## Davis-Mullen To Hold Hearing Regarding Kindergarten Assignments

Citing an overwhelming demand for kindergarten seats that have dwindled by over 1,000 spots, Boston City Councillor Peggy Davis-Mullen announced that the Committee on Education will hold a hearing on Monday, April 1 at 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St., in Charlestown to discuss
and determine the practicality of eliminating the Kindergarten I program.

Under a recently enacted school department policy , Kindergarten I seats and classes will be phased out over a three-year period to increase Kindergarten II classes for 5 -year-olds, from half days to full days.

The phase-out begins this September and already

parents of 4 -year-old children are receiving the bad news in the mail. DavisMullen, a proponent of the educational benefits that Kindergarten I offers to 4-year-old children, adamantly opposes the destruction that this new policy will wreak. "We need kindergarten for 4 -yearolds just as much as we need full day kindergarten for 5 -year-olds. One without the other would put our children at a disadvantage going into the first grade," Davis-Mullen said.

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## Penny Campaign Underway To Sail 'USS Constitution' Into The 21st Century



EXCITEMENT permeated the atmosphere as invited guests and media gathered on the decks of the USS CONSTITUTION on March 22 as the completion of her restoration was marked with a "sea trial" and the announcement that the American Legion is spearheading an Old Ironsides Penny Campaign to raise funds to purchase and ouffit the ship with sails to mark her 200th anniversary in 1997.

Gillen, USN (Ret.), 59th commanding officer of CONSTITUTION and member of the "Sail Our Ship" Committee; William D. McCarthy, president, Charlestown Cooperative Bank; Sara Beth Stern, volunteer; and William S. Annino, president, Junior Achievement of Eastern Massachusetts.
"Report to commander - CONSTITUTION is fit for duty . . . including the possibility of limited sails," so stated Charlie Dean, director of the Naval Historical Center, Detachment Boston, on the moming of March 22. With the major restoration of the ship complete, the tugs were in place and the crew prepared for "sea, or harbor, trials" and the berthing of the ship once again at Pier One in the Boston National Historical Park section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The restoration of the ship has several implications. Her 64th commanding officer, Cmdr. Michael C. Beck, USN, relates that she is stronger than was the ship almost 199 years ago. Also, her masts have been strengthened to carry sails - and the ship has not been powered by sails since 1881. Now, as she approaches her 200th anniversary in 1997, plans are that she will sail out into the harbor under her own power during that celebration.

Back some 70 years ago, a penny campaign was launched to restore the USS CONSTITUTION with schoolchildren from throughout the country sending in pennies in support of the ship. It is recorded that $\$ 154,000$ was raised by this means, called the "Save Old Ironsides" campaign. Other funds were raised by the sale of lithographs, buttons and discarded materials from the ship's hull.

Now, in 1996, the "Old Ironsides Penny Campaign" has been launched to outfit
the ship with sails. A donation of $\$ 1,000$ from the Killilea Fund of Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion was presented by the fund's Chairman James W. Conway as the first step in raising between $\$ 200,000$ and $\$ 500,000$ for the project. The Legion will spearhead the drive but Conway noted that this project is "allinclusive" and support from individuals, businesses and fraternal, civic and educational organizations is encouraged and welcomed.

Legion Past National Commander John P. "Jake" Comer and John Sommers, executive director of the Legion's Washington, D.C. office, praised the effort and offered support to the project.

The Charlestown Cooperative Bank, represented by its president William McCarthy and vice president Jacqueline Latta, will serve to collect the funds. All of the money directed to this campaign will go to sails for the ship with no salaries or administrative costs. Donations, in any amount, are welcome and should be sent to:

During the ceremony, Beck spoke of his pleasure in having CONSTITUTION return to duty. He noted that "this is the Navy's flagship, the oldest commissioned
warship afloat in the world . . . The USS CONSTITUTION's mission is to represent the values and ideals of the Naval service and of the Nation. It is my vision that she will represent our nation, the United States of America, sailing into the 21st century. I see this vision in both a physical and spiritual sense. In order for this vision to be realized, CONSTITUTION must sail again."
Part of the bicentennial celebration will focus on education. Beck went on to say, "If the document for which she is named, the United States Constitution, is studied, we will recognize as citizens what our duty is to keep this country free ... CONSTITUTION must sail again because she can sail . . . and the effort that it takes means the values that made this country great are alive and well."
Cmdr. Robert L. Gillen, USN (Ret.), 59th commanding officer of CONSTITUTION and member of the "Sail Our Ship" Committee, served as master of ceremonies. Gillen formally announced the start of the nation-wide "Old Ironsides Penny Campaign" which will be led and coordinated by The American Legion. He stated that donations of any size would be welcome, but the object was for the campaign to work with the country's children so they will remember this event for years to come as those did in the 1925 drive.
He introduced the ship's two newly appointed "powder monkies," his grand-
children, John and Bobby Dannemiller, representing the children of the United States. They dumped bags of pennies into a large sea chest on the deck of the ship.
One organization that has come forward to assist in this campaign is Junior Achievement of Eastem Mass., represented on this occasion by its president William S. Annino.
Then, as helicopters circled the ship, ropes were cast off and CONSTITUTION was moved out into the harbor escorted by fireboats sending streams of water skyward. She saluted the city of Boston with her guns blazing before she was turned back toward Charlestown and her home at Pier One.
An essay contest was held in conjunction with the penny drive in 1925 and students across the country were asked to submit 500 -word essays. Julia Kochevar, 13, an eighth grade student in 1925 at the St. Joseph School in Grand Junction, Colo. wrote: "Old Ironsides must be preserved. Old Ironsides is our family heirloom. She belongs to all generations of Americans. We shall save her. Thousands of patriotic Americans to come will reverently tread her decks . . . they will gaze upon her guns that gained our victories, and from all this they will get new inspiration and a renewed and increasing love of our country and of our heroes whose daring and whose bravery have kept us free."

## Parks Department Planning Improvements To Training Field

The city is expected to begin spending the first $\$ 100,000$ on improvements to the Training Field as early as this summer, according to a three-phase plan presented to residents by the Boston Parks and Recreation Department and a consulting design company at a March 26 public meeting.

The meeting, hosted by the Parks Department at the American Legion Hall, included neighborhood historians, Friends of the Training Field and abutters. Eugene Bolinger of Levy, Eldredge \& Wagner Associates, said improvements to the historic acre park will be accomplished in three phases.
The second phase, described as the master plan by Bolinger, will include planning and cost review with neighbors. The construction phase,
expected to come late this year or early 1997, will include $\$ 200,000$ of city Capital Improvement money.
Bolinger described the initial work as safety improvements for the circa 1630s Training Field, the oldest park in the country. Improvements will include stabilizing the centerpiece Civil War monument, repairing the Adams Street and Freedom Trail staircases, installing railings and including water service with a hose connection and potential sprayshower for children.
Beyond these first basic steps, an additional $\$ 200,000$ will pay for the park's enhancement. Residents and designers will work together on creating "historically correct" improvements during the second phase over the next several months.
"There is absolutely no-
thing set in stone," Bolinger said. He said he encourages the community's comments and specific concerns about the Training Field.

Neighbors took the opportunity to plant the seeds for anticipated issues in designing the park. American Legion Past Commanders Jim Conway and Arthur Hurley explained their interest in recognizing two Charlestown residents who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for their Civil War service.
"It would be a feather in the cap of Charlestown," Conway said, reporting that there is probably no other town in the country that can boast of two such distinguished soldiers.
Neighbor Bill Meyers raised the age-old dog fight between park users. "I hope you'll consider animal control and the trouble

we've had with the way ward dogs," Meyers said. "They have taken over the Training Field."
The current temporary chain-link fence was a Parks and Recreation Department response to neighbors' complaints about irresponsible dog owners whose animals have trampled and killed the grass, and mow down small children unleashed. Fencing is giving grass seed a chance to grow this season.
Other issues raised included the iron fence around the entire park, handicapped access, plantings, the Freedom Trail line and whether to incorporate a sprinkler for young children to replace the open hydrant.

Bolinger said he expects to return to the community within the next month to begin the master plan discussions.

## Voke Acts To Improve Services For Seniors

Acting to improve the coordination and delivery of services provided to the state's senior population, the Mass. House, led by House Majority Leader Richard Voke, voted to adopt legislation to create Aging Service Access Points, commonly referred to as ASAPs.

Voke, a noted senior advocate, stated, "Prior to this, the state's long-term care services were fragmented and therefore difficult for seniors to find and to utilize. This initiative
will help provide seniors easier access to a coordinated and well-managed system that is also more cost effective for taxpayers."

Under the plan, not only will the search for quality care become easier, but the emphasis will be shifted to caring for the state's estimated 1.1 million elderly residents at home as opposed to in nursing homes or other institutions. Voke says this will be accomplished through the establishment of regional ASAPs. Among the services
that will be provided include informational assistance, needs assessments, service delivery and case management.

Voke concluded, "This piece is a nice fit with my efforts to enhance the quality of life for seniors. As the fastest growing segment of our population, we must develop innovative programs such as ASAPs to ensure that the health care, safety, housing and consumer needs of our elderly population are met by state government.

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USS Constitution Museum Announces Extended Spring Hours

## Public Safety Education Grants For Charlestown Schools

Public safety officials, funded through state grants, will be providing valuable educational services to Charlestown students, announced Sen. Thomas F. Birmingham and Rep. Richard A. Voke. The Boston school district has received grants, through programs funded by the Department of Public Health and managed by the Executive Office of Pu blic Safety to provide drugand fire-awareness instruction to students.

Through the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) grant, $\$ 30,000$ is being provided for a collaborative effort
between school and law enforcement personnel for drug- and violence-prevenion education. The curriculum, supported by classroom materials and com-munity-oriented law enforcement officers, is designed to equip students with the skills to resist peer pressure, substance abuse and violence, while building decision-making, risk assessment and communication abilities. This year, the well-established DARE program will be complimented by a new public safety grant.
The Student Awareness Fire Education (SAFE) grant of $\$ 18,000$ brings
firefighters into the classroom to share fire prevention information with students. The firefighters, who will receive training at the state's Firefighting Academy, will discuss smoke detectors, home escape plans and the hazards of smoking, among other health and safety issues. This program was initiated in the Senate's budget and is the first statewide fire and anti-smoking education program.
"The earlier children leam about the detrimental consequences of drugs, smoking and playing with matches, the better we all are," said Birmingham. He
praised "these valuable programs for making public safety and health issues that affect all of us very real to our most impressionable citizens."

Voke added: "These programs serve to provide lessons about life that cannot be found in textbooks, but which are still vital to the proper development of our children. I am very pleased to do my part in bringing these grants to the children of Charlestown."

Birmingham and Voke lauded the law enforcement and fire prevention professionals for their continued commitment to these valuable programs.

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## HOBBY OR BUSINESS?

The IRS defines a hobby as an activity not engaged in for profit. For taxpayers who are engaged in a sideline business, the distinction between "hobby" and "business" can be significant come tax return filing time.

Business losses are deductible; hobby losses are generally deductible only to the extent of hobby income (with the additional limitation imposed on them as miscellaneous itemized deductions subject to the $2 \%$ of adjusted gross income floor).
The tax law contains a presumption that an activity is a business, not a hobby, if it is profitable in three out of five consecutive years (two out of seven consecutive years for activities involving horses). Some factors which help determine whether you have a hobby or a business include:

- Whether you conduct the activity in a busi-ness-like manner.
- How much time and effort you spend on the activity.
- Whether there is a reasonable expectation that the business will be profitable.
- Whether losses in this activity continue beyond the normal time to bring such an operation into profitable status.
- Whether the occasional profits in relation to losses and the total investment are realistic.
- Whether you have substantial income from sources other than this activity.
- Whether the activity has elements of personal pleasure or recreation.

If you hope to deduct any losses resulting from a sideline business, be certain that you are doing all that is necessary to meet the requirements of running the activity in a business-like manner. TO SEE HOW THIS CAN AFEECT YOU, CALL TODAY:
