

Gardiner Resigns As Executive Director Of The Kennedy Center

In a letter to James J. Cushman, President of the Kennedy Center Board of Directors, John T. Gardiner announced his resignation as Executive Director of the Kennedy Center effective September 30, 1982. Gardiner has accepted a position as Area Director of the State Department of Social Services.

The letter to Cushman, made available to The Patriot, read as follows:

TO: James J. Cushman, President Kennedy Center Board of Directors

FROM: John T. Gardiner, Executive Director

I have been offered a position as Area Director for the State's Department of Social Services; and after much thought, I have decided to accept this position and hereby submit my resignation as Executive Director of the Kennedy Center effective September 30, 1982.

The past sixteen years working for the Center, especially the last ten and a half as Executive Director, have been most rewarding for me; and I am proud of the record of

achievement that productive Board members like you and I were able to accomplish together. Those members who were helpful and supportive of me and the staff in our efforts to help the people of Charlestown will forever be in my memory and have earned my gratitude and respect. In addition, your help and assistance as President, as well as that of Jean Babcock, Moe Gillen, Joe Owens, and Matty O'Neil, is greatly appreciated.

While I look forward to the challenges of this new position, a part of me will always be with the good people of Charlestown; and I stand ready to assist you in anyway that I can.



Gardiner has also resigned as Executive Manager of the Charlestown Economic Development Corporation, which was responsible for the construction of the Mary Colbert Apartments.

Board President Cushman has stated that there will be no interruption of services provided by the Kennedy Center with the resignation of Gardiner. He stated that applications are now being accepted for the position of Executive Director. Deadline for submission of applications is Wednesday, September 29, 1982 at 4:00 p.m. (See advertisement on page 10).

Cushman said that there are no plans to appoint an Interim Director and he hopes that the application and selection process will "move forward rapidly." He stated that based on past practices he, as President of the Board, will appoint a Screening Committee to review applications (which he expects to number in the hundreds), interview applicants, and narrow the field to three or five for final consideration by the full Board of Directors of the Kennedy Center, probably at a special Board Meeting.

The regularly scheduled Board Meeting is slated for Monday, September 27th.

Cushman said that he was aware of the fact that Gardiner had applied for a position with the State for about a month but could not go forward with securing a replacement for Gardiner until Gardiner's position had been confirmed and a letter of resignation had been submitted to Cushman as President of the Board.

The summer is finally over, whatever there was of one. We made it through without many problems. As you know, all the layed off police officers have been hired back, but those who retired, for whatever reasons, have not been replaced. The Police Commissioner expects to put on a class of 50 or 60 police officers this fall and another class to follow them.

Taking everything into consideration, things have gone well the first seven calendar months of 1982. Part one crimes are down 5.5% in Charlestown over the first seven months of 1982 as compared to those of 1981. (Part one crimes consist of auto thefts, all B&E's, robberies, larcenies, rapes, murder and manslaughter, and aggravated assaults.) This is a significant accomplishment

Charlestown still has excellent police coverage, that being

4:00 P.M. to Midnight: two officers Bunker Hill Project two or three sector cars two cycles Midnight to 8:00 A.M. two or three sector cars

In addition to the above, there are the detectives in Charlestown and the anti-crime teams when needed.

There have been no incidents when there was not any coverage in Charlestown. I am now going to try to put some walking men in Charlestown. I hope to put officers walking on Bunker Hill Street between Elm and Hayes Square for at least four hours a tour of duty both days and first halves. Also a man walking the Monument area four hours a tour of duty both days and first halves. The reason for this is that this past summer I had two officers on overtime, 6 p.m. to 1 a.m., in those locations, and the residents of the areas were very pleased. The overtime is gone so therefore I hope to keep officers walking the same area on a tour of duty.

One cycle will patrol Bunker Hill Street from Elm to Sullivan Square and the Cambridge Street, Brighton Street and Crescent Street area. The other cycle will patrol the Main Street area. The sector cars will patrol all of Charlestown and perform directed patrols where needed. As priorities change, patrols will change. This coverage should give more visibility to the Charlestown area.

There was a rash of housebreaks this past summer in

Charlestown. Because of these breaks I put a number of detectives in Charlestown and two anti-crime teams in order to apprehend those responsible for the breaks. Finally on 7-1-82, Detectives Antonuccio, Thornton, Twohig and Joyce apprehended those responsible for the housebreaks. One Bart Albano was arrested for a housebreak on School Street. As a result of this arrest, property was recovered that was stolen from 18 other housebreaks in Charlestown. All property that was recovered has been identified by the owners. Since the arrest the breaks have stopped.

Several Cadets have been hired by the Boston Police Department from Charlestown. This is going to help us administratively. I have received two cadets days at District A. This means that I can do more things that I have not been able to do in the past. One, in which I truly enjoy, is the weekly column for the Charlestown Patriot, I will keep the community informed of all significant happenings in Charlestown.

Now that the summer is over I hope the monthly Police-Community Relations meetings can resume. The dates will be published in the paper. At the first or second meeting I hope to have a demonstration put on by Special Operations. The community will be shown all the special equipment the Police Department has and how it can be used when needed. Also, the officers that work in the Charlestown area will be introduced to the community.



CANKER SORES


The canker sore (or apthous ulcer) is one of the best known and most persistently annoying dental lesions. It is small and whitish and may occur on the gums, cheeks or tongue. It appears singly and in clusters. A blister usually forms first, without notice, then breaks to form an open sore or canker. Then the acute pain begins

The open canker sore is especially sensitive to touch and to hot or spicy foods. Fortunately, the lifetime of the canker sore normally runs its course in about a week or ten days.

No good treatment is known for its cure at present. There's not much you can do except to make sure you avoid irritating foods. Some people are especially prone to canker sores. They seem to run in families and there may be a connection between canker attacks and emotional stress, though there is still no definite information on the cause of this puzzling disorder.

A dentist can treat canker sores to relieve the pain. However, certain kinds of cankers tend to persist or come back in spite of any treatment now known.




