## Competition Heats Up As Business Teams Prepare For Race

Runners from far and near are quietly contacting the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club for an application to race in the Two-Mile Novice or 8 K Battle of Bunker Hill Road Races that are set to go on the morning of Sunday, June 16. Things are not nearly so quiet in the Charlestown business community.

In last week's Patriot and in a mailing to the businesses in Charlestown, Thom Gilligan from Marathon Tours \& Travel threw his hat in the ring to challenge last year's business competitors McCarthy Brothers Liquors and the Ironside Grille. As is indicated by the name of his business, Gilligan is no stranger to the sport of running and he looks to take the "Fastest Business in Charlestown" award.

Other team captains are taking the challenge seriously and have their teams in full-time training. Richie McCarthy of McCarthy Brothers Liquors and Ned Rosselli of The Red Store can be seen stopping runners on the street and signing them up for their respective teams. They have gone over the racing roster from last year, and are approaching some of the best runners to join in the team competition. It isn't "Uncle Sam wants you," it's Richie or Ned want YOU
Gilligan had stated that in order to be eligible for the team award, team members must have resided in Charlestown for a minimum of six months or work fulltime for a Charlestownbased company. Team scoring is comprised of the five fastest combined times and a team may enter as many
members as they wish up to the post registration on the day of the race.
This past week, charges and counter charges have traveled between the liquor store at Hayes Square and the grocery store at the corner of Bunker Hill and Monument streets.
Rosselli, the captain of The Red Store team ( $\mathrm{a} / \mathrm{k} / \mathrm{a}$ The REM Club), gave up smoking a while back and has been training on a daily basis. He has every intention of leading his team to victory. He challenges Henry and Richie McCarthy to run the 8 K race, noting that "no business should be allowed to enter a team in the race unless the principals of that team are running themselves." Rosselli stated that there will be a minimum of 15 runners on The Red Store team.

When asked for a comment, Richie McCarthy just smiled, stating that he would wait to see just what Rosselli had to say. He added, "Rosselli is out there trying to get my best runners on his team."
There has been no word from Bill Cantin at Ironside Grille, but it is expected that runners representing that Park Street restaurant will have a comment or two before the big race.
Other businesses are invited to enter a team in this race, which is sponsored by the Raymond Group and benefits the Boys \& Girls Club. Maybe the Raymond Group's own Linda Smith will field a team from their Navy Yard headquarters.

The Charlestown Navy Yard District of Boston National Historical Park announces a free harbor and history tour from the Bunker Hill Monument to Dorchester Heights Monument on Saturday June 8

our earlier days, with very few real worries clogging our thoughts. We had not yet reached an age where we were burdened by responsibilities, so we concentrated on important things, things like the daily baseball box scores, the new girl next door, and automobiles.

The first car I ever owned was a shiny black 1954 Chevrolet with red seat covers which brightened up an otherwise dull, gray interior. I bought that car from my parents in 1959 when they purchased another 1954 Chevy with lower mileage. I loved that car just as much as any kid loved a first car, and I drove it until my parents were ready to step all the way up to a 1955 Chevy a year or so later. They then sold me that second 1954 for the price I received for mine. I believe it was $\$ 85$. Joe Scanlon might better remember.
That car was blue on blue, and had only two doors as compared to its predecessor's four. I drove the car without incident until one Sunday night when Mary and I doubledated with Walter and Lorraine. Sunday

night usually meant the movies or bowling, and this particular week we had chosen bowling. This choice was made above Walter's objections, for Lorraine was a much better bowler than he, and this particular set of circumstances often led to serious disagreement between the two when she would "kick his butt," as they say.
When we emerged from the old Medford Square Bowling Alleys with three smiles and one frown, we found my car filled with smoke. When the door was opened, the incoming air caused the smoke to iqnite into flames. With the help of the bowling alley's fire extinguisher, I was able to douse the flames, but not before most of the back seat had been burned out. To this day, Walter still thinks I blame him for accidentally dropping a lit cigarette on the seat. To this day, I still do!
That car was my source of travel to and from Salem State College for a couple of years, and only when the insurance rates for drivers under 25 began to exceed the Gross National Product, did I take it off the streets and park it, unregistered, in an empty lot on Elm Street. Eventually, the lot was to be built upon, and I had no recourse but to pay $\$ 15$ to have it towed away, burned out back seat and all. There are very few blue-on-blue 1954 Chevrolets left on the road today, but for many years, when I would see a similar car drive by I would wonder if it was mine.
It was several years before it was economically feasible for me to buy another car and when I did, it was a 5-or 6 -year-old 1961 blue and white Chevrolet Impala. It was a beautiful car with one major drawback, it consumed gasoline even as it was being pumped.

In 1970, I made a big move in the automotive world. I bought my first new car, a Volkswagen Squareback which was priced in the neighborhood of $\$ 2,000$. By this time I had two young daughters and the squareback was great for taking them on drives to the beach or New Hampshire. Looking back now, I realize just how dangerous it was to
et them play in the open space in the rear And because they could sleep back there, it was a great car for the drive-in.
The VW was really an economical car, but it was green. What that had to do with the matter was beyond me, but it was certainly important to at least one member of my family. Finally I did something about it. I sold it for $\$ 700$. At the time it had been driven a total of 14,000 miles and gas was less than 50 cents per gallon. I bought my second new car, a 1972 Chevy Nova, and the gas crunch caused the price per gallon to jump to over $\$ 1$ per gallon and, needless to say, the Volkswagen's value, because of its gas economy, jumped along with it. But I no longer owned the VW, but somebody did, and I was mad as hell about that. "Don't cry over spilled milk," they say, but here it is some 20 years later and the milk is still spilling.
The Nova, though, was good to us and I drove it until selling it in 1979 when I bought the new Oldsmobile Cutlass for $\$ 6,000$. Things were beginning to move in an upward direction in the world of automobiles.

Finally one day, the need for a second car presented itself and I picked up an old Plymouth which did not last very long.

The following summer I was introduced to Bertha, just about the most reliable piece of machinery I ever owned. She was a 1970 Dodge Dart with a slant six engine, 90,000 miles on the odometer, and she cost me $\$ 500$. I bought her to get me through the summer. Five years and some 50,000 miles later, I was still driving Bertha. I reluctantly gave her away when I noticed that my daughters and my wife would slouch below the dash board so as not to be seen when they rode with me.

Since the demise of Bertha, I have moved onto a 1984 and 1985 Olds Delta 88, and a 1989 of the same make and model. The final chapter has yet to be written on these cars, although the 1984 sits in my garage awaiting a new owner.
One day, perhaps, these too will be part of a story.

## Street Reconstruction Projects Hit Residential Nerve

by Kathy Giordano

The monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council on June 4, brought over 100 community residents to the Knights of Columbus Hall to voice their agitation regarding reconstruction projects soon to begin on 26 Charlestown streets. The reconstruction projects fall under four Boston Redevelopment Authority contracts, stated Paul Reavis, BRA assistant director for Engineering and Design Services, during a presentation to the council. Residents of Tremont, Union and Winthrop streets were vocal in requesting that their streets, each located adjacent to areas in the contracts, be included in the reconstruction project because existing conditions on their streets mandate their inclusion. Tremont and Winthrop streets, residents stated, are on the Boston

Freedom Trail, but walking conditions are unsafe and not accessible to the handicapped and elderly.
Reavis explained that the streets included in the four contracts, costing an estimated $\$ 4.1$ million, were determined many years ago as part of the Charlestown Urban Renewal project and inclusion of additional streets would not only delay the construction work but cost additional money not allocated in the contract budget.

As part of the project, the 26 streets will have water and sewer lines replaced, catch basins and curbs reset and sidewalks and roadways reconstructed. Reavis also stated that the contracts will require that the contractor employ a coordinator to work with the residents and the BRA to help alleviate any problems that may arise and secure alternate parking

Low Interest Loans
Available For College Students

Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Tom Birmingham were pleased by this week's announcement that the Massachusetts Educational Finance Authority (MEFA) Finance Authority (MEFA)
will offer below market-rate loans for qualified college enrolled students. Through the Family Education Loan program, 52 participating public and independent colpublic and independent col-
leges and universities in Massachusetts will offer loans at an interst rate of 9.25 percent.
"The Legislature created MEFA in 1983 as a way of providing a supplemental source of financing for those who qualify for financial aid and a primary cial aid and a primary
source of funding for those who are not eligible for aid. Since its establishment, more than 21,000 loans totalling almost $\$ 160$ million have been issued. The loan program represents another successful effort put forth by the Common-
wealth to aid families seeking ways to fund the dream of a college education," said Voke.

Birmingham, Senate Chairman of the Committee on Education, echoed similar thoughts about the program. "This is the nation's lowest publicly offered, fixed-rate educational loan available to students. With a repayment period of 15 years, families need only pay $\$ 10.95$ a month for each $\$ 1,000$ they borrow. Certainly, this makes for a more attractive financing option for those trying to cope with the costs of attending college," Birmingham noted.
