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Editorial

Red Sox Reportedly Taking A Serious Look At Charlestown For Its Stadium Site

A reliable source has told the Patriot that the management of the Boston Red Sox is in high-level discussions with the principals of the property on Rutherford Avenue owned by H.P. Hood to locate a new stadium in Charlestown.

The rumor of a new baseball stadium in Charlestown surfaced several weeks ago on the business pages of a Boston daily newspaper which wrote that the property being considered was located near the Schrafft building. Other nearby

sites have been rumored but the Hood property seems to be the prime target.

The list of negative impacts of such an enormous project, generating traffic congestion beyond belief in this essentially residential community, is endless.

If Charlestown is seriously being considered as a stadium site, the Red Sox and Hood organizations as well as representatives of the city must bring any plans, no matter how preliminary, to the residents and businesses immediately.

Walsh Scores Outstanding Victory In Race For National Convention Delegate

It has been a good many years since such a large number of Charlestown Democrats gathered in the same room to support one of their own in his or her's quest for election.

Saturday morning saw several hundred Charlestown residents come by bus and car to crowd the field house of Somerville High School. They swapped tales of former political campaigns as the shear numbers overwhelmed the caucus registrars.

All ventured into Somerville to take part in the caucus organized by the Democratic State Committee to elect delegates from the Eighth Congressional
District to nominate President Bill Clinton at the
Democratic National Convention in Chicago in
August. The prime objective was to see that Jimmy
Walsh of St. Martin Street
won election.

The Eighth Congressional District was allowed four male delegates, three female delegates, and one male alternate. There were 14 candidates for male delegate and 12 candidates for female delegate.

The caucus, chaired by Senate President Thomas Birmingham, recorded 642 registered Democrats eligible to vote. Walsh won election as a delegate to the National Convention on the first ballot. In order to secure nomination, a candidate had to receive 50 percent of the votes cast plus one. Walsh tallied 435 votes for delegate, a total of 68 percent of the votes cast.

On subsequent ballots, Eugene Ring of Somerville, David Holway of North Cambridge and Jack Wofford of Cambridge were elected delegates with James Farley of Cambridge being elected to the alternate spot.

Elected to the female delegate slots were Dorothy Kelly-Gay of Somerville, the Sixth District Governor's Councillor representing Charlestown; Elizabeth Moroney of Somerville; and Susanna Segat of Cambridge.



Father Coyne Prepares To Leave St. Catherine's Parish

Friends.

I write to you this week to announce that I will be leaving St. Catherine's Parish as of Aug. 1, 1996 after serving for six years. It has been a privilege for me to work with, minister with and live with the people of Charlestown.

I am leaving to go on a three-month sabbatical at Menlo Park in California. Every priest of the Archdiocese is eligible for and encouraged to take a sabbatical at least once during his priesthood, anytime after he is ordained 10 years. I am now ordained 23 years. A sabbatical is time spent studying, updating, reading, praying, resting, reflecting and imagining new possibilities in ministry.

I have thought of the possibilities before, but never wanted to apply for a sabbatical in the middle of an assignment, but only at the end of a term with the intention of returning to a new assignment at the conclusion of the sabbatical.

My first term as pastor of St. Catherine's would end in March 1997, and my first term as school pastor for Charlestown Catholic will conclude this June. With those dates in mind, I applied for a sabbatical for this fall. This will also enable me to realize a life-long dream of traveling across the country and enjoying the United States. I may never have this opportunity again.

I realize that there are over three months between this announcement and my departure and that is to afford the Archdiocese the time to advertise the opening for a new pastor at St. Catherine's and go through the process of Parish Consultation meetings and interviewing prospective candidates. The new pastor will definitely be at St. Catherine's on Aug. 1. I hope to have as much input as possible in helping the Personnel Board and Cardinal Law in choosing the best person for St. Catherine's. You deserve the best!

I know change can frighten some people and others look forward to changes. The Archdiocese of Boston realizes the needs of St. Catherine's and wants our parish to continue to serve the people of Charlestown in the best ways possible. I believe in the process and trust in the system to do all in its power to guarantee that St. Catherine's Parish and Charlestown Catholic continue to thrive.

It's not that I want to leave St. Catherine's, or that I have to leave St. Catherine's, but I am ready to leave. I arrived here in June 1990 as an assistant and was named pastor the following March. When I leave on Aug. 1, I will have served at St. Catherine's longer than any other of my assignments.

I have truly been at home and cannot begin to thank you enough for the support, encouragement and affirmation of love.

There will be a weekend toward the end of July when you will be welcome to come into the rectory after Masses to say goodbye.


Window Box Contest

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Residents Exchange Ideas On New Playground For The Harvard-Kent School

Representatives of the City Year national service organization met with Harvard-Kent Elementary School abutters at an April 11 community meeting hosted by Charlestown Neighborhood Council Precinct 2 representative David Whelan to discuss ideas for a new playground.

"The idea came from City Year," said Jack Halloran, Harvard-Kent principal. "They asked if we might be interested in a playground, and I said 'absolutely yes.' I didn't hesitate at all."

City Year volunteers between 17 and 23 years old have been serving the school and its classrooms for three years, having been a great asset, according to Halloran. Anticipated money for a playground from the Brown Fund did not materialize, he said.

ed to design the approximate 1,000- to 3,000square-foot playground in the next two to three weeks. Site preparation, equipment and manpower will be supplied by City Year in a high-impact barn-raising tradition. Some 500 people will build the tot lot in a few hours starting on June 13.

"This is not a City Year project," said Executive Director Robert Lewis Jr. "We provide the workforce, but this is the community's project."

The Harvard-Kent was the only Boston Public School selected for the organization's playground community service project in Boston this year. Last year City Year built playgrounds in Ohio during its 1995 Annual National Convention. Another private school in Roxbury has also been chosen.

A City Year team will return next year for a cleanup, but Charlestown is expected to regularly maintain its new playground.

Ted Marquis, City Year service coordinator, said the tot lot will primarily be geared toward 3- to 8year-olds and be completely handicapped accessible. Probably one of the "pits" at the front of the school will serve as the site, Marquis said, and the community's design can include trees and other green space.

Playground Environments in New York will supply the community's selected play pieces, such as slides and climbing structures. Marquis said two different playground surfaces could be considered, a wood chip covering or rubber matting, although, he said wood chips are a safer landing surface for children. Facilities Management for the School Department will have final design approval to ensure safety standards.

Noting the Harvard-Kent's particularly unattractive design and landscaping, residents agreed that a playground would enhance the school and community's appearance. But abutters and school personnel were concerned about issues, such as children's safety, supervision, Bunker Hill Street traffic and added noise.

Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee Chairman Jim Conway was also concerned that all work and clean up be completed by the day before the June 16 parade, asking for a written guarantee.

City Year designers will meet with Harvard-Kent students and school personnel early next week for initial ideas and issues.

Whelan will reconvene abutters and other residents for an April 25 meeting to provide community input for the designer. The meeting is slated for 7 p.m. at the Kent Community Center, 50 Bunker Hill St. Whelan said that the full council will review the playground's design plan at its May 7 monthly meeting.

Investment clubs have been around for a long time, and it's easy to see why. According to their umbrella organization, the National Association of Investors Corp., about 60% of clubs outperform the stock market in any one year.

If you don't have a fortune and you want to grow a portfolio of individual stocks rather than mutual funds, an investment club may work for you. Every month, club members contribute the same amount (e.g., \$50) into a pool. This monthly commitment facilitates "dollar-cost averaging:" you'll probably do better by investing regularly, rather than trying to time market highs and lows.

The optimal number of members in a club is about 15. If membership gets too large, people may feel they don't have enough input. Some clubs have each member track one or two stocks and report on them at monthly meetings. This keeps everyone involved.

Most clubs are organized as partnerships, so capital gains and losses on stock sales are prorated and flow through directly to the members. Clubs typically reinvest dividends and capital gains.

Most clubs diversify their holdings. As a good starting point, look for companies whose sales have grown at an average annual rate of 12% to 15% for the last five to 10 years, with earnings per share growing at a similar rate.

Successful clubs aren't get-rich-quick schemes. Their investment strategy usually emphasizes objectivity and focusing on a company's long-term growth potential. Stocks are not purchased on a "hot tip," nor are they dumped in a panic. If this kind of investment approach appeals to you, consider joining or starting a club.

Mayor Thomas Menino Shares Vision Of The City With Kiwanis Members And Guests At Recent Luncheon

Mayor Thomas M. Menino recently took the opportunity to lunch with members of the Kiwanis Club of Charlestown, the Charlestown Business Association and Kiwanis Club members from neighboring communities. The focus of the program was on the city's schools and the mayor's plans to upgrade the education programs and properties.

The Kiwanis Club of Charlestown was singled out for its \$12,000 donation which initiated a proposal to create a playground at the Warren-Prescott School that would be utilized by students as well as by neighborhood youngsters.

Charlestown Kiwanis
Club President Henry Sawyer welcomed the gathering, introducing Kiwanis
District Lt. Gov. Manny
Camelo who praised the
local club for "doing great
programs for children."
Honorary Charlestown Kiwanian Don Breen spoke
of the Kiwanis motto "We
Build," noting that the

word "playground" should be added to it.

Kiwanis Secretary Patricia Simpson, who is spearheading the efforts to raise the necessary funds to build the Warren-Prescott playground, told of the project which started with four people - Tony Fernandes, Doug MacDonald, Leo Boucher and Dr. Domenic Amara, the school's principal. Simpson praised Amara's efforts in helping to write a grant proposal that resulted in \$10,000 from the BioMedical Foun-

Simpson went on to tell of the Schoolyard Initiative created by the mayor that helped remove some of the obstacles involved in building a playground and created a public-private partnership that will "work toward building a better life for our children." She said that she had benefitted from the playground proposal by making new friends and involving the children of the school in the project.

Menino praised Simp-

son, calling her a "catalyst" in making good things happen. He said, "At present the schoolyard looks like a prison . . . schoolyards should reflect what's going on inside and they should be a place where children want to go."

He spoke about the collaboration between himself, foundations and the private sector, noting the importance of such cooperative ventures, especially with the cutting out of government programs. Menino added that "a great government is one that doesn't lose its heart."

Menino went on to talk about his goal of bringing up the reading grade level, encouraging volunteers to go into the schools to help students with reading and investing \$60 million in capital improvements for the schools, including three new schools he termed community learning centers which would also provide before and after school programs. These centers are slated for East

Boston, Roxbury and Mattapan.

The mayor mentioned the recent donation of 32 computers by Boston Edison to the C.R. Edwards Middle School. He said that there must be an emphasis on technology, adding that "partnerships are what it is all about."

Menino urged Boston residents to support the appointed School Committee which will be a question on the November ballot. He said he felt the appointed School Committee voted on the merit of issues, not on being re-elected. He went on to talk about the new school superintendent, Tom Payzant, and the changes he has instituted. He said that Payzant's aim is to have "117 good schools," and he is "taking accreditation seriously." Menino noted there is a task force checking on schools to make sure requirements are being met for accreditation.

Changes in the schools, said Menino, include headmaster and principal meetings, issuing keys to their respective schools to the headmaster, the establishment of a city-wide curriculum by September, and the involvement of parents in the schools through Site Councils. He noted, "Parents make the difference."

The program concluded with the presentation of a certificate of recognition by Menino to the Kiwanis Club of Charlestown for the club's work on initiating plans for the new Warren-Prescott playground, Also, Simpson presented a playground T-shirt to Menino thanking him for his support.

Each guest took home a bookmark made by students in grades 1-5 at the Warren-Prescott School as a special gift of thanks for supporting the playground.

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



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
