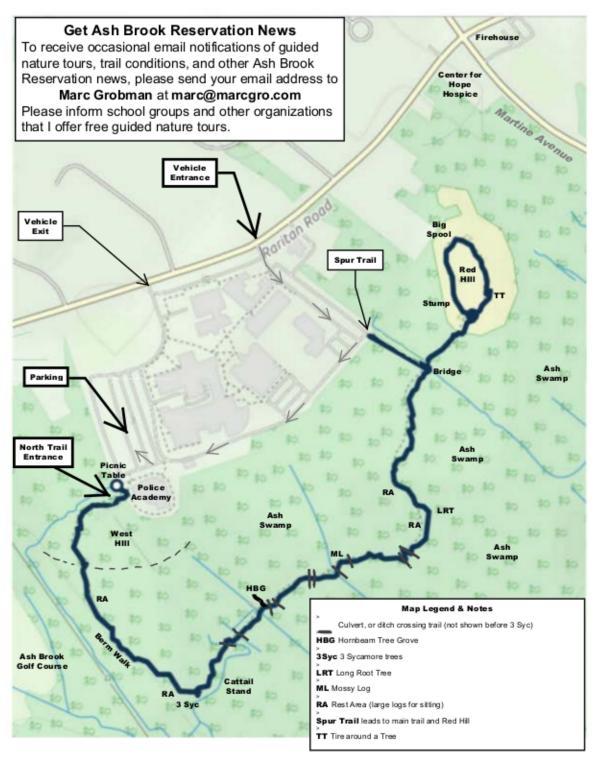
Ash Brook Reservation Hiking and Nature Trail Map - see reverse for directions and more information



At the meeting of Scotch Plains, Plainfield, and Clark, Come enjoy Union County's most natural park!

Treat yourself to a quiet walk along the North Trail of Ash Brook Reservation, a natural oasis that seems far away from the sounds of cities and towns!

You'll venture through four very diverse habitats, starting with a walk over a gentle hill forested by beeches, tulip trees, sweetgum, and sassafras. Soon you will head down into Ash Brook Swamp, which is populated by ash, maple, swamp white oak, a grove of hornbeam trees, and blackberry, skunk cabbage, and cattails. After you cross a small bridge, you'll pass through a shady forest of black birches, fems, mosses, and ground pines. Suddenly you'll emerge from the shade onto a bright meadow on an arid hill dotted with pines, pin oak, and high bush blueberry, reminiscent of the South Jersey Pine Barrens.

But prepare and proceed cautiously. You'll walk on a primitive trail, not groomed walkway. Please wear appropriate footwear such as boots or sneakers and watch where you step so you won't trip or slip or fall. The area between the two hills, Ash Swamp, may be muddy or even under water in wet months, generally winter and spring. When there is deep snow, avoid walking through Ash Swamp. The snow may hide a ditch, fallen branches, slippery ice, or frigid water.

Trail length, from North Trail entrance to Red Hill: 1.1 miles, about 25 minutes without stopping.
