## Charlestown's 10th Annual Preservation Week Historic Park Clean-up On May 11

The city of Boston's Historic Burying Grounds Initiative (HBGI) and the Charlestown Preservation Society (CPS) are collaborating on a community clean-up of two of Charlestown's historic open spaces. Each year the clean-up is scheduled during the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Preservation Week

## CREATE YOUR OWN

CAPITAL GAINS TAX CUT
Earlier this year, it seemed as if investors would be treated to a capital gains cut. Now it isn't clear when - or if - that cut will come. If you can't wait for tax relief from Washington, here are some strategies you can use right now to trim your capital gains.

- Sell assets with the highest tax basis, since high-basis assets generate the smallest capital gain. This strategy is especially effective if you have stocks, bonds or mutual funds that were purchased in different blocks at different prices.
- Use high-basis assets to make family gifts. Hold onto your low-basis assets, since these will be "stepped-up" to market value when you pass away. Because of this step-up, neither your estate nor your heirs will pay capital gains tax on the built-in appreciation. Your age and health are factors to consider.
- Consider a tax-free exchange. This is one of the few big breaks left in the tax law, but the rules can be tricky. Basically, you're allowed to exchange a business or investment property for another property of the same "nature or character," such as exchanging an apartment building for an office building. On an exchange, the taxes will be deferred until you dispose of the new property.
- Make an installment sale. For example, if you sell real estate, consider taking back a note instead of selling for cash. Capital gain is taxed as you receive your note payments, while a cash sale triggers $100 \%$ of your gain in the year of sale.
- Consider establishing a charitable remainder trust. You donate an appreciated asset to charity, and the charity is able to sell the asset without paying capital gains tax. You receive income from the charity based on the full value of the asset, as well as an income tax deduction for a contribution to charity. The charity keeps whatever is left, after its income obligation has been met.

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Plans Presented For Development Of Housing At Thompson Square
by Lynn Peters The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Development Committee voted to recommend endorsing the proposed Thompson Square Condominiums as presented by local architect Jack French of JW French -As sociates at an April 29 community meeting. The committee's recommendation to the full council next week will include reservations, however, on truck type, delivery schedules and traffic congestion around the redesign of Gimbels Liquors.

A May 23 meeting on the proposal has already been scheduled for imme diate abutters to discuss their concerns with the De velopment Committee and designers.

French said the street
level commercial space and proposed housing was designed "as the edge of Town Hill." The brick building would include refacing the existing liquor store so that the facade would wrap around its Main and Warren street comers.

The Thompson Square development would include 16 residences. Nine townhouses, five condominiums over the liquor store and two condos in the existing rear parking lot would make up the new housing. The building's highest point from the ground to a cupola, resembling that of the Navy Yard's Muster House, would be 60 feet.
Underground parking for 32 cars would also be included, as would an en-

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 quor store's use.Residents expressed concern to committee chairman Tom Cunha and members Ken Stone and Mel Stillman about trucks and well-designed delivery schedules for the liquor store. Cunha said that there were particular concerns about the proprietor not using tractor trailers and how delivery trucks are routed and scheduled for the location.

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## Just Talk, Says City On Sox

A modem-day Paul Revere has been heard galloping around town waming, "The Red Sox are coming!"
But, according to city officials, today's town crier is not getting his "one-if, two-if" signals from them. The word is that there are no serious discussions going on about building a new stadium for the Boston baseball team on the former H.P. Hood Inc. site on Rutherford Avenue in Charlestown.

According to Tom O'Brien, Boston Redevelopment Authority chief of staff, if the city were approached for this particular site, there would be many official processes that a developer would have to initiate.

The 23 acres are zoned for industrial use, and any changes in use would re-

City Councillor Diane Modica spoke with the three major story characters, Kaneb, the Sox's John Buckley and the BRA's Marisa Lago last week.
"It appears that there's a lot of speculation on the part of the reporters," Modica said. "They are in a kicking-the-tires mode at this point in time."
The Charlestown site was one of six locations that might be generally feasible for a new ballpark, Modica said. Three South Boston, one Roxbury and one Allston-Brighton sites were also identified. And Mayor Thomas Menino has also publically stated that he would like to see an
