DECA Members Teach First Aid

Cafeteria workers in Hamburg Central School District are now better prepared to deal with emergencies thanks to the efforts of students who taught them the life-saving Heimlich maneuver.

Research by the students also found that many of the district cafeteria workers and lunch monitors did not know how to perform the Heimlich maneuver, and were not required to learn it.

Simple math told the students that the district's 4,000 students who eat lunch daily at school cafeterias consume a total of 800,000 lunches per year. Coupled with the lack of training, the students felt an unnecessary accident was waiting to happen. So students Lisa Armbruster, Kristine McHugh, both juniors, and sophomore Jennifer Errington set out to make the school district's cafeterias safer places to dine.

Katie Sacco, a Red Cross coordinator for First Aid/CPR programs, personally trained the trio in the Heimlich maneuver and suggested they take the Red Cross CPR course. "I thought it was wonderful that these three young people wanted to involve the Red Cross in their DECA project. They followed up on my suggestion and took the CPR course. Taking the course gave them a better background and made them more knowledgeable," Sacco said.

The three students, along with other DECA members, assembled a presentation that included posters, wallet-sized information cards, a video tape and actual demonstrations of the Heimlich maneuver on audience volunteers followed by a question-answer period.

In addition to district cafeteria staff, the presentation was put on for district office workers, sixth-graders and anyone else in the district who expressed an interest.

Michael Karpis, a district secondary business and marketing teacher, also arranged to have the group visit Alden Central School District, where they gave a presentation.

A resident of Alden, Karpis serves as the Hamburg faculty adviser to DECA. Future plans include annual training sessions for school staff and presentations to local service clubs.

As for the initial public relations project, state DECA officials rewarded the Hamburg DECA chapter with high honors earlier this year. The chapter won third place for its project in statewide competition.
