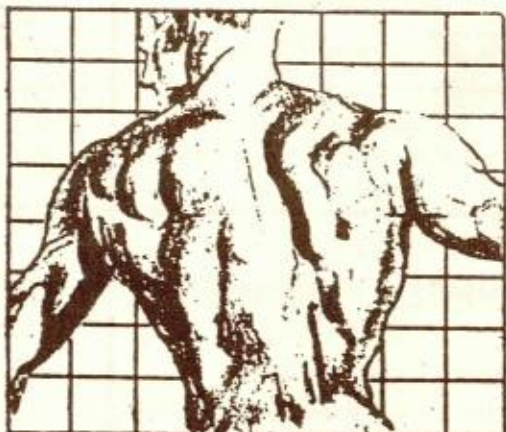

Get Out, Stay Out: It's Your Fire Safe Response

Although 82 percent of American homes have smoke detectors, nearly one-third don't work because of worn or missing batteries.

This is tragic because a working smoke detector cuts the risk of dying in a home fire by nearly half by providing an early warning and critical extra seconds to escape.

Because people too often aren't well prepared to evacuate a fast-growing fire, the National Fire Prevention Association decided to make escape the focus of this year's Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 3-9. The theme for the national commemoration is "Get Out, Stay Out: Your Fire Safe Response." You may only have a very few minutes to safely escape a fire. The Boston Fire Department reminds

people to NEVER go back into a burning building.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year in North America and several European countries in remembrance of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 in which 250 people died. Held every October, it is the full week, Sunday through Saturday, that includes Oct. 9, the anniversary of the fire.

What are some of the things that can be done to help prevent fires? To start with, it is the law in Mass. that homes be equipped with smoke detectors, one on each level. "And it's not enough to have a smoke de-

tor," said Boston Fire Commissioner Martin Pierce. "Make sure the batteries work, and test the detectors monthly."

Keep matches and lighters where children can't get them. Never wear loose-fitting garments when cooking, never leave a pot on the burner unattended, use caution when using alternate heaters (unvented kerosene heaters are illegal in Mass.), discard cracked or frayed electrical cords and never smoke in bed.

Every household should have a plan of escape with at least two escape routes from each room, and practice it.

It Was 12 Years Ago!

Just a thought. Where was I a dozen years ago? I remember one night in East Boston back in October of 1981 when a group of Anti-Prop 2 1/2 protesters from East Boston and Charlestown joined forces at the Sumner Tunnel next to Lombardo's and proceeded to block the tunnel entrance during rush hour to show Boston that public safety cuts would endanger the entire East Boston community.

The group from Charlestown, of which I was a proud part, had occupied the firehouse on Winthrop Street in Charlestown back in May and June of that year and prevented the city from removing the Engine No. 50 apparatus from the station. For one month, we occupied the firehouse and in the end, the city relented, the fire apparatus was reactivated and the firehouse re-opened by the White administration. I was called a member of the Charlestown Seven, a badge of honor to me.

Eventually, on that October night, the Boston Police cleared us away from the tunnel and I ended up standing before Judge Joe Ferrino at the East Boston District Court. Thankfully, the criminal justice system does work at times. Everyone seemed to understand that we were nothing more than outraged citizens committing an act of civil disobedience. But I can't believe it was 12 years ago!
