# 'Townie Santa' Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

Although the weather continues to be relatively warm and the Thanksgiving Turkey is yet to be purchased, a group of residents have been meeting and planning for a Christmas program for Charlestown's elderly.

Christmas can be a very sad and lonely time of year for the needy, elderly shutin. While the rest of us may be gift giving, card writing, and simply caught

up in the tinsel and glitter, there are others for whom Christmas is just another lonely day.

In Charlestown, however, residents remember the true meaning of the Christ-Through mas season. "Townie Santa," elderly, needy shut-ins who may otherwise be alone or forgotten, receive a visit from "Santa," who could be anyone, but represents everyone, and lets the person know, yes, we remember you. The first hearing will be held on Monday, Nov. 14 at 2 p.m. at the Anchorage Apartments, 103 Ninth Street in the Charlestown Navy Yard. This hearing is to discuss the need for bus service in the Navy

The second hearing will take place on Tuesday, Nov. 22 at 6 p.m. at the Golden Age Center, 382 Main St., Charlestown. The topic of this hearing is Sunday bus service on Main Street. Currently there is no service on Sundays for the Main Street area.

Modica stated, "Many residents have expressed their concerns regarding the lack of bus service because there are several elderly developments in the Main Street area. Many of the elderly rely on public transportation for mobility and with the holiday season fast approaching. Sunday bus service will not only be utilized, but is neces-

"Though there are approximately 1,500 residents and 3,500 employees in the Charlestown Navy Yard, including one elderly housing development and another to open in the near future, there is no bus service within the Navy Yard and this ridership issue must be addressed," said Modica.

Representatives from the MBTA, the Boston Transportation Department and the Elderly Commission have been invited to attend. Please make every effort to attend the hearings and lend your support to the community.






# Mayor's Cup Tournament Finals To Be Aired Again On Cable







If you want to see some of the finest young hockey players in the state, you won't want to miss this telecast.



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# 'Townie Santa' Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

(continued from page 1) 1982, centering around the idea that something should be done for the shut-ins. In less than one month's time, this group expanded, money was raised, meals cooked and 48 baskets were delivered.

The four probably never anticipated that their discussion would be so contagious. Townie Santa has a unique way of drawing residents together who may not otherwise share similar interests. One reason for the attraction, states a committee member, is the simple fact, Townie Santa is a good cause. Another reason may be that inbred Charlestown responsibility of taking care of one's own. Or, more importantly, it may be that joy one re-

ceives from giving - something too personal for words. Whatever the reason, the number of volunteers grows with each passing year.

Townie Santa welcomes back a faithful contingent each year and expands with new faces from all parts of Charlestown. Some of them deliver the boxes, others pack them and others do the work behind the scenes. Last year, there were volunteers from as young as 6 to over 75 years of age. Almost 300 people donated either time, money, gifts or services in 1993 whereas the first year, there were about 25 volunteers.

Beginning each fall, letters are sent to merchants, businesses and organizations within and affecting

Charlestown, seeking contributions to the Townie Santa fund. Canisters are also placed throughout the town for coin and bill donations. Articles begin to appear in The Charlestown Patriot inviting residents to come to organizational meetings, or to submit the names of those they feel are in need of a visit from Townie Santa, or to send in monetary donations. All donations are publicly acknowledged in the Patriot, however, as many as 10 percent of those who contribute wish to remain anonymous, donating just for the sake of Christmas.

In 1982, the Townie Santa fund was approximately \$1,000. In 1993, this figure rose to more than \$10,000. However,

this does not truly reflect the total in donations received, since no value is placed on the gift donations. All the money received, with the exception of postage costs, goes directly to the packages.

"People wonder how much we give out in these boxes," related a committee member. "Well, just ask anyone who had to deliver one of them to a person living on a third floor, and they'll tell you how heavy these boxes are."

Those who are considered eligible are persons over 60 years of age who are shut-in with limited finances and family contact.

The selection of the names of recipients for a Christmas package is not an enviable or easy task. There is a screening com-

mittee who researches the names that are submitted and determines who will receive a basket. And despite the screening committee doing an excellent job, there is always someone else who also deserves a basket.

"You never get everyone," said a committee member, "You often hear later that we missed someone, but that's through no fault of the screening committee. This is why we ask the cooperation of agencies and residents in submitting names - and we are asking that the names be submitted by Monday, Nov. 21 to allow us an opportunity to finalize the list of recipients before it gets too close to the day of deli-

An important fact to remember is that the idea behind Townie Santa is to bring some Christmas cheer to the elderly shutin. A committee member concluded, "These boxes do more than supply a person some much needed household and personal items - they tell the shut-in that we, the community, haven't forgotten them."

# Serving The Fleet' Exhibit At The Charlestown Navy Yard

ice. Several of these former yard workers will discuss their memories of working in the Charlestown Navy Yard. This preview reception will take place in the exhibit space in Building 125 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. "Serving the Fleet" will be open to the public in the coming months as final preparations for general public visitation are completed.

On today, Thursday, Nov. 10 from 5:30 to 8 p.m., the Boston National Historical Park will preview at the Charlestown Navy Yard its new exhibit, "Serving the Fleet," chronicling the 174 years that the Charlestown Navy Yard was a Navy ship building, repair and production facility. Since 1974, the Charlestown Navy Yard has been a district of Boston National Historical Park, and this exhibit preview is a tribute to the work and workers of the Navy Yard.

This exciting new exhibit tells the story of the work that was accomplished in the Navy Yard, starting in 1800 when the yard was established through the "age of sail" to the end of the 19th century, and into the 20th century and the "age of steam." Starting in the 1830s, Navy Yard workers produced prodigious amounts of rope in a 1/4 mile long "ropewalk." Workers in the yard also invented and manufactured a new type of anchor chain, "die lock" chain, in 1926. From then until 1974, most of the anchor chain used by the United States Navy was made in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

During the World War II era, over 300 ships were built here, with 50,000 workers in the Yard in 1943, including 8,000 women. The Charlestown Navy Yard was most noted as a ship repair facility and continues in this function today as USS Constitution undergoes an extensive restoration in its historic dry dock.



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#### NEW MONEY - OLD BUILDINGS

As Washington's appetite for tax revenues increases, fewer tax shelters remain. However, certain types of real estate are eligible for the rehabilitation tax credit.

Specifically, the tax credit is available for the rehabilitation of certain old and historic buildings. A
credit equal to 20% of qualified rehabilitation expenditures is available for certain historic structures. To be eligible, the building (whether residential or commercial) must be listed in the National Register or be located in a registered historic
district and be certified as historically significant
to the district. If the building is not a certified historic structure, it must generally be a non-residential property first placed in service before 1936.
The credit for these properties is 10% of qualified
rehabilitation expenditures.

Qualified rehabilitation expenditures include renovation, restoration or reconstruction of a building. Enlargement or new construction does not qualify. To be eligible for the credit, the building must be placed in service before the rehabilitation begins and the rehabilitation must be "substantial." "Substantial" is defined as qualified expenditures incurred over a two-year period that exceed the greater of \$5,000 or the building's adjusted basis.

As many cities and towns attempt to revitalize their downtown districts, they offer incentives to attract investors. The rehabilitation tax credit is the federal government's attempt to encourage this revitalization by stimulating preservation and continued use of existing structures. If you have a real estate venture you think might qualify, this tax credit is certainly worth exploring further.

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

Good news! Curbside recycling is starting in Charlestown on Monday, Nov. 14.

The work of the Charlestown recycling volunteers has paid off. Curbside recycling is happening this year, thanks to Mayor Thomas M. Menino and his belief in and dedication to recycling.

Literature has been sent out from city hall explaining what materials will be collected weekly in the blue boxes. Each residential unit will receive one blue recycling box with the exception of buildings with more than six units.

All materials must be rinsed clean and tops removed. Labels may be

The following items should be placed in the blue box: glass, clear and mixed colored; metal, tin, steel, aluminum cans and foil / trays; plastic, #1 and #2 bottles / jugs (look on the bottom for the number within the arrows); and empty aerosol cans.

The following items should be placed beside the blue box: Newspapers, brown bags and magazines should be put in brown bags; phone books and corrugated cardboard (waffleboard). Please flatten and tie them with string.
