A New Life For Rutherford Avenue

For the last three months, Charlestown residents, together with their neighbors from Cambridge, Somerville and Everett, and city and state officials, have come together to explore how the Rutherford Avenue Corridor can be transformed from an unattractive, often congested thruway into a transportation corridor which enhances the livability of the surrounding neighborhoods and communities.

The Boston Transporta-

tion Department has begun the Rutherford Avenue Corridor Transportation Study with funding from the Mass. Highway Department. The goal of the 15-month study is to develop conceptual plans and strategies for the construction of improvements to the Rutherford Avenue Corridor.

The study will focus on improving circulation at Sullivan Square and developing a cross-section for Rutherford Avenue that comfortably accommodates all appropriate transportation modes including pedestrians and bicyclists. Also to be reviewed will be the impacts of the proposed CA/T Project related highway improvements on the Rutherford Avenue Corridor from the perspective of the residents of Charlestown and adjacent communities.


IF YOU SMOKE

CNC Members Given Update On Plans For Bicentennial Of The Sailing Of USS Constitution Next July

The Dec. 2 monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council was held at the Knights of Columbus Hall. In attendance were Jim Mansfield, Peter Looney, Tom Cunha, Mel Stillman, Bill Mc-Cabe, John Iacoi, Kate McDonough, Jim Conway, Edna Kelly, Don Haska, Dan Ryan, Bill Galvin, Peg Bradley and Ken Stone

Dusty Rhodes of Conventures Inc., addressed the council relative to plans underway for the celebration of the Bicentennial of the first sailing of USS Constitution on July 22, 1998. A four-day event is being planned, beginning on Thursday, July 23. The planners are endeavoring to raise \$700,000 for the event. Thus far, they have raised \$450,000. Although no monies from the Navy, city or state have been earmarked for the celebration, Mayor Thomas Menino and Senators Kennedy, Kerry and Moakley have been very supportive.

Plans call for an International Naval review, a bicentennial park located on Pier One, a concert and fireworks and the second annual Parade of Lights. Rhodes commented that admission to most of the events will be free of charge and open to the public. She also noted that event organizers do not anticipate the public safety issues that were experienced by the community during the Tall Ships visit in 1992 as the event is not nearly the same magnitude.

However, Rhodes assured the council that she would be working with both city and state police to keep traffic moving. She

added that she would talk to the MBTA about increasing public transportation during that weekend. In addition, organizers are working with Modern Continental to explore the possibility of increasing ferry service for those four days.

A CNC USS Constitution Bicentennial committee, headed by Jim Conway, as chairman, and Bill Galvin and Don Haska as vice-chairmen, has been established to work with event organizers. More details will be forthcoming as soon as plans become more detailed. An open public meeting will be coordinated to discuss further traffic projections, transportation options and the Parade of Lights.

A discussion followed about the future of the USS Constitution in Charlestown, There have been rumblings that Constitution will be celebrating the millennium in New York City. Elected officials have been alerted of this potential situation and are working to ensure that Constitution remains in Boston. Council members expressed concerns and opposition to its being moved. The council plans to speak with the commander to get more information and will work with elected officials to address this issue.

The floor was opened and Sheila Martin, a resident of 34 Austin St., addressed the council relative to the issue of vacant Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA)owned land between Austin and Lawrence streets. At the November monthly meeting, Francis Sacco requested that the council endorse a letter to the BRA asking that the disposition process for the vacant land be revisited. Sacco explained that he was informed that the parcel had been sold to the condo association at 34 Austin St. He was disturbed because he claimed his family had been attempting to secure the land for over 10 years. The council endorsed the letter to the BRA requesting that the process be reviewed and that the land be evenly divided between the two abutters.

Martin informed the council that the condo association has not, in fact, been awarded the parcel. The association did submit a bid, but no decision has been made. They have written to the BRA asking that they be awarded the parcel in its entirety as it is landlocked and the only access to the property is through 43 Austin St. Martin stated that the condo building currently has no open space and this parcel, if awarded, would provide residents this much-needed space. She then invited members of the council to look at the space so they could see the situation first-hand. Martin concluded that the residents of 34 Austin St. are committed to maintaining the land.

A resident of 36 Austin St. added that she, too, has been attempting to secure the parcel from the BRA for several years.

Dick Mulligan, a BRA representative, addressed the council on this issue. He stated that the BRA had not yet voted on disposition of this parcel. He did note that his recommendation to the board was to award the parcel to 34 Austin St. as the property has neither a front nor a back yard.

After much heated discussion, it was de-

cided that the process would be re-opened and handled by the BRA.

Bill McCabe, chair of the Public Safety Committee, reported that at the September meeting the public safety issues regarding the Thompson Square development were discussed. Officer Bill Smith, community service officer at Area A-1, informed the committee that the developer's permit requires a police detail on both sides (Main and Warren streets) during construction.

Jim Conway added that since the November meeting, he witnessed a black pickup truck blocking the pedestrian passageway forcing pedestrians to either squeeze by the truck or walk in the street. This is a real hazard for both the elderly and children. In addition, the developer has not made any attempts to address traffic and parking issues.

A heated discussion about the neighborhood council's role in future resident parking meetings ensued. Bill Galvin was outnumbered in his quest to conduct resident parking meetings as a CNC committee meeting with members present voting on a motion. Conway made a motion that the elected CNC precinct representatives chair the meetings and that people from the precinct be allowed to speak first, then members of the CNC and finally residents from other precincts. The motion passed and the CNC will continue to facilitate meetings on resident parking and no votes will be taken.

The next monthly meeting will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 6 at the Knights of Columbus Hall

The presentation will also include a description of the wide range of informational resources and services available through the Boston Public Library's on-line databases.





As a former long-time employee of the Boys & Girls Club (part of the time when it was the Boys Club and later when it was the Boys & Girls Club), browsing through Charlie McGonagle's *Charlestown's Blades of Grass* brought back a flood of memories. The years I spent at the club with the staff and the kids were among the best of my life, and Charlie was clever at jogging my mind about how very important the club has always been and always will be to the kids of Charlestown.0

The club is not about bricks and mortar or sunrises and sunsets or shadows or noise.

As for the current staff, the faces and names may be different, but the loyalty and commitment are identical. As Charlie mentions in his book, it would be impossible to name every single person who made a contribution to OUR children, the ones who later became the ADULTS who make Charlestown the wonderful community that it is.

Dear Gloria:

The Nov. 27, 1997 issue of The Charlestown Patriot contained an article by Sal Giarratani entitled "Politics 101 ... Post Election Thoughts." I found the article misleading and hope that you will print my response.

Mr. Giarratani comments about Paul Scapicchio, "I still don't like some of the company he kept, but each campaign is the creation of the candidate. You load it up with your friends and allies." 



PROTECT YOUR TRADE SECRETS
WHEN AN EMPLOYEE LEAVES
Many companies rely on their trade secrets to
keep one step ahead of their competitors. Impor- tant trade secrets include customer lists, market-
ing plans, and details about new products or pro- grams. To protect these trade secrets, manage-

ment should consult with an attorney to establish and implement proper safeguards. The first step is to plan ahead. For example, consider requiring key employees to sign nondisclosure and non-competition clauses, which can be part of an employment contract. To limit access to sensitive information, documents which contain trade secrets should be stored in locked file cabinets and stamped "confidential." Computer data files should be off limits to all but a few authorized individuals. Steps like these will demonstrate to employees that management places a high value on the company's trade secrets and will not tolerate leaks of sensitive information.

Companies need to be particularly concerned about protecting trade secrets when an employee resigns or is fired. Upon starting a new job, the former employee might try to pass sensitive company information to a competitor. To reduce the risk of this happening, management should hold an exit interview with every employee who resigns or is fired. During the interview, management should ask these employees to sign a written acknowledgement indicating that all sensitive company information has been returned or destroyed.

Management should also remind terminating employees that they are still obligated to refrain from disclosing any of the company's trade secrets. If an employment agreement was previously signed, the non-disclosure and non-competition clauses should be reviewed at this time. Holding the exit interview will be management's final opportunity to demonstrate that they intend to vigorously protect their company's trade secrets.

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





· Fire Safety For The Holidays ·

The holiday season is now upon us. It is a festive time of the year when Christmas lights decorate our homes and families get together to enjoy the wonderful holiday spirit. It is also the time when the risk from fire increases. The Boston Fire Department offers some simple steps that all can take to keep these holidays *fire safe* for everyone.

Boston Fire Commissioner Martin E. Pierce Jr., a Charlestown native, states, "These guidelines are really just common sense. We hope we do not have to come to your home this holiday season. I urge all families to take a moment to go over these tips. May I also add the warmest of holiday greetings to all from the men and women of the Boston Fire Department."

Christmas Trees

When you purchase a Christmas tree, select only a freshly cut tree. The needles should not be falling off from dryness. When you place the tree inside, start with a tree stand that has a water receptacle and is non-tip. Also, the stem of the tree should be cut diagonally. This will allow the tree to soak up water from the stand. Water should be added daily to prevent the tree from drying out. For stability, consider adding some wire near the tree top and run it to nearby walls. If you prefer artificial trees, purchase those that are flame-retardant.

Trees should be at least three feet away from heat sources such as fireplaces, candles and radiators and never block an exit with the tree. Finally, remove the tree as soon as possible after the holidays. Remember, it has been inside a while and slowly drying

Protect Yourself Against Car Theft And Break-Ins

Lock your doors and windows. A thief will insert a wire in a slightly open window to pop up the door lock. An unlocked door is an open invitation to a thief.

Replace your standard door lock buttons with tapered ones. Tapered door lock buttons make it more difficult for a thief to hook a wire or device onto the door lock button to pop it open.

Invest in an anti-theft device. When you buy a new or used car, checking to see if it has an anti-theft device is as important as checking the engine. If there isn't one, you should have one installed. Having an anti-theft device can lower the cost of your auto insurance.

<u>Never leave valuable items exposed to public</u> <u>view.</u> Remove valuable items from your car or lock them in the trunk.

Car theft results in economic loss, higher insurance premiums, and the inconvenience of being without transportation.

out. Dispose of it by leaving it for your trash collector or bring it to a recycling center.

Holiday Lights

When getting ready to decorate the tree, use only UL approved lighting sets. Start by a careful examination of the lights. Before plugging a set of lights in, look for cracked sockets, frayed, loose or bare wires and loose connections that could cause a serious electric shock or start a fire. Never overload your electrical system. Do not connect more than three light sets together. Whether on a tree or on the house, never staple or nail the light sets. Finally, do not run extension cords under rugs. They could become frayed without your knowledge.

<u>Heating Systems,</u> Fireplaces & Chimneys

With the heating season in full swing, a little preventative maintenance on your heating system, fireplace and chimneys will go a long way toward having a safe winter. These systems should be looked at and serviced by professionals. Also, do not forget to always use a fireplace screen.

Smoke Detectors

Smoke detectors on all floors of your home - outside bedrooms, and in good working order, are a must. The seconds smoke detectors give you to get out can truly be lifesaving. Make sure toddlers and older children can recognize the sound of a smoke detector's alarm ringing and know how to respond. Teach children never to hide under a bed or in a closet when a detector sounds. Families should also have a meeting place outside in the case of a fire, and don't forget to call 911 in case of an emergency.

Portable Heaters

Electric powered space heaters should never be left on while sleeping. In fact, the Boston Fire Department does not encourage their use. It would not be hard to have a blanket fall on one by accident, causing a slow, smoldering fire. Liquid fueled space heaters such as those filled with kerosene are illegal for indoor use in Mass.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors


CO is a colorless, tasteless, odorless toxic gas which is produced when fuel burns. CO poisoning occurs when faulty heating equipment is used, such as malfunctioning fumaces, blocked chimney flues and space heaters. Exposure to CO can cause headaches, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting or loss of muscle control. The best first aid for CO poisoning is plenty of fresh air followed by immediate medical treatment.

CO detectors are becoming more popular in the home. Look for UL approved detectors and follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and operation.

Candles

Candles can add to the festive decoration of a home. Some special precautions are needed however, to do this safely. Always use non-tip candleholders. Keep the candles away from combustible materials such as wreaths, trees, curtains and paper decorations. Never leave candle unattended. Extinguish candles, wetting the wick, before going to sleep.



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


