## Charlestown Democrats Elect State Convention Delegates At Caucus

Charlestown Democrats braved the cold winter winds of last Saturday, Feb 29 , to journey to the Knights of Columbus Hal o elect delegates and alternates to represent this community at the Democratic State Convention to be held in Worcester on May 29 and 30 .
The caucus was called to order shortly after 2 p.m by Ward 2 Democratic Com mittee Chairman Tom Cuna, and the doors were shut and registration closed at .15 p.m.
Some 126 eligible Democratic voters subsequently elected six male, six female
and one additional delegate along with two male and two female alternates.
There were six men nominated who agreed to run for the six male delegate pots Since there was no ompetition, the counting of the ballots was waived and those nominated were declared the winners. The same held true for each catgory with the exception of male alternate, where three persons sought the two alternate spots.
Elected to fill the male delegate positions were Dennis Collins, Mel Stillman, Edward Johnson Dennis McLaughlin, Peter

Looney and Edward Callahan.
Elected female delegates were Margaret Collins, Kathy Giordano, Mary (continued on page 14)

* Spice Street - A 31-year-old Charlestown man was found dead from a gunshot wound to the back of his head at approximately 6:45 a.m. on Monday, March 2 .
The body was discovered by an employee of Fraser Molloy Associates when he was reporting to work at his Spice Street studwelding company. The victim was lying under a sheet of plywood with his head, arms and legs exposed. He was wearing a blue knit sweater, blue jeans and white socks. A pair of sneakers were found next to his body,
Police have identified the victim as James "Muff" Boyden of Old Ironside Way. He was pronounced dead at $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. by the Medical Examiner and taken to the mortuary for an autopsy.

The shooting is under investigation by the Boston Police Homicide Unit and the Detectives of Area A, which includes Charlestown. There were no suspects known at press time.
The police are also said to be investigating reports that the victim's rental car is miss ing. It is a 1992 white Toyota Corolla with a Massachusetts registration of $922-\mathrm{THZ}$.

* School Registration Correction - The Boston School Department sent a revised announcement this week, changing the date of birth for children to be allowed to enter school next fall. Admission to school will be based on the child's age as of Sept. 1, not Oct. 31 as previously reported.
The change in birthdate for registration means that a child entering Kindergarten I must be 4 years old by Sept. 1, 1992. A child entering Kindergarten II must be 5 years old by Sept. 1 and a child entering the first grade must be 6 years old by Sept. 1 .

I did not have to get out of the bed to look for the falling snow, for the very fact that the radio was on at such an early hour told me all I had to know. Not only was it snowing, but it was snowing damn hard.
Snow days were the best winter in New England could offer a youngster. They provided an opportunity to make a few pennies shoveling sidewalks, and they afforded other opportunities not available on snowless days. Because cars were not nearly as numerous in those days, coasting was a popular and safe activity.
Since a sled was not used very often during the course of a year, the old Flexible Flyer would be passed on from big brothers and sisters to the younger set, and it would
last for a least forever and a day.
Stop here right now. Stop reading and go to your cellar . . . maybe to that infrequently visited corner where darkness outweighs

the light, and you will find a Flexible Flyer, perhaps more than one. Carefully wipe off the cobwebs, and watch as the memories magically appear.
We coasted Hancock Street for starters,
but as our horizons expanded, coasting High Street to Walker and the "Roundies" at the back of the Park (Doherty Playground) became a more popular choice.

Did anyone not own a Flexible Flyer? Remember how, after a season's long hiatus in the cellar, the runners would rust? But remember how those same rusted runners would come clean and glisten in a winter's
sunlight after you ran a piece of hardened snow or ice on them for only a minute or two?
And when you tired of coasting, remember digging tunnels through the snowbanks and looking for high places from which to jump safely into those soft white mountains?

I can see Bunker Hill Street in those storms of yesterday. Great winds seemed to push the falling snow in horizontal sheets over the hill, completely erasing the green St. Francis steeple from its place against the sky. Woolen parkas and brown hats with ear flaps turned white in a mere instant as people walked backward against nature's biting assault. And then an orange monster would rumble slowly over the hill. It was a streetcar, but unlike the others of that day, it had no windows along the side. Its purpose was to clear the tracks of snow, and only when the storms were great enough, did it emerge from its place of hiding.
I remember those and other things of my earlier winters now, only because, while on a recent search of my cellar for some longforgotten piece of something or other, I found a Flexible Flyer.

I now wonder if memory has a way of exagerating things, or did our winters of yesterday carry more snow, and were the snow banks all that much higher?

(continued from page 7) organization would apply for funds; outlining the specific program and explaining the need for funding; indicating the amount of money requested; noting the long-range effect of funding; stating the number of Charlestown residents served by the organization; and including a plan for fineuned record keeping.
Keyes noted in her report that each organization would be required to submit formal evaluation of its program as it pertained to a request for funding. Funds would be appropriated on a one-year funding cycle and the amount appropriated would be determined by the 21 members f the Neighborhood Council.

Council members suggested that a cap be placed on the amount of money that can be awarded to any one organization. They also discussed the need to require a section in the document that indicates the Charlestown residents being served.
Keyes stated that a community meeting will take place on Wednesday, March 11 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill St. Representatives of community organizations and interested residents are invited to attend.
Keyes asked the council nembers to review the guidelines presented to them from the first committee meeting, and return heir suggestions to her prior to the March 11 meeting. The council is expected o vote on the plan at its April meeting
Ongoing problems with on-street parking were
brought to the attention of the council by both Cunha and Looney. Cunha informed the council that as part of a request to develop a building at the corner of Phipps and Main streets, he developer agreed to provide off-street parking for the tenants of the building. Because of this agreement, he stated, the Neighborhood Council supported his petition to renovate the building. The off-street parking has not materialized, according to Cunha, and cars belonging to the building's tenants are compounding the parking prolem in the area
Cunha stated that this problem should be addressed by the council and action be taken on this situation. He added that this should extend to any future devel xtend to any future devel opment proposal where
parking is an agreed upon omponent.
The council voted to inform the Board of Appeal, the Boston City Council, the Mayor's Office and other city departments of this particular situation and continue to monitor similar conditions with other developers.
Looney stated that residents of Devens Street and Rutherford Avenue approached him to complain about a production company that is using St. John's Church to film a movie The residents state that "no parking" signs are posted in the area prohibiting them from parking outside their homes while, at the same time, crew members are allowed to pull their cars into the parking spots.
