



by Sal Giarratani Here Comes the Metro?

Last week the Boston Globe ran a story concerning Boston School Supt. Robert C. Wood's scheme to enroll suburban students full time in Boston's public schools to promote voluntary metropolitan desgregation and to provide academic opportunities unavailable in smaller communities

First Edco, then Metco and now this? Most opponents of forced busing have said all along that a metropolitan solution would be inevitable and now it appears that could be true!

Many pro-busing "experts" who have studied schools in Northern cities have concluded

that as long as families can flee to the suburbs, court-ordered forced busing can never work in cities like Boston. In other cities, including Los Angeles and St. Louis, pro-busers are attempting to win approval of a "metropolitan" busing scheme, which would bus inter-city students to suburbs and vice versa.

Whether inter-city busing works on a voluntary or mandatory basis, it will eventually be imposed anyway. You're damned if you do, damned if you don't!

In an article in this past Sunday's New York Times in a column headlined, "Busing is Still a Dirty Word in Many Cities," Dr. Willis Harley from Duke University stated that options for white flight are declining and "Private schools won't be able to accept all the whites. . . whites might find that they have no place to go."



and meet income guidelines, can apply for a Project YES job. Project YES will visit neighborhood Little City Halls duringthe next two weeks to enroll eligible youth.





Today, John Sears candidate for the Boston City Council called for an immediate study to explore the need for a second airport to reduce the heavy volume of traffic at Logan Airport. Sears made the proposal after strongly criticizing the FAA's recently

Chief of the Air Traffic Division for the FAA - New England Region, Sears said:

decision of August 23 concerning the usage of runway 22-Right at Logan Airport. Choosing the second noisiest flight path of the five examined is no solution at Your report offers an all. unacceptable alternative. The residents of Boston's neighborhoods should not be forced to live with this excessive noise and a threat to their safety.'

Sears charged that the FAA had failed to address the problem of limited air space and congestion at Logan, noting that there is no room for future expansion.

The City Council candidate called upon the federal agency to

consider the diversion of air traffic to other major Eastern airports, and to study the traffic mixture at Logan to determine the need for a second airport.

In addition to the role of the FAA, the former MDC Commissioner proposes that the Metropolitan Area Planning Council study the feasibility of building a new airport or pulling Otis Air Force Base, Hanscom Field or other airports, out of retirement as possible locations where more air traffic could be diverted

"I have supported the idea of a second airport since it was proposed 10 years ago," said Sears, "and consider it a crime that no work in this area has been done subsequently.'

In concluding his letter to the FAA, Sears said: "It is time we begin addressing long term solutions, instead of accepting short term corrections '

Mayor White Calls District Profile "A Tribute To Neighborhood Vitality And Testament To The Future Of Charlestown"

Mayor Kevin H. White today called the district profile and proposed 1979-1981 Neighborhood Improvement Program for Charlestown "a tribute to the neighborhood's vitality and a testament to its promising future."

The 28-page report, which outlines various proposed city improvements and cites recent city investment initiatives, was prepared by the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

Compiled to assist community residents in defining their needs in terms of available city programs, the profile also provides background information and professional analysis of current issues facing Charlestown.

Mayor White said, "This document portrays the efforts of a responsive city administration to meet the needs and aspirations of neighborhood residents through programs and investment unheard of in Boston 12 years ago. But more than that, these booklets chronicle the stubborn, successful fight of this city's neighborhoods to maintain their distinct identities in the face of enormous economic and social pressures.'

The neighborhood profile offers a variety of strategies and options for confronting the most significant problems identified in Charlestown: maintenance of public land and facilities, and human services development, particularly for youth, elderly, and the unemployed.

Since 1968, the city has invested over \$35 million in public funds in Charlestown through the urban renewal program and through other investments such as the Kent Community School, the new Charlestown High School, and the Charlestown Library. Existing housing in Charlestown has been significantly improved through the Housing Improvement Program, the 312 low interest loan program, and 872 units of new housing including

CharlesNewtowne and Mishawum Park, have been built.

Currently, the city is improving and repairing many streets. It is also helping to support several important human service providers and planning several major improvements, including transportation changes and the redevelopment of the Boston Naval Shipyard.

Mayor White said, "Because of limited city funding capabilities, every effort should be made to use those funds wisely and to attract greater Federal and investments private in Charlestown. Information and recommendations contained in this report assist both the city and the neighborhood in determining how to accomplish that. goal.'







after a long period of negotiations between the "T" management and Rep. Voke. The debate over MBTA service in Charlestown began at a public meeting held last June where many area residents met with officials from the "T" to voice their complaints. When asked to comment on the progress he has made these past several weeks, Voke said, "I was able to put my foot down and demand action only because of the many Charlestown residents who helped me prove our case to the MBTA. I have a file several inches thick with residents' complaints on service that made it very difficult for them not to admit that changes were necessary.'

The major change that will benefit Charlestown is the addition of another bus and driver to the Bunker Hill line that will cut the waiting time down from 10 minutes to 7 minutes during the rush hour. According to Rep. Voke, this increase in service, coupled with the shortening of the Downtown run will help to ensure that Charlestown residents will be able to get to work on time in the morning.

These changes will go into effect with the new Fall schedule beginning on September 8th. Printed schedules are not available as yet but they should be ready by next Monday. Watch for a copy of the new schedules in next week's **Patriot**.

Fire Cripples Charity For Children

Mail for Tots, a charitable organization which has, during the past four years brought sunshine into the lives of critically ill children has had a major setback. The fire, attributed to arson, has shut down the flow of mail and gifts for the youngsters. Both children and adults (who they also help) are from all parts of the United States and Canada. The greatest loss was the list of names and addresses of the volunteers who provided the mail, toys, dolls, games, stuffed animals, books, and other like items, for the children. The loss of the 2,000 friends whose financial support made everything possible, along with nearly 500 gifts which had to be abandoned because of water damage, has brought the organization to a standstill.

Edmund Burns, the founder and President, had the sad task of informing the youngsters why the mail and gifts have stopped. He stated "he did not have the heart to tell them how truly serious the situation is," and added, "How do you tell a child who has Cancer. Leukemia or some other dreadful affliction that we somehow managed to lose their friends and gifts in one fell swoop?" Mail for Tots is struggling to get started again. There was no insurance coverage for the equipment and materials lost; it will have to be replaced before mailings can be resumed. Any donation, large or small, would be appreciated.
