

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
Charlestown Teens Receive Awards From Mayor

The majority of the award recipients were past peerleaders in the Youth Outreach Program who were nominated by their




SHANNON McLAUGHLIN receives a Mayor's Youth Service Award from Mayor Raymond L. Flynn.







★ Tax Credit For Working Families . . . Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham, chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, has announced that he will join the 1993 Earned Income Tax Credit Campaign (EIC) and that the resources of his office will be made available to assist the EIC outreach.

The Earned Income Credit (EIC) is a tax credit designed to benefit working families that have at least one child living at home for more than half the year and income of less than \$22,370 for 1992. The credit is available to both married and single parents. Even families whose income is so low that they do not owe federal income tax can be eligible to receive a check up to \$2,211.

"According to Internal Revenue Service estimates, 10s of thousands of Massachusetts families are eligible for the EIC credit and are not receiving it. With so many Massachusetts residents struggling financially as a result of the poor economy, it is important that we draw attention to an underutilized benefit for those who need it most," said Birmingham.

The EIC is a "refundable" credit. This means that eligible working families can benefit from the credit even if they owe no federal income tax. Eligible families that owe no income tax receive a check from the Internal Revenue Service in the amount of their credit. If a family does owe income tax, the EIC reduces the amount of taxes owed. If the family's credit is greater that the amount of taxes it owes, the family's

tax bill will be reduced to zero and the IRS will send the family a check for the remainder of its EIC.

Eligible families must do two things to receive the EIC: they must file a federal income tax return using either Form 1040A or Form 1040 and they must also file a tax form called Schedule EIC with their tax return.

"I urge those families who feel that they may qualify for this benefit to seek further information by calling my office 722-1650. This benefit is designed especially for working families and they should take advantage of it," concluded Birmingham.

* Street Reconstruction Update . . . Mother Nature continues to foil any ideas of starting construction this spring. Susi & Son has obtained the necessary work permits, has the construction signs in place, the traffic mitigation plans are all approved and the preconstruction video was even

done in between snowstorms. The plan at the moment is to try and start on Lawrence and Seminary streets on Monday, March 29, weather permitting. Watch for the leaflet distribution if you live in the planned construction area. The calendar says spring is here and as soon as the weather agrees, construction will be able to be started.

The railing fabricator for the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) is about finished making the railing. When the ice and snow melt off the stairs, he will be able to get out there and set up the trial section of railing for inspection by the Boston Redevelopment Authority. Again, when the weather agrees with the calendar, the stairs project will also be able to get going. Look for leaflets in the vicinity of the stairs for the start-up of that contract as well.

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Voke's Group Meets With Congress On Water Bills

Thirty-five Massachusetts legislators, led by House Majority Leader Richard Voke, met two weeks ago with the entire Massachusetts Congressional Delegation to discuss the issue of sky rocketing water and sewer rates charged to member communities of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MW-RA). The meeting, which was held in the Washington, D.C. office of Congressman Joseph Moakley, also included the participation of U.S. Speaker of the House Tom Foley.

"As evidenced by the attendance of Speaker Foley, I was pleased to see just how important rate relief was to our congressional delegation. While I have had several talks with Congressman Joseph Kennedy regarding the subject and know he shares my commitment to help local ratepayers, listening to Senators Edward Kennedy and John Kerry and the rest of our congressmen speak showed me they do understand the issues and will continue to act in our best interests in terms of seeking federal funding," said Voke.

After opening statements by several of the congressmen there, Voke began the morning program by framing a picture of the present situation: "We are in a crisis situation, one which was not created solely by the 2.5 million MWRA ratepayers, but one which is being rectified solely by those very same 2.5 million MWRA ratepayers." From there, Voke went on to retell many of the situations revealed to him by Charlestown resi-

dents and businesspersons, along with his own personal concerns that spiralling rates would continue to dampen individual household and business budgets, the local and regional housing markets and the entire regional economy.

In addition to getting a rundown of the actions of the congressional delegation on the federal level, the state legislators also engaged in a question and answer session with their federal counterparts in an effort to identify problems and work on solutions on both levels of government.

"Beginning with a comment by Sen. Kennedy that the harbor was going to be here for hundreds of more years, we embarked on a discussion of long-term bonding as a way of spreading out capital costs over the life-span of the harbor. We also addressed many other aspects of possible relief, including federal and state loan and grant programs and the impacts these would have on rates," noted

Speaker Foley concluded the meeting with revelations regarding his own district's experience in the state of Washington. The greater Seattle area recently concluded its own water and sewer infrastructure program which similarly drove rates up.

Voke's group also met Wednesday with key staff people in the House Appropriations office. There, they lobbied federal staffers to review possible language changes in congressional appropriations which would allow federal funds to be

applied to the MWRA debt service now, instead of future costs down the road.

"We were able to explain how a \$20 million grant by the state was equal in terms of immediate rate relief to a federal grant of \$200 million, simply because the language with the federal grant would not allow us to apply the money to today's loan repayments. While the idea of rate relief may sound easy, as shown by this concept and others, we were in fact dealing with the staffers on some very complicated issues," noted Voke.

Satisfied with their trip to the nation's capital and the responses they heard, Voke noted the MWRA State Legislative Caucus would now continue its focus on bills and appropriations requests it has sponsored on Beacon

"Although nothing is concrete, I do believe our joint efforts on the state and

federal levels will pay great dividends. While we can be pleased that there is some light at the end of the tunnel, we must continue to move forward to reach the end of what has proven to be a very frustrating and complicated journey for rate relief," concluded






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
