★ "Old Ironsides" . . . Excitement mounts in the Charlestown Navy Yard as preparations continue toward July 21st and the sailing of "Old Ironsides" for the first time in 116 years in celebration of her bicentennial.

The July 4th turnaround cruise proved to be thrilling. Some 50 individuals celebrated Independence Day by being swom in as United States citizens on the deck of the ship with flags flying and cheers from the gathering. Two sails were raised while the ship was off Castle Island and the strong breeze carried her along magnificently.

On Friday, at nearly the same time as Pathfinder set down on Mars, the first man to walk on the moon, Neil Armstrong, stood with his wife on the spar deck of USS Constitution during her turnaround. Bunker Hill Day Chairman Jim Conway presented Armstrong with a pewter pin and coin, designed by local artist Tom Gorsuch, marking the 200th anniversary of the ship.

The sea trials of "Old Ironsides" took place on July 8 and, from all reports, it was a great success as she sailed out in the harbor with her six new sails. These are the sails that were often used when the ship was engaged in battle.

Joining CDR. Michael C. Beck, USN, commanding officer of USS Constitution, on this occasion was Charlestown native CDR. Robert L. Gillen, USN (Ret.), the ship's 59th commanding officer, who is heading the "Old Ironsides Pennies Cam-

paign." He notes that the sail of the ship on July 21st will not end the pennies campaign, for plans are to raise the funds necessary to purchase a full set of sails for "Old Ironsides."

Work on the street is set to begin later this month, starting up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square. According to Judy Evers, regional coordinator from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, Susi will leaflet the areas surrounding the portion of the street on which his company will be working and he will also provide a construction schedule to be printed in the Patriot.

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Charlie: An Update

I believe that it was sometime in early March of this year when I announced that I would like to compile several of my columns, most of which have appeared here in the Patriot, and put them into book form.

At the same time I asked for assistance from anybody who may have, for one reason or another, saved a favorite piece. I suggested that they send a copy of the article to my address for possible inclusion in my collection. I must say that I was extremely happy with the response that I received from Townies and former Townies (I have always known that there is no such thing as an ex-Townie!), even from one woman living as far away as Florida. I have, I believe, written to and thanked each person who has helped in this way.

I have received a great deal of encouragement from people I have met on the street who have also taken the time to remind me of a personal favorite of their own. I have found that where many people do not save the things they may read, they do remember them.

It has been mainly from these two sources that I have been able to compile many, many pieces.

When I began the project some four months ago, I had no idea how much work would be involved, but even after realizing the enormity of it all, I was determined to go ahead.

My first thoughts were to compile some one hundred pieces, put them together, and that would be that. It was Joe McGonagle of Century 21 Realty on Main Street who asked what made me decide to stop at one hundred.

Well, with Joe's words fresh in my mind, I went home and began to dig through an old cardboard box which had been located in a dark corner of my basement. I knew I had saved many copies of my earlier contributions to the Patriot, but what I did not know was that my wife, Mary, and my daughters, Brenda and Marie, had been cutting out pieces and placing them in the box for years. In a short time I discovered that I had a huge reserve of back copies, and when people asked about a particular column, I could usually find it in that box.

To date, the number of pieces that I have separated into five different categories and keyboarded onto a computer disk, has reached more than one hundred and fifty. It seems now that a more realistic goal will be somewhere in the neighborhood of one hundred seventy-five selections.

The categories that I have chosen are as follows:

- The holidays.

- The people and places of Charlestown.
- 5. General.
- In many cases, one overlaps the

I am presently looking to complete my compilation of stories by the end of this month. The next step will be to put it into some sort of manuscript form, and have it printed. All of this will, conservatively, take another two months.

In any event, I have set the holiday season as my goal for completion. I hope I am not being overly optimistic.

My immediate plans still include the compilation of material, and I would like to again ask for your help.

Because of that old cardboard box in my basement, I may very well have a copy of something you might remember and want to have considered as part of my collection. Naturally, the process would be made much easier if you were to send me a copy of the article in question, but if you do not have a copy, I may be able to locate it if you simply mention the contents of the column and an approximate date.



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

Sailing USS Constitution Through History





cities during the finals in New York.



The new guide gives Boston residents information about the types of paper, cardboard and boxboard material they may recycle, which recyclable materials they may include in their Blue Boxes, and what to do if their Blue Boxes are of the incorrect size. The leaflet also contains information for large apartment building landlords who wish to participate in curbside recycling, and provides drop-off recycling advice to guide residents of larger apartment buildings that cannot participate in the program.



New Valet Parking Regulations Are Now In Effect

Boston Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently released a report on valet parking compiled by a task force he formed in January which was led by former Transportation Commissioner Richard A. Dimino. He also stated that the city implemented new valet parking regulations last month.

The report cites a number of issues relative to the Transportation Department's current valet parking program. These include record keeping, allocation of resources, national traffic and parking issues, single-event permit issuance, role of valet parking in urban development and cost versus revenue.

The new valet parking regulations are the result of comments from citizens. elected officials, restaurant operators and community groups. They provide a variety of changes that will greatly enhance the Boston Transportation Department's ability to manage and regulate valet parking operations in the city.

Highlights of the new valet parking regulations include:

- · An application form requesting detailed information on the valet operation;
- · Issuing the valet parking permit to the establishment served by the operation rather than the valet parking operator, and requiring

that a copy of the valet parking permit be posted in a conspicuous place at the establishment;

- · A special public comment period will be established for the annual renewal of permits and notices of applications for new locations will be posted in City Hall and provided to District City Councillors;
- · Hearings will be held on all new valet applications;
- Closer coordination with local police districts, the Boston Licensing Board and the Mayor's Office of Consumer Affairs and Licensing;
- · The option to have the BTD designate valet parking zones and require that

more than one establishment be served from a single zone;

- · Detailed criteria for reviewing applications and permits will be issued with requirements such as the maximum number of vehicles to be valet parked during operating periods and the number of valet attendants required during those periods;
- · A progressive enforcement mechanism and suspension of the permits is an available sanction. Special emphasis will be placed on insuring that adequate offstreet parking is available and that valet-parked vehicles are not illegally parked at curbside spaces.




