## Drug Education At The Charlestown Boys And Girls Club

The Charlestown Boys and Girls Club has hired a Drug Education Coordinator for the school year. Tom King was able to obtain the funds for this much needed service through a Massachusetts Department of Drug Rehabilitation grant. "When we asked the kids what they wanted for their program last year, drug education was a high priority," said the Charlestown Club Director. Mimi White, M.Ed., has joined the staff as of October 1. Besides her training as a counselor, she is knowledgeable in all facets of alcohol/drug use and abuse. For two years she has been doing alcohol education groups for teenagers at Faulkner Hospital.

Mrs. White has been spending time this past week getting to know the Boys and Girls Club and the Charlestown com-

munity. "It's truly a beautiful town...a place I have not gotten to know before, though I've lived around Boston for many years," states Mrs. White.

Mrs. White hopes to bring an awareness of drugs and issues surrounding them to adolescents, pre-adolescents, and parents. She stated, "The drug problem is here in Charlestown as it is in all other areas throughout the country. Education is good and necessary but it is not the only factor in combating drug abuse. Attitudes towards drug use need to be examined before any change can be effected. I hope I will have an opportunity to help in these areas."

Weekly there will be an article answering any questions that might be sent in to Mimi White concerning aspects of drug use and abuse, alcoholism, or recovery. DO YOU

Constitution will toast to her 188th anniversary with a traditional rum rationing ceremony at a party on Friday, October 21st at 6:30 p.m. at the Constitution Headquarters in Charlestown. Dressed in full 1812 regalia, the bosen will pipe "Up Spirits" on his whistle and the very important grog rationing

will begin. The Constitution is the only commissioned ship in the U.S. Navy with a rum tub still on it. The ration of grog will consist of 4 parts water equal 2 parts Pusser's Rum as was served on the seas for over 300 years. Commander Sudholtz of the Constitution has ordered this rum ceremony to be authentic.

*Views On Dental Health*

**IS THERE AN ANTI-CAVITY VACCINE?**

The development of a vaccine that can prevent tooth decay has long been the goal of dental researchers. Experiments currently being conducted by the National Institute of Dental Research (NIDR), offer promise of a vaccine that could eliminate 90% of dental decay, to be available to the general public by 1990.

This prediction is based on recent clinical tests which, for the first time in human subjects, have successfully controlled and eliminated the specific bacteria associated with dental decay. Although further testing and refinement is necessary, it is expected that the vaccine will be in the form of a pill taken every 6 months. In addition to the research at NIDR, several pharmaceutical companies are conducting independent research to develop a successful vaccine to be available even sooner.

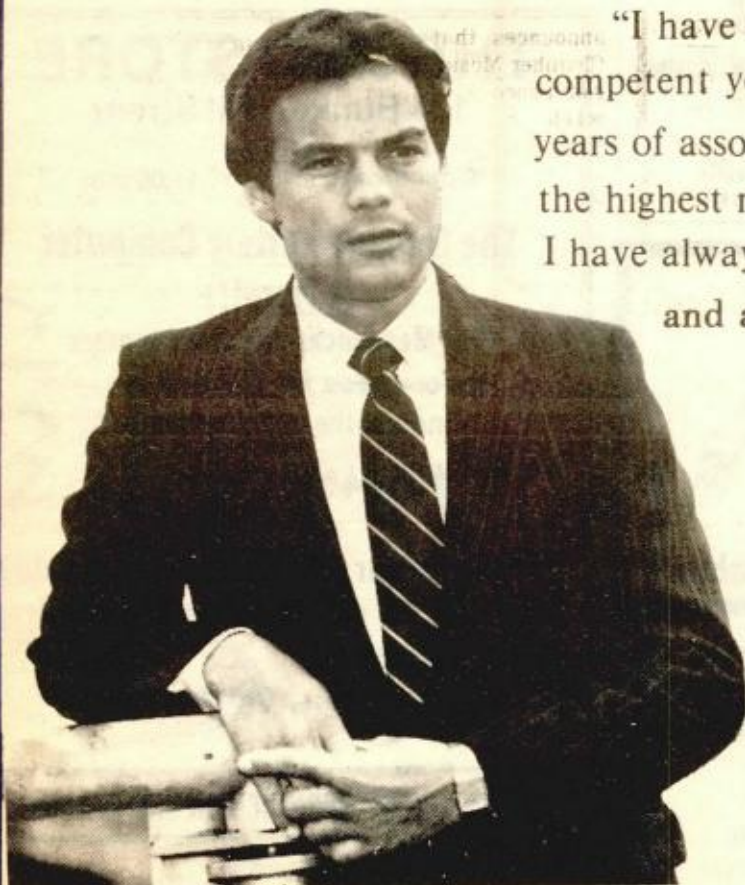

## Thinking Out Loud

TRAVAGLINI, MODICA  
SEEK TOWNIE VOTE

The race for District One City Councillor has come down to Robert Travaglini

and Diane Modica, both of East Boston. Travaglini carried the district winning over five thousand votes and Modica finished in second place only thirteen hundred votes behind.

The preliminary election results show Travaglini the heavy favorite in East Boston, winning there by a 2-1 margin. Modica carried the North End with Robert Cappucci coming in second and Michael Reardon topped the ticket in Charlestown but finishing fourth district wide.

Diane Modica's second place finish can be attributed in a great part to two key Charlestown precincts - heavily gentrified, the Monument Square and Navy Yard area.

According to some political observers, Modica, a former Massport employee, has momentum going for her, but Travaglini's first-place victory was impressive and can't be undersold.

The District One race is, indeed, a horse race. Either candidate can win it depending on who gets out

## "Master Harold . . .

## And The Boys"

## Returns To Wilbur Theatre

"Master Harold" ... and the boys," the play written and directed by Athol Fugard, noted South African playwright, previews at The Wilbur Theatre on Tuesday, November 1 and opens on Thursday, November 3, for a limited engagement. Presented by Marvin A. Krauss and Irving Siders, the production stars Zakes Mokae in his Tony Award-winning Broadway performance in the role of Sam. Also starring are Ray Aranha and Evan Handler.

Athol Fugard has returned from South Africa to direct this new cast in the production which broke box office records at the Wilbur last spring. At that time, Kevin Kelly of The Globe said, "It is a masterpiece, period. It is bitter, bruising and extra-ordinarily beautiful, quite simply one of the great plays of our time."

Zakes Mokae, a distinguished actor, is a native of Johannesburg, South Africa and a longtime associate of Athol Fugard. Mr. Mokae originated this role at the Yale Repertory Theatre and premiered it on Broadway, where his performance won a coveted Tony Award. The season before he had starred on Broadway as Steve Daniels in Mr. Fugard's A Lesson From Aloes. He made his American theatre debut as the Old African in Boesman and Lena and later succeeded James Earl Jones in the title role opposite Ruby Dee at the Circle in the Square Theatre in New York. He studies drama at the Royal Academy in London and the British Drama League and has taught at the American Conservatory Theatre. He has played in regional theatres across America and is a director as well.

"Master Harold" ... and the boys" had its World Premiere at the Yale Repertory, becoming the first Fugard play to do so outside South Africa; It subsequently opened on Broadway at the Lyceum Theatre on May 4, 1982. While Mr. Fugard was directing this production of the play, another longtime Fugard associate, Suzanne Shepherd, was directing it in its South African premiere for the March 17, 1983 opening in Johannesburg. At one point banned by the South African government, the play was permitted to open when the ruling was overturned.

Ray Aranha has been a professional actor, director and playwright for 15 years. His most recent acting credits include Steve in A Lesson From Aloes by Mr. Fugard, the title roles in Macbeth and Othello at the Champlain Shakespeare Festival and the leading role in Zooman and the Sign with the Negro Ensemble Company. As a playwright he is the award-winning author of My Sister, My Sister.

Evan Handler, who plays the role of Hally, which is based on Fugard himself, has played on Broadway in Solomon's Child, off-Broadway in Strider and Biography: A Game, and in Early Warnings at the Manhattan Theatre Club. He appeared as Eddie in the movie Taps and as Goldberg in the film of The Chosen and makes his touring debut with this production.

Based on an incident in the playwright's own life, "Master Harold" is the latest play in a body of work which began in 1959 with the all-black production of No-Good Friday in South Africa. 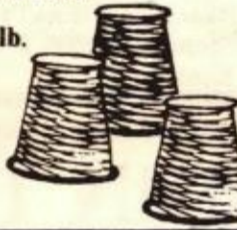

## "Mission Hill" Zeroes In On Reality

"Mission Hill", produced by independent film-maker Robert Jones, starring Brian Burke. Opens October 21, at Sack Beacon Hill.

Once again, Charlestown and some of its residents have had the honor of appearing in a motion picture, this one entitled "Mission Hill."

"Mission Hill" is a story of the alternate paths two youths take in struggling from beneath the social deprivations of a working-class life. It is not an unique story but it is a personalized one for those who live in Boston, and especially Charlestown, as the complete film was shot on location in Boston neighborhoods using for the most part, Boston or local actors.

Danny and Laura Doyle are brother and sister who along with their mother and younger brother live in a tenement setting of Mission Hill, barely eeking out a survival.

Danny wants to quit high school and earn a fast buck, anyway he can.

Laura wants to become a singer. However, both suffer set backs with Danny's being the most devastating. He becomes involved with the police.

The film is dedicated to Levi Hart, the teen-age black who was struck down by Boston police officers

during a car theft. Although the script for "Mission Hill" was written long before that incident, the movie turned out to be a prophecy for Levi Hart, and no doubt, predicts the future for others.

Considered a drama which employs docu-

mentary information, the film accurately captures the social problems that face Boston and other major U.S. cities...that being a lack of motivation for youths of large cities to seek alternatives to crime or to act out their frustrations in ways other than violence. If you have grown up in the city or are close to the monster's heart in any other way, you will find nothing new in this film.

Instead, you will find in the frames of film a resounding cry for a solution to crimes committed by our city's youths. This is what Charlestown resident and location manager for the film, Joe Foley sees in the film.

"The film stands for many things. Maybe to you and I there's nothing new. We probably even know a family who has suffered a similar incident, but we've forgotten about it. The film

reminds us of reality," said Foley.

"Mission Hill" was recently named as Best Feature Film at the Athens International Film Festival and Best First Feature at the Houston International Film Festival. Earlier this year the film was awarded Honorable Mention at the U.S. Film Festival.

### Next week we will begin a three part series in the Patriot *Show Of Strength At Museum*

A show of strength takes place Friday and Saturday, October 21 and 22, at the Museum of Science, which is staging a re-enactment of a famous 17th century demonstration.

On Friday at 12 noon strong men from the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus attempt to separate two metal hemispheres that have been joined together and emptied of air. The power of the resulting vacuum is tested against the men's strengths.

On Saturday at 1 p.m. two teams of Belgian horses, three to a team, attempt the same feat. The horses are from the Eastern Draft Horse Association.

The two demonstrations are a spin-off from the Museum's current exhibit on The History of Vacuum Technology. Installed with the cooperation of the American Vacuum Society, the exhibit features a replica of the hemispheres used by Otto von Gericke of Magdeburg in 1654.

He then had a team of eight horses attached to each side of the sphere. Both teams, pulling in opposite directions, could not separate the hemispheres. Because the King of Prussia was in his audience, the fame of the demonstration spread, and the previously held view that a vacuum was a physical impossibility was demolished.

The Museum's replica of the Magdeburg Spheres was lent by the Deutsches Museum, Munich. A number of other museums and institutions lent material, which was collected by the American Vacuum Society for its annual symposium in Boston later this month. The featured spheres remain on display through October 30.

### Cablevision Gives Employment Statics

Cablevision of Boston has delivered its quarterly report on employment to the Neighborhood Development Employment Agency, Department of Compliance and Enforcement of the City of Boston.

As of September 30, 1983, there were 297 employees, of which 76% or 226 were Boston residents; 32% (95) were minorities, and 32% (96) were women.

In Section 13.1 of the license agreement with the City of Boston, Cablevision of Boston agreed to take affirmative action to employ during the construction of the system at least 50% Boston residents, 25% minorities and 10% women. Cablevision of Boston has exceeded these percentages for the past 9 months.

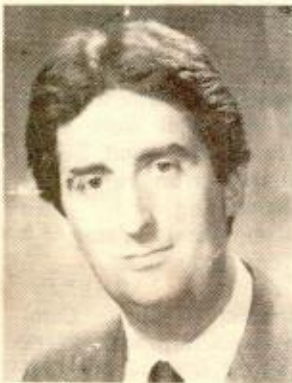
## Nucci Gets Highest District School Vote In City

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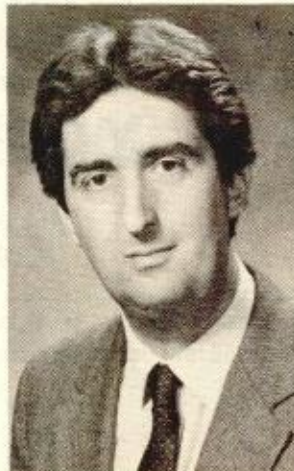

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## Considine On Candian Hockey Team

Dan Considine says that, unlike many Canadian centaws, he likes to go inna cawnaws.

In the Queen's English, the 19 year old Considine was saying that he likes to grind it out in the corners to get the puck even though he is a center iceman.

Considine is from Charlestown, Massachusetts and come to the Orillia Travelways Hockey Team after a 30 goal, 25 assist season in the tough Boston City League in just 13 games. Charlestown High won the league title and made the second round of the state championship.

"That Charlestown is the toughest part of Boston," St. Lawrence University assistant hockey coach Randy Sexton observed recently. He was in Orillia scouting the Travelways players for college scholarships.

"The type of guys they produce there are pretty tough. Mike Fidler from the N.H.L.? He grew up there."

Considine is an example of how far the tentacles of a good hockey organization can stretch.

"I had a few offers from

schools for scholarships," said Considine, who was his team's leading scorer last season. "But nothing big and it turned out to be a lot of talk.

"I wasn't that great in school. Most of the colleges wanted me to go to prep school."

So Boston Bruin scout, Bob Tindale, tipped off the Travelways to the husky center and also alerted Considine to the joys of playing in central Ontario.

So far, neither side has been disappointed with the arrangement.

"He'll stick with us," said Harry Kloefer, Travelways' executive director. "He's very tough. He hit a kid so hard in Newmarket that they had to carry him off the ice.

"Most Americans take some time to adapt to the speed of the Canadian game, but Considine is one of those guys who is the first man in the corner. He has adjusted well.

"He looks a bit awkward on skates, like a football player, but he can thread the needle with the passes."

And he can work those corners.

At 5' 10" and 190 pounds of pectorals, biceps and hamstrings, Considine is

one of the most solid of this year's huge Travelway team. Kloefer says Considine and a few of the others made the team because no one had the guts to cut them.

Twenty, of the more than 300 players who tried out, made the team and Considine was the only American to be so chosen.

Although the bulky pivot spent a lot of time in the Boston Garden watching the Bruins, he says he doesn't style himself after any particular N.H.L. player.

"None of the great centers in the N.H.L. are real corner men," says Considine, "but I've always played center and I've always played it from the corners, trying to set up the wingers."

That's fine with coach Rich Bince who, naturally, seems to like Considine's aggressive style. The feeling is mutual.

"I like Bince as a coach," says Considine. "He's teaching me a lot more than I ever learned in the states - mostly on defensive play what to do on a draw in our end, who to take first, how to forecheck."

The Bobby Orr influence is evident when Considine

responds to a discussion on the difference between U.S. and Canadian hockey.

"In the States, most of the time defensemen bring the puck out of their end," he says. "Here we try to have the wingers bring it out up the side.

"Also, the game I'm used to isn't as fast as it is here, although the hitting is about the same."

Considine was originally ticketed for Stratford's Junior B Cullitons, the best Junior B organization in the province of Ontario and a haven for American players. However, they dallied and Greg Simerson, Travelways' chief scout, snapped him up. Considine paid his own way (about \$120) to training camp.

He returned home to Charlestown over the

weekend, after it became apparent that he would be staying in Orillia all winter.

He almost didn't make it back.

Apparently there were some immigration officials who didn't believe he was heading to Orillia to play hockey.

Simerson tore down to the airport, straightened out the situation and later met with immigration officials.

"They said I wouldn't be able to play in any games until I get all my papers passed," said Considine.

Considine says that he has been taking quite a bit of ribbing for his nasal accent which "reeks of baked beans and crabs." He says it doesn't bother him.

And no opposition skater is going to make fun of his accent while they're both in the cawnaw.

# Charlestown Police Line

On October 7, 1983, Officers received a call of an attempted suicide at McNulty Court. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to the suspect's sister, who told them that her sister had been drinking heavily all day, and that she had sliced both wrists and her stomach. The officers immediately requested medical attention. The suspect was taken to Mass. General Hospital by ambulance. The officers later found out that the suspect has a past history of mental problems, and has been treated at the Lindeman Center.

On October 8, 1983, a Charlestown man was arrested on Cambridge Street, Boston, for Willful and Malicious Destruction of Property. The man was extremely drunk and threw a wooden saw-horse through two large windows. The man was pointed out to the officers and placed under arrest. The officers observed that the suspect had been injured during the incident. The suspect was taken to Boston City Hospital, where he was treated and released to the custody of the arresting officers. The suspect was then taken to District A where he was charged with, Willful and Malicious Destruction of Property.

On October 8, 1983, Officers responded to Roland Street on a call for an attempted Breaking and Entering. Upon arrival, they were met by the night manager who told them that when he left the building all doors were secured. The rear entrance was now open. The officers searched the building, to no avail. The building was then secured by the night manager. This incident is to be further investigated.

On October 8, 1983, Officers received a call for a Break-

ing and Entering at the Mystic Tavern Lounge. When the officers arrived they spoke to the manager, who told them that person(s) unknown entered the building through the front grate. When the suspects were inside, they stole an undetermined amount of cash and checks from the cash register. The suspects also stole a .38 caliber revolver, .22 caliber handgun, and BB target gun. This incident is to be further investigated by Detectives at District A.

On October 9, 1983, Officers received a call for gun shots fired at the corner of Medford and Pearl Streets. Upon arrival, the officers spoke to a witness, who told them that two white males drove up to a Cadillac, parked at the above

location, and fired six gun shots into the Cadillac. The witness then told the officers that the suspect vehicle then headed towards the Bunker Hill Housing Project. The officers spoke to the owner of the Cadillac, and he told them he had no reason why someone would do this to his vehicle. The victim could not give the officers any more information. The victim then got into the Cadillac and drove off. This incident is to be further investigated.

The next Community Service Meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 8 at 7:00 p.m. The location for this and all meetings is The Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill Street.

## Confirms Opening Of Police Sub-Station

Finally, public confirmation was given on the impending opening of a Police Sub-station for Charlestown at Tuesday's Police/Community Relations Meeting.

According to Deputy Superintendent Joseph Saia, the Sub-station will be located adjacent to Store 24 and that firm is renovating that section of the building to suit the

needs of Boston Police. Store 24 is located in Thompson Square.

Saia said Connie McCarthy, owner of the lot adjacent the Store 24 building, will lease spaces to the police at \$1 per year to park their patrol cars.

Saia said he expects renovations to be completed before the end of November at which time he and others will move in.

A complete communication system will be housed in the building, and there will be a police officer stationed around the clock with an additional cadet on duty during the day shift.

Another unit will also be

headquartered at the sub-station. Saia suggested this unit could be the Harbor Patrol or the Team Police. Earlier this year City Hall officials were considering locating the Detectives in the Charlestown sub-station.

Saia said reports will be made at the sub-station but that arrests will be taken to Division I on New Sudbury Street in downtown Boston.

"Now if I can just keep them (police officers) from hanging out at the station," said Saia. "Superintendent Coleman lives just around the corner. God help them if he catches anyone."

### Takes Issue With Hunneman's Letter

Dear Miss Girvin,

This letter is in reference to a letter printed in the Patriot on October 6 from a Mr. Greg Jordan, CharlesNewtown Management, which he called a clarification of a previous article regarding CharlesNewtown.

I was also at that meeting a few weeks ago and Mr. Jordan's answers were different then they were in last week's letter. He stated that we could not sell our share at a profit. If he happens to have a book on the cooperative he would find on page 22 that:

**TRANSFER VALUE:** Whenever the Board of Directors elects to purchase a membership, the term "transfer value" shall mean the sum of the following:

1. The consideration (i.e. down payment) paid for the membership by the first occupant of the unit involved as shown on the books of the Corporation;

2. The value, as determined by the Directors, of any improvements installed at the expense of the member with the prior approval of the Directors, under a valuation formula which does not provide for reimbursement in an amount in excess of the typical initial cost of the improvements.

3. The amount of principal amortized by the Corporation on its mortgage indebtedness and attributable to the dwelling unit involved as paid by the member involved and previous holders of the same membership. However, the amount of principal paid by the Corporation for a period of three years after the Corporation has made its first principal payment on the mortgage shall not be included in this computation.

Mr. Jordan, we as a Cooperative also have an income tax advantage. When Hunneman was called for figures for our income tax, they didn't know what we were talking about.

I, for one, would like to know how our gas and light bills, which were paid off two years ago, were allowed to accumulate to the amount we owe today?

Why, when we sued the contractors for \$2 million dollars did we only settle for \$175,000? Why can't that money be used today to help with our bills?

Why when we voted NO to syndication on October 8, did OUR PEOPLE tell us to go to court ourselves and fight for our gas and electricity? I thought they were there to help us, no matter what.

When it comes down to it all, what matters is whose payroll they (the board) are going on.

I know this is a long letter, Miss Girvin, and I could fill the Patriot with many things. I hope you will give us a chance to speak up and fight back by printing this letter.

## Open Letter Of Thanks To A United States Army General

It is important for the people of Charlestown, where I live, and all other cities and towns to keep in mind that our great nation still has thirty-nine thousand American troops as a peace-keeping force, and along with many other free nations, they combine to make one half million troops in South Korea. North Korea also has one half million armed

troops, with which I pray we will not have to do battle again.

Realizing this is a very lonely assignment for our American troops, I sent pictures of my garden better known as Veterans Garden, and the flags that fly in it, to the Commanding Officer of the Peace-keeping Force of the United Nations which is Four Star General Sennewald, United States Army, Korea.

The flags are from all branches of the military services plus the Stars and Stripes which was flown from the mainmast of the U.S.S. Arizona, sunk by the Japanese on December 7, 1942. Mrs. Florence Johnson donated this flag in loving memory of her son, killed in Vietnam in 1967, and also her husband, a Navy veteran WW 2. A picture of Florence raising her son's flag was also sent with the pictures.

I requested that the General have sets of these pictures made up and posted on all bulletin boards under his command. I had hoped that these pictures would let our troops stationed in Korea know that the people of Charlestown, and all other cities and towns care and that they are not forgotten.

General Sennewald was kind enough to take the time to send to me a beautiful United Nations Flag to compliment the other flags in the garden, along with a detailed copy of the Peace treaty signed between United States and North Korea. Thirty-nine troops of this peace-keeping force, including Americans, have died since this Treaty was signed. I received a letter of thanks from the General, which I think is great since he must be busy. (Let us not forget.)

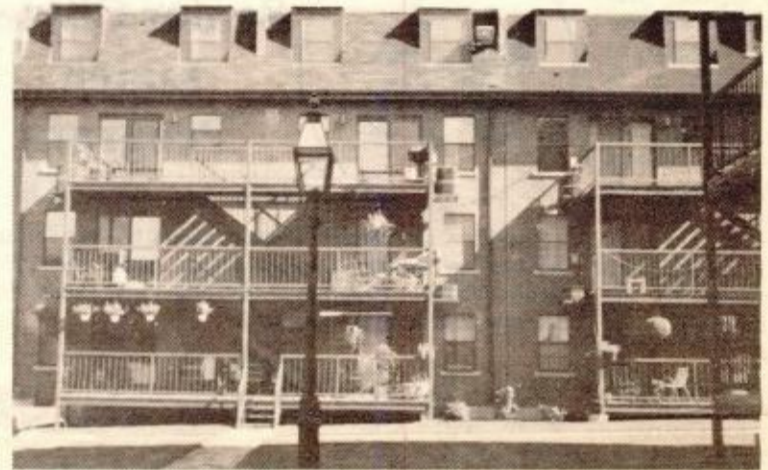
