# A MESSAGE FROM L.A. UNIFIED VICE PRESIDENT NICK MELVOIN

### FRIENDS AND PARTNERS,

It has been two years since I was sworn in to serve on the LA Unified Board of Education and represent the families and schools of Board District 4.

Every day and every decision in our work starts with a promise to put kids first. We have made progress on our priorities by building new coalitions and soliciting community input. We have worked hard to ensure that we can hear from every stakeholder, no matter their viewpoint or disagreements. We have stayed true to our values in the face of opposition, opting always to do what is right over what is easy.

Last year, we heard from parents about the need for district transparency, stronger K-12 pathways, better safety measures, and more resources in schools. This year, we introduced an Open Data platform and catalog with publicly accessible datasets. We engaged the community to begin the process of opening new middle school options. And we funded nearly \$154M in projects to directly benefit schools in my district, including technology and security upgrades.

As I told thousands of graduates this year—change is hard, but possible. And it starts by showing up. So, as long as I'm in a position to make a positive impact on the students of LA Unified, I will show up every day to do just that. Take a look at what we've achieved this year, together.

### **CHAMPIONING OPEN DATA**

Our "Open Data" resolution passed to increase transparency and accountability with a public district data portal.

### **TACKLING LONG-TERM LIABILITIES**

We made tackling the district's long-term liabilities a priority, advocating for pension reform at the state level. Nick cast the lone vote against a deal that he believed was bad for students and employees.

### **ADVOCATING FOR MORE FUNDING**

We advocated for increased state and federal investments in public education, especially for our most vulnerable students.

**LEAD BY LISTENING: ENGAGE OUR PARENTS AND SCHOOL** COMMUNITIES AS PARTNERS TO SERVE THEIR DIVERSE NEEDS

### **SPEARHEADING MOBILE APP**

Nick's resolution to create a district wide mobile app that transforms district communications with parents unanimously passed.

### IMPROVING SCHOOL **FACILITIES**

We visited every school in BD4, held several community forums, and launched a "Bond Grant" application program to hear from our school communities about the resources they most need.

### **CUTTING RED TAPE**

We worked with the district to stop charging fees for parent volunteer groups to rent school spaces and solicited community feedback about the barriers we could reduce.

TRANSFORM EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES: PROTECT AND EXPAND ACCESS TO HIGH-QUALITY SCHOOL OPTIONS FOR EVERY STUDENT

### **INCREASING COLLEGE READINESS**

We pushed for a pilot program to give LA Unified juniors in one local district the SAT for free during school hours, and worked to expand this to all LA Unified juniors the following year.

### **SIMPLIFYING** SCHOOL SEARCH

We co-sponsored a resolution to create an online system of school report cards with easy-to-understand information about all our schools.

### **STANDING UP FOR SCHOOL CHOICE**

We began our work with a kids first agenda, promoting collaborative progress and leading efforts to include more schools of choice in our online enrollment platform.

# POLICY PROGRESS

## 2018-19

Open Data launched with datasets on the budget, student demographics, attendance, college and career readiness, and more.

LA Unified worked with labor partners to initiate a Medicare reform that will save \$3.8B and the Governor's latest budget proposal included some state pension relief.



We continued our advocacy, and the Governor's latest budget includes an increase in state funding. Although Measure EE did not pass locally, we built a broad coalition of support and look forward to continuing the fight for more funding!




We have funded \$154M in projects for BD4 schools since taking office—including over \$1.6M in BD4 "Bond Grants"—to provide security, technology, renovations, and more.

We spearheaded a new district policy to waive fingerprinting fees and simplify the volunteer process for district parents and pushed the district to begin the process of digitizing burdensome paperwork.



We succeeded in offering all LA Unified juniors the SAT for free during school hours.

We held stakeholder working groups to develop the school report card platform—coming this fall!


# COMMUNITY PROGRESS

### **NORTHWEST SAN FERNANDO VALLEY**

### 29 SCHOOLS SERVING MORE THAN 13,000 STUDENTS

- Classroom Champions visits Sutter MS with paralympic athlete to educate MS students about the importance of living a healthy lifestyle one of the first partnerships BD4 facilitated
- Successfully advocated for the redevelopment of the track and field at Taft Charter High School
- Worked with NWSFV parents to facilitate meetings with Asm. Jesse Gabriel and other state legislators to discuss the underfunding of public education
- In light of concerns raised at several schools, passed a motion to make it easier for parents to volunteer while still meeting state legal requirements

- Worked with parents to facilitate meeting with Asm. Autumn Burke to discuss the underfunding of public education in California
- Funded chromebook carts for Grand View ES, Mar Vista ES, and Stoner Ave ES through BD4 bond grant program
- Assisted Mark Twain MS to secure new tennis courts and fund gym renovations including basketball backboards and volleyball court net Secured additional teacher at Walgrove ES to avoid split classes

- Funded chromebook cart at Cheremoya Avenue ES to support technology access for students

### **WEST HOLLYWOOD**

### 15 SCHOOLS SERVING MORE THAN 5,000 STUDENTS

- Successfully advocated to lower the college enrollment requirement to protect teacher assistants at Wonderland Ave ES, West Hollywood ES, and at schools across BD4
- Funded the installation of the iron rod fence around Hancock Park ES. In addition, facilitated meeting at school with district staff and City officials to support school safety
- Funded the purchase of flexible seating furniture at Rosewood Ave ES to support creating adaptive learning spaces
- Funded landscaping and irrigation upgrades at the Laurel Early Education Center

### **WEST LOS ANGELES**

### 15 SCHOOLS SERVING NEARLY 8,000 STUDENTS

- Ensured the Institute of Chinese Culture and Language After-School Program at Brentwood Science ES remains
- Funded completion for new play structure at Brockton Ave. ES, audio visual equipment for Webster Middle School's auditorium, and a security gate for Warner Ave. ES through BD4 bond grant program
- Co-sponsored fire evacuation drill event with Councilmember Mike Bonin's Office for school communities in affected areas

- Funded technology and innovation upgrades at Katherine Johnson STEM Academy, Cowan ES, and Kentwood ES
- Secured funding for upcoming library renovations at Playa del Rey ES
