## Neighborhood Policing Center To Open On Saturday

In keeping with her campaign pledge to bring a greater police presence to Charlestown, District One Boston City Councillor Diane J. Modica, has advocated for and successfully secured a Neighborhood Policing Center for Charlestown.
"This Neighborhood Policing Center will be the first of its kind in the city of Boston and represents the commitment of Mayor Thomas Menino and Police Commissioner Paul Evans' to community policing," stated Modica. The grand opening celebration for the Charlestown Neighborhood Policing Center, located at 316 Main St., will be held on Saturday, Sept. 9 at 10 a.m.
"Charlestown residents made it clear during my campaign that greater police presence in the community is crucial to address the public safety needs of the community," said Modica. "Mayor Menino understands that also and we have worked together with the community and Commissioner Evans to discuss this innovative approach to community policing," Mo-
dica explained.
Modica, working with the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and its Public Safety Subcommittee, along with a commitment from Menino, has made the Charlestown Neighborhood Policing Center a reality.
"To have increased police visibility is a major accomplishment for the community and for the Neighborhood Council," stated Peter Looney, chairman of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council. "Without the strong support of Mayor Menino and Councillor Modica, this would not have moved forward. This is the biggest public safety event for the community in over 15 years," Looney continued.
The Neighboriood Poiicing Center will be open seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to $10 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Citizens may use the office to file reports, pick up forms and hold small community meetings. The post will be staffed daily by a police officer and a cadet. In addition, regularly scheduled visits will be made by different specialty officers in-
cluding the Community Service Officer, the Senior Response Officer and the Youth Service Officer. Their hours will be published in the Patriot on a weekly basis.
"This is a momentous occasion," Modica added. "Charlestown has not had a police station since Distric 15 closed its doors during Proposition $21 / 2$. This couldn't happen without the support of Peter Loony, Bill McCabe, Mel Stillman and other Charles own residents who were out in front on this issue. The community worked hard to reach this day."

Space for the Neighborhood Policing Center has been generously offered and prepared in a storefront at the Mishawum Park Housing by Robert Kenney of Fulton Properties who played a critical role in the location of the center.
"This is a true partner ship between City Hall, the community, the Police Department and local busines to achieve the mission of community policing in Charlestown," Modica concluded.

School Policewoman Is Charged

A 35 -year-old school police officer, assigned to Charlestown High School, pleaded not guilty on Aug. 30 to heroin distribution charges, according to District Attorney Ralph C. Martin II.
The woman, a Charles town resident, was arrested on Aug. 29 outside a Bunker Hill Housing Development apartment by
members of the Boston Police Drug Control Unit.

She is charged with two counts of distribution of a Class A (heroin) substance and two counts of distribution in a school zone.

Charlestown District Court Judge Thomas May released her on personal recognizance and set Sept. 20 for a pretrial conference.

## Friends Of City Square Park Hold Annual Meeting

The Friends of City Square Park held its annual meeting recently on the lawn of the Commandant's House in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The agenda included reports by the chair officers and the election of members to the board, followed by a social.

Gov. Ken Stone told the gathering, "At our last annual meeting, I talked about how different City Square would look when the highway viaduct came down . . . well, if you like the changes you see, then all I can say is just wait till next year when the park is completed!!!"

lished a Construction Oversight Committee to watch over construction and planting aspects of the park; raised concerns and awareness about the bus stop locations in the area and, with the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, looked into getting better services in the City Square area.

Stone went on to say: "The CANA Project is now almost complete with the removal of the highway viaduct. And shortly, the streets and sidewalks will be returned to the city of Boston. City Square Park itself will be looking good by winter with completion next spring!"
Stone stated that the continued support of the members is appreciated. He thanked the National Park Service for the use of the space for the meeting, the U.S. Navy for their special tour of the USS Constitution; R. Wesley's restaurant in Sullivan Square; Tremont Ale, Alex and Chris of Tremont Ale; and Friends' Chef David Paisner.

These activities merely begin to scratch the surface of what is offered in the brick building at 255 Medford St. To fully understand the scope of the services and programs that receive mail at the above address, you
will begin to answer the aforementioned question, "What do all of these programs have in common?" The answer is they all fall under the auspices of the Charlestown Community Center and its local Council. The Charlestown Community Center is the local component of Boston Community Centers. This program is a unique partnership between the city of Boston and its neighborhoods. The partnership gives community residents a voice in the operation of various city-owned recreational and educational facilities. This is accomplished through the local
councils that oversee each Community Center.

The Charlestown Community Center Council is made up of elected, volunteen residents who have a vested interest in what programs are offered to the Charlestown community. Elections to the Council are held every year with each elected member serving for two years. Members of the Council meet once a month to discuss and conduct Council business and to make programoperating decisions. COMPUTER FRAUD: WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PREVENT IT?
As the use of computers increases, so does the opportunity for fraud. A single computer may give access to tens of thousands of business records, greatly multiplying an employee's productivity, but also multiplying the power to cause harm. And when computers are linked to a network and connected to phone lines for outside access, the potential for damage increases exponentially.

Most fraud falls into one of two categories: problems caused by unauthorized access, or misdeeds by an authorized user of the system. An unauthorized user may change or delete records, steal information, create false transactions, or even plant a virus in your system. The first line of defense is to establish and carefully control passwords. Don't be afraid to set and enforce strict rules. Passwords shouldn't be obvious - for example, a user's initials or first name - and they should be changed at regular intervals. Set a policy against sharing passwords with fellow staff members, and don't allow employees to write their passwords on a slip of paper taped to their desk, as happens in too many companies. Change passwords automatically whenever an employee quits.
Even though passwords provide good protection, you should expect them to be defeated. Make sure your system keeps a record of access attempts, and make sure your computer specialist reviews the reports regularly. Then, even if your defenses are breached, you will know about it and can take counter-measures.

The second type of fraud, where an authorized employee is deliberately falsifying records, is harder to detect. Here you must fall back on the typical internal controls for any business system - segregating duties so one employee can't control the whole process, careful review of reports, and enforcing vacations so a different employee runs the system for a while.

## House Supports Establishment Of Alzheimer's Office

A bill to establish a state office on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders recently passed the House of Representatives. As a sponsor of the bill, Rep. Richard Voke was proud to be part of the effort to create such an office on behalf of the Mass. citizens who suffer from this debilitating disease.
"Services to persons with Alzheimer's and their families are provided by a number of different agencies and are not efficiently coordinated," according to Voke, who serves as the House Majority Leader. "Having an Alzheimer's Office within state government will allow us to administer quality, accessible care more effectively, as well as to discover ways we can leverage federal and other private sources of funds."

The mission of the office is to advise the Govemor and his administra-
tion on matters of policy, programs, services and other information affecting the more than 100,000 Mass. residents with Alzheimer's. In the state, the public cost of the disease is estimated at $\$ 1$ billion per year, while the average annual cost to families caring for patients at home is $\$ 18,000$. These amounts will certainly rise since the fastest growing population in America - people 85 and over - already represent an alarming 47.2 percent of Alzheimer's victims.
"We are very pleased that the House of Representatives has passed the legislation," stated Daniel O'Leary, executive director of the Alzheimer's Assoc. of Eastern Mass., Inc. "Families caring for loved ones with dementiarelated illness deserve the very best support that we can give them. An Office on Alzheimer's Disease will help to promote public
awareness and education about dementia and will help families cope with the many challenges posed by this disease. The House should be commended for its swift action on this important piece of legislation."

Certainly the cost to families of Alzheimer's patients is more than a financial one," stated Voke. "The emotional toll this disease takes on people affected with the disease and the people who care for them, is enormous. Since the cause of Alzheimer's is not determined yet, there is no cure for the disease. Short of this fact, we must look toward improved care and support for patients and their families. The Office on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders intends to respond to some of these concems," Voke concluded.
The bill now proceeds to the Senate.

School principals sent letters home to parents in－ forming them of the inci－ dent，advising them of the availability of counseling services and offering safe－

School Safely
Walking to and from school
－Show your child the safest route to school and back，and walk with your child if you can．If not， your child might walk to school with older friends or family members．
－Remind your child to cross only at crosswalks and to look both ways before stepping into the street．They might also cross at a pedestrian light， and wait for the＂Walk＂ signal，or at an intersection
with a crossing guard or police officer．
－Tell him or her not to walk or run between cars at any time．
－Ask you child to be especially careful in rain or snow；wearing light col－ ors or bright clothing makes your child more visible．

Waiting for the school bus
－Instruct your child to always stay on the side－ walk，back from the curb． Children should not move toward the bus until the bus stops fully and the dri－ ver opens the door
－If you can be there， make sure the children at the bus stop don＇t run around，push each other， fight，or act carelessly or in an unsafe manner．

Getting on and off the
school bus
－Make sure your child behaves appropriately on the bus；sits down and remains seated at all time， keeps hand and arms in－ side the bus，and puts backpacks and other be－ longings under the seat， not in the aisle．
－When getting off the bus for home，tell your child to walk ten steps ahead and watch for the driver＇s signal before crossing in front of the bus．Be sure all traffic has stopped to allow a safe crossing．Again，remind your child to look both ways．If you can，meet your child at the bus stop．
－Once off the bus at the end of the day，remind your child to walk－not to run－across any streets and to come directly home．

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## Conway To Work With Residents In Setting Neighborhood Police Plan

The District A-1 Strategic Planning Team will reconvene this month, under the direction of Capt. Ron Conway. Strategic Planning Team members will meet regularly this fall to set out strategies and tactics for the goals and objectives identified in Phase I. The new Strategic Plan for Neighborhood Policing will be made up of 16 individual plans, with a lead section that presents the overall direction for the department. Work on District A-1's neighborhood plan, which includes Charlestown, will be completed by Christmas.
"We made a lot of progress in the first planning phase of this project. Now we will get down to the nuts and bolts of how we are going to realize those goals, who is going to do it, and what they are going to do," Commissioner Paul Evans said. "We will be looking for partnerships throughout the plan. Over half of the goals and objec-
tives involved the establishment of partnerships with community an other stakeholders. We want to keep this key operating principle on the forefront in all of our strategies.'
In Phase I, March 4 through June 24, 1995, the teams set some 100 goals and 405 objectives for Neighborhood Policing. The work in Phase II, which ends on Dec. 15, 1995 will involve the teams setting concrete, time-specific strategies and tactics to implement the goals and objectives. The entire project will be capped off with a presenta tion of the new plan after the first of the year.
Members of District A 1 Strategic Planning Team, who began working together on March 4, 1995 will reconvene in a task force, and meet over the next few months to create the implementation plan. This plan will address the specific goals and objectives identified by the Dis-
trict A-1 Strategic Planning Team.

The Citywide Planning Team will also reconvene, with a charge from the Commissioner to help identify common themes among the ideas and goals generated in Phase I. They will advise the commissioner on citywide issues, such as setting citywide definitions and standards for such operational matters as what an effective problem-solving partnership is, and what role non-police stakeholders should have in setting strategy, through vehicles
such as the Neighborhood Advisory Councils.
Each team will be allocated one facilitator to help design and move the meetings forward, and one professional writer to draft the team's individual plan. The individual plans will form chapters of the overall Strategic Plan for Neighborhood Policing in Boston.
